CONTENDS FOR 35c AS COTTON PRICE

Austin, Texas. October 15, 1918.

The State Department of Agriculture of Texas has made a care ful survey of the cost of producing the 1918 cotton crop and found the cost to be 35 cents based upon 160 pounds of lint per acre, and named 35 cents as the minimum price cotton should sell for. Since then the Government estmates less than 160 pounds, thus increasing the cost.

The price went to 35 cents. 


