WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The allied German armistice has been signed.

The State department made the officail announcement at 2:46 o'clock this morning. The armistice was signed at five o'clock this a. m., Paris time, which was eleven o'clock last night here. The hostilities ceased at eleven o'clock this morning, Paris time, which was six o'clock hereal

The signing of the armistice and the comprest dis surrender of the enemy is now a matter cd wa tory. The enemy guns have been hushedthe allied and American armies are in furns er, and will hold it until democracy assert? and permanent world peace has bee nre

Washington, Nov. 11.&President Wilso, afternoon, told congress and the whole what terms Germany accepted when she s the armistice.

These terms are pictured in Germany su'a dering abjectly to General Foch on the ba field, her armies beaten, her government of turned, her masters in flight, and her own land blood stained with her own people in a state of revoultion.

The terms of the armistice include the most drastic downfall ever experienced by and nation. They are briefly as follows:

Cessation of hostilities.

Evacuation of invaded territory, including Alsace-Loraine and Luxenburg.

Surrender of vast amount of guns and equip-

Evacuation of left bank of the Rhine river.

Surrender of vast amount of rolling stock in occupied territory.

Abandonment of Bucharest and Brest treaties Unconditional surrender of all German forces in East Africa.

Reparation of all damages done.

Surrender of scores of submarines and large war crafts.

Concentration of her aircrafts at a stipulated

Evacuation of all the Black Sea ports.

Restoration of all allied and U. S. Merchant vessels.

The duration of this armistice will be thirty days. In that time Germany must comply with all requirements stipulated in its terms.

One portion of the machinery at the tower has been considered weak for some time and new material has already been ordered to build this part now. It gave way and the men, who at the time lowering the bit could not control the machinery. It was turned loose and the big wheel was shattered into a thousand pieces. Great supports and parts of the derrick and machinery. It was broken as if they had been splinters. Very luckily none of the four men on duty were hurt It is thought within a week the repairs can be made and the well started up again. The bit and tools were not lost as the cable became entangled in portions of the tower and other machinery and held it so it did not strike bottom. This was another lucky thing for the well, as the well would likely have had to be abandoned if the bit had fallen to the bottom unobstructed .- Paint Rock Heral.
