The first calls for having stored away somewhere in the car a stack of old newspapers. When refuse to take hold, feed in some of the old papers between the tires and the mud. Usually only a few will have to be worked in before the wheels will begin to grip and the car start forward. This method of handling a difficult situation is so simple and so uniformaly successful that every motorist should know of it and carry a pile of old newspapers unless he is equipped with some other apparatus for such a costin-

Here is the other method suggested by the tire company. Put the car in low, and if you cannot feed the gas with your foot evenly so that the wheels will revolve slowely put your emergency brake on. Do not put it on so tha the wheels will not revolve at all, but tightly enough to keep them from revolving rapidly. With the wheels turning slowely, the maximum pull is delivered to them by the car in ow gear, and so long as they turn slowely they can get the benefit of the tremendous power.

It is not always wise to fill the hole with stones or bricks, for their rough edges are hard on tires. Small banches of trees are better, as they ofter much better tractive space. Should this method fail quite often a slight push that would not much more than move a baby buggy will furnish just the added amount of power necessary t goet the ear going.
