## FEW OPERATORS STRIKE; REPORTS ARE CONFLICTING

Dallas, June 11.—With a nation wide strike of telegraph operators going into effect at eight o'clock this morning conflicting statements are made and it is impossible to tell the number of operators who are out in Texas. The Western Union Service is declared to be unimpaired, while the Postal and McKay services in the principal cities are reported to be badly crippled.

President Konenkamp of the Telegraphers Union, in a statement issued at Chicago, declared that sixty thousand operators struck in the nation this morning.

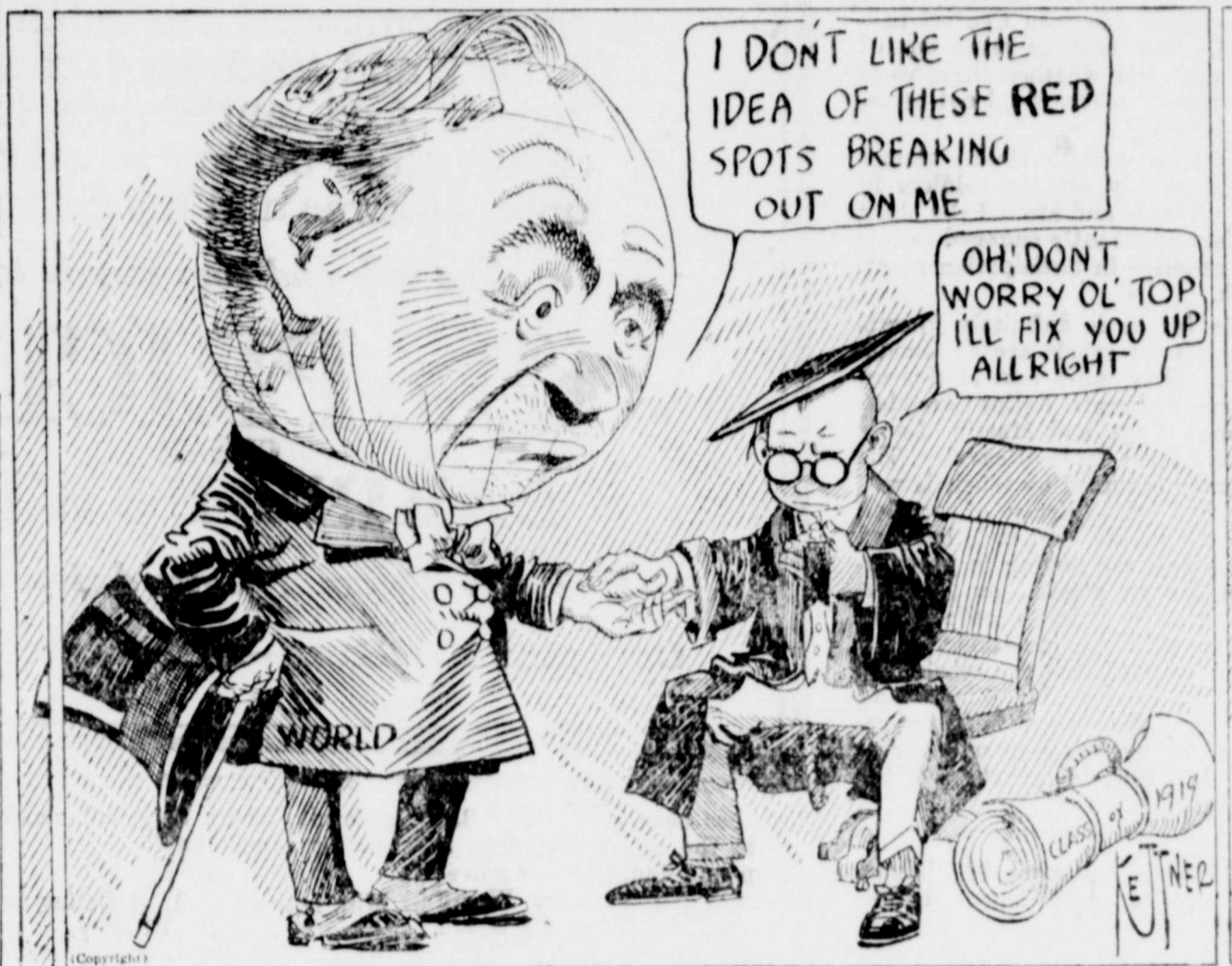
**Western Union Makes Statement**

## WAR NURSES TO RECEIVE \$60 BONUS

Nurses who have been discharged from the service of the United States will receive the \$60 discharge bonus being given the soldiers, sailors and marines, according to announcement by the federal government. Those who are discharged hereafter will receive this bonus on the same roll or voucher upon which they are given their final pay.

Section 1406 of the Revenue Act, approved February 24, 1919 authorizes the payment of a bonus of \$60 to officers, soldiers, field clerks and nurses of the Army upon honorable discharge, resignation or otherwise. This bonus is not payable to the heirs or representatives of any deceased soldier.

Nurses who have been discharged and have received their final pay without the \$60 bonus should make application to the Zone Finance Officer, Lemon Building, Washington, D. C., enclosing their discharge certificate or military orders for discharge, or both, if both were issued. Nurses are advised to secure attested copies of discharge certificates before forwarding them.

For further information regarding this, apply to the local Red Cross Chapter or the Division Department of Nursing Service.

A party of non-union men who were employed to fill the places made vacant by the strikers, were attacked by strikers and a general fight followed. The police have four union men under arrest.

The union leaders issued a statement following the fight declaring that the fight was the outcome of the state's policy in allowing companies to hire armed guards to protect the strike-breakers.

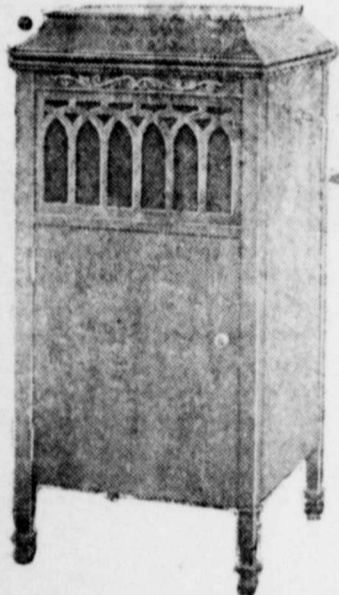

## Gov. Hobby Discharges 3 Troops Texas N. Guards

### BAD PRISONER PLAYS 'POSSUM

Jack Johnson, being held in the local jail charged with robbing the Winters State Bank and doing other unlawful things, "pulled" another "stunt" on Sheriff Perkins Wednesday, or at least laid the plot which Mr. Perkins believes was designed to trap him.

When the Sheriff carried the prisoner's breakfast to him Wednesday morning, Jack was apparently asleep, and did not respond to the officers' call. The breakfast was left within the prisoner's reach, and the sheriff did not disturb him.

At the noon hour Mr. Perkins went to find the prisoner again, and found that he was occupying the same position on his bunk, and the morning meal was where the sheriff had left it.

The prisoner again failed to respond to the sheriff's call.

Mr. Perkins has learned the tricks of Jack pretty well, and he did not rush in the cell to see if the man was really dead, but called County Clerk McCarver and Attorney Shepherd over to witness the resurrection. After the two gentlemen arrived the cell was opened and Jack pulled from his bunk for an examination.

The officers found the prisoner very much alive, having perfect respiration, pulse, etc., but he continued to feign unconsciousness, and refused to wake up.

The officer did not call a doctor as from the diagnosis made, they decided that Jack was only suffering from the sleeping sickness disease, and the sheriff says he is a better prisoner when asleep than at any other time.

The secret of the 'possuming was found in a piece of lead pipe which Jack broke loose from the plumbing and secreted under his pillow. It is the opinion of the officers that the prisoner was laying a trap for the sheriff and intended to make an attempt to escape when the officer went into see if his prisoner was dead.

However, Jack may really be in a "stupor" as he has been losing some sleep and laboring under mental strain in making trouble for the sheriff. He has played desperate and stated that he had as soon be dead as be in jail and that he did not care if the officers took him out and shot him.

Captain I. Cohen of the local cavalry troop, known as Troop I, Third Texas Cavalry, received official notice from the Adjutant General's Department Wednesday at noon, that all the men in the local troop had been discharged, except the officers. All the officers have been transferred to the National Guard Reserve. The enlisted men are honorably discharged from the service.

In addition to the local troop, Troop L, 7th Cavalry, San Augustine, Texas and Troop L, 2nd Cavalry, San Marcos, Texas, are also discharged by the order issued by Gov. Hobby, Commander in Chief of the Texas National Guard.

It is not known here what prompted Gov. Hobby to discharge these three troops, but it is believed that he did so in complying with an appeal made to the headquarters several weeks ago, when petitions bearing seventy-two names of the enlisted men of the local troop was presented. It is probable that petitions also went in from the troops and San Augustine and San Marcos.

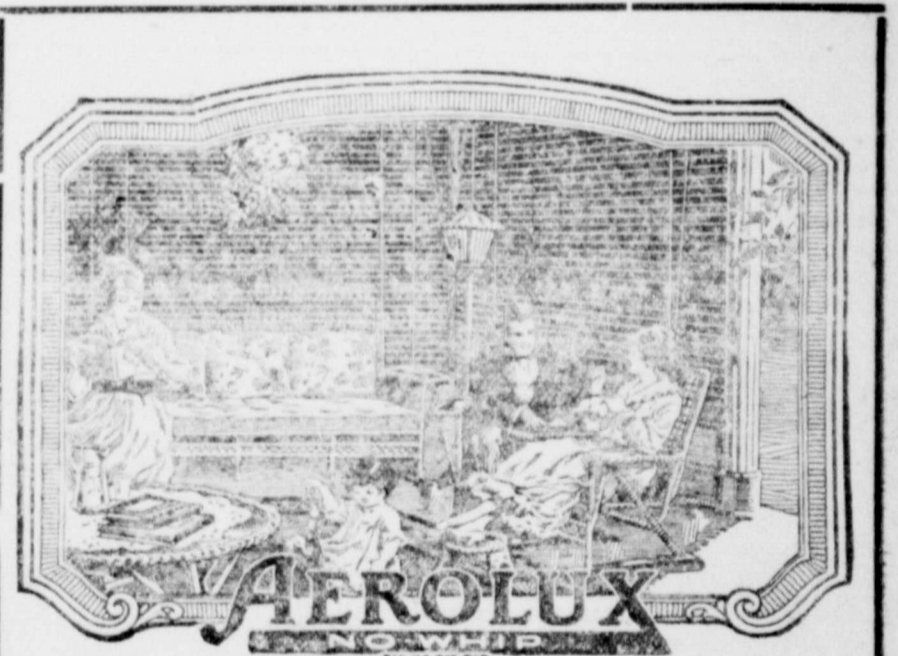
No action effecting the other troops of the National Guard of Texas has been made known here. The order issued by Gov. Hobby today only releases three troops, or three hundred men out of a total of perhaps of twelve thousand.

Capt. Cohen stated that he was delighted that his men had been released. The local troop was organized about one year ago by Dr. L. B. Stephens, who was commissioned captain. Later Dr. Stephens was promoted and Mr. Cohen appointed to succeed him.

For a time after the organization was perfected it appeared as though the boys would get into service. The officers were called to training camp, and in the mean time many of the boys were mobilized and held together here. The signing of the armistice stopped plans, and the boys have been in somewhat of an unsettled state of mind, and from time to time promises, or announcements of plans kept them guessing as to what would come next. They have never received any pay while the law governing their status provided for a twenty-five per cent pay, or about \$7.50 per month for enlisted men. They have never received any equipment, and the discouragement caused them to ask for their discharge.

A few days ago Gov. Hobby ask-

**PLANNING FOR STATE S.S. MEET**

All indications point to an unusually large attendance at the forthcoming Forty Fifth Annual Convention of the Texas Sunday School Association to be held in Galveston June 22nd-24th, according to information received by the Ledger from Rev. Geo. Waverly Davis, Pastor of the First Methodist Church at Galveston and General Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements. Aside from the fact that Galveston is the only large city in the state which will enjoy the benefit of excursion rates during the present summer, that city was unanimously chosen as the place of meeting because of its natural attractions and the opportunity it affords visitors for wholesome outdoor enjoyment. **LOCATING SITES IN WEST TEXAS**

(San Angelo Standard)  
Dr. Hugh H. Tucker, the Dallas geologist, who returned Sunday evening from a prospecting trip with Frank T. Pickrell of El Paso over the oil holdings of the Texon Oil and Land Company, located sites for the four wells that the company is to sink and found two perfect structures in the land that he examined according to Mr. Pickrell. Mr. Pickrell, who is vice president and general manager of the Texon company, said Monday that he was not yet ready to make public the sites that have been picked. He stated before starting on his trip, however, that the company would begin operations as soon as satisfactory arrangements had been made in regard to the sites on which it is to drill. The company's holdings are understood to be on University lands on which it has filed for the mineral rights under the Texas laws.

**DRILLER GIVES LOG OF WELL**

H. H. Jones, in charge of the Cain Well, near San Angelo, which proved to be a failure, issued a statement through the San Angelo Standard, when the well turned out to be a salt water producer, and furnishes a log of his well which refutes a statement recently made by an oil journal, and places this field in the field of great possibilities. We reproduce Mr. Jones' statement in full. It follows:  
San Angelo, June 9.—First let me thank you for the Southwestern Petroleum Syndicate, and the Spellman Oil Producing Company for the conservative manner in which you have handled the news regarding the Cain well. All have made a great effort to win oil for San Angelo but in this case have not succeeded. The Cain test should not be considered final by any means. It has made discoveries which, I believe, will lead to success in some of the wells drilling and to be drilled in this vicinity. In the May issue of one of the leading oil journals, there was an article relating to the "Boneyard of Texas," in which 30,000 square miles of this territory was unconditionally condemned, the argument being that the Bend formations would be so deep that they could not be reached by the drill. The Cain well has absolutely proved that conclusion erroneous, in so far as Tom Green county is concerned. Every authority that has examined the samples and log of this well assert that we not only found the Bend formation but passed through them and were in the lower Bend shale when the well was stopped at 4,314 feet. The lower Bend was thicker than expected as compared to the tests and outcrops further east. After going through over 500 feet of dark shale a gray mottled limestone was found at 3,860 feet. It continued to 3,897, then there was twenty-three feet of black rotten lime and shale. At 3,920 a very black silicious lime was entered, which continued to 3,965. The lower portion of this tested oil by chemical means. Below that there were alternate shales and limestones, the lines thinning out but each testing traces of oil down to 4,185. Then the formation was mostly shale with brownish hard intrusions until 4,250 feet was reached, when the shale had sandy streaks through them, turning to a sand rock at 4,312 feet. Two feet into this dense sandstone gave a salt water very heavily charged with salts—analysis not yet known. Taking the surface elevations into consideration the Bend formation lie but very little deeper here than at Ranger—that is, below sea level. The discovery of salt water makes a certainty of a seal to hold the oil up in any anticline there may be in this territory. We failed to reach the Ellenburger limestone. I am making this plain statement of facts for the information of those who are interested in the development of this part of the country in the hope that it may assist them in arriving at the correct conclusion. Personally I am very confident that success will be attained not far distant from the Cain well.

El Paso, June 11.—Juarez, cut off from communication with the rest of Mexico, had all the appearance of a deserted village today. A large portion of the civilian population had already sought refuge in El Paso, and the 2,500 troops were either confined to barracks, or on duty in the trenches and other defenses of the city. From office building roofs in El Paso, men could be seen at work where the Mexico Southwestern crosses the Mexican Central railroad, three or four miles out of the city, but whether these were federals or rebels could not be ascertained. Observers with field glasses could plainly see the soldiers in the trenches and around the block houses, apparently engaged in battle practice in anticipation of attack. So far as is definitely known, the nearest rebels are at Guadalupe, thirty miles east of Juarez, where Generals Felipe Angeles, Ramon Vega and Martin Lopez have a large force of cavalry. The country occupied by rebels is well watered with plenty of grazing for the horses, and it is believed the rebels are resting in preparation for an attack on Juarez, which even federal officers in Juarez admit is inevitable. It is also admitted that the rebels outnumber the available federals and that the latter are cut off from retreat in any direction save across the Rio Grande into the United States.

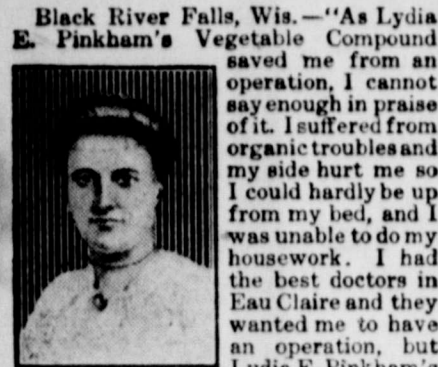

ed the war department to federalize certain regiments of Texas National Guards and place them on the border. The war department decline to do this, Gen. Cabell, in charge of the Southern Division, stating that there were sufficient number of regular troops in Texas to cope with the Mexican situation.

Some are inclined to criticize Hobby and say that his action in discharging the three troops above mentioned comes as result of the war department's failure to grant his request. This can hardly be, as the troops discharged are not included in the regiments which Mr. Hobby requested to be federalized.

While rejoicing over the fact that his men had been given their discharge, Capt. Cohen said "I am going to get mine." He will immediately take steps to be released from army rules, or expectations, in order that he may plan for the future and devote his time to his business, after sacrificing about two years without a cent of pay.

**SALVATION ARMY CARES FOR GIRLS**

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This hotel is being completely overhauled, repainted inside and outside and repaired throughout. It will be ready for the first guests about May 10.

The girls who live in the home are asked to conform to but few rules. On four nights of each week they are required to be in by 11 o'clock, but on the other three nights they may stay out until 12. After dinner each night they are asked to attend a short prayer service, consisting of a few hymns, Bible reading and the Lord's Prayer. Except for these rules the girls are at liberty to live as they would in their own homes. They may give parties in the pleasant living room and entertain their men friends there whenever they like.

The charge for board and room is very small. The highest price charged will be \$7 for a single room. The larger rooms contain two and sometimes three single beds. For accommodation in such rooms a smaller price is charged.

But since the home is designed for girls who would otherwise have to struggle to get along on small salaries, no girl who receives a salary larger than \$15 a week is accepted. Inquiries about the home are being made constantly and it is expected that it will be filled to capacity as soon as it is opened.

Captain Maja Thell is in charge of the home. She is a trained nurse, who began her training in Sweden and finished it at the Nurses' Training School of Jamestown, New York. She is also a graduate of the Swedish Massage School in Chicago.

For the past eight and a half years Captain Thell has been an officer in the Salvation Army. During this time she has been head nurse at the Salvation Army rescue homes of Chicago, Portland, Spokane, St. Louis, San Antonio, and Des Moines. "From my work in rescue homes," Captain Thell said, "I have come to the conclusion that the best way of protecting girls is to provide them with the proper living conditions at a price within their means."

Captain Thell comes to Dallas from Camp Logan, Houston, where she was a war worker in the Salvation Army hut at that camp, prior to that being at the hut at Camp Travis, San Antonio.

**DEMANDING FULL ICE WEIGHTS**

Mayor Guin issued a statement Wednesday morning in reply to numerous complaints which he said were being made to the city commission about short weight in ice. "I experienced the short weight myself," said Mayor Guin "and I know that the complaints, or at least some of them are justified." Continuing Mr. Guin said: "We have a law governing this matter, and the city commission expects to see that the law is enforced, as the ice company has increased its ice prices and the people are entitled to what they pay for. I called for fifty pounds of ice yesterday and when the ice was brought out I requested that it be weighed. It weighed only thirty-seven pounds on the ice plant's scales, and at the present prices I would have paid nearly a cent a pound for this ice had I accepted it without questioning the weights."

Mr. Guin stated that no protest had been made about the increase in price for ice, but that the city commission was going to see that full weights are given, and he has issued a notice to the ice consumers requesting that they report to him every instance where the weights are short. Mr. Guin says that if the ice company wishes to discard its scales and deliver ice by guess the delivery men must be sure that his guess is not below what he collects for.

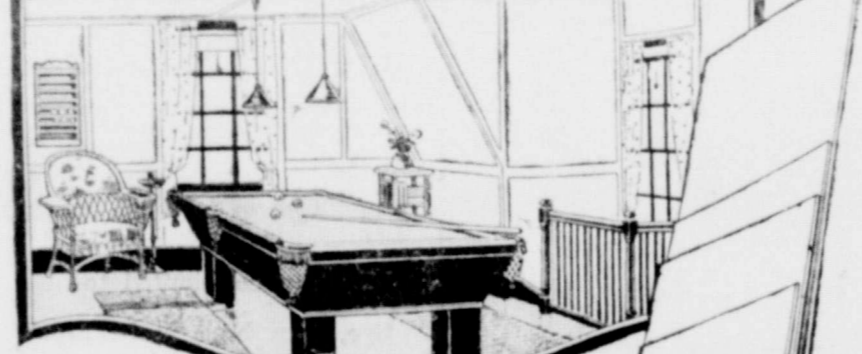
