## AUSTRIA SIGNS TREATY TO PUNISH WAR LORDS

PARIS, Sept. 10.—The Austrian Peace Commission, headed by Chancellor Renner, signed the peace treaty at St. Germaine at ten-fifteen this morning in a simple ceremony lasting until eleven.

Premier Georges Clemenceau presented the treaty for the allies, requiring the Austrians to sign two other agreements, submitting the list of allied ships sunk by the Austrians during the war, and a list of persons held responsible for the war to be punished by the allies. The Austrians signed both separate agreements.

## BUSINESS HOUSES ARE FILLING FAST

Only one vacant house remains on Eighth Street, where a short time ago, more than half of them were unoccupied. The remaining vacant house is expected to be rented before the end of the week.

The latest addition to the commercial life of the city is the Brewer Plumbing and Metal Works. D. J. Brewer has rented the building next door to the Dunlap pool hall and will engage in the plumbing and tin business here on October first.

Mr. Brewer is moving from Kearnes, Texas, or will move as soon as he can get a desirable residence for his family. Local rental agents have been scouring the city in an effort to locate a house, but so far only the cheaper class houses are offered.

At the present rate of increase in population and business concerns every business house in the city will soon be occupied, and the good old times of other days will be experienced here again. The man who said the country would come back was a good guesser.

Rev. C. L. Ewing, of Brownwood, is a delegate to Presbytery here this week. Rev. Ewing was pastor of the First Presbyterian church of this city when The Ledger editor landed in Ballinger twenty-seven years ago.

## SIGN NOW OR CHAOS TO FOLLOW

BISMARCK, N. D., Sept. 10.—Addressing an audience of one thousand people in a small theatre this afternoon, President Wilson declared that the question before the American people in considering the peace treaty is in whether there shall be peace or war.

"The failure to ratify the treaty as it now stands will cause chaos," said Mr. Wilson, "and the men who are opposing the treaty are desperate and will destroy the American government."

Bismarck is in the center of the non-partisan league country and the audience yelled when the President asserted, "America was founded to lead the world to liberty."

## DOUBLE CREW ON AT LOS ARROYO

Splendid success in drilling at the Safety First's Los Arroyo well is reported today. A double shift is on now and drilling is under way day and night.

Reports from the well late Wednesday stated that the drill was down about seven hundred feet and was still drilling in dry formation, never having struck water.

The well is on the North side of the river and on a high point overlooking the Colorado river valley, and the fact that no water has been encountered causes the wild caters to look upon the proposition with more favor. Much of the depth so far drilled has been through solid rock, and the geological showing is all that could be asked for in a deep well field.

Drilling at the rate of from fifty to one hundred feet per day this well should tell its story within a short time, and that story may set things to whirling here.

## Big Riot Follows Cop Striking

BOSTON, Sept. 10.—The state militia was called out this afternoon when renewed rioting caused by the policemen strike broke out.

There were scores of fights as the great mob moved towards the downtown district. More than two hundred arrests were made and the mayor declares that property damages amount to over a half-million dollars.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Union members of the Boston police force went on a strike last night. Carrying out their threat to walk out if Police Commissioner Curtis disciplined any of their number of joining the union, they reported at the evening roll call, turned in their equipment and proceeded to Fay Hall in the south end for a meeting.

## FIVE DRUNKS IN ANGELO TOWN

(San Angelo Standard) Shades of John Barleycorn! Was there boot-legging in San Angelo during August, or were home made drinks "with a kick" responsible?

On the monthly report of City Recorder M. B. Jones, appear five cases of drunkenness during August. All of the inebriates were Mexicans, and all were fined. Officers investigating the cases expressed the opinion that excessive quantities of lemon extract and other supposedly harmless liquids had been drunk.

Not a complaint was filed in city court during July, and the passing of the saloon was held responsible. During August there were nine cases. Two white men were arrested, convicted and fined for speeding, and there was one case each charging affray and assault. The other five were for drunkenness. With the exception of the white men fined for infraction of the speed laws, all the defendants were Mexicans and negroes.

## TREATY SUBMITTED TO SENATE; WILSON CRITICISED

### INFLUENZA WARNING SENT OUT BY STATE

State Health Officer Goddard, has issued a warning to the people to begin now to prevent the spread of the flu this fall and winter. The health officer announces that another epidemic is expected, and he urges that every city wage a vigorous clean-up campaign and use every precaution to keep down the disease.

The flu last winter killed more people than were killed in the war as it came unexpected and the physicians were not familiar with the disease, its treatment and preventives.

Medical experts have been busy experimenting with preventives and with remedies, and if the people begin in time, use the proper precautions, and guard against exposure, it is not expected that the disease will be as bad.

By all means the citizens should support every move put on foot to clean up the city and in every effort to make for good health.

## ANOTHER INSANE CARRIED TO AUSTIN

Sheriff Perkins is off to Austin with Mrs. Hanny Kiefer, who was adjudged insane Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Perkins went to Brownwood a few days ago and brought the woman back to Ballinger, having been notified by the sheriff of Brown county that the woman had been taken in custody at that place, and her action indicated that she was mentally unbalanced.

Mrs. Kiefer lost her husband in the war, he having died with pneumonia. She has several children, and these are with their grandparents near Winters. The unfortunate woman came to Ballinger and spent several days and after renting a house here she said she would buy the place. She said she was a detective for the government and when she left here last week, after leaving her children with their grandparents at Winters, she said she was going to Washington. When she reached Brownwood she called at the court house and represented herself as being with the secret service.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Accompanied by a six-page report, which bitterly criticises President Wilson, the senate foreign relations committee today submitted the peace treaty to the senate.

Senator Lodge in submitting the committee's report declared that it represented a majority of the committee. Senator Hitchcock, the administration leader, will later submit a minority report, upholding Mr. Wilson and asking that the treaty be ratified without amendment.

## ANGELO PREACHER MADE MODERATOR

The Brownwood Presbytery, convened at the First Presbyterian church in Ballinger at eight-thirty Tuesday night. Rev. B. D. Kennedy, pastor of the church at Coleman, preached the opening sermon.

Following the opening sermon, the Presbytery was opened in regular order with prayer by the retiring moderator, Rev. Kennedy, and a roll call of delegates showed that a quorum was present.

The matter of electing officers was postponed until Wednesday morning, and the hours for session fixed from nine to twelve forenoon and from two to five afternoon and from eight-thirty to adjournment in evening.

Wednesday morning several other commissioners arrived and the election of officers resulted in the election of Rev. A. F. Cunningham, of San Angelo, moderator, and Dr. S. W. Johnson, of Brownwood, temporary clerk.

The usual order of business was carried out through the day with devotional services at stated times. Tonight Rev. Cunningham will preach the doctrinal sermon. The public is cordially invited.

CENSORING PRAYER

The country has learned all the details of an incident occurring a few days ago in the National House of Representatives. But in order to refresh the memory of Bulletin readers, it is recounted that the blind chaplain of the House, who has held his position for a long period of years, was severely censured by the Republican Speaker, when he inclined in his daily invocation a plea for Divine blessing on the League of Nations.

Another scene a few days later is interesting. A Republican representative from the good state of Ohio was tearing his hair and literally frothing at the mouth as he counseled against the adoption of the League of Nations. Admittedly many interruptions he delivered himself of a fiery speech, admonishing the Democrats to get down on their knees and beg forgiveness for having foisted Woodrow Wilson on this country of ours, and declaring that never before since the declaration of Independence had the freedom of the American people been menaced as in "this nefarious document."

Manifestly, such a speech required an answer, and our own Congressman, even Thomas L. Blanton, was elected to the job. Mr. Blanton, somewhat surprised upon being requested to make a speech, got to his feet at once, and met the occasion fully:

"Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the House, it ill becomes the gentleman from Ohio to admonish the Democrat, on this side of the aisle to get down upon their knees and pray to Almighty God when the time has come, unfortunately, in the history of this House when, by command of our Republican Speaker, our supplications must be specially framed according to Republican recipe, so as not to embrace any hope of universal peace and brotherly love, for which the lowly Savior of men meekly taught us to.

"And likewise, unfortunately, by the command of the Republican Speaker of the House, the distinguished, Godly, blind Chaplain of this House, though a Republican, has been denied the privilege of praying without restraint for Democrats, and though, during his many sessions of valuable service as nonpartisan Chaplain of this House he in years past was taught by leaders of the Republican Party that an established peace guaranteed by a league of nations was a condition such to be sought after and worthy to be prayed for, his zealous lips are now sealed and this blind follower of the Nazarene has been forbidden by Republican mandate to pray for Divine guidance in assisting Congress to bring about a cessation of cruel war and the establishment of universal peace, forsooth, because our Republican colleagues have denominated same Democratic doctrine."

Be it noted in this connection that the Bulletin finds itself heartily in accord with the Congress, from the Seventeenth Texas district. It is a rather agreeable sensation.—Brownwood Bulletin.

THREE NATIONS RACE FOR AIR PRIZES.

Bournemouth, Eng., Sept. 10.—Nine British, French and Italian seaplanes faced the starter here today when the international over-sea race for the Jacques Schneider trophy and a \$5,000 prize was resumed after an interval of five years. The last contest was held at Monte Carlo in April, 1914, when Howard Pixton, on a Sopwith seaplane won the trophy for Great Britain.

Modern advances in seaplane construction have led to alteration of the conditions of the contest, which is now held over a course of 200 nautical miles. The course selected by the Royal Aero Club embraces Bournemouth, Swanage and Christ Church. Each country is entitled to three entries, the British fliers being supplied by the Sopwith Aviation Company, the Avro Company, and the Supermarine Aviation Company.

The British Motor Boat Club supply marine police and patrols.

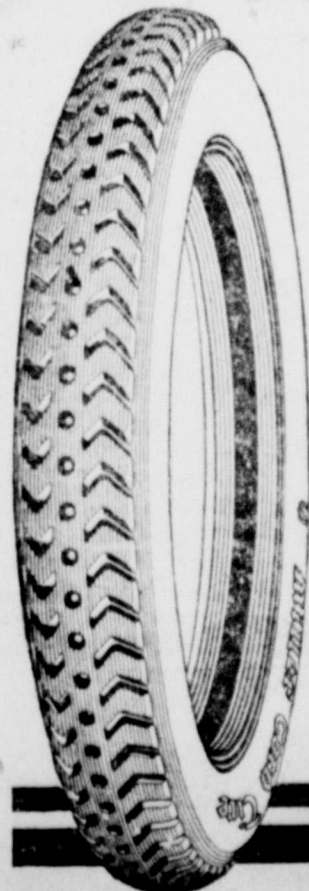

## BIG RIOT FOLLOWS WHEN BOSTON COPS STRIKE.

(Continued from First Page.)

ley said that more than 500 men had been recruited for a volunteer police force.

**5 KILLED; 15 WOUNDED, IN RIOTING IN INDIANA**  
Hammond, Ind., Sept. 10.—Five strikers were killed and fifteen wounded yesterday in a battle between 1,000 former employees of the Standard Steel Car company and the police.

Two months ago 2,000 workmen at the plant went out on a strike for increased wages and improved working conditions. Five weeks ago there was a riot between strikers and the police in which a number of persons were injured and as a result of the outbreak Governor Goodrich sent a regiment of Indiana state militia to Hammond to restore order. The troops were withdrawn about two weeks ago.

Yesterday 200 strikers returned to work and this caused considerable bad feeling among the men who refused to return.

Today when the 200 men were on their way to the plant a crowd of 1,000 foreign born strikers gathered and threatened them.

Twenty policemen and twenty special guards ordered the disturbers to disperse. The order was greeted with jeers and shouts of "scab." Capt. Ben Strong, in charge of the police, then instructed that the leaders of the mob be arrested. When the police attempted to execute the order the crowd attacked with sticks and stones, several of the strikers drew revolvers and fired a number of shots.

The police replied by firing about seventy-five shots into the crowd, killing five and wounding fifteen strikers. Later the striker leaders were taken into custody and taken to jail. None of the policemen or special guards were wounded in the fight.

According to the police, the mob of strikers was led by Lieut. Thos. Skuba, 21 years old, a Pole, recently discharged from the United States army. He wore his uniform and carried an American flag, which he waved during the fight. He was later arrested.
