Mob Hangs Omaha Mayor

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 29.—Mayor Smith, of this city, who was hung to a telephone pole by an angry mob last night is able to sit up this afternoon. He has made no comment on the attempt to lynch him since he regained consciousness.

Major General Wood telegraphed the mayor today that he had ordered additional troops to Omaha, and that he would arrive tomorrow to assume personal charge of the situation. Some scattered fighting continued today between whites and

blacks, and a general race riot is threatened.

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 29.—Mayor Edward Smith, twice strung up by a mob which stormed the county court building here early today, after lynching William Brown, a

negro is not dead as reported in morning papers. Mayor Smith is still alive, but unconscious in a local hospital.

Federal troops assumed control of the city this morning after receiving orders from Major General Leonard Wood, commanding the Central department of the United States army.

The trouble which may cost the life of the mayor started yesterday when Sheriff Clark refused to turn over to the mob a negro charged with assaulting a white woman.

A huge mob formed yesterday, set fire to the court house. The court house and jail was defended by the entire city police led by the sheriff and Mayor Smith. The police fired into the mob, killing Frank Clancy and wounding several other members of the mob.

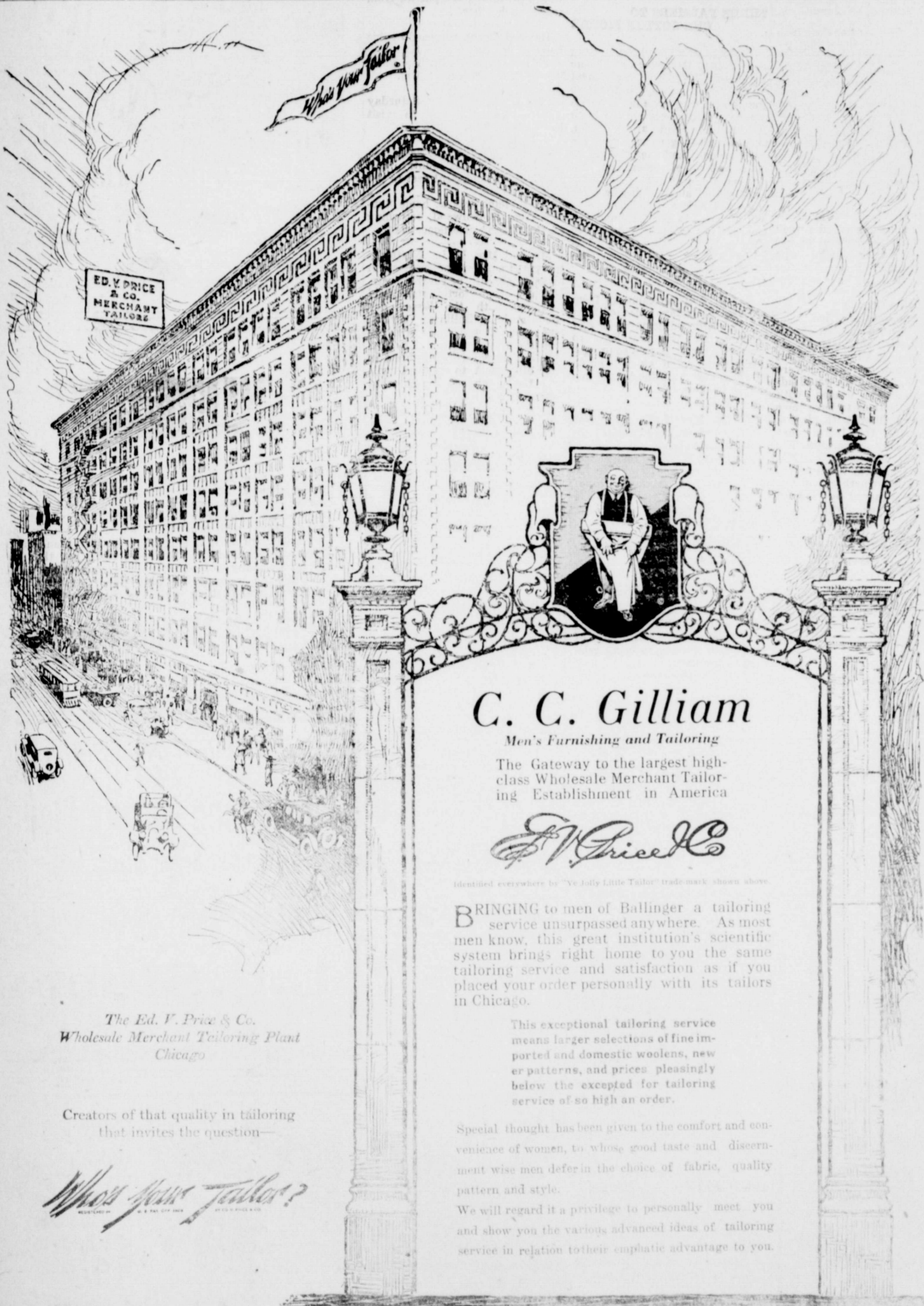
Thinking that the mayor fired the shot which killed Clancy, the mob seized the mayor and dragging him through the streets strung him to a pole with a rope about his neck. The police took desperate chances to rescue the mayor, who was more dead than alive when taken from the pole. There are slight chances for his recovery.

At a late hour the situation was quiet, and the mob had dispersed.

When a cotton picker gets off the train the farmers crowd around him, and the fellow generally feels his independence and saunters off up town and some farmer who did not meet the train gets him. Most of the hands coming here are employed before they leave home and farmers do not gain much by meeting the trains expecting to pick up hands. Most of the pickers want to get the "lay" of the land" before contracting.

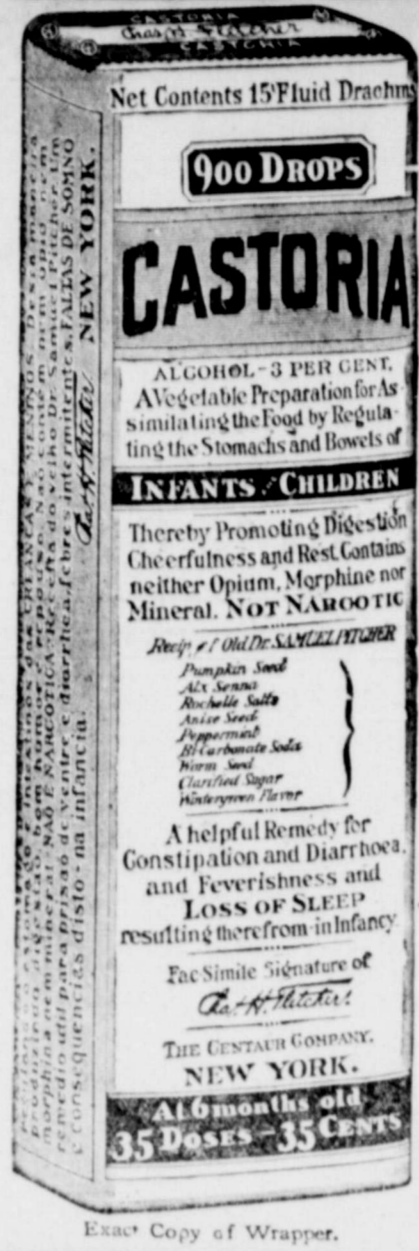

Champion Jack Dempsey Here Monday

It's not often that one of the smaller cities figures in the spotlight to the extent that Ballinger will next Monday, when Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, "the giant killer," opens his engagement with the Sells-Floto circus.

Every sporting page in the United States will carry a Dempsey story that day, and Ballinger will be mentioned often.

The champion of champions will reproduce in a squared circle in the big show arena Monday afternoon and night the Toledo fight with Jess Willard, blow for blow, round for round. Marty Cutler, heavyweight, who was one of the Dempsey seconds at Toledo, will step in the ring with Dempsey. After staging of the big fight reproduction, the champion and his sparring partner will box two fast exhibition rounds. And all this is in the main performance, folks. Right before your eyes in the big show—the huge three ring Sells-Floto performance, with its spectacular extravaganza, "The Birth of the Rainbow," with its seventeen great displays of one hundred and fourteen acts, its pageantry, its tableaux and its ballet.

Dempsey will arrive in Ballinger Sunday noon from New York, accompanied by his manager, Jack Kearns, who is negotiating a fight in England with Joe Beckett, the British champion. The purse will be over \$200,000, the New York papers state.

GOOD SHOWING IN HIGHTOWER WELL

J. T. Brown, of Winters, who was here the first of the week, reported that successful drilling was now in progress at the Hightower well east of Winters.

This well has been shut down for some time, but resumed drilling a few days ago. Hazlett & Harrison are contractors on the job.

Mr. Brown reported that the formation through which the drill was passing Saturday was declared to be favorable for an oil find after reaching deeper strata.

The well is now down 2365 feet. The contract calls for 3500. The optimism is causing some brisk trading in leases in the northern part of the county as well as a general feeling of assured success all over the county.

HUNDRED HANDS COME IN SINCE SATURDAY.

It is estimated that at least one hundred cotton pickers arrived in Ballinger on Sunday, Sunday night and Monday noon Santa Fe trains. One bunch of twenty-odd negroes arrived Sunday at noon, and others came Sunday night, and Monday noon's train brought a pretty good bunch of negroes. There were more white men than usual to arrive Sunday and Monday, very few of whom were employed at the train, farmers who were present to get hands being told to "wait until we look around."

Farmers who have been east after hands have been playing in hard luck, returning in several instances empty handed. They report that hands will be plentiful in a week or ten days, but not until scattering cotton is picked away from this section.

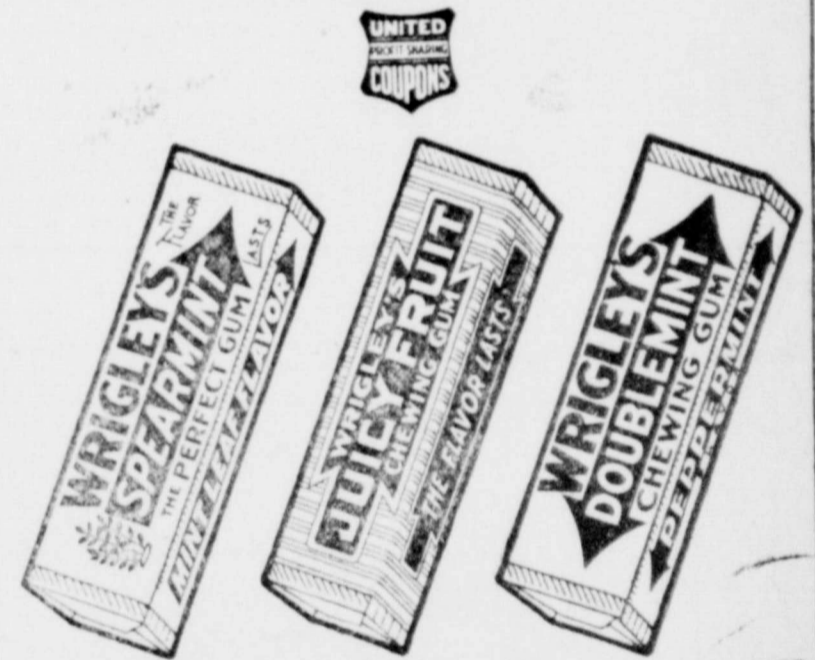

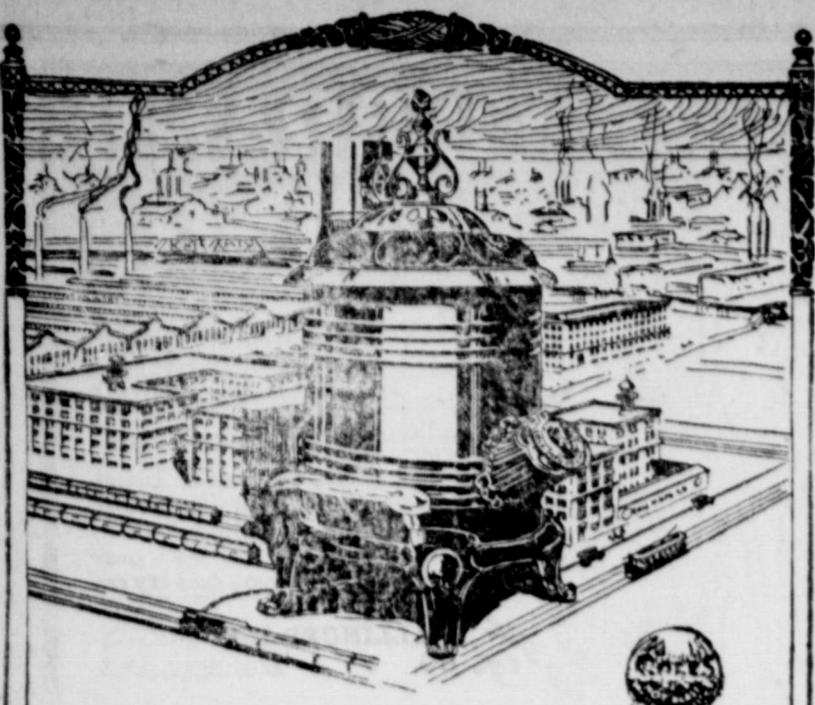

FARMER BUYS EIGHT MEXICANS

The eight Mexicans who were caught here Saturday and held by the sheriff until J. B. Reed, of Bangs, a farmer, could arrive, were released from jail Sunday.

Renzo Lee, a farmer of the Maverick country, was the lucky purchaser of the Mexicans. Mr. Reed accepted Mr. Lee's check for \$135 and loaded the Mexicans in his wagon, and they will pick cotton for Lee at the rate of \$2 per hundred until they have repaid the \$135.

Renzo Lee, a farmer of the May and paid the Mexicans' railroad fare to Bangs, where they contracted to pick cotton for him. They picked a short while and jumped their contract.

When caught at Ballinger, the Mexicans were en route to San Angelo. They acknowledged that they left Mr. Reed without making good their contract, but said they would not return. They expressed a willingness that the account be transferred to some one else and Mr. Lee jumped at the chance of getting some cotton pickers.
