SEVEN KILLED IN STEAMSHIP WRECK

MUSKEGON, Mich., Oct. 28.—Seven were killed, and eight are missing as the result of the steamer "Muskegon" sinking this morning. The steamer washed against a pier a mile off shore at four-thirty and went to the bottom in a few minutes. The vessel, valued at a half million dollars, is a total loss.

SCHOOL TEACHERS MUST HAVE HOMES

"I can't believe that the people of Ballinger are going to go back on me," said County Superintendent Bugg, "but I am having poor success getting homes for the school teachers who will be here to attend the institute next week."

Mr. Bugg says there will be more than two hundred teachers here, and so far he has listed homes for only about forty. Mrs. A. S. Love phoned Mr. Bugg she could room four teachers, and if necessary would try to make room for a half dozen.

"I am receiving letters from teachers asking me to get rooms for them," said Mr. Bugg, "and we must have the rooms, or Ballinger will receive a black eye."

The teachers from four counties are coming here to attend the institute. There will be at least one hundred teachers from this county alone, and Tom Green, Sterling, and Coke counties will join in the institute, and there will be about one hundred and fifty teachers from the three counties, making two hundred and fifty in all.

The school law requires the teachers to attend the institute, and they will be here in full force for one week.

Mr. Bugg says that everyone who has a spare room should notify him. A reasonable rate for lodging will be paid by the teachers, and as the same roomer will occupy the bed every night it will not be necessary to change the bed linen daily, and the teachers can be accommodated at a small cost.

It is expected that some will give both board and lodging, but lodging is the question Mr. Bugg wants help on now, and the teachers can make their meals at the cafes.

This is a matter which the Chamber of Commerce should handle, but as that organization does not seem to be working overtime, every one who can furnish room for one or more teachers should phone Mr. Bugg at once.

The institute convenes here next Monday, and many teachers will arrive Sunday.

PROPOSE CHANGE FOR SANTA FE

The people of this city and the traveling public from Brownwood West, could get a better train service if they would ask for it. The Santa Fe officials would no doubt make a through train out of the east bound train which arrives here at 9:28 a. m. and arrange a schedule for that train which would give connections with the main line and other roads between San Angelo and Temple, and at the same time give the people west of Coleman another through mail train east.

The following schedule has been suggested, and the people should get busy and ask that it be adopted by the Santa Fe, not to the minute suggested, but on a basis which would serve the purpose:

Train leave San Angelo 3:30 a. m., Ballinger 4:40 a. m., Coleman, 6:00 a. m., Brownwood 7:00 a. m., Lometa 9:00 a. m., Temple 12:30 p. m.

This schedule would make direct connection with the Frisco North and South at Brownwood, with the San Saba branch at Lometa, and both Santa Fe and Katy North and South at Temple. It would also connect with the H. & T. C. at Lamapapas, leaving that place at 12:30 and arriving at Austin at 4:30 p. m. and such a schedule would give an all day light ride to most any point in the state.

Making this stub train a thru train would do away with two stub trains on the Temple-San Angelo branch and would relieve the congestion now existing on No. 92, the evening train East of Brownwood as it now has to take care of all business originating in West of Brownwood on both the cut off line and the Angelo line, and it is usually late on account of connections to made at the various junctions between Brownwood and San Francisco.

The early morning train out of Brownwood could be operated on time as there are no connections West of Brownwood for it to be held for. It would give this country a thru train instead of two stubs as is now the case, both cutting out at Brownwood.

Parties going east on the morning train, as it is now operated, have to relay at Brownwood, and wait for the California train, which is usually from two to four hours late, and thus causing passengers to miss their connection at Temple, and forced into another lay over.

Under the present schedule only one outgoing mail train is operated each day. The morning train only carries pouch mail and that stops at Brownwood.

This is a change which we believe would meet with the general approval of the public of this part of the state, and we are going to take the matter up with Mr. Keenan and Mr. Maxson, and get their views on the question. Unfortunately the city has no chamber of commerce secretary at this time to handle such matters and what is everybody's business seems to be nobody's business.

PLUMMER TRIAL UP AT SAN ANTONIO

The case against Ernest Plummer, a former Ballinger boy, charged with killing his step-father-in-law at San Antonio last spring, is scheduled for trial at San Antonio this week.

The killing for which the Ballinger boy is to be tried grew out of the man who was killed insulting Mr. Plummer's wife and family trouble which followed. According to the particulars of the tragedy received here Ernest will be able to prove that he was justifiable.

A number from Ballinger are attending the trial, including Judge Jno. I. Guion, Judge J. W. Powell, H. Giessecke, R. P. Kirk and W. C. Penn.

SUCCESS REPORTED IN NEARBY WELLS

After a brief delay, caused by dropping the bit, the Safety First well is again operating on full time, drilling day and night. The hole is about 1275 feet deep, and making about fifty feet every twenty-four hours. The log of the well is as good as could be wished for, and the promoters are optimistic.

The well of the Runnel, County Oil Co., near Rowena, is down 475 feet and making good time. This is in the new hole started after all hope of cleaning the old hole was given up and the derrick skidded over and a new well spudded in. The drillers are under contract to sink this hole 3500 feet or get oil. Both oil and gas was found in the old hole, and pay oil is expected in the new well.

Hightower is drilling again after a brief delay caused by broken casing and is down about 2500 feet.

Nelson & Nelson on Mustang are shut down, but it is reported that they will resume drilling as soon as help can be had.

D. G. Lacy, who returned here last week and announced that he would resume drilling on the Russell ranch, left the city first of the week, and stated that he would organize a new drilling crew and return here soon.

The derrick for Russell No. 3 is ready for rigging and it is expected that the new well will be spudded in soon.

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—Apparently reliable reports received here today said that Texas railways will be turned back to corporate management on December 1st. The reports say that the Federal government will retain general control of the roads but will allow the executive heads of each railway to determine the general matters of business, improvements, upkeep, etc.

It is understood from the report that the duties of regional directors will be done away with.

The joy in the high price of cotton is knocked out when we think of the high price of dry goods.

Ballinger citizens will be guilty of neglect and a lack of hospitality, if they do not furnish homes for the school teachers next week.

Prosperity breeds crime, as evidenced by court records, and for this reason, it is better that countries experience reverses and hard times.

Enough feed for man and beast is going to waste in this county to make fat many heads of cattle and sustain the lives of many people. The farmers planted but the farmers can not harvest all.

Every sane man will endorse the move made by President Wilson to stop the coal strike. It is expected, however, that some republicans congressmen will vote with the strikers. Mr. Wilson has told the miners that the strike is unlawful legally and morally.

The agricultural department is warning farmers to look well ahead for planting seed, and to preserve a surplus supply of good seed. The wet weather throughout the country and the loss of crops in some parts of the state will create a shortage of planting seed. Farmers who save good seed will realize a big price for them.

There is a howl about bad roads. This is predicted. A big crop is now being marketed, and the unusually heavy rainfall has made roads impassable in some places. The people of this country wasted three years of valuable time waiting for it to rain. The rain finally came, and now they are wasting more time waiting for the roads to dry up enough to haul their cotton and other farm products to town. If the people had voted sufficient bonds and built good roads during the drought, they would have not only had good roads, to travel over now, but they would have been employed during the drought. But why look backward and worry.

ARMENIAN WOMEN BUILD GOOD ROADS

MARASH, Mesopotamia, Oct. 25.—One hundred miles of stone roads and several reconstructed steel bridges are among the permanent monuments that America will leave in this part of the Near East.

When the Red Cross arrived here, it found that the condition of the highways would hamper its relief operations among the refugee Armenians in this district. So it set about to rebuild stretches of roads between Aintab, Aleppo and Marash.

Capt. Edward Bickel, of Seattle, Washington, was placed in charge of the engineering work. He had to overcome difficulties which would have halted many contractors of public works in America. There was no male labor, materials were scarce, and small burros and camels were the only means of transport.

He settled the labor question by hiring Armenian women, who were glad to have employment of any kind. There were 500 Armenian women on the payroll of the Red Cross in this road building work. Materials were obtained from abandoned homes which had been partly demolished during the war. Convoys of mountain burros and camels were hired to transport the material.

In less than four months this female labor and ancient transport, under American direction, had reconstructed 100 miles of roads, rebuilt several ruined bridges over tributaries of the Euphrates river, and made possible the speedy distribution of Red Cross supplies in this district.

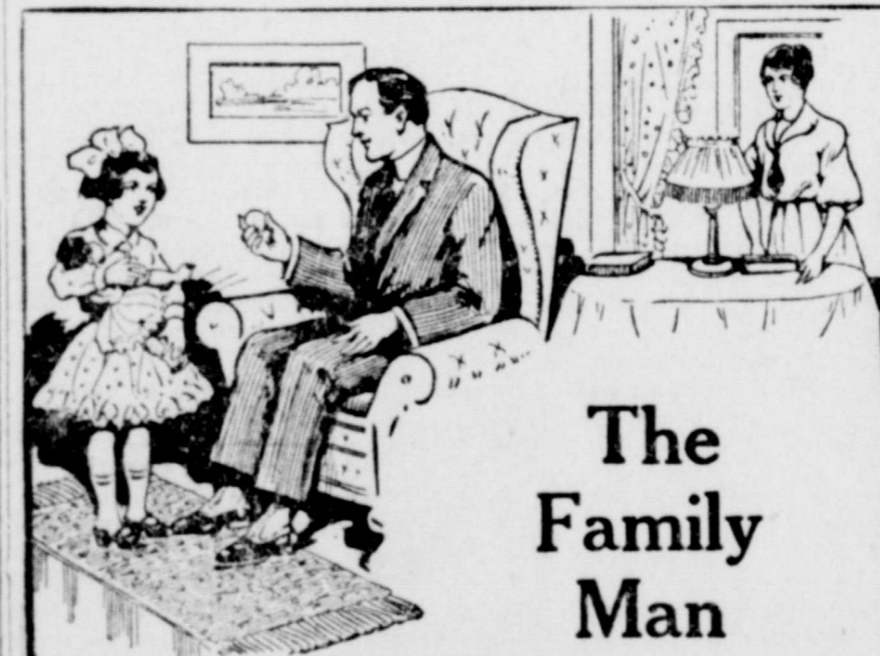

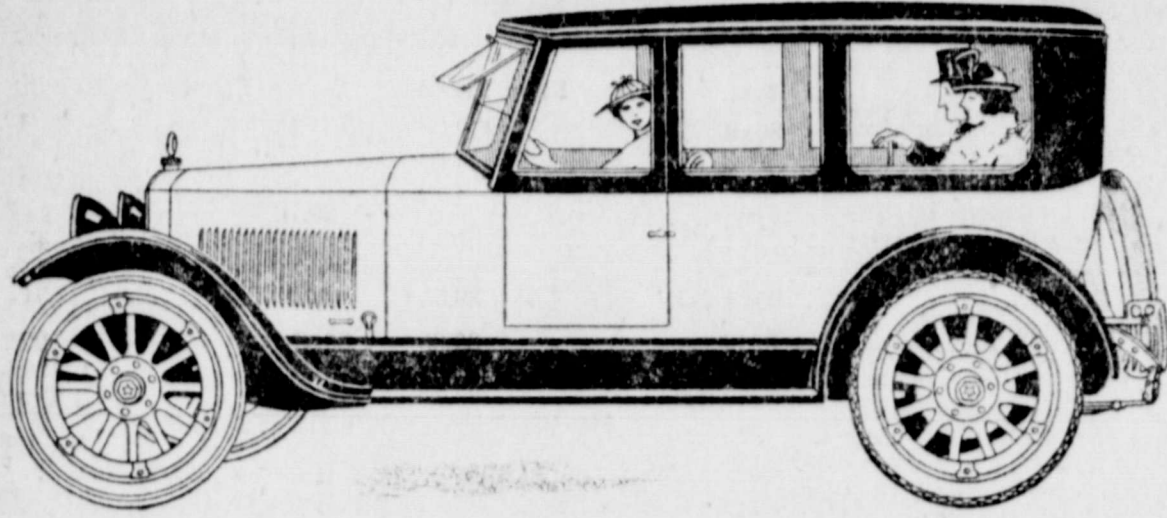

THIRTY-FOUR NATIONS AT WOMEN'S CONFERENCE.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Wages, the 8 hour day, and betterment of working conditions are the principal subjects scheduled for discussion at the world conference of women-workers which opened here today under the formal title of the First International Congress of Working Women.

Women workers of 34 countries were invited to send delegates. Delegates from nearly all countries now are here overflowing hotels and private homes in which many are guests. Others will arrive before the week ends, officials said.

Among the countries whose women workers sent delegates are Great Britain, Canada, France, Belgium, Italy, Switzerland, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Argentina, and Uruguay. Each was entitled to 10 delegates, and no limit was put on the number of secretaries and assistants.

Nearly 500 delegate and assistants will register before the congress closes, it is predicted.

Among the delegates, representing the United States is Mrs. Raymond Robins, of Chicago, president of the National Women's Trade Union League of America, which called the congress to meet in conjunction with the International Labor conference scheduled to meet tomorrow.

All subjects to be put before the International Labor Conference will also be introduced in the women's congress, according to Mrs. Robins.

Arrangements for the women's congress were made by the International committee of the National Women's Trade Union League, which committee includes Mrs. Robins, Miss Mary Anderson, director of the woman's bureau of the U. S. Labor Department, Miss Agnes Nestor of Chicago, Miss Rose Schneiderman of New York, and Miss Julia O'Connor, head of the women's section of the National Electrical Workers' Union.

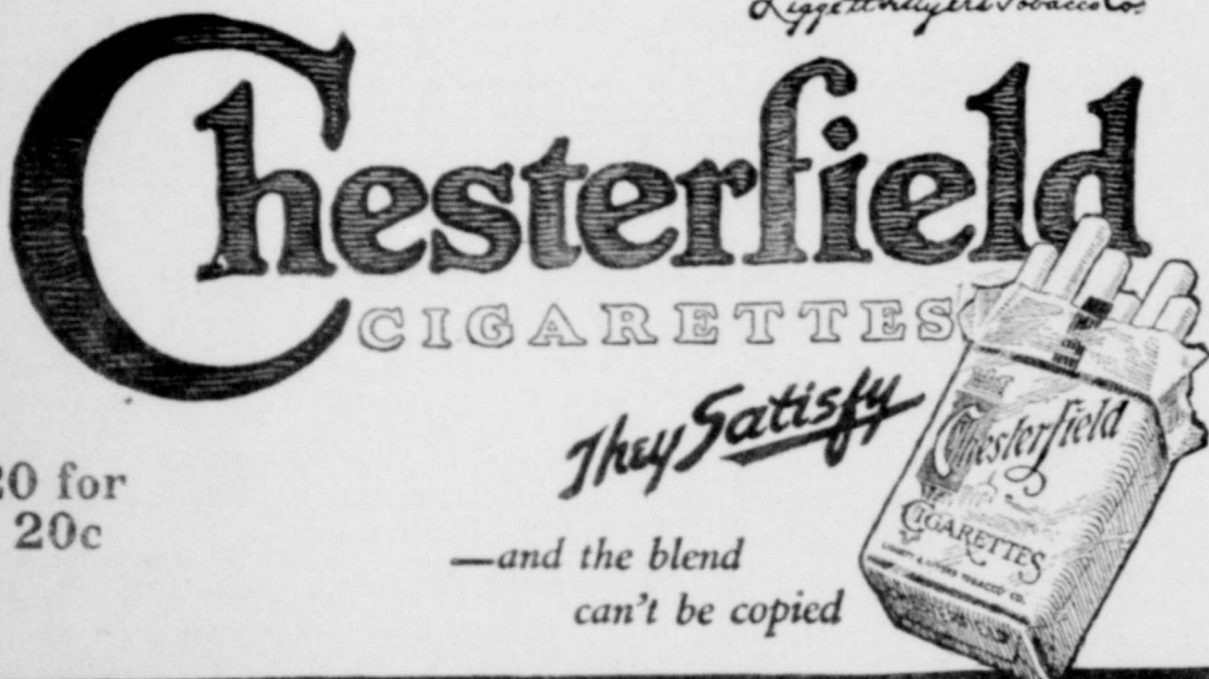

COLLEGE CAMPAIGNERS
WATCH HARVARD DRIVE

BOSTON, Oct. 28.—Educational institutions all over the country are watching intently the outcome of Harvard's drive for a \$15,000,000 endowment fund as the first of a long series of similar campaigns planned by colleges and universities in practically every state.

Just how far Harvard's alumni and friends are willing to go for the Cambridge school will be a good indication of the extent alumni of other schools will rally 'round their own alma mater when it calls for money. It was stated here today by a university official in touch with the situation.

If the endowed universities are successful in their drives, many state universities of the west and middle west will approach their legislatures with requests for appropriations that will equal the big funds sought in the east, according to one of the Harvard campaigners who came back today from a western tour.

Princeton has entered a campaign for \$14,000,000. Cornell wants \$5,000,000; Bryn Mawr has asked for a million, while Smith has likewise announced a campaign. Dozens of smaller colleges have been in drives for funds ranging from \$500,000 to \$2,000,000 for a year or more. Some have had a fair degree of success, while others have been forced to wait "until things are better."

Workers reporting here today, said that every Harvard graduate approached had given something, and that the average of generosity has been large in comparison with incomes. Both in New York and Boston almost 100 percent results have been obtained, it was stated.

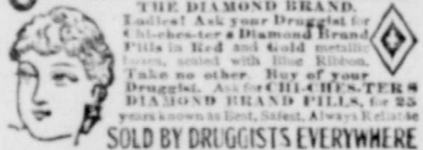
