Miners Will Ignore Injunction; Strike Effective at Midnight

COAL MINERS DEMANDS AND SALARY AT PRESENT

Coal mine operators have announced that they will not accede to the demands of the miners and purchase peace with the miners. In this they believe they will have the support of the public.

To grant the demands of the miners would almost double the price of coal, and of course the consumer would pay the cost. The mine operators could settle with the miners and keep the coal moving, but to do this they would have to double the price of coal, and the burden would fall on the coal consumers.

The public should refuse to permit the miners to meet the demands of the miners. The demands are unjust and unreasonable. The miners are asking for a decrease of 48 percent in working time and an increase of 60 percent in wages. Either demand within itself would be questioned at this time, but taking the two together is an absurdity and the American people should not stand for it.

The public can get some idea of the unjust demands being made by the miners by reading the table below showing the wages and working hours demanded by the union miners:

PICK POCKETS AT WORK IN BALLINGER

Two pocket books, mysteriously disappeared at the Santa Fe station Thursday afternoon, and there is no doubt but what pick pockets were on the job.

A lady got on the East bound train, here, missed her purse after she boarded the train. She had it just a few minutes before the train arrived, and could not tell how it got away from her.

Chas. Strum, a local rock mason, purchased a ticket and boarded the West bound train and missed his pocket book after getting on the train. He made a search among the crowd, but of course did not find anything that looked like a pocket book.

It is not known how much money the lady lost, as the train pulled out and she left the city. Mr. Strum lost \$26. He had his pocket book about ten minutes before he boarded the train, and it is believed that a pick pocket lifted it from his pocket.

There was quite a crowd around the station as the trains pulled in, and as usual every fellow was trying to get on the train first, and there was good opportunity for pick pockets to do their work.

Mr. Strum had his ticket to the fair at San Angelo, but had to postpone the trip until he could draw on his bank account for expense money.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 31.—(2:18 p. m.)—The strike of the bituminous coal miners of this nation will start at midnight tonight, Acting President Lewis of the mine union declared this afternoon.

Mr. Lewis said that the strike would take place in defiance of the restraining order issued by Federal Judge Anderson, and that the miners would ignore the injunction served on them.

GOOD WITNESS FOR HER HUSBAND

According to the report of the trial as given by the San Antonio papers, Mrs. Ernest Plummer made a good witness in behalf of her husband, who is charged with killing Mrs. Plummer's step father.

Mrs. Plummer was on the stand for two or three hours, and the state failed to cross her in her testimony, and she testified that the man whom her husband is charged with killing, insulted her, and that she told her husband about it.

Mrs. Plummer detailed how her step father assaulted her, and how she ordered him out of her room and how she got away from him, and reported the matter to her husband.

The state's attorneys grilled Plummer for a long time, while he was on the stand and tried to break down his account of the tragedy.

The evidence in the case was concluded Wednesday night, and the case went to the jury Thursday.

Plummer acknowledged that he shot Marshall, step father of Plummer's wife, two, three or four times, he did not remember which. He also testified that he bought a pistol from a man whose wife Marshall was alleged to have insulted. The gun used when Marshall was killed was the one he purchased, the defendant testified.

Marshall, according to the evidence given by Plummer and his wife, had insulted Mrs. Plummer on two occasions, during the time she was living at the Marshall home. These actions charged to Marshall are the issues upon which the "unwritten law" has been injected into the case by attorneys for Plummer.

While under cross-examination by District Attorney McAskill yesterday afternoon, Plummer said that he would not have killed Marshall had he (Marshall) apologized to him and his wife. He admitted also, that Marshall apologized on bended knees and said that he was sorry for his actions. This occurred, Plummer said, before Marshall was shot, and that he would not have shot Marshall had he not thought that Marshall was trying to draw a weapon from his pocket with which to harm him.

Lewis declared that the injunction would not avert, or settle the strike after it occurs, and would only complicate problems involved in the controversy between the mine operators and the miners.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 31.—Federal Judge Anderson granted a temporary restraining order today, restraining President Frank Hayes and eighty other officials of the United Mine Workers of America from calling a strike of the coal mine workers.

The strike of a half million coal mine workers is set to go into effect at midnight tonight, and the injunction granted by Judge Anderson restrains the officials of the mine workers union from putting into effect the strike order.

The temporary injunction was issued upon a petition presented by Special Assistant United States Attorney General Ames.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The coal strike order has been rescinded in Hopkins, Webster and Christian counties, Kentucky, the Department of Labor announced today. These three counties comprise the production of coal in Western Kentucky where six thousand employes are used.

The miners in these counties will not strike.

ANOTHER CHECK SWINDLER IN BAD

For the second time within a week Miles has furnished another crooked check deal for the officers to investigate, and the man alleged to have put over the second deal is in jail at Brownwood, and will be returned here tomorrow.

A day or two ago a man passed a bad check, using the name of Holmes & McDonald, a Miles firm. He got the money, \$24, and in addition is alleged to have got off with another man's overcoat.

The matter was reported to Sheriff Perkins. Mr. Perkins touched the wires and notified the officers along the Santa Fe east, and Thursday night the officers at Brownwood phoned him to come and get his man.

The man showed some shrewdness in leaving the train before it reached Brownwood, presumably getting off at the Frisco crossing just before the trains pulled into the yard at Brownwood. The officers searched the train, but failed to find a man suiting the description. Later they found him taking in the sights of Brownwood, and he will be forced to answer to a forgery charge in this county, and also a charge of theft will probably be filed against him.

The man arrested a few days ago for passing a bad check at Miles, is in jail here waiting examining trial, or fixing of bond.

FOR DEPORTING ALIEN STRIKERS.

Oklahoma City, Oct. 31.—With the walkout of miners in Oklahoma in response to the general strike of bituminous coal miners regarded as inevitable, Gov. Robertson today sent a telegram to Attorney General Palmer at Washington, requesting the deportation of all aliens in Oklahoma mines who obey the strike order.

At the same time Governor Robertson addressed a communication to Dorset Carter, president of the Oklahoma Coal Operator's association asking that all operators affiliated with the organization take immediate steps to keep their mines in operation with non-union and union men who desire to remain on their jobs.

Governor Robertson made it plain that he will not avail himself of the use of federal troops if they are offered until national guard forces have been exhausted. "Every man who helps keep Oklahoma's mines in operation will have the absolute assurance of protection," said the governor, in discussing the situation today.

SCARLET FEVER IS IN VERY MILD FORM

There are quite a number of scarlet fever cases in Ballinger, but none of the patients have been very sick, and the epidemic is in a mild form.

There is no cause for alarm, and no steps have been taken to close the schools or other public gathering places, and there will be no closing unless the epidemic should take on aggravated form.

The health officer and physicians say that every precaution should be used to keep down the spreading of the disease, and that cases should be well treated and not allowed to become aggravated.

The disease has been working in such mild form that some difficulty has been experienced in diagnosing the cases, and therein lies the danger. Every symptom of the disease should be watched closely until it has been determined whether the patient should be placed under quarantine.
