WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—President Wilson has invited seventeen prominent industrial and labor leaders to constitute an industrial commission, to meet in Washington early in December. None of the men invited to attend the conference were members of the round-table conference which recently failed to accomplish anything. The president hopes to get a commission which can agree upon some common terms of interest to all parties.

NO TRACE OF ROBBER IS FOUND

MEDICINE BOW, Wyo., Nov. 20.—Bill Carlisle is still at liberty after a wild chase in which he out-guessed and out-manuevered cavalry troops and blood hounds and a posse of citizens.

Carlisle robbed two trains and made his get-away. He held up the trains single-handed.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 19.—Westbound Union Pacific passenger train No. 19 was held up and passengers robbed at 8:10 o'clock tonight, according to a telegraphic dispatch received here from Medicine Bow. The train robber is believed to be William Carlisle, escaped train bandit, for whom posses have been searching since Saturday.

The robbery was confirmed by Union Pacific officials here. Although it occurred about 100 miles east of the place where the posse is hunting Carlisle, railroad officials were confident Carlisle was responsible. The train is the Los Angeles limited, one of the best trains on the road. A special Union Pacific train is being made up here to carry a posse to the scene of the robbery.

The bandit entered the baggage car at Rock River, forcing his way in past the baggagemen at the point of a pistol. After the train left Rock River he entered the passenger coaches, robbing the passengers of their valuables, dispatches received here said. The bandit leaped from the platform of one of the coaches when the train reached Medicine Bow. At the same time a train guard sighted him and opened fire. The bandit apparently was not hit and escaped. The bandit lost his hat and his pistol in jumping from the train. They were recovered. The hat, it is said, answered the description of the hat stolen from a sheep herder yesterday by Carlisle. The identification was not positive, however, advice said.

Sheriff Hawley Allen, of San Angelo, was here between trains Wednesday, coming this far with the state penitentiary transfer agent, who was carrying a bunch of convicts to the pen from this section of the state.

PEACE TREATY GOES OVER TO THE NEXT SESSION

WILL MEET TO SETTLE OIL CLAIM

FORT WORTH, Nov. 20.—The governors and attorney generals of Oklahoma and Texas are in conference here today, for the purpose of settling the boundary dispute on Red River, where armed conflict has been threatening, between claimants to certain lands for months.

The lands in question have flowing oil wells on it and two factions are claiming the title to the land on the question of state boundaries.

HARD YEAR ON OUR CITY WATER PLANT

City Water Superintendent Lusk says the prosperity which struck this city this year knocked the city's water business hard. Much water is used during the spring and summer for irrigating gardens and yards but this year was an exception to the rule.

Good season fell in the summer when the city generally realizes the greatest income from its water plant, and water consumers did not have to draw on the city water to keep their yards and gardens in good shape.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—President Wilson is expected to submit the peace treaty which was defeated last night, to the next session of Congress which starts December first, and will attempt to get the next body to ratify the treaty.

Two attempts to ratify the treaty last night failed after a spectacular session in which the Lodge resolution was defeated.

The vote for unqualified ratification stood 38 to 53.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Senator Lodge's resolution, carrying fourteen reservations to the peace treaty, was defeated by a vote of 39 to 55.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—The peace treaty, as ratified by some of the nations, will become effective on December first according to a decision of the supreme council today. The nations which have accepted the treaty will exchange formal ratifications before the first of December.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—Regardless of the American government's attitude the peace treaty of Versailles will be put into force, according to the prevalent view here today, following the receipt of the report that President Wilson might withdraw the treaty from the United States senate.

Whatever happens the feeling in French circles is that France cannot meet the German plenipotentiaries again and French opinion is that Italy and Great Britain have a like feeling.

BOOSTING THE PRICE OF SWEET THINGS

There is no limit to this high price propaganda, and now after the war has been over for more than a year, and when we all expected to get our full of some of the things we were denied during the war, we are reminded that we must pay prices unreasonable for such things.

Candy prices are being boosted, and according to the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram, we may be deprived of keeping up that habit formed in our courtship days and not be able to carry the lady a box of candy.

"Candy prices will advance," says the Star-Telegram in quoting candy manufacturers of Fort Worth.

This increase is liable to be considerable but none of them would make a prediction as to what it would be.

Dealers during the past week have paid prices ranging from 5 to 20 cents a pound higher, they say. The next week may see a maximum reached.

"Louisiana sugar cane growers are asking from 17 to 22 cents for their crop, against the Government price of 9 cents for the old crop," one candy factory official said Tuesday. "Candy prices will advance in proportion to the sugar situation. It is impossible to tell what that will be."

Another manufacturing firm would say nothing at all about prices.

"You can't make candy without sugar," a representative said.

MAY RESTORE A. & S. PASSENGER SERVICE

The Ledger recently stated that the passenger train which was cancelled on the A. & S. during the war, would no doubt be restored, if the matter were put up to the proper authorities in the right way.

It is a well known fact that the traffic is heavier on this road now than it was before the war and before the passenger train was cancelled, and no doubt if the matter was presented to the railroad commission that body would act favorably on the proposition.

As what is everybody's business is nobody's business, the editor of The Ledger addressed a letter to Mr. O. E. Maer, superintendent of the A. & S., a few days ago, stating that patience had ceased to be a virtue with the patrons of that road, and asked him to take some action and not wait for the matter to be brought to the attention of the railway commission.

The following reply from Mr. Maer offers some encouragement, and it is probable that the service maintained on this line before the war will be restored within a short time:

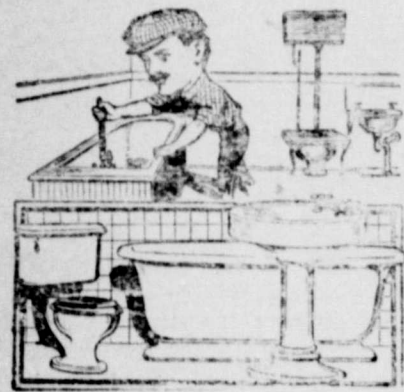

**CONVICTS CARRIED
TO PENITENTIARY**

The transfer agent for the state penitentiaries passed thru Ballinger Wednesday afternoon, with four prisoners for the state penitentiary.

Two of the four convicts were Ballinger prisoners; Dave Henry, recently convicted here for stealing an auto, and given two years in the pen; and F. B. Jones, convicted of forgery and given two years. These two men were recently carried to San Angelo on account of the Ballinger jail burning. Jones was sentenced to four years in the pen from Sweetwater before being brought to Ballinger for trial. Forgery charges were pending against him at Eldorado, but these have been dismissed and he will get off with only six years.

M. H. Bibb, also a former Ballinger man, was one of the convicts who was en route to the state prison. The other man was a San Angelo man.

Bibb was tried for killing a man by the name of Stokes, also a former Runnels county man, and a county commissioner in this county in the early days. The killing occurred about three years ago, Bibb shooting Stokes because Stokes was with Mrs. Bibb on the streets. Bibb plead the unwritten law, but it failed to work. He was given a ninety-nine year sentence, and the higher court sustained the verdict and sent Bibb up.

Bibb remarked to a Ledger reporter as the train passed here Wednesday, that he did not get a fair trial, and he hoped to get a pardon. He is a man up in years, being probably fifty-five or sixty years old, and has a ninety-nine year sentence hanging over him.

Farmers are too busy to be worried with court matters, and the docket is one which will keep until it can be disposed of without breaking into rushing farm activities.

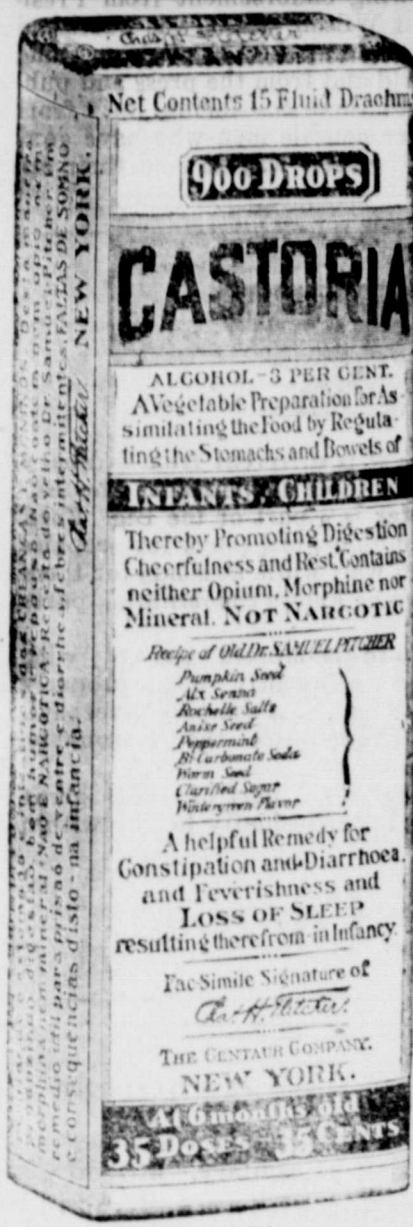

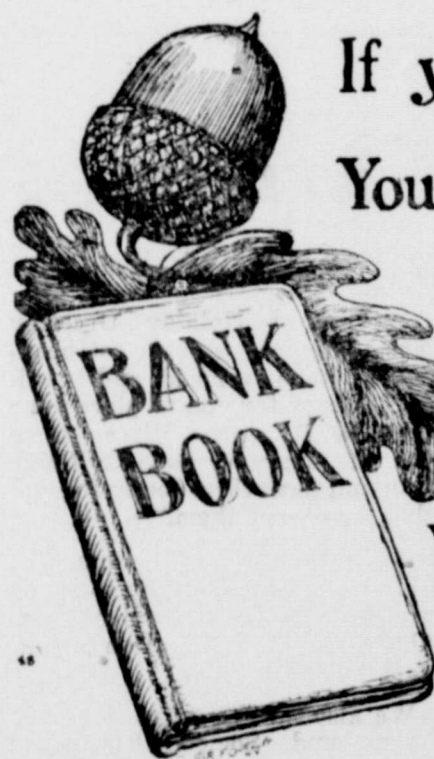

WEST TEXAS FARMERS PILING UP MONEY

(San Angelo Standard)

Enormous profits are being made by the cotton farmers of Concho county this year, by way of making up for the lean years of the drouth, according to D. C. Broyles, of Paint Rock, editor of the Concho Herald, who was in San Angelo Tuesday and Wednesday to attend the district steward's conference for the San Angelo district of the Methodist church.

As an instance of the money that has been made, Mr. Broyles told of W. S. Garrett, who came to Concho county from Victoria county in March and bought a farm of 480 acres, paying for it \$20 an acre, or \$9,600. Some weeks ago, Mr. Garrett had already realized in cash for his crop \$10,000, and he had enough cotton still on hand to bring him in as much more. He had gotten back the entire cost on his farm, and he had every prospect of getting double that amount.

T. F. Benge of Millersview on his big area of farming land is realizing \$200,000 from 1000 bales of cotton, Mr. Broyles says.

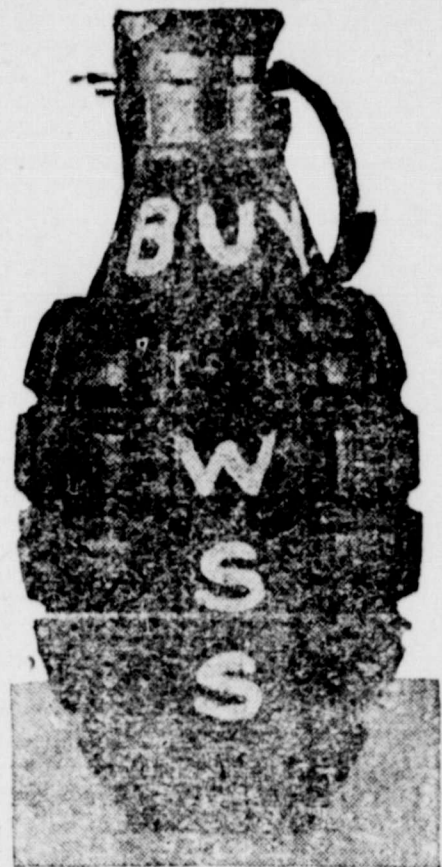

Got a Hand Grenade; Is Rarest Souvenir of Great World War



Hammering the Hun line until it bent and broke, bearing the Kaiser and his clans down to inglorious defeat, the American soldiers used one weapon in greater numbers than any other. It was a weapon they had never used before, one that had been obsolete for centuries—the hand-grenade—but when the brawny lads from the U. S. A. sent the old "eggs," as they were called, spinning into dugout and pill-box, the only Boches remaining on the ground were those ready to be buried.

Grenades were known to have been used five centuries ago. In 1427, at the siege of the Fortress of Casmaggiore on the River Po in Italy, the defenders used a primitive grenade, made of a glass bottle filled with powder. For a time, grenades were made out of heavy paper, then out of glass and then out of metal. With the close of the eighteenth century, the grenade began to be discarded and little use had been made of it until the Russo-Japanese war in 1904.

It remained for the Great World War to see the grenade developed into its present efficiency. The grenades used by the American doughboys were as carefully manufactured as their rifles. But the end of hostilities found a limited supply on hand and these were turned over to the Savings Division of the Treasury Department, the explosives extracted and they have been made over into savings banks.

Thus a weapon of war has been transformed into a "weapon of peace." Instead of being used to battle the Hun, it is now being used in the fight against the High Cost of Living and the arch-enemy, Thriftlessness. Any boy or girl can secure a grenade by purchasing a \$5 War Savings Stamp; any adult by investing in three or more War Savings Stamps, but these must have been bought after July 15, 1919. These hand grenades will be distributed through local banks and by a few merchants.

If you want a grenade, get busy. Make arrangements with your banker immediately. Only a limited number of these rare and unique souvenirs of the World War could be secured and when they are gone there will be no chance of obtaining one. You don't have to wait until the grenade is received to begin saving. Do that now. When the grenade arrives you will have that much of a start toward owning it. Ask your banker about it today.

Missoula, Mont., Nov. 20.—One billion feet of timber killed by 1445 fires is the estimate given for Montana's tremendous forest fire losses for the season just closed. Half of the fires were started by human agency and were preventable. MOVE TO BULL COTTON MARKET

Up to November first of this year, nearly ten thousand bales more cotton had been ginned, according to the government report, in Russell county, than for the same date last year.

Prior to November first this year, 10,498 bales of 1919 cotton had been ginned in this county. Prior to the same date last year, only 1,591 bales of cotton of the 1918 crop had been ginned.

Up to this time it was estimated that about one-fourth the cotton in the county had been ginned and the report which is being compiled this week by the government gin reporters will probably show about one-half the cotton ginned, or about twenty thousand bales.

Young Crockett possesses, as a relic of his ancestor, the butt of a long rifle, which was presented to the Indian fighter for his service in the Mexican war.

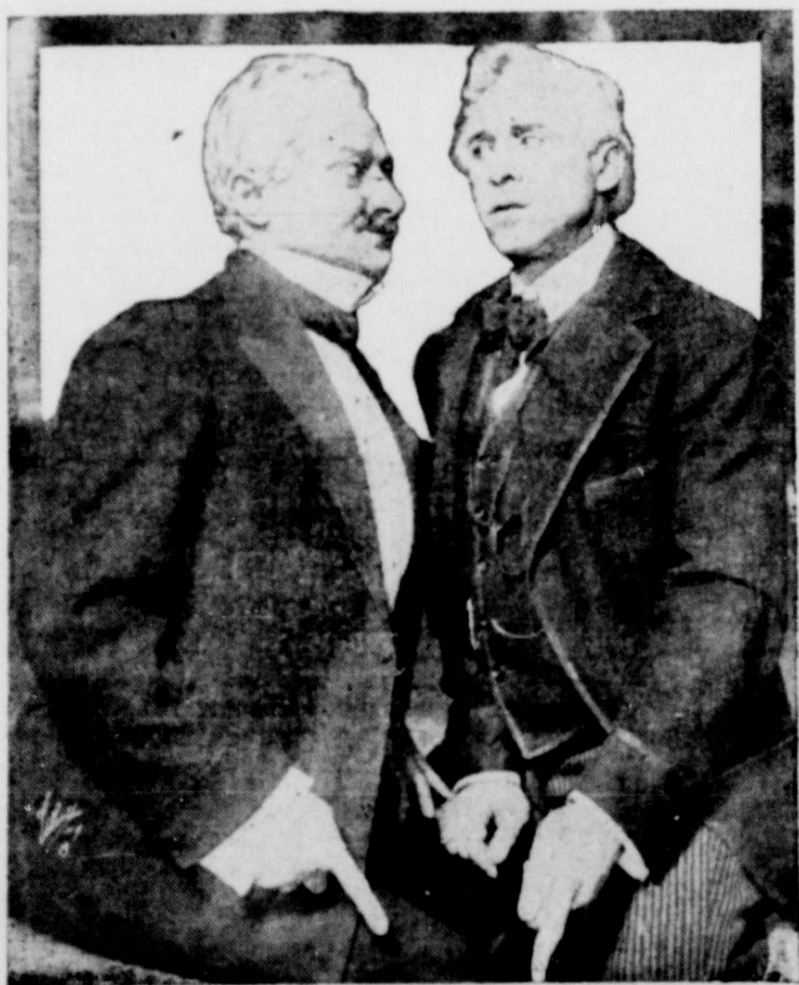
