Court Takes Up Criminal Cases to Clean Docket

Ford Laxson was the first to be time the man she alleged to be arraigned for trial when district court convened for the second week's work Monday afternoon. Thirty minutes from the time the case was called the judge sentenced the young man to the pen for two years. The boy pleaded guilty to theft, having been charged with stealing goods to the value of more than fifty dollars, from Higginbotham Bros. & Co. store.

It was only necessary to go through the regular form in disposing of the case after the boy pleaded guilty, and this only required a few minutes. The defendant stated that he was only seventeen years old, and Judge T. T. Crosson made a brief talk to the jury asking that the jury fix the lowest penalty. The jury was out five minutes and fixed the penalty at the minimum.

Another case of theft against Ford will be dismissed, it was stated by the prosecuting attorney. The boy broke down and cried as District Judge Woodward, in pronouncing the sentence, stated that he never sentenced a boy to prison without a feeling of sympathy and sadness, and admonished the young man to reform and make a man. Judge Woodward promised to aid in getting him out of the pen, if his conduct was such as to merit it.

Louis Parker, negro, charged with killing another negro, was with the second case called Monday afternoon. Parker, it was stated by his attorney, would enter a plea of guilty to manslaughter, and beg for the mercy of the court. Parker stabbed another negro to death in the kitchen of the Central Hotel on the 22nd of February.

It is expected that most of this week will be taken up in disposing of the cases turned into the court by the grand jury last week. There were thirteen felony indictments found by the grand jury, and all parties have been served with warrants, and are either in jail or out under bond.

They are: Lee Morris, forgery; Luther Kellum, (two cases), forgery; Charlie King, forgery; Ford Laxson, (two cases) theft; W. T. Adams, forgery; Walter Walker, theft; May Robinson, aiding prisoners to escape jail; W. F. Gorman, assault to murder; Louis Parker, murder; Dave Henry, arson; Ernest Suarez, forgery.

After deliberating only a short time, the jury in the May Robinson case, rendered a verdict Monday evening, fixing the punishment for the woman at two years in the penitentiary.

Mrs. Robinson was charged with aiding prisoners to escape from the Ballinger jail, at which

enjoy their freedom so long as they behave, but if charged with violating the law again during the life of the sentence the order of the court will be revoked and they will be placed in the reform school.

Court convened again at one-thirty Tuesday afternoon, and four or five other cases will be disposed of in short order, and the criminal docket cleaned up.

Another meeting will be held on the campus of the school grounds Wednesday afternoon at six o'clock, and all those who are interested in seeing Ballinger organize a good team, are requested to be present.

San Angelo, Coleman and Brownwood, as well as other neighboring towns are busy and have sent word that they will be in on any kind of a move to perfect a circuit which will give the fans some real sport.

For the juniors in West Ward, Marie Bluett won first place for the girls, and Wameta Fleming second. Fred Atwell won first for the boys and Burton Reese second.

For the juniors in the Central Ward school, Mamie Jean Hale won first place for the girls, and Nettie Williams second, and Mildred Hill third. George Eaton won first place for the junior boys in the Central school.

The county meet will be held here three weeks from now, and the above boys and girls will try for the honor to represent the county in the district meet to be held later in the season.

SIMS SAYS LEADERS 'DUPED' ON SUB WAR

WASHINGTON, March 16.—

President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George, and other "civilian" leaders of allied nations fighting Germany, allowed themselves to be drawn in to a "fascinating speculation" about some means of quickly ending the war by a spectacular master-stroke, Admiral Sims told the Senate committee this afternoon. Sims stated that while the allied chiefs were casting around for a miracle, the Germans continued their submarine warfare.

COMPROMISE EXPECTED IN REVOLUTION

BERLIN, March 16.—Clashes between revolutionists and workers occurred in various quarters of Berlin today. Especially were the district of Schoenberg and Wilmersdorf the scenes of violent encounters.

Fifteen have been killed and many wounded.

STUTTGART, Germany, Mar.

16.—The Ebert government today decided to cease all communications with the revolutionary government at Berlin. The constitutional cabinet voted unanimously with the exception of Vice Chancellor Schiffer, who was absent.

It was further decided by the Ebert government to punish all insurgents with the maximum severity. The cabinet took this action despite the fact that a report had been received that Gen. Maercker was en route from Berlin with a proposal from the revolutionists for a compromise.

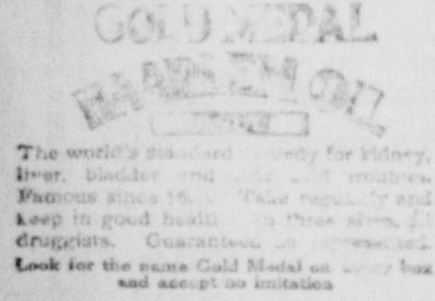

BAILEY INELIGIBLE BY COURT DECISION, SAYS

SWEETWATER, Tex., March 10.—Supplementing the statement of Hon. Marshall Hicks, declaring that Mr. Bailey is ineligible because of his residence outside of Texas, to hold the office of Governor, Ed J. Hamner, lawyer of this city, asserts that Mr. Hicks' contention has been upheld by the Supreme Court of Texas, in a case which arose in Dallas. Mr. Hamner says:

"The decision of Michael vs. Michael, 79 SW, 74, cited by Marshall Hicks, is in point as to the construction placed upon the word 'reside' when used in our statutes, but we are not left in doubt by our Supreme Court as to what 'reside' means when it refers to eligibility of officers of our Government.

"In Seay, ex-rel, vs. Hunt, 55 Texas, 545, one Stone received a majority of the votes cast for mayor of Dallas at an election held April 5, 1881, but was refused the office because he had not resided in the city one year next preceding the election, as

required by the city charter. "The evidence shows that Stone came to Dallas in 1876 for the purpose of making it his home, and with his family, occupied different rented places in the city up to the fall of 1878, when he rented a place outside of the corporate limits and occupied it with his family for two years. In February, 1880, he purchased a lot within the city and commenced to at once to improve it for his homestead, but did not occupy it with his family until the latter part of that year. During the entire time he had been carrying on business in the city, and, since the spring of 1878, in premises which he owned. He testified that during the entire time he had no other permanent home than the City of Dallas; that any other home was temporary. (Page 557.)

"In a contest for the office the District Court (Judge George N. Aldredge) held that Stone had not resided within the city for one year next preceding the election, and upon appeal this decision was affirmed by the Supreme Court (Justice Gould) in these words: (p. 560.)

"We are clear that the Mayor is required to have resided within the corporate limits of the city for one year next preceding the election. We are also satisfied that the evidence negatives the possession by Stone of the necessary qualifications. It thus appears that Stone is not entitled to be installed as Mayor."

GRAND JURY ASKS NUMBER CHANGES

To the Hon. J. O. Woodward:

We, your grand jurors selected for the March term of district court beg to submit the following as our report:

We have been in session six days and have examined fifty witnesses and diligently inquired into every violation that has been brought to our attention.

As a result of our investigations we have returned into your court sixteen true bills of indictments, thirteen of which were for felonies and three for misdemeanors.

We have examined the jail, court house and lawn. We find the court house and lawn well kept and we highly commend the jailor for the manner in which same is kept.

We find the court house in need of some repairs, and we are informed that the commissioners' court are looking after same. We would recommend that something be done to the walls in the rooms of the court house that would prevent rubbing off and soiling people's clothes; also that the jury box be furnished with more comfortable chairs for the jurors. Also that hangers or racks be installed in the grand jury room for coats, hats, etc., of the jurors, while in session.

The court has called our attention to the fact that under the law we can recommend an auditor to audit the books of the county and report the financial condition of the county. We have given this matter due consideration and recommend that same shall be done at once.

We have been asked by the commissioners' court, after examining the jail, to make report to them. This is our report to them, to wit: We, the grand jurors have just examined the jail and find same to be in a very bad sanitary condition and recommend that the jailor have same put in a sanitary condition at once, which can be very easily done and that necessary bedding be furnished the jail.

We also find the jail very badly in need of repairs, however, we are willing to leave this to the good judgment of the commissioners' court. But it seems to us that the jail could be repaired and could serve the purpose at a much less cost than building a new jail.

We recommend that at all times, as far as possible, the jail, or keep negroes and white prisoners separate in jail.

We have reports of the following officers: District Clerk C. C. Cockrell, County Judge O. L. Parish, County Clerk W. C. McCarver, County Attorney C. P. Shepherd, and Justice of Peace W. D. Jennings of Precinct No. 6. We note from report, of previous grand jurors that all of the officers are not making reports as required by law, and we earnestly urge that in the future the law be complied with.

We most sincerely desire that in the future some way be provided that bailiffs can be had to reach out of town witnesses, that are necessary to be brought before the grand jury as we have had some unnecessary delays on account of having no riding bailiff, this being due to insufficient pay.
