DOVER, Dela., March 30.—It was authentically forecasted today that the final vote of the Delaware legislature would ratify the National suffrage amendment, giving women the right to vote in the United States. MYSTERIOUS KILLING IN NEW OIL TOWN

(Brownwood Bulletin) Mystery surrounds the murder of a young white man Friday night in a Sipe Springs gambling house, and officers who have investigated the case have no opinion as to the probable motive for the crime. There is considerable excitement in the new oil town, according to those who have visited the place recently, and a number of stories are current as to the incidents immediately preceding the tragedy of Friday night.

The victim of the shooting is a young man about 25 years old, nicely dressed and intelligent and prosperous in appearance. His identification is made impossible by the removal of all labels from his clothing, and there were no papers or other articles in his pockets which could give a clue as to his name. It has been rumored that he is a former Brownwood restaurant worker, but this story is not confirmed.

One arrest has been made, a man named Irwin being held pending further investigation. State Ranger R. D. Shumate, of this city, together with other officers, hurried to Sipe Springs Saturday morning and began an investigation of the case, but they were able to learn little as to the incidents leading up to the shooting. The story which appears to have greater credence than any other is that the young man entered a gambling house with the intention of robbing its inmates, and with the flourish of a gun yelled "Hands up!" Dissatisfied with the response to the command, he is said to have fired a shot above the heads of the men in the room, and then reiterated his command.

At this juncture, the story goes, some one in the room shot the intruder, his body falling across a poker table in the room. The gamblers then fled.

Another story that has gained circulation is that the young man had been playing in one of the gambling houses and had "broke" the "bank." He is said to have been seen on the street with a large sum in currency in his hand

MILLIONAIRE GUILTY OF EVADING DRAFT

NEW YORK, March 30.—Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, a Philadelphia millionaire, was found guilty on a charge of evading the draft law, according to an announcement received from Governor's Island today. The millionaire was sentenced to five years' imprisonment in the military jail on Governor's Island.

LITTLE FIGHT CONTINUES IN JUGOSLAVIA LAND

ROME, March 30.—Dispatches received here today report that a serious clash occurred between Italian and Jugo-Slav sailors at Port Spalato.

The reports received here state proclamations issued by the Jugo Slavs have excited the population of Spalato into a frenzy and further clashes are feared.

ALL AGREED SOCIALISTS ARE DISLOYAL MEMBERS

ALBANY, N. Y., March 30.—Five of the Socialist members suspended from the New York assembly, have been declared as disloyal and unworthy of seats in the assembly in a majority report of the judiciary committee filed this afternoon.

There were three minority reports, and one concurrent report filed, but all of them agreed that the socialist members were disloyal, and the reports only differed in the punishment fixed.

50,000 MEN STRIKE IN STOCK YARDS

CHICAGO, March 30.—Nearly fifty thousand employees of the packing companies will be idle if the strike of workers in the Union Stockyard, which began Saturday, continues, the packers declare.

Armour officials say that they have enough live stock on hand for today, but "after that a gradual close down will be necessary if the strike continues and a week will see all departments closed."

Officials of the Stockyards company admit that all their men are out. Their employees, numbering less than nine hundred, they say, are striking for an increase of thirty to forty-five dollars monthly and the elimination of Sunday work. They are now receiving from \$115 to \$154 monthly.

\$30,000 PAID FOR WYLIE RANCH LAND

Showing his faith in Runnels county dirt, after having spent a quarter of a century here, Robert Herring purchased from C. A. Doose & Co., Tuesday, 1955 acres of the R. K. Wylie ranch land.

The land purchased by Mr. Herring is four and a half miles Southeast of Norton, and total consideration figured \$30,000.

Mr. Herring now owns about 8,000 acres of land in this county, and none of it is for sale. He realizes the value in Runnels county land.

From present indications the candidates are going to be few, and the expenses will fall heavy on them, as the greater the number of candidates the lighter the expenses on each candidate.

The primary will be held the last Saturday in July, which will be July 31st. The law provides for a second primary, but unless there are more candidates to enter the campaign no second primary will be necessary in this county for county candidates, as a majority vote will settle the



PROMINENT CHURCH WORKERS APPOINTED

The Ledger received a telegram Sunday announcing the appointment of district directors and speakers for the Inter-Church World movement campaign, which is to be launched at an early date.

Judge L. Gough, prominent land developer, of Hereford, and his wife, prominent educator and member of the school board of Amarillo College, were appointed citizens district director and will make headquarters at Amarillo.

Dr. F. F. W. Thompson, president of Daniel Baker College, of Brownwood, volunteered as a speaker for the campaign, having obtained a leave of absence to assist in the great co-operative Christian movement.
