**Santa Fe Changes Schedule
of Morning Train Sunday**

The long pulled for change in Santa Fe schedule is coming. According to reliable, but unofficial reports, received in Ballinger the proposed change in schedule which will make the morning train to Brownwood, a through train, will be made Sunday, April 11th.

The local Santa Fe ticket office has not received official notice of the new time table, but the report has been given out from reliable sources, and the time table is due this week.

The new train, or the morning thru train, will take the place of the train which arrives at Ballinger at nine-twenty on the present schedule and will be known as No. 76.

While not officially announced, it is expected that the new train will arrive at Ballinger at about 4 a. m. and will reach Brownwood at seven a. m., for breakfast, and will arrive in Temple at twelve-thirty, making connections with the main line Santa Fe trains.

The train will make connections with the Frisco at Brown-

wood, giving travel pretty good connections both North and South on the Frisco.

Connections will also be made at Lometa with the South bound branch line to San Saba, Brady and Eden, and at Napasas with the Katy system to Austin, and at Temple with Katy and I. & G. N. trains also.

Passengers can leave Ballinger at four a. m. and arrive at Fort Worth about noon of the same day, by changing cars and catching the Frisco at Brownwood. San Antonio and Austin, can be reached by the middle of the afternoon, and Houston and Galveston can be reached by night, giving all day travel to almost any point in Texas.

The change will also give this city two through mail trains East daily, instead of one, and this within itself will be worth a great deal. Mail which arrives here too late to be worked up and returned on the afternoon train will go out next morning at four o'clock, making a gain in time of twelve hours over the present schedule.

**FORMER CITIZEN IS
MAYOR OF COLEMAN**

E. P. Scarborough was elected mayor of Coleman Tuesday, defeating the present mayor, J. W. Golson, by a vote of five to one, according to news received here from the Coleman town Wednesday in a letter from H. M. Jones, another Ballinger man.

Mr. Scarborough moved from Ballinger to Coleman about three years ago, and has been manager of the Coleman Abstract Co. since moving to that city. He has taken considerable interest in public matters since becoming a citizen of Coleman, and is said to be popular with the Coleman people, all of which is verified by the big vote given him for mayor of that city.

Houston, April 7.—Contest of the will of Andrew K. Robertson, who died January 30, leaving an estate of \$150,000 for distribution among 12 of his 15 children, was started today in probate court before County Judge Chester H. Bryan. Robertson, who was 85 years old, was twice married.

**PINK BOLL WORM
SPREADS IN TEXAS**

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The state of Texas was urged today at a meeting of officials from every cotton growing state to take immediate steps to stamp out the pink boll worm which has reappeared in nine counties in the Galveston section. Only the most drastic quarantine, accompanied by destruction of crops already planted, can prevent a rapid spread of the pest, experts of the department of agriculture said, with a consequent disastrous effect upon the premier product of the South.

The conference was again called in session this morning, but a general horticulture board is understood to have practically served notice on the Texas authorities, that unless action is taken by the state, all of Texas will be placed under quarantine, which will prevent the shipment of cotton and cotton seed products into neighboring states.

**JAPANESE
TO REMAIN
IN SIBERIA**

TOKIO, Japan, March 31.—(Delayed cable).—It was officially announced today that Japanese troops would not be withdrawn from Siberia until after the evacuation by the Czechs, and it was assured that the Japanese in Siberia were safe and that conditions in Russia were such as to no longer constitute a menace to Manchuria.

**PACKING HOUSE EMPLOYEES
LOSE JOBS IN STRIKE**

Chicago, April 7.—Between 15,000 and 18,000 packing house workers were thrown out of employment today by the unauthorized strike of switchmen in the Chicago switching district.

According to A. F. Whitney, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, approximately 1,000 union switchmen have been imported from other cities to break the strike, and he stated that more were on the way today.

**CONSPIRACY
RULES FACES
GERMANY**

LONDON, April 7.—A far reaching military conspiracy, paralleling the importance of the Von Kapp insurrection, has been revealed by the Munich News agency dispatches from Berlin today.

The conspiracy included making Ludendorff dictator, and Dr. Heine economic chief, the dispatches stated, and added that Dr. Heine is known as a Bavarian Spartacist.

LONDON, April 7.—French troops continued to take possession of German towns today, the French armies occupying Offenbach, Homburg and Wiesbaden.

The occupation of these towns by the French was complete according to telegraph dispatches from Berlin this morning.

**SAYS GOMPERS
CONTROLS CONGRESS**

Mr. A. W. Sledge,
Ballinger, Texas,
My dear Mr. Sledge:

The crisis precipitated by Samuel Gompers and the American Federation of Labor Leaders, in their present avowed attempt to elect a Congress of Serfs, is far more serious than the thinking people of our Nation realize.

As a matter of fact, practically every issue made during the present Congress, has been controlled by Gompers, and decided under his dictation. The only exceptions were denying him his demanded wine and beer, returning the railroad, over his protest, and separating the Washington police and firemen from the American Federation of Labor. Every other issue even remotely affecting his interests was decided under his dictation.

Gompers would unhesitatingly in this Congress socialize all industries, confiscate property, hog-tie the courts, obliterate the sacred right of private ownership of property, destroy prohibition and woman suffrage, and establish the same kind of a Soviet and Bloody Anarchy now existing in Russia, Germany and other countries of the world, were he not afraid that some of his dependable Congressmen might desert him at the crucial hour, and he has learned a lesson from the Police Strike being pulled off prematurely in Boston. By an assessment of only \$2 on his membership he has raised a campaign fund of \$9,000,000 and he can easily raise this amount additional monthly if he so desires. With such unlimited campaign slush funds it is possible for him to carry many districts over the United States, unless there is some organized action to stop it.

We only who have been in this fight and on the firing line here in Washington during the past few years, and who are thoroughly acquainted with Gompers' objectives, realize full well what will happen to our beloved Government and our sacred institutions should he and the American Federation of Labor Leaders succeed in obtaining absolute control of the next Congress, for the attainment of which goal it is now engaged in at least a \$20,000,000 campaign for the Plumb Plan League is co-operating and furnishing its tremendous slush fund.

I hope that you won't think that this letter is written in the interest of my own re-election, for it is not. So far as my own district is concerned, substantial evidence from over it have voluntarily written me in such numbers that I am not at all apprehensive, and whether you believe it or not, if by doing so, there could be sent here from the 18

Texas district, 18 Representatives wholly uncontrolled by Gompers or any other special class, but who would stand for the rights of all the 110,000,000 people alike, I would be perfectly willing to return to private life.

But it is concerning the general menace, and the National crisis, affecting every Congressional district in the United States that prompts this letter. I have the right as one American loving his country to address you, another American loving his country equally as well, and a subject that presents danger to our Government.

True Americans everywhere, cherishing the sacred ideals of our beloved institutions, Democrats and Republicans alike, in every Congressional district in the United States, should carefully scrutinize the record votes of their Congressman and Senators on every such issue involving class-interest during the present Congress, and should make it their business to find out exactly what pledges and promises to the American Federation of Labor, or to any other class interest, have been made by their candidate, before they express their choice at the polls, and should take some concerted action to see to it that no man is sent here with a class yoke around his neck. And I sincerely hope that the newspapers in every community will impress their influence on the country at large in such a way that it will be felt throughout the length and breadth of the whole United States.

Anticipating this crisis, during the past year I have fought almost a single-handed fight here to prevent this death clutch from throttling Congress, and leaders here will admit to you that largely thru such fight was Gompers' dictation on the railroad, prohibition, police and fireman legislation overcome. Besides every moment of my spare time, I have devoted most of my salary during the past year in efforts to protect our Government from anarchy. I have not yet written a single letter to my district asking for support of myself, but I am distributing 50,000 copies of my speech, "Awake America," among the thinking men in the 48 states of this nation. Does the crisis not appeal to you? Do you not feel willing to lend a hand, and do something to weaken the people of the whole United States to their danger? The danger is real—serious.

GOT OVER THE DIFFICULTY

Chaplain Evidently Found Some Way to Get Around the Regulations of the Navy

In June, 1911, writes Dr. Maurice P. Egan in his book, "Ten Years Near the German Frontier," the Atlantic squadron stopped at Denmark on its way to Germany. One day the equerry who had been appointed to look after the admiral and his immediate suite came to me in great perplexity. It was shortly after one of the receptions given by the American officers. He held in his hand a little box.

"I am in difficulty," he said, "and I have come to ask you to help me. His majesty has received several letters from the American sailors, and there is one that especially amused him. It seems that he pleased the men by asking for the Scandinavians in your navy. A sailor who addresses him as 'Dear King' thanks him for this and declares that the men like Copenhagen so much that they beg his majesty to induce the admiral to stay a few days longer. Of course his majesty cannot do that, but he has asked me to give the little medal in this box to the sailor. I am told that it is against the rules, which seem to be very strict, yet I really cannot tell the king that I have not given the medal to the worthy sailor. You know the king's kindness of heart. I am at my wit's end, so I appeal to you."

"It is easy enough," I said. "When in a quandary of this kind call in the church."

We found the chaplain, and Frederick VIII received a grateful note, addressed, "Dear King."

BIG SPIDER WRONGLY NAMED

Insect Found in the Southwestern States and in Mexico Not Really a Tarantula.

The famous tarantula, sometimes represented as one of the terrors of the arid portions of the Southwestern states and northern Mexico, is not really, it seems, the tarantula of history and of fable.

An eminent authority in such matters, in remarking that the tarantula is a spider, says of that terrifying creature that it is the Lycosa Tarantula, a species of spider found in some of the warmer parts of Italy and Spain. When full grown it is about the size of a chestnut and of a brown color. Its bite was at one time supposed to be dangerous and to induce a kind of "dancing disease," but now it is known not to be worse than the sting of a common wasp.

It is an old fable, extending to remotest times, that the bite of this spider would produce epilepsy or a strange dancing mania in its victims, and that this epilepsy or madness could be relieved only by a particular kind of music. The tarantula of Italy and Spain—and it is found in those countries today—has hairy legs with black markings on them.

It is very likely that when the early Spanish explorers came upon the great spider of the Southwest, and seeing a good deal of resemblance to the tarantula of the Old World, those explorers, not being entomologists, called the new spider a tarantula. And the name has persisted.

Earthquake Peculiarities.

A peculiar feature of earthquakes is that they seem to undulate the ground with a twisting motion. This effect is quite noticeable in almost every Central American or southern Mexico quake, when straight rows of trees are shifted into irregular zig-zags or light buildings twisted about on their foundations, and many odd effects are created in this manner. Statistics tend to show that the maximum of earthquake disturbances occurs in the northern hemisphere during the months of January, August and October, with a minimum during May, June and July. The southern hemisphere's period of greatest activity is November, May and June, while the minimum is in March and August. It will be noted from the above that the period of greatest activity is during the cool months, and although this may not appear to be true in regard to the Southern hemisphere, it must be remembered that its seasons are just the reverse of ours in the northern hemisphere.

First Transcontinental Railroad.

The completion of the first railway which made it possible to go by rail from the Atlantic to the Pacific was celebrated on May 10, 1869, when a gold spike was driven to commemorate the joining of the Central Pacific and the Union Pacific at Promontory, Utah. The scene was depicted by Bret Harte in a poem which is preserved for the future by a massive painting which had wide popularity. The similar last spike of the Northern Pacific was driven September 8, 1883, near the mouth of Gold creek in Montana. On the earlier road the first through car from the Pacific reached New York on July 24, 1879.

Motor as Rival of Camel.

The camel replaces the motor truck for general hauling in Asia Minor. By this means twelve miles a day is traversed, but where the camel "has it on" the motor truck is in the upkeep. The camel needs nothing but the few weeds and blades of grass he can pick from along the roadside. The great difficulty with the animal as a mode of transportation is that all articles shipped by camel must be of a nature that they can stand a long journey without spoiling.

NAZIMOVA'S ART IS WORLD FAMOUS

"The Countess Coquette," made an equally strong impression.

Departing from her European repertoire, she starred in "Bella Donna." Turning to vaudeville, she attained great popularity in "War Brides," the only play based on the great world war which is conceded to be of permanent value. She made her screen debut in a motion picture version of this play, and she later resumed her work on the speaking stage and appeared in "Ception Shoals."

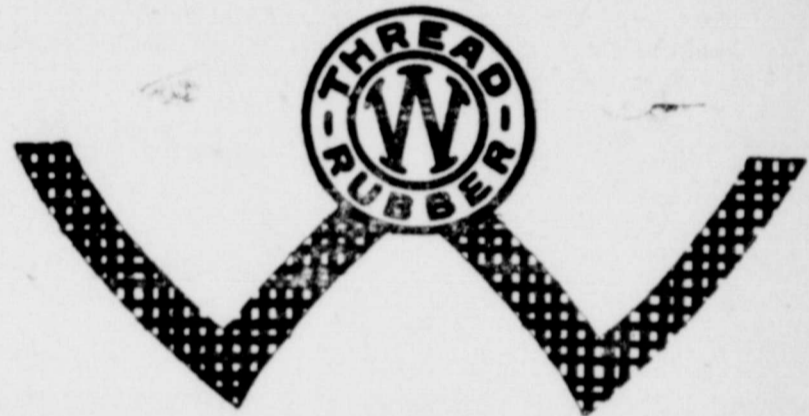

American in the Philippines Was Forwarding the Cause of Civilization, With Krag in Place of Shepherd's Crook.

I first met him in the brush, a thousand yards north of Dagupan, in Pampanga, lying on his belly and watching me through the sights of his Krag. It is indeed startling to discover the silent menace of a rifle muzzle protruding through the tropical undergrowth, especially at 20 yards range.

"Friend!" I called across to him. "Sure, come on over," he laughed back, and his rifle muzzle slipped across a point or two, covering the trail I had followed over the skyline.

Though it was but a chance meeting, he trusted me as one of his kind, and there was no "glad-to-meet-you" talk or the reticence of Manila.

His name is no matter; it was Harvard-Boston-Irish of four American generations. But it is vital that his eyes were blue and that he was one of those unburned American idealists whose success is not gauged in dollars, but in service rendered to civilization, to sanitation, to health and to decency. Why, then, was he civilizing with a Krag? I thought of the head-hunters of the northern mountains, not far away, and of native insurrection, now a thing of the past.

"What's the trouble?" I asked when I reached his nest in the undergrowth. "Nothing, just precaution," he answered. Then I heard in the valley behind him the rhythmic pounding of boring machinery and saw the top of a timber scaffold for well digging.

He explained, as I crouched beside him, that a certain ex-alcide, in a fit of petulance, had thrown a dog into the village well, thereby contaminating the supply. This had happened three villages up the road and sickness had spread throughout the valley. To dig another well in the near neighborhood seemed inexcusable to the natives. Not that trouble was really expected, but machinery cost cash and guards had been posted at the hill trails. His village needed water, and water they would have, pure and cold from the 200-foot level, whether the natives opposed the work temporarily or not. These things he told me, and more, while we sat and brushed away the flies.

This man was no engineer and no sanitary inspector. He was no N. C. O. of the Philippine constabulary. He thumbed the bolt of his rifle and admitted he was a teacher! I had heard often of his type. Indeed, I had come to the Philippines for the sole purpose of making his acquaintance, and to meet him in the equality of the brush was indeed good fortune, for men of his kind the world over are prone to be as uncommunicative as the Englishman at the frontiers of empire. Here he was at work at one of the strong contacts of civilization and of education in the Philippines—the development of water supply.—Paul Monroe in Asia Magazine.

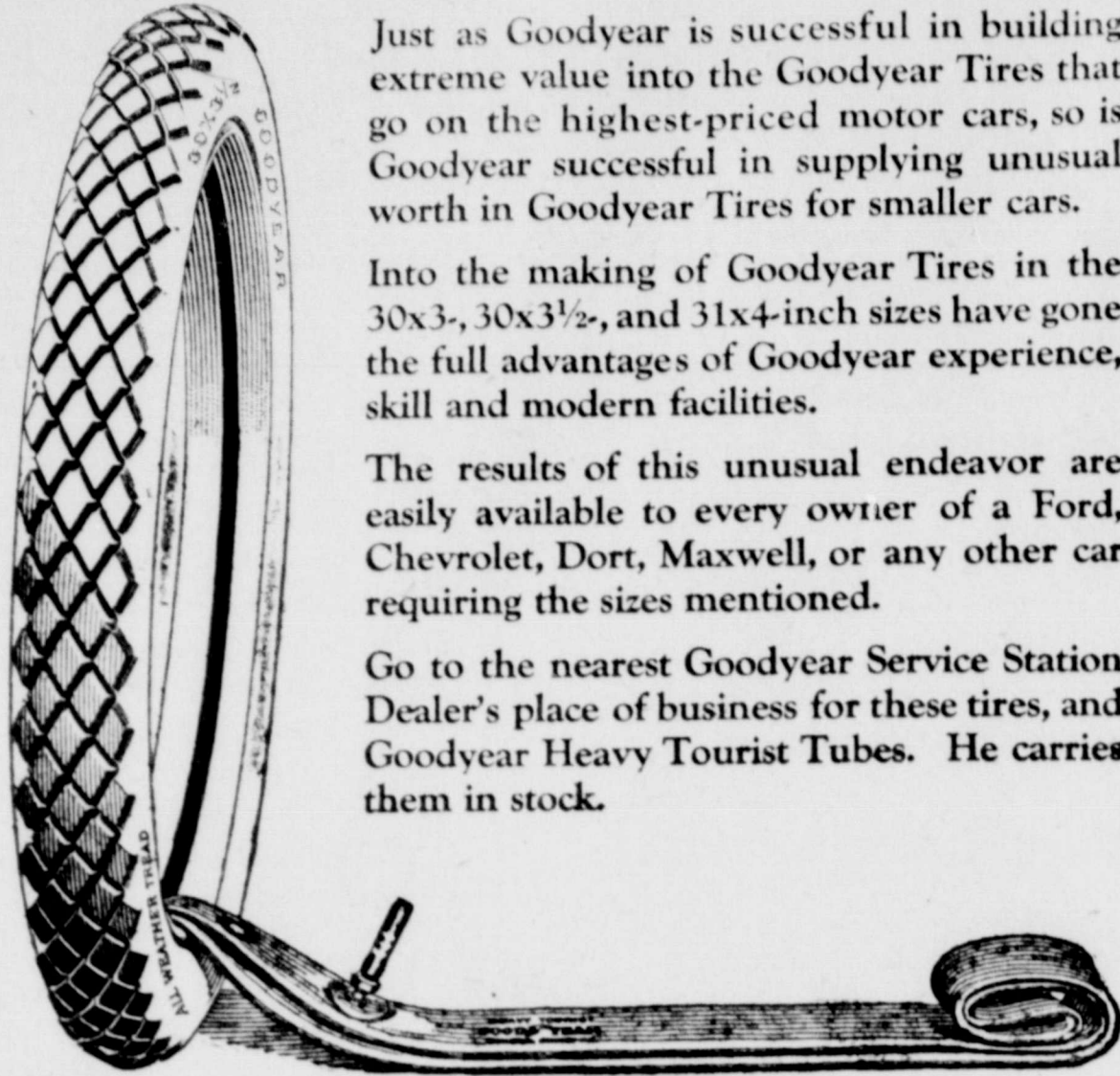
