



TOTEM POLES TELL HISTORY

the Up-Coast Indian Tribes of British Columbia.

Totem poles of the up-coast Indian tribes of British Columbia tell the history of that race. The poles are of ethnologic and folklore significance, have legendary symbolism, and carry details of the tribe, clan, family and individual. Their painted grotesques of birds, beasts, fish and men are done in blue, red and white upon a black

background. The right to use the totemic crest always descends through the woman. A tribesman uses the tribal crest of his clan group in addition to those of one or more guardian spirits he may have acquired. If he is easy in making friendships with birds, beasts and fishes he may have a Noah's ark of them on his pole. The crests are also carved on canoe prows, painted on house fronts and woven into baskets and blankets of goat hair or cedar




