"48" YIELDS TO LABOR-PRAYER IS CHEERED

COX TO MEET WILSON SUNDAY

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 13.—Governor Cox, Democrat, presidential nominee, announced today that he will hold a conference with President Wilson at the White House next Sunday morning.

The announcement was made following a telephone conversation between Gov. Cox and Secretary Tumulty. Franklin D. Roosevelt, vice-presidential nominee, will also be in the conference, according to the Washington announcement.

BARBECUE FOR RABBIT DRIVE

Ed Jones and other citizens from the Colorado river country, East of Ballinger, were in the city Monday advertising a rabbit drive for their neighborhood next Thursday. Mr. Jones stated that the farmers in the community to be covered by the drive would give a barbecue and picnic for the rabbit hunters, and every one who can possibly join in the campaign against Brex Rabbit is invited to come.

The drive will start at the Mustang oil well on Mrs. Mary Spreen's place at seven o'clock. The drive will be made towards Ballinger, or towards the Colorado river, and a halt made for dinner at the Giesecke tank, where a barbecue and basket dinner will be ready for the hunters. "We are going to barbecue the fatted calves," said Mr. Jones, "and we will have the good women there with baskets filled with pies, cakes, etc."

After dinner another drive will be made, and if the territory is not covered the second day's drive will be made and another barbecue spread arranged for the hunters.

The farmers are in dead earnest about the pesk rabbits and they declare that a concerted effort must be put forth or the loss to cotton crops will be serious.

Your presence at the drives will be appreciated by the farmers, and you will be given a good dinner and a good day's outing.

R. M. Grimes, of the Maverick country, was here Tuesday looking after business. Mr. Grimes owns an irrigated plant on Oak Creek, and has been fighting the dry weather until his water supply became exhausted. He is preparing to build a dam and store water for irrigating.

SUFF AMENDMENT AGAN WINNER

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Justice Bailey, in the district supreme court today, dismissed the proceedings brought by Charles Fairbanks, president of the American Constitutional League, to prevent the promulgation of the ratification of the suffrage amendment and to test the validity of the suffrage law.

Justice Bailey held the court was without authority to inquire into the action of the state legislatures in ratifying the suffrage amendment and that his court had no authority to pass upon the validity of the amendment.

HOBBY RETURNS TO HIS OFFICE

AUSTIN, July 13.—After an absence of nearly three weeks, Governor Hobby is back at the capitol desk today, returning last night from San Francisco, where he went as a delegate to the Democratic national convention, accompanied by Mrs. Hobby. Gov. Hobby resumes his duties as governor and Lieut. Governor Johnson, who has been acting as governor during Mr. Hobby's absence, returns to his home at Memphis, Texas.

VOTE BEFORE LEAVING HOME

Absence from the county on primary election day, July 24th, will not prevent you from voting, if you will file your ballot with the county clerk before leaving home.

The election law allows a voter who is called away from home for any cause not earlier than ten days and not later than three days before the primary election day, to file his ballot properly made out with the county clerk.

Thus voters who know they are going to be out of the county between July 14 and July 21 may file their ballot with the county clerk.

The voter will place his ballot in an envelope addressed to the presiding officer of his election box, place a stamp on it, and leave it with the county clerk, who will mail it to the presiding officer in time to reach him on election day and be counted.

Those who are not personally known to the county clerk must bring two witnesses for identification, the law states. The only cost to the voters is the two cents postage to mail the ballot to his voting box.

Quite a number of ballots were filed two years ago, and no doubt those who are called away from home will take advantage of the law this year, and express their choice in the political fracas before they go away on business or take their vacation.

Germans Given More Time to Comply to Ultimatum

SPA, Belgium, July 13.—Allied prime ministers decided not to insist upon the Germans replying to the ultimatum regarding coal deliveries, which was called for at three o'clock today, but the time limit has been extended until tomorrow.

The allies originally demanded a monthly delivery of two million and two hundred thousand tons of coal by the Germans. The Germans offered to deliver one million and one hundred thousand tons and the allies reduced their demands to two million, and the ultimatum informed the Germans that they must agree by three o'clock today and comply with the last demands or the

allies would take steps to enforce the terms of the treaty of Versailles.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—A report from Mexico City that Francisco Villa, the bandit chief, is surrounded and his capture imminent, is not credited in Mexican official circles here.

CHICAGO, July 13.—The amalgamation of the principal groups attempting to form new political parties here came to an agreement today, and the Third Party is assured.

The committee of 'forty-eight' voted to join the National Labor Party, and a large non-partisan league and group of delegates representing the single taxers marched into the labor convention and announced that they had decided to amalgamate.

Reverend George C. Richmond, in a prayer before the committee of forty-eight, gave thanks for the Russian revolution and for a "new spirit of self assertiveness among negroes." The Reverend Richmond also gave thanks for the revolution in Ireland and he prayed for blessings to rest upon Eugene Debs "in his prison cell." The prayer was interrupted with cheers.

COAL SHIPMENTS MAY COME FIRST

WASHINGTON, July 13.—A new emergency order from the Interstate Commerce Commission, granting priority to coal shipments to the Northwest and New England states by operators having contracts in that section, will be proposed by the bituminous coal mine operators to the railroad executives in New York tomorrow. This step is made in the hope of improving the transportation situation.

MAKING PLANS FOR ELECTION

The County Democratic Executive Committee was in session Monday perfecting plans for the first primary election to be held Saturday, week, July 24th.

The ticket was made up in official order and copy placed in the hands of the printers for rush work in making ready the tickets. About four thousand ballots will be printed and distributed to the various election managers, according to the number of votes in the respective precincts.

All candidates came in with their prorata portion of the election expenses as assessed by the committee. That was necessary before candidates could be given a place on the ticket. The political game is one in which the dancer must pay the fiddler before the music starts.

The election supplies will be made ready as quick as possible and placed in the hands of the respective presiding officers of the election, and balloting will begin on scheduled time.

It is estimated that about two thousand votes will be polled in the county primary. The voting strength of the county is upwards of three thousand, including 400 women who paid their poll tax and are entitled to participate in the primary, but about one-third of the voters will remain away from the primary, some through carelessness and indifference and some who are affiliated with other political parties and will not take part in the Democratic election.

The executive committee appointed the precinct chairman of each precinct to serve as presiding officer for that precinct, and the presiding officer will choose his own help. It is to be hoped that a sufficient number of clerks will be employed to handle the work of counting as rapidly as possible in order that it will not be necessary to work late at night and that the result of the election may be known as soon as possible after the polls close.

CHICAGO, July 13.—The proposed amalgamation of the minority political groups into one new party today hinged on two joint conferences. The labor party, after fifty hours conference, failed to bring the labor group and committee of forty-eight together, and adopted an ultimatum to proceed with the adoption of its own platform and selection of candidates if the conference is not finished today.

Delegates urged that the labor party "forget all about the forty-eight leaders and go after the farmers' support in their convention." They said that the farmers' strength in other meetings had no real affinity with "plutes and subtle slick lawyers" who they asserted comprise the leadership of the forty-eight group.

RABBITS RUN IN BIG DROVES NOW

"I have more rabbits, bigger rabbits and gentler rabbits than anybody," said R. M. Davis, of the Crews country, who was here Monday. "I have seen as many as fifteen in one drove," said Mr. Davis, "and they are cutting our cotton in a hurry."

Mr. Davis stated that he had been living in a "rabbit country" a long time, but he never saw the rabbits as plentiful as they are at present.

Farmers from other sections of the county make the same report, and they say the damage to crops will run high into thousands of dollars.

The damage will not stop with the destruction of the present cotton crop. With favorable season for planting grain this fall a large acreage will be put in, and the rabbits will live high through the winter.

The farmers can not wait for outside relief, or state appropriations to assist in exterminating the pests. They must get busy and adopt the most practical plans for ridding the country of rabbits, and every county should join in the campaign.

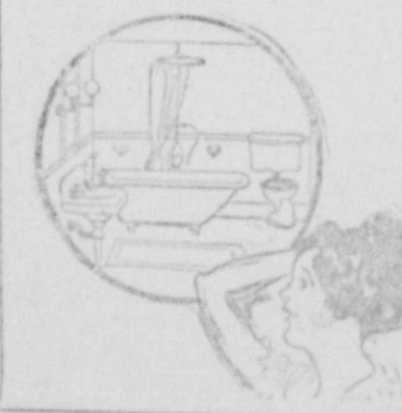

STOCK JUDGING FINALS SATURDAY

County Farm Agent Eaton was out in the Rowena country Monday with a number of the boys of the Boys' Clubs of this county, giving some instructions on stock judging. Several farms were visited and the boys were given opportunity to put their knowledge into practice.

The final contest for the county in stock judging will be held Saturday, according to Mr. Eaton. The winner in this contest will get a four-thousand mile trip, along with the winners from other counties of Texas. The trip will extend through the intervening states between Texas and Canada, and a short trip will be made into Ontario. The chief factories and packing houses of the North will be visited, as well as the agricultural colleges of the various states, and the return trip will be made by Washington, D. C., where a call will be made on President Wilson.

The stock judging contests are under the supervision of the State Agricultural & Mechanical College, and the excursion is offered as a stimulus toward harder work for the boys. The trip will start in August, and the boys will be gone for two or three weeks.

RABBITS EAT UP 75 ACRES COTTON

Jack Rabbits are being assisted by grasshoppers in their raid on the cotton crop in Brown county, according to the Brownwood Bulletin, which says:

"Farmers in Brownwood today report general prospects in Brown county as excellent with only two dangers now apparent, that of jack rabbits and grasshoppers, with the odds at present in favor of the rabbits from a standpoint of destructive capacity. Ten miles south of Brownwood on the Brady road one farmer stated that he saw as he came to town seventy-five acres in cotton or rather had been in cotton but which had been eaten to the ground by the rabbits. Similar reports come from many other localities and just now organized rabbit drives throughout the county are being discussed. It will be called to mind that when the pest was so bad in Coleman county a few years ago, farmers organized gun clubs and succeeded by persistent work in killing practically all the rabbits in the infested areas. In some localities grasshoppers are doing a lot of damage but poisoning on a large scale has started and it is believed the ravages of the pest will be stopped to a large extent."
