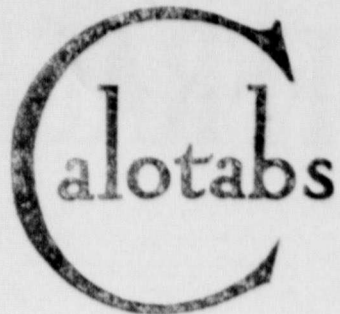
"It was Culbertson's genius, his broad vision, his capacity for detail, his intense earnestness and his sustaining courage that made

this possible. Unquestionably he is the greatest business man, whose perspective takes in every vital element of business, that has ever been named as a candidate for governor by any party in Texas.

"Personally he is as clean as a hound's tooth. He is a red blooded American. He is just 37 years of age, is single and has all the earmarks of having in him those qualities that are essential for a first class, home broke and thoroughly tamed husband. He is as plain as an old shoe, as democratic as the proverbial blacksmith; is a man who works hard when there is work to do and who plays hard when it is play time.

"Culbertson is a man who can command a salary of \$50,000 or more a year from any seasoned concern as its chief executive, if it has the foundation for an expanding volume of business of large moment, and he would carry to the executive chair of Texas qualities of administration that might seem strange and fearsome to professional politicians, but which would find pleasant reflection in the thoughts of the tax payers and the citizens and which would bring about conditions that would mark a new era in the development of Grand Old Texas.

LARGE CROWD HEARS JOHNSON'S ATTACK ON BAILEY'S WAR RECORD

(Continued from first page.)

Bailey came back to Texas last fall and held a conference with other enemies of the democratic administration at Ft. Worth, and at the same time Jim Ferguson was holding a conference with his political pals in laying plans for disrupting the democratic party. The speaker said that Bailey declared he was going to organize a new party in Texas, and today he is fighting the democratic party within and Ferguson is fighting the democratic party without, and that both Bailey and Ferguson are agreed on their party principles. "Bailey is on the inside bushwhacking," said Mr. Johnson.

"I would not have the nerve to stand in the presence of a democratic audience and ask them to make me their standard bearer," said Mr. Johnson, "if I could not find one single thing good in eight years of democratic administration," and here Mr. Johnson brought out the bitter stand Bailey had taken against the administration.

"Bailey denounced Wilson," said Mr. Johnson, "and said that Wilson was the most monumental failure who ever occupied the White House. That is what the Republicans say, and Joe's talk suits the Republicans. If the Republicans would stay out of the Democratic Party Bailey would not get 75,000 votes."

Mr. Johnson said that 1902 Democratic delegates, representing every congressional state in the Union were unanimous in endorsing the administration and the Democratic platform as adopted at San Francisco, and defending the Democratic president, while Bailey was against the whole affair. The convention and Governor Cox said that Wilson's administration has given the nation more constructive legislation than any administration in the history of the nation, and here the speaker discussed the Federal Reserve Bank bill which was passed under Wilson's administration.

"We had a National Bank failure every twenty-one days," said Mr. Johnson, "before the Federal Reserve Bank law was passed. For the first year under the Federal Reserve Bank system there were only nine National Bank failures. For the second year there were only six failures and during 1918, after passing through the awful war, there was no single National Bank failure in the United States, and the Federal Reserve Bank system brought about this state of affairs. Mr. Bailey is opposed to Federal Reserve Banks."

"Bailey opposed the Farm Loan Bank said the speaker, and this law has been a great help to the farmers and made it possible for many of them to buy farms on long time at five per cent interest."

"Mr. Bailey opposed the child labor law because Jefferson did not have a child labor law. Bailey opposed the woman wage law. The speaker told of the great benefit of these laws in protecting children and keeping them in school and in protecting the widow women and the women who have to work for a living.

"The Democratic platform declared in favor of all these laws, and Mr. Bailey is opposed to all of them," said Mr. Johnson.

Mr. Johnson discussed the open shop question and said this was a false and false issue and that Bailey could not and would not try to pass any legislation to prevent any man from operating either an open or closed shop. He declared that every man had a right to make contract to work as long as he pleased and for who he pleased, and that Bailey had distinguished himself to be governor as he could not arbitrate or prevent labor disturbances, as he had already prejudiced labor organizations against him and union labor knows that they could not get justice at his hands. "I will give any man a block of bank stock if they will get Mr. Bailey to say that he will put his open shop plank into law," said Mr. Johnson.

"I am for open shop if the owners of the shop want an open shop and for a closed shop if the workers of the shop want a closed shop."

Mr. Johnson was applauded from time to time during the two hour address, but the climax in enthusiasm came when he attacked Bailey's war record.

"I do not want to put the standard of democracy in the hands of a man who was a slacker during the war. The man over draft age who shirked his duty at home was just as much of a slacker as the ignorant boy who took to the brush to flee from being drafted. There were young American boys who did not know any better, and who were misled by older heads, who were misled by the enemy, who were misled by the enemy, and yet this man who did know better shot up and kept his hate smoldered in his breast until after the war."

"There are young American boys in the federal pen, who evaded the draft law largely through ignorance, having been taught that the United States had no right to send them into a foreign field to fight, and it makes my blood boil to think that a man who did as bad as asking us to make him governor of Texas."

"Bailey said he was not in favor of war, and when war was declared he closed his mouth. That was a great sacrifice for him to shut up, and since the war is over he feels free to express what was in his heart during the war."

"Suppose you and I had shut up like Bailey during the war? Suppose the women of this country—my wife and your wife, had refused to get out and sell Liberty Bonds and Thrift Stamps, do Red Cross work, make bandages, and tend for our boys over there? Don't you know that your boy would have been over yonder yet, or else he would be filling a German prison or a soldier's grave."

Mr. Johnson stated that as soon as the war was over Bailey began to complain about freedom of speech and included it in his platform upon which he promulgated at Fort Worth when he came back to Texas last fall to campaign against the administration. "His freedom of speech has been abridged" and the speaker said Emma Goldman

was run out of the country because she had the courage to express her feelings of hate against the administration and Eugene Debs is in the federal pen for the same reason, while Bailey closed up until after the war was over.

Mr. Johnson closed his address with the attack on Bailey's war record. He said that he did not hate Bailey and would not throw a pebble in his way except to defend his fight on democracy, and he said that Bailey was responsible for the record he made, "and I am only giving the facts," said Mr. Johnson.

The speaker devoted most of his time in expounding Baileyism and had very little to say about Bailey's opponent, only mentioning Neff's name in the beginning of his address when he briefly stated why he was on the stump.

Labor Shortage in South Texas

CORPUS CHRISTI, Aug. 13.—The lure of the unpicked cotton, coupled with the high wages have caused the towns of the Gulf coast district to be deserted by surplus labor, according to reports received here. A local ice company, in a published statement said that so many of its employees had quit to pick cotton that it was handling the situation with difficulty.

Thousands of cotton pickers are needed in the Gulf Coast district according to the Rural Land Owners' association, in spite of the fact that news of the great crop being made has drawn more labor here than ever before so early in the season. Farmers are paying \$1.50 a hundred pounds.

And how she once knew of a lady who caught cold after a similar operation and contracted some awful kind of incurable "stis".

One always considers people in conversation. Then why not in letter writing? One does not talk religion before an atheist, nor let the conversation verge on the frivolous before a curate.

Letters require just as much thought.

DISCOVERY OF HOLY CROSS

Story Goes That the Empress Helena Was Responsible for Its Recovery From the Jews.

Through the zeal of the Empress Helena, mother of Constantine the Great, was discovered the cross on which the Savior was crucified, and the date is given as May 3. The story usually told is to the effect that the empress went to Jerusalem and there compelled the Jews to bring the cross from its concealment and give it to her, together with other crosses in their possession. Its identity was established by a miracle: The body of a dead man was placed on each of the crosses, and when it touched the true one the dead man immediately came to life. Many pilgrims traveling to Jerusalem received pieces of the true cross, and the question was raised as to the possibility of supplying thousands with those fragments without entirely carrying away the cross. It was therefore said that the true cross had the power of reproducing itself. On the capture of Jerusalem in 614, the cross was taken to Persia, where it remained until restored by Heraclius, which event is commemorated in September and is usually called Holyrood day. The four nails were distributed so that two were placed in the imperial crown, one brought to France, and another thrown into the Adriatic to quiet its turbulence.

Oulja Supplanted Planchette.

The planchette was a thin, heart-shaped piece of wood supported on two casters at the end of the base, and on an ordinary pencil at the apex. popular about 1860 to 1880, before the oulja board supplanted it. The pencil could readily be made to trace characters without conscious movement on the part of the operator, if the fingertips were placed upon this device.

Like the oulja board, the planchette was used by two classes of persons. It was used by the believers in spiritualism, who asked questions of a spiritual control, and believed that they received answers from the intelligences on the spirit plane, and by people who regarded the mechanism as a game, and amused themselves by pushing it to write messages for the benefit of others present.

Old and New Books.

There is no sillier affectation than that of old worldism. To rave about Sir Robert Browne and know nothing of William Cobbett is foolish. To turn your back upon your own time is simply to provoke living wags, with rudimentary but effective humor, to chalk opprobrious epithets upon your person. But, on the other hand, to depend upon your contemporaries for literary sustenance, to be reduced to scan the lists of "Forthcoming Works" with a hungry eye, and new novels, and new sermons, is worse than affectation—it is stupidity.—Augustine Birrell.

Checking Fire in Films.

The celluloid films used for motion pictures ignite easily and burn rapidly, necessitating the installation of special protective equipment. A European inventor has combined a new chemical with an ingenious method of applying it, which saves, it is asserted, all of the film except the portion first ignited. The film in the projecting machine is surrounded by a ring of tubing with inner perforations, connected with an iron tank containing the chemical, a colorless liquid. A valve near the operator's hand enables the flow to be started instantly.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

INSANE HOMES BADLY CROWDED

AUSTIN, Aug. 12.—A report to the governor by State Health Officer Goddard of the inspection by the State Health Department of the four asylums of the state for the insane, said that conditions were very much overcrowded at these institutions. Dr. Goddard declared that at each of the asylums at Austin, San Antonio and Terrell there were approximately two hundred beds more than the capacity of these institutions and the asylum at Rusk was fast filling beyond its capacity.

"Under the very able and efficient management of all these hospitals, sanitary conditions were as nearly perfect as they can be made, taking into consideration the overcrowded conditions and certain needed building improvements and equipment," the report says. "With roofs leaking and ceilings and floors rotting and giving away, it is impossible to keep down odors and maintain absolute sanitation. This condition in the asylum at Austin especially cannot be improved until the dilapidated interiors of some of the old buildings are repaired. All sanitary rules are very rigidly enforced, except the use of the common roller towel in some of the hospitals, which use cannot be thoroughly condemned."

"There is no system of ventilation in any of the hospitals for the insane except by means of open doors and windows, says the report. In the asylum at San Antonio it was noted that in female ward A there were two to three patients in small rooms sufficient in size for one patient, and twenty-two beds were in a dormitory where it is said there should have not been more than half that number. The report cites other instances of overcrowded conditions.

BULLETIN ON OIL SURVEY

AUSTIN, Aug. 12.—Of especial interest to oil geologists and prospectors is a recent University of Texas bulletin, issued by the Bureau of Economic Geology and Petrology, on the "Underground Position of the Ellsburger Formation in North Central Texas." This bulletin is the work of Dr. E. H. Sellards, geologist of the Bureau, and represents a paper read before the Dallas meeting of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists in March 1920 and since that time revised for publication.

According to Dr. Sellards statement in the introduction the Ellsburger formation is not known to be itself productive of oil or gas in commercial quantities, but its relation to the production formations is such that determination of its position becomes a matter of importance. This bulletin relates to the position of the Ellsburger limestone in north-central Texas, covering the chief oil district and including the following counties: Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Coryell, Eastland, Erath, Palo Pinto, Runnels, San Saba, Stephens and Young.

Data was collected from the files of the Bureau, from the geological and scouting departments of the large oil-producing companies, operating in North Central Texas from drillers, and from the logs of wells.

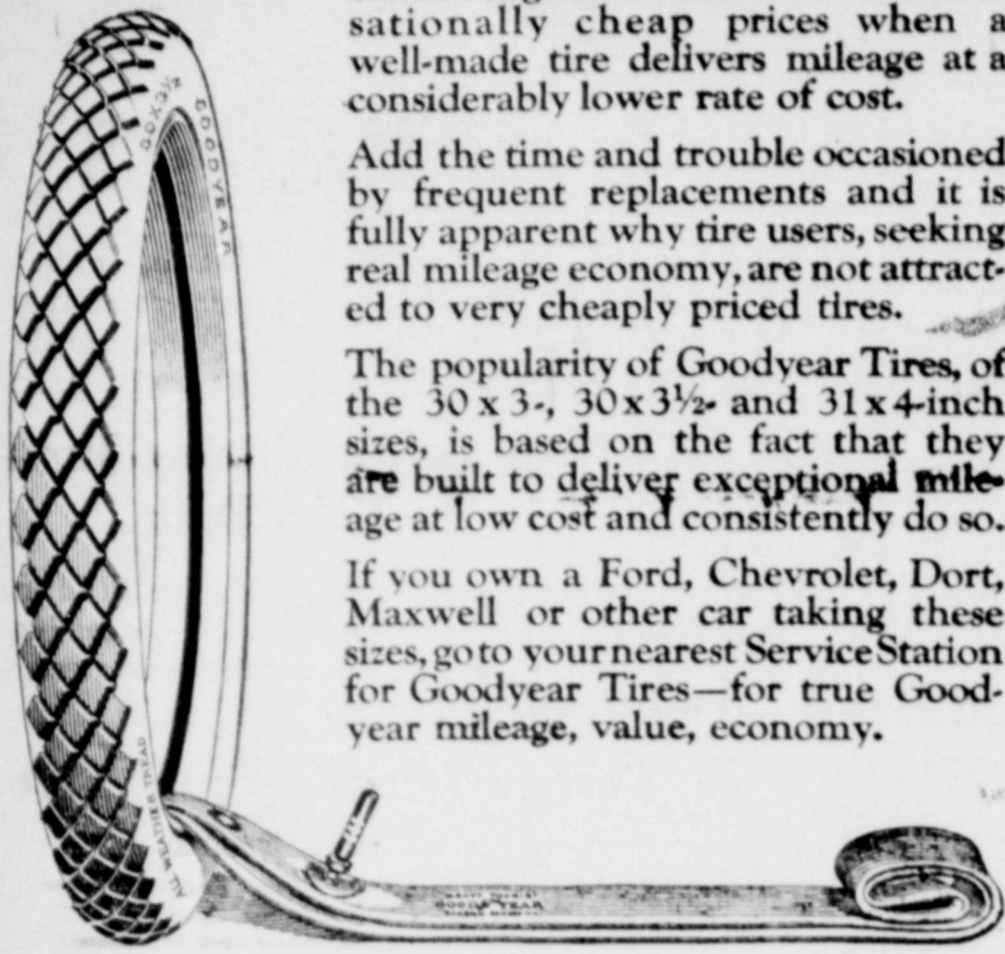

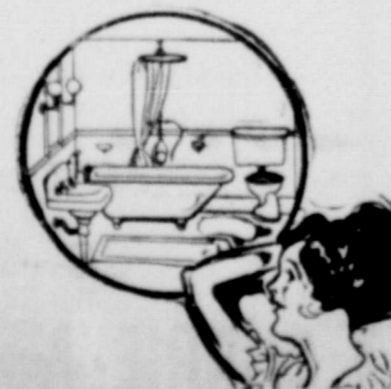
