Role of Rocket In War Is Told

Starting With Nothing, by End of War We Were in Lead With Weapons.

WASHINGTON. — At the outbreak of war, our armed forces were like kids without fireworks on the Fourth of July as far as rockets were concerned. But the handicap was made up in deadly fashion, asys the United Press. It was the United Press of the Washington more of their wartime rocket weapons. The report also frankly admitted that as late as June, 1940—after the fall of France—the armed forces showed only "mild interest" in suggestions of a civilian scientist that rockets could and should be developed.

The scientist was Dr. C. N. Hickman of Bell Telephone laboratories. He was one of the leading rocket scientists of the recent war, and every one of his ideas proved sound in combat.
