PAYS TRIBUTE TO PIONEER CITIZEN

Just as the evening shadows were rapidly drawing the day to a close and the rays of an autumn sun were giving way to darkness following a bright Sunday afternoon, a large number of Masons and concourse of friends gathered around the remains in Evergreen Cemetery to pay the last tribute of respect and love to W. H. Weeks, Sunday afternoon, October 3rd.

The funeral service began at the home of deceased on Eighth Street at five o'clock. Rev. J. B. Curry had charge of the services at the home, after which the Masons took charge of the remains, and they were tenderly conveyed to Evergreen Cemetery where the ceremony was concluded with Masonic honors at six o'clock. A long procession of sorrowing friends formed at the home and followed the remains to their last resting place. The beautiful floral offerings attested to the high esteem in which the deceased was held by the people among whom he spent more than half of his life.

Mr. Weeks passed out of this world at seven o'clock Sunday morning, his death bringing to an end a long and useful career. For several days it had been known that the end was drawing near. Following a period of several months' feebleness, Mr. Weeks was stricken with heart trouble, and this was the cause of his death, coupled with the fact that he had rounded out a long life, having lived seventy-eight years, one month and six days.

Deceased was a native Texan. His parents came to Texas in the pioneer days of this state and helped blaze the way for civilization. He was born in Nacogdoches county, and when the tide of immigration turned West Mr. Weeks came to Lampasas county, where he lived for a number of years. Later he moved to Taylor county and located at Buffalo Gap, where he lived for eight years. When the Santa Fe was under construction West from Temple, the pioneer citizen moved to Ballinger, locating here in 1886, and he lived to witness the growth of Ballinger from a tent city to a modern little city, and raised a family of one son and three daughters here.

In the early days of his residence here Mr. Weeks was engaged in the cattle buying and shipping business and market business. After retiring from business he was elected justice of the peace and county commissioner of this precinct, serving several years, giving the precinct a successful administration with faithful service. Later he was elected mayor of Ballinger and served faithfully in that capacity. For the past several years he had been on what his friends called the retired list, and was living in comfortable ease and waiting patiently until the summons should come for him to leave this world.

Responding to messages that their father was ill and perhaps on his death bed, the three daughters, who live at other places, reached here in time to join their mother and brother and spend several days with their father before the end came. Mrs. John DeYoung came from Wharton, Mrs. Willie O'Dell and Mrs. Ollie Midgley, and the latter's two children, came from Pawnee, Oklahoma. The only son, John A. Weeks, who resides here, had been living close to his father and watching closely after him in his declining days. To these and the bereaved wife the sympathy of many friends is extended.

Stage All Set for World Series World Series to Be Played Here

The Associated Press wired The Ledger today that the World Series of baseball would start at noon, Texas time. The first bulletin on the game should reach The Ledger immediately after the local Western Union office opens after lunch, and the bulletins will be filed at the close of each inning.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The world series of 1920, the blue ribbon event of baseball, will be ushered in at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, Tuesday.

The contesting teams, Brooklyn and Cleveland, champions respectively of the National and American leagues, are perhaps more evenly matched than are the world series contenders generally.

The expose before the grand jury in Chicago of the crooked deal in connection with the world series of last year apparently has had no effect on the coming game, other than to make the players of both teams more determined than ever to make the contests a true test of the relative merits of both clubs.

Reports from both clubs today are that applications for reserved seats far outnumber the supply. With the unreserved seats, to be sold on the days the games are played, it will be a case of first come, first served.

Local baseball fans can see the World Series played tomorrow and this week by watching the bulletins in The Ledger window. We have made arrangements to receive the games play by play at the close of each inning. The games start at 2:30.

The series this year is a battle between the Cleveland Indians and the Brooklyn Dodgers for the world's championship. The first three games will be played on the Brooklyn field.

The world's series last year between Cincinnati and Chicago of the American League was the first five out of nine series under the National Commission's jurisdiction. Only eight games, however, were necessary to decide the championship, this being the second time that eight games were played. The other occasion was in 1912, when the Boston and New York clubs were obliged to play an extra game because one in the regular series resulted in a tie.

While the Boston-New York series of 1912 still holds the record for total attendance at 251,901, the series between Cincinnati and Chicago last year established

a new high mark for receipts when the 236,928 people who saw the games, paid a total of \$722,928.

Houston, Texas, (revised) 138,276, increase 59,476 or 75.5 per cent. Harris county, Texas, containing Houston, is given at 186,667, increasing 70,994, or 61.3 per cent.

CROP REPORT SHOWS COTTON REDUCTION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—A reduction of 660,000 bales of cotton is forecasted for the season, as compared with the government statement made one month ago. The department of agriculture issued a report today and bases the latest forecast on crop conditions at 59.1 per cent normal. The report was made up as of date Sept. 25th. Today's forecast fixes the crop for the present year at 12,123,000 bales.

The cotton market varied little today from the Saturday market, the prevailing price for spots running from 21.50 to 22.00.

Reports received here now from other markets in this part of the state has put at rest the charges made against the local market. According to a comparison of prices quoted in papers reaching The Ledger office, Ballinger is offering more and is at the top. 19 cents was the top in Brownwood last Saturday, while cotton sold for as high as 22.10 in Ballinger.

ARMY OF COTTON PICKERS ARRIVE

A Salvation Army officer arrived in Ballinger Sunday at noon with a squad of cotton pickers. The officer had been picking with his bunch in Bell county and at other places, and learning of the good crop and demand for pickers here, brought the men to this place.

Monday morning there were several farmers trying to contract with the Salvation Army man, and no time will be lost in giving the hands work in the cotton field.

The crew work on the independent order, having with them their own cook, and all they ask is a place to camp and work. This county could use many such crews of workmen for a few weeks.

Sunday's train brought the largest number of cotton pickers to arrive at one time this season. More than one hundred negroes arrived and many white men. The negroes were mostly in charge of parties who went East and employed them. Most of the white men came independently, but were soon assigned to jobs in the cotton fields.

Other large squads are due to arrive during the present week. The publicity given this county thru the Y. M. B. L. and other agencies is having good results, and many pickers are drifting this way. Farmers have not cut the price, but if cotton continues to go down, they will be forced to say less for picking. The prevailing price is \$2 per hundred, or \$1.50 and hard, where the farmer, are fixed for boarding their hands.

OLD WARRIORS IN MEET AT HOUSTON

ATTENDS WEST TEXAS COMMERCE BOARD MEET

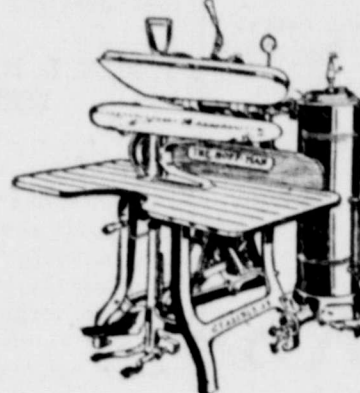

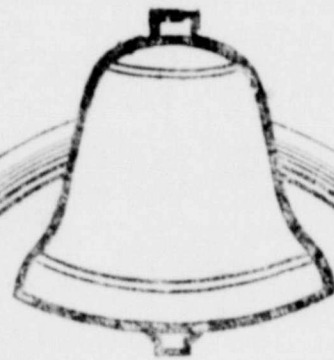

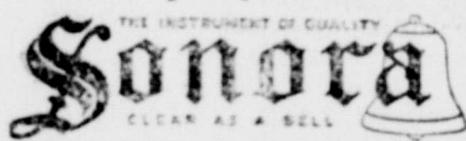

ABILENE MAN BUYS MAEROY FORD CAR STOLEN SATURDAY NIGHT

A deal was closed last week in which H. E. Wood sold to H. T. Dodge, of Abilene, the Maeroy Theatre, and Mr. Hodge takes charge today (Monday). The announcement that Mr. Wood had sold the theatre came as a surprise to his friends, as he has only been here a few months, has recently purchased the building in which the Maeroy is located. Mr. Hodge came here from Abilene a few days ago, prospecting for a new location. As a result of the visit the Maeroy changes hands.

He says that his son is an experienced showman, having been in the business seven or eight years, and he assures the public that the business here will be in good hands.

"You can say for us," said Mr. Hodge, "that we will make some improvement in the house here, both in equipment and in service to be given. We will present a variety program, and will make the show here equal to the service given in the larger cities."

Mr. Wood had not entertained an idea of selling and the deal has left him without a business. He says he has no idea what he will do and is casting about for something in which he can engage. He does not know whether he will be able to remain in Ballinger or not.

Both Mr. Wood and his family have made many friends since coming here and these friends trust that he will connect up with something which will keep them in Ballinger.

BOUNDARY SUIT UP IN U. S. COURT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—The United States supreme court convened today in regular term to find the docket crowded with important cases. Among the important cases on the docket is the Texas-Oklahoma boundary dispute and a half dozen anti-trust suits, and further attacks on the prohibition amendment to test the constitutionality of the amendment.

There are also suits on the docket seeking a test of the anti-profiteering section of the constitution of the food control act, the federal farm loan act, and other cases which will be of interest to the nation at large. 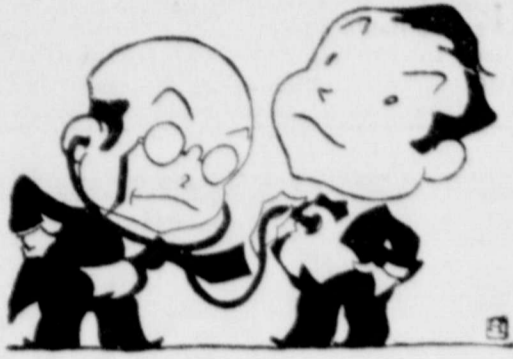

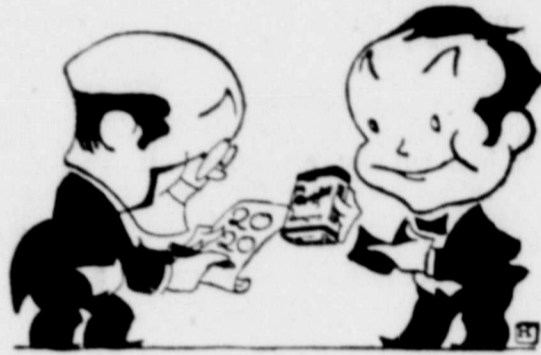

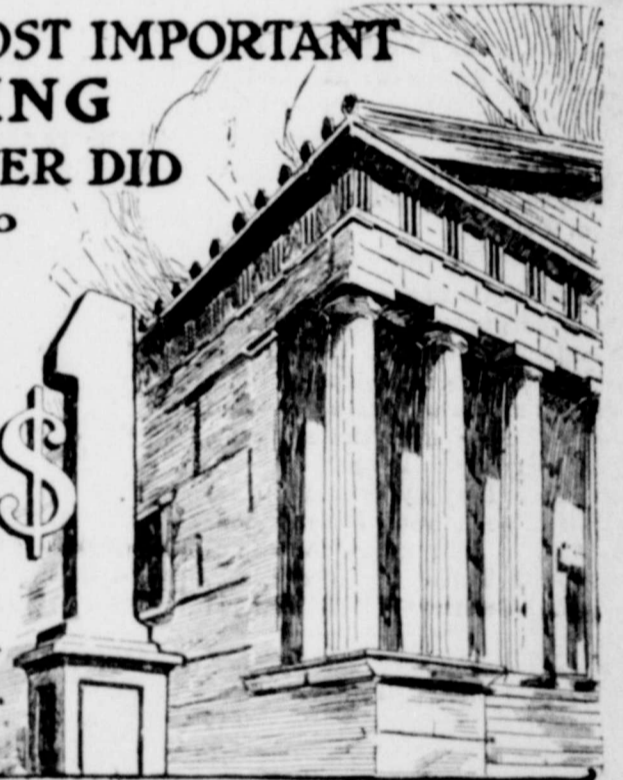
