"We paid 22.75 Monday," said Mr. Freeman, "and can prove it." For the same date the Ballinger top was quoted 21.75, and The Ledger stated that 20.75 was the top for Rowena.

We published the market on what we considered to be reliable information, but there is a difference of one cent somewhere.

DODGERS MAKE 3 RUNS; INDIANS FAIL TO SCORE

EBBETS FIELD, Brooklyn, Oct. 6.—2:19 p. m.—Burleigh K. Grimes fitted a fine coat of white wash on the backs of the Cleveland Indians today, and the National League pennant winning Brooklyn Dodgers, walked off the field with the second game of the world series by a score of 3 to 0.

Grimes' spit ball tied the Indian's backs into knots, while the Dodgers' timely hitting, getting hits when hits meant runs, kept the slate clean, and sent the Indians from the field with their feathers dangling in the dust.

The third game of the series will be played here tomorrow, and then the teams go to Cleveland for three games.

EBBETS FIELD, Brooklyn, Oct. 6.—The Cleveland Indians with one Brooklyn scalp dangling from their belts, went on the warpath again today with their tomahawks out for the National Leaguers in the second encounter of the world series warfare.

The tribe believe that they have the National Leaguers tied to a stake and declared themselves in for another killing. More than 20,000 fans were at the park, and the chill of yesterday's defeat and a cool night did not freeze the enthusiasm of the fans who came early to the ball yard and waited patiently for the signal, "play ball." Spectators began to form in line early in the hope of getting the unreserved seats.

Bagby was announced as Speaker's pitching selection and Burley Grimes as Beaver's choice for the Brooklyn Dodgers. The other stations were assigned as follows:

First Inning

Cleveland—Jamieson out, Konetehy to Grimes. Wambagans out Johnson to Konetehy, after working call to three and two. Speaker singled past Johnston. Smith fanned. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Brooklyn—Olson popped to Wambagans, hitting first ball pitched. Johnston got a single to deep of shortstop. Johnston stole second. Griffith out Johnston to Bagby, Johnston going to third. Johnston scored on Wheat's double to center field. Meyers out at first. One run, two hits, no errors.

Second Inning

Cleveland—Gardner doubled to left. Grimes took Johnston's roller and tossed to Olson who touched out Gardner. Johnston getting to first. Sewell flied to Olson. With O'Neill at the bat, Johnston died stealing. No runs, one hit, no errors.

Brooklyn—Jamieson made a nice catch of Konetehy's line drive. Kildruff lined out to Gardner. Miller popped up to O'Neill. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Brooklyn—Grimes singled thru pitcher's box. Bagby took Olson's sacrifice and threw wild to second, both batter and runner were safe. Grimes was spiked as sliding to second. It was no sacrifice for Olson but the fielder's choice. Johnston fouled out to O'Neill. Grimes scored on Grif-

fith's double to right, and Olson went to third. Wheat was purposely passed, filling the bases. The Cleveland infield drew in close, a double play following. Gardner took Meyers' grounder and threw to O'Neill who threw to first, the throw hitting Meyers on back. Griffith tried to score but was thrown out, Johnston to O'Neill. One run, two hits, one error.

Fourth Inning

Cleveland—Speaker walked. Smith grounded to Konetehy unassisted, Speaker going to second. Gardner flied to Meyers. Johnston flied to Wheat, who ran to the bleachers to make the catch. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Wrangel, according to wireless dispatches received here from Moscow.

THREE DIE IN OIL WELL FIRE

FORT WORTH, Oct. 6.—Three men who were fatally burned in an oil well fire last night near Breckenridge, died during the night. A fourth man will recover, according to the doctors.

The dead are: F. A. Kell, of Fort Worth; Walter H. Perlow, of Stockton, Illinois; Everett Higgins, of Shawnee, Oklahoma.

The well where the explosion and fire occurred is five blocks from the Breckenridge court house, and the fire is still burning today. Several nearby buildings were set on fire and destroyed by the force of the explosion. It is estimated that the property loss up to the present amounts to more than \$50,000.

U. S. POPULATION GIVEN TOMORROW

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The census department today announced the following population reports:

South Carolina, 1,683,662, increasing 168,262, or 11.1 per cent.

Nevada, 77,407, decreasing 4,468, or 5 per cent.

Alabama, 2,347,295, increasing 209,202, or 9.8 per cent.

Wyoming, 194,402, increasing 48,437, or 33.2 per cent.

The populations of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Iowa, Virginia, Arkansas and Florida will be announced at ten-thirty tomorrow morning, and the populations of Minnesota and Nebraska, will be announced at four o'clock tomorrow afternoon, and simultaneously the census bureau will announce the country's total population, the population of the United States to be announced shortly after the population of the last state is made public.

There were no changes in the personnel of the directorate or the officers of the bank, except the forwarding up the line of promotion of Carl Hensley as an assistant to the cashier.





Mr. Doose spent several days at Austin, where he was interested in legislation looking to betterment of the cotton market. He was instrumental in putting over the proposition to send a committee to foreign markets to see if a market could not be found for the 1919 cotton which the farmers are holding.

CITIES GAIN OVER COUNTRY IN 1920 POPULATION REPORT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Cities are increasing in population seven and one half times as fast as rural districts, the census bureau disclosed last night, in a compilation of figures covering approximately 85 per cent of the new census.

For the last ten years, rural growth was but one third as great as it was in the previous decade, but the cities almost maintained their rate of growth, getting five new inhabitants from 1910 to 1920 for each six added during the previous ten years. All population centres, including hamlets and towns, showed a greater proportionate increase than the purely rural districts. The greatest increases were by cities of 10,000 or lower inhabitants.

BUSY PROGRAM FOR Y. M. B. L.

With the assistance of The Ledger, the Young Men's Business League has put on foot a "Trade at Home" campaign, to offset the advertising which is being done in this section by the mail order houses. Two full pages of advertising, with a space in the center for propaganda, will be taken each week by the advertisers of this city. This campaign will extend thru the fall season, closing at the end of the year. The campaign will cost the advertisers only a small amount weekly, and will undoubtedly keep thousands of dollars in Rannels county that would otherwise reach Eastern cities. The Board of Directors, at their meeting last Monday night, were unanimously in favor of the project.

It was also decided at this meeting to start a move toward holding a Poultry Show in Ballinger this fall. A committee consisting of County Agent Eaton, Chester Cherry and S. B. Raby, was appointed to make the necessary arrangements. The committee will meet just as soon as Mr. Eaton returns from the Brady Fair. The committee will likely start the movement by organizing a Rannels County Poultry Association.

A committee from the Ministerial Association met with the Board and asked their co-operation in keeping immoral amusements and theatrical performances out of this city. The Directors assured the committee that they were heartily in sympathy with the move, and would do all within their power to create a sentiment against this character of amusement. The following general committee was appointed to handle this situation: Messrs. Roy Reeder and Noel Penn from the Y. M. B. L., Rev. Curry from the Ministerial Association, Mrs. Scott Mack from the Civic League, and Mrs. Dan Moser from the Shakespeare Club.

The condition of the local cemetery was brought before the Board, and the following committee was appointed to meet with Mrs. Geo. M. Vaughn of the Cemetery Association and work out some plan of keeping the cemetery in condition: James Skinner, Miss Maggie Sharp, and Miss Georgia Singletary.

The Y. M. B. L. voted to place before the State Railroad Commission at its hearing on October 19th, an application for a reduction in freight rates on road building materials. Many other applications and petitions are to be heard at the same time.

The Secretary reported that the Executive Board of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce had selected Clifford B. Jones, of the Spur Cotton Mills; Henry James, an Abilene banker; and Mr. Harlan, of Stamford; to meet with Mr. Finberg of Abilene, and formulate final plans for the disposition of low grade cotton in West Texas. The West Texas organization realizes that this is a gigantic task, but believes that this cotton must be turned into cash at the best prices obtainable in order to relieve the present market. Homer Wade of Stamford, Dr. Harkey of DeLeon, and Stuart L. Williams of Ballinger, were selected to make a study and

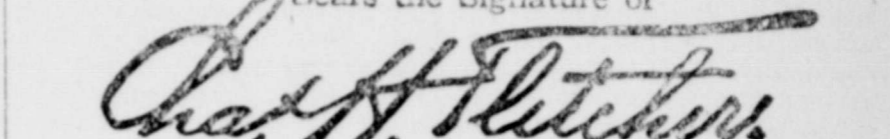

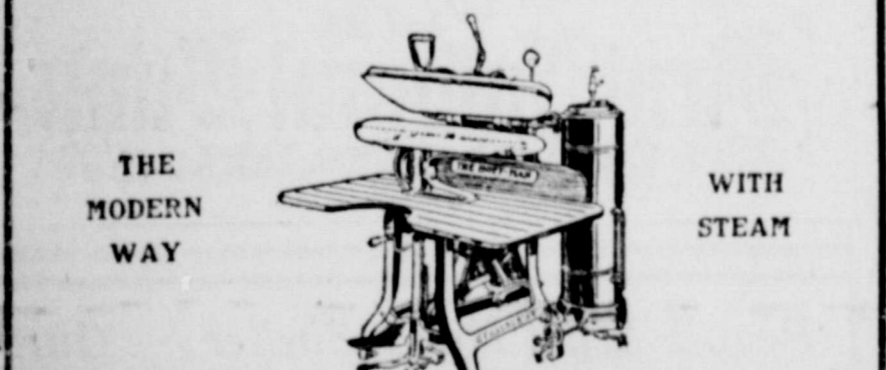

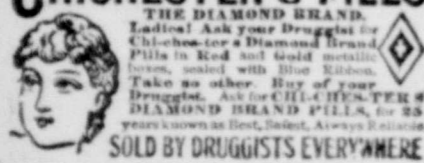

"Now by mathematical deduction and proportions the ginning under most favorable weather conditions for 1920 to Sept. 25 being only 2,243 is to average ginning 3,160 as X, the probable yield for 1920, is to 12,870, the average for 9 years, which will give the production for this year 1920 as compared to above crops to be not more than 9,124 bales. Now granting that acreage is some more and allowing for same 500,000 additional bales and further granting that crop is later this year and add for that 1,500,

000 possible addition, makes in all 2,000,000 to be added, would give us at the highest only 11,125,000 bales that can now be safely figured on, and it can run less.

"Certainly figures of actual ginnings, are more accurate than guessing at a crop. In my article of July 30th or about that time, I estimated the crop this year not to exceed 11,700,000 bales at the highest, and now after the actual ginnings are published, I feel confident the ultimate crop will fall considerably below my said estimate, and if it is below last year's crop, there is no reason why cotton should not be intrinsically worth, this year, at least 35 cents middling bases.

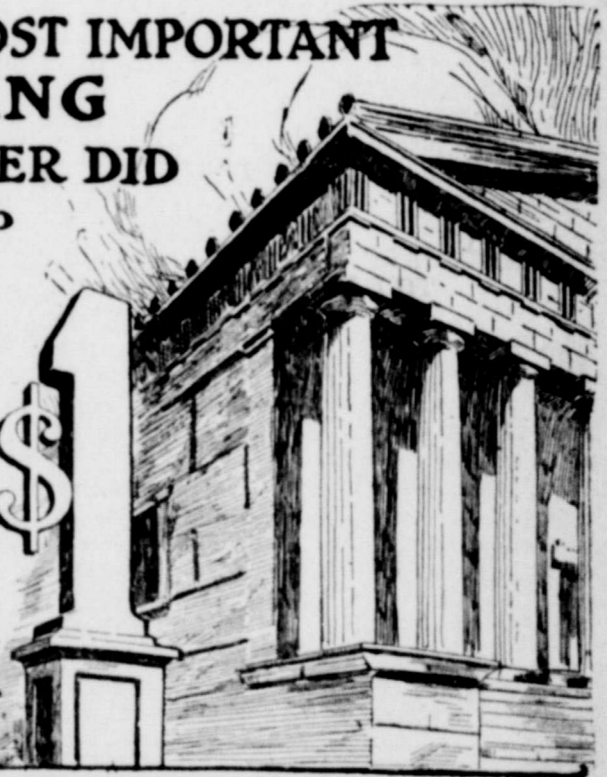
