COX DONATES \$5000 TO FUND

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Governor Cox, Democratic presidential nominee, today contributed \$5000 to the Democratic National Campaign fund, it was announced at headquarters here.

At the same time it was announced that Mr. Cox would speak at Detroit on the night of October 15th, instead of at Toledo.

CAN'T STARVE IRISH TO DEATH

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Lord Mayor MacSwiney is more refreshed this morning, after passing a fairly good night in Brixton prison. The mayor had some sleep, according to the Irish Self-Determination League bulletin, but to relatives who visited him in jail he seemed to be weaker and much more exhausted. He suffers great distress after saying even a single word, the bulletin declares.

NOVEMBER 14 MEMORIAL DAY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—President Wilson today directed that on November fourteenth, the American flag be displayed at half mast on all public buildings, naval and military posts, as a token of the nation's participation in the memorial services to be held on that day in memory of the heroic American soldiers, sailors and marines and others who gave their lives for their country in the world war.

SOUTH AND WEST HAS BEST GAIN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—An examination of the final census figures of the country indicates that the West and South proportionately will gain more in a political way than the East or Middle West.

The gain will come in form of increased membership in the House of Representatives, and increased votes in the Electoral College and larger delegations to the national political conventions. The increase in population in a number of the Western and Southern states will call for congressional redistricting of the states, and these states will be given larger representation in Congress.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The growth of the country's population was not expected to show so large a relative increase during the last decade as during the previous decade ended with 1910 because of almost complete stoppage of immigration during the World War and the heavy emigration during that period.

In the decade ending with 1910 the total population of the United States, exclusive of its outlying possessions, was 91,972,266. During those ten years the numerical increase was the largest of any decade of its history while the rate of growth was 21.0 per cent. The gain in that decade was four times what the total population of the country was in 1790 when the first Federal census was taken, while the total population in 1910 was almost 23 times larger than it was in 1790.

With the outlying possessions, the United States in 1910 had a population of 101,115,487. These possessions included Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico, the Philippine Islands, the Panama Canal Zone, Guam and Samoa, and the total of persons in the military and naval service abroad was added. This year the population of the Virgin Islands of the United States, acquired from Denmark, is included.

Rogers, has accomplished only a portion of its tremendous task which will continue to occupy a large force of statisticians and clerks for the better part of a number of years. But the primary object, for which the fathers of the country provided in the constitution that a counting of the people should be made every ten years, has been achieved. That object was to obtain the total population in order that apportionment of the members of the House of Representatives may be made by Congress.

COURT HOLDS UP ELECTION BALLOT

AUSTIN, Oct. 8.—The Texas Secretary of State was temporarily restrained today from certifying the names any political party on the official ballot for the November election pending the final decision of the application of an injunction to prevent certification of the candidates of the American party, on an order issued out of the third court of Civil Appeals.

The court announced that it would remain in session recessing from time to time until a decision was handed down in the case. In the meanwhile the certification of the names to go on the Texas official ballot will be held in abeyance.

The order today was issued at the conclusion of the hearing of the application of A. T. Morris, of Bastrop county, for a permanent injunction restraining the names of the American party candidates from position on the ticket.

OLD VETS MARCH THRU STREETS

HOUSTON, Oct. 8.—The soldiers of the Confederacy marched again today.

They were not the countless thousands who tramped buoyantly on the battle fields of more than a half century ago, but there were enough of the boys in gray to make an imposing column.

Despite the gray hair and stooped shoulders the marchers made up in spirit and enthusiasm what was lacking in physical strength. Some were forced to drop out of line, but autos were provided for these and they were permitted to follow the line. The line of march was less than two miles in length and led through a veritable lane of colored bunting. The "stars and stripes" floated from poles and buildings and hung from overhead alongside were the "stars and bars" of the Confederacy. Several bands marched with the old soldiers.

NATIONAL GUARD LEAVE GALVESTON

GALVESTON, Oct. 8.—500 officers and men of the Texas National Guard, who have been maintaining martial law at Galveston for four months, entrained early today for Houston. The troops will participate in the Confederate reunion parade at Houston today, and then return to their respective homes, having been mustered out and released from further duty as the result of the lifting of martial law, which ended in Galveston at noon today under the terms of recent proclamation issued by Governor Hobby.

Boys Find Mysterious Bomb, But It Was a "Bum" Bomb

HUTCHINSON, Kans., Oct. 8.—A bomb plot mystery engaged the attention of local authorities today, following the discovery of a cylinder containing a powerful charge of explosives under the approach of the main street viaduct, in the center of the city.

The absence of threatening letters and the close check recently which indicated the suppression of radical activ-

ities here put the police officials at a loss to understand the presence of the bomb. The bomb was picked up by boys fishing.

HUTCHINSON, Oct. 8.—3:40 p. m.—The Hutchinson "bomb plot mystery" flickered out today when it was determined that the supposed bomb found by boys was merely a discarded piece of fireworks.

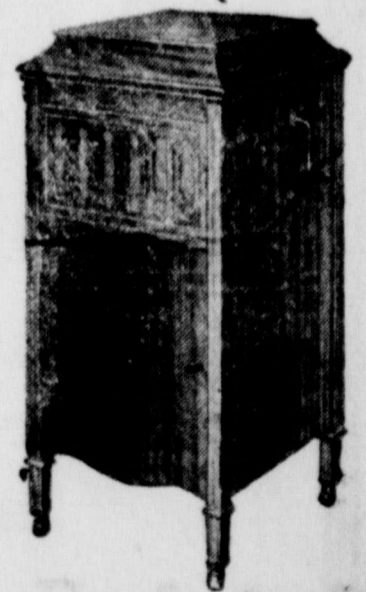

MARKET SQUARE

The effort to establish a market square in Ballinger has caused more or less confusion on account of a lack of co-operation on both buyer and seller.

At the suggestion of a number of farmers and a number of cotton buyers, the Young Men's Business League went to the expense of providing a marketing square.

The proposition does not meet with the unanimous approval of sellers and buyers, and as is always the case in bringing about such changes, the town is getting some knocks.

There is no city law governing the matter, and it is now up to those interested to do as they please. Farmers can sell their cotton wherever they can find a buyer to buy, and a buyer can buy wherever he finds a bale the farmer will sell him.

However, that is not as it should be. Every city should maintain a market square—a place where the farmer can go to sell his produce, and a place where the buyers can go to buy.

The main streets of the town were not intended for sales grounds. No one man has any more right than another to block

the streets with peddler's wagons. The farmer prefers to haul his cotton to some certain place to sell, and will do so, if the buyers will go there to buy.

The matter can not be regulated by mutual consent or agreement. It will require a city ordinance, an ordinance applying to all classes of street peddling, and it is useless to try to invoke the rule until the authorities have the law to back them in the work.

The Young Men's Business League acted on suggestions offered by those interested, and did what it has done in the matter with a view to the convenience of all parties concerned, and that includes the public.

The Y. M. B. L. will not attempt to force any farmer to patronize the market square, and will not expect him to do so, unless the buyers co-operate in the proposition and stay on the square to buy the cotton. The buyer is the only man who can control the situation without a law regulating it otherwise.

CONNIE HUNTS FOR SINNER HUSBAND

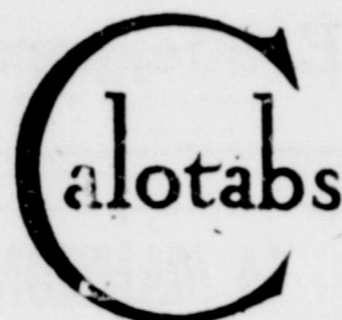
