MEN INDICTED; BOND NOT MADE

In a few hours after complaints had been filed in the justice court charging Syl Roberts, John Hughes, and Walter Alexander with arson, the grand jury returned a joint indictment against the three men, and the court fixed their bonds at \$1,500 each. Up to a late hour Thursday the men had not been able to make bond and were still in jail.

The three men were arrested Wednesday and placed in jail, the sheriff acting on the warrants issued by the court. The writ of indictment was served on them early Thursday morning.

The parties are charged with burning the home of J. T. Billups, near Crews, about midnight last Sunday night, an account of which appeared in The Ledger Tuesday. Roberts declares that he did not leave his home Sunday night, that he was sick all night, while Hughes denies any knowledge of the burning, and says he did not hear about it until late up in the day Monday. Alexander is non-committal.

If the men succeed in making bond the cases against them will probably be continued until the next term of court.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Frank Campione, convicted for implication in the murder of a local saloon keeper, and James Reese, a negro, who confessed to killing his wife with a hatchet, were hanged early this morning. Frank Zagar is under sentence to hang tomorrow for killing two Greeks.

Thirteen men had been sentenced to hang today and tomorrow, but reprieves staying their execution have been granted for all but three by the state board of pardons. Chief of Police Garrity, in discussing the reprieves, condemned the Illinois reviewing board for interfering with the hangings, and said, "The fact that all but three of the thirteen murderers escaped the noose today is an invitation for gunmen to go back to their profession and Chicago will be the scene of more brutal murders."

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Nine men were to be led to the gallows in Cook county jail in the 48 hours of today and tomorrow.

The largest number executed at any one time heretofore was four, who were hanged Nov. 11, 1886, for participation in the Haymarket riots.

Thirteen men were to have been executed Oct. 14 and 15, seven today and six tomorrow, but ten of them have obtained writs of supersedas and appealed to the Supreme court.

The two condemned men to hang today are:

James Henry Reese.—On the night of Dec. 5, 1919, he murdered his wife Mary with a hatchet when she is said to have confessed her love for another man. After dismembering the body, Reese buried it in a lot near his home.

Frank Campione.—convicted of the murder of Andrew P. Bowman, on June 24, 1919, and held by police to be a member of a "murder trust," against which were charged six murders and more than fifty holdups.

Sam Cardinelli, who was called by the police the head of this group of murderers was to have been hanged today, but obtained a writ of supersedas, staying execution.

Antonio, Lopez, Sam Ferrera, and Joe Costanza, sentenced for the murder of Antonio Varchette, who was killed while resisting robbery also were to be hanged today, but secured stays.

On October 15th, these two were set down for execution:

Arthur E. Haensel—former service man, who shot and killed his wife, Cecelia, Feb. 4, 1919, when, on returning from service, he questioned her fidelity.

Frank Zagar.—confessed slayer of two men who resisted when he attempted to rob them. Zagar, who has long waited to hang, expresses a desire to pay the penalty for his crimes.

COTTON CONSUMED DECREASES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Cotton consumed during September amounted to 457,647 running bales of lint and 37,121 bales of linters, the census bureau announced today. Consumption for the same period last year amounted to 491,069 bales of lint and 23,182 bales of linters.

GIN BURNS AT WICHITA

WICHITA FALLS, Oct. 14.—Fire early this morning destroyed the J. B. Jamieson cotton gin here. The loss is estimated at \$21,000.

Fire Chief McClure says there is every evidence that the fire was of incendiary origin, but Jamieson declares that he had received no warning that his gin would be burned.

The officers advised all gin owners to arm their guards and instruct them to fire upon all prowlers.

TEXAS GETS RAIN TODAY

FORT WORTH, Oct. 14.—Rain reports received here this morning indicate that many points in the cattle and grain growing counties, where suffering was imminent and drought threatened, was receiving rain. The reports say that rain began falling this morning. Ft. Worth received showers this morning.

400,000 AUTOS LISTED IN STATE OF TEXAS

With more than three months to go, the total number of motor vehicles registered in Texas for 1920 has now passed the 400,000 mark. About 350,000 of this number are passenger cars, the remaining 50,000 being delivery cars and trucks. About 100,000 transfers of used cars have been recorded. It is estimated that the total number of 1920 registrations will reach 425,000 by the end of the year.

Dallas county leads all counties in the state in the number of cars, having 25,449 in use on Sept. 15.

Auto statistics of other counties, on the same date, were: Brown, 2,120; Coleman, 1,616; Comanche, 2,072; Eastland, 8,212; Mills, 782; McCulloch, 959; Bexar, 18,712; Harris, 20,999; Tarrant, 17,504; Runnels, 1,740.

TWO CAR LOADS PICKERS ARRIVE

One hundred Mexicans, one hundred negroes, and quite a number of white men, arrived here on the noon train Thursday, and lost no time in getting in the cotton fields. The farmers seemed determined to save the cotton notwithstanding the stuff is hard to sell.

Tad Richards brought in about one hundred Mexicans, and loaded them out on trucks and carried them to his farm. The Mexicans were brought direct from old Mexico, being handled thru the federal authorities at Laredo. It was a typical peon class of Mexicans, men, women and children, and the scene around the local Santa Fe station made one feel that he was in the heart of old Mexico.

Mr. Richard, has about fourteen hundred acres of cotton, and some of it will make a bale to the acre.

It is estimated that there are more pickers in the country now than at this time last year, and with favorable weather for two or three weeks the farmers will be in good shape, as some will begin to release their hands, and others can double their forces, to complete the work before winter sweeps down upon this country.

GOVERNMENT REFUSES TO AID IN BOOSTING PRICES

SHOPMEN AT HOUSTON STRIKE

HOUSTON, Oct. 14.—A "vacation" strike of 1500 Southern Pacific shopmen went into effect today as a result of the reinstatement of four negro workers by the road officials.

POOR SUCCESS FOR THE EXTERMINATION LEAGUE
LONDON, Oct. 14.—Terence MacSwiney passed a fairly good night last night, but is reported extremely weak this morning, according to a bulletin issued by the Irish Self Determination League. This is the sixty-third day of starving for the Irish mayor.

CUBA APPEALS FOR MONEY AID

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Cuba has appealed to the United States government for aid to overcome recent financial difficulties. The appeal has been taken under consideration by the officials to determine whether a plan of assistance shall be worked out and the aid given.

4,000 BALES COTTON WEIGHED HERE

Practically 4,000 bales of 1920 cotton has been weighed at the local yard this season, and cotton is rolling in at a lively rate. Cotton is accumulating rapidly during the last few days on account of little selling, and with the old cotton on hand there is about 3,500 bales in the yard and warehouse.

About 3,500 bales have been ginned at the local gins this season, which is only about 500 less than weighed here, and indicates that many farmers are storing their cotton at home.

Buyers report that grades have been falling during the last days, while up to this time most of the cotton has classed out well and brought the top price. Cotton was selling on the streets Thursday morning at around 20 cents, but very little sold.

WOULD IGNORE PEOPLE'S VOTE

VANWERT, Ohio, Oct. 14.—A new line of attack on President Taft's position on the League of Nations was made here today by Governor Cox in opening a three day's campaign in his home state.

Referring to Taft's statement "that in the event Cox is elected there would remain enough Republicans to defeat the treaty," Mr. Cox stated that this indicated that a plan to disregard the decision on the "League Referendum," and it shows the purpose of a brazen conspiracy of the Senate to treat the mandate of the people with contempt and turn their backs on the expressed will of the electorate.

W. H. Harrison is here from San Marcos, looking after property interests. Mr. Harrison owns the Katy building on Eighth street. He says Ballinger is doing the right thing in promoting a municipal light plant, and he trusts the citizens will see the plant installed.

FALL OF PEKING FALSE REPORT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—The rumors from Shanghai to the effect that the Peking government had been overthrown in China will be disposed of officials here believe as the result of the receipt of a message at the White House today from President Han Chang, of the Chinese republic.

The message dated at Peking yesterday, came in reply to a message of congratulation recently sent by President Wilson on the occasion of the Chinese national anniversary, and is believed to have been sent from Peking after the rumor was put out that the government was overthrown. Officials are inclined to place no confidence in yesterday's rumor.

THORP MADE DIRECTOR FIRST NATIONAL BANK

At a directors' meeting of the First National Bank held Wednesday, A. J. Thorp was elected director and made one of the vice presidents of the bank. Mr. Thorp has been with the bank for several years, and the adding of his name to the board of directors brings to him a deserved promotion.

CONVICTED FOR KILLING PUBLISHER

GALLATIN, Mo., Oct. 14.—Hugh Y. Tarwater was today found guilty by a jury on charge of second degree murder in connection with the death of Wesley Robertson, a veteran newspaper publisher, on Dec. 22, 1919, and sentenced to thirty years in the penitentiary.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Secretary Houston today reiterated to representatives of the agricultural interests who are in session here trying to work out some plan for holding the prices of commodities up, that the treasury department would not be a party to withholding any commodity off the market in order to maintain artificially high prices.

The spokesman for the delegation made a frank criticism of Mr. Houston's recent statement that prices had begun to recede, but the secretary promptly and frankly told them that his statements properly represented the true conditions and that all prices are sure to show a marked decline.

ASST. SECRETARY OF TREASURY RESIGNS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Joulett Shouse, assistant secretary of the treasury, resigned, and his resignation has been accepted by President Wilson, effective November 15th. Mr. Shouse wrote Mr. Wilson on Oct. 7th that he desired to quit his post of duty in order to adjust his personal affairs.

Y. M. B. L. HAS 22 NEGRO PICKERS FOR DISPOSAL

The Y. M. B. L. has 22 negro cotton pickers at its disposal in Navasota. The manager of the crew will bring them to Ballinger if some farmer will furnish tickets, and will assure them of wood, water and shelter after they arrive. He wants \$2.00 per hundred and \$3.75 per bale bonus for handling the men and the cotton.

POLL RECEIPTS BEING ISSUED

Tax Collector Chastain has his poll tax books open and is ready to issue a 1919 poll tax receipt to any of those, either men or women, who wish to qualify for voting in the November election.

Mr. Chastain received instructions from the Comptroller to comply with the law just passed by the special session of the legislature extending the time to October 22nd in order that there might be no discrimination between men and women voters, as provided against in the suffrage amendment, and this places all on an equal footing. Any one can now qualify for voting in the general election, and those who have not paid their poll taxes have until Oct. 22nd to do so.

Instructions sent out to tax collectors, briefly, is as follows:

"All persons not having paid a poll tax prior to the first of February, 1920, and who may now apply to you at any time from the 6th to the 22nd of the present month, for the purpose of paying a poll tax under the new law just enacted, should be given a 1919 poll tax receipt the same as you gave those paying prior to the first of February, 1920.

"The enactment of the law is merely an extension of the time until the 22nd of October, in which either men or women can pay their 1919 poll tax, and have the privilege of voting at the November election or any election prior to February 1, 1921.

"As the tax collector begins collecting the 1920 tax, the first of October, it will be possible and also legal for a person to pay two poll taxes from the 6th to the 22nd of October; one for 1919, and one for 1920."

The extension of time for payment of poll taxes applies only for the present year. Men and women will all be on an equal footing next year and all poll tax receipts which entitles the holder to voting must be issued before Feb. 1st. Whether men and women pay their poll tax or not, it will remain an obligation against them, and is a just debt due the state.
