SAYS IRRIGATION DAM IS FEASIBLE

(Special to The Ledger)

AUSTIN, Jan. 19.—Following their attendance on the State Irrigation Conference in Austin, the representatives of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association appeared before the Board of Water Engineers Tuesday morning. The delegation, which consisted of S. L. Williams, of Ballinger, secretary of the Association; Robert Knerim of Bronte; Judge E. J. Stockton, of Robert Lee; Sam Sawyer, of Tennyson; and Mr. Hill of San Angelo, was accompanied by L. M. Hewitt, of Navasota; an irrigation expert; and Dean J. C. Nagle of the engineering department of A. & M. College.

After hearing the claims of the delegation, the Board expressed itself as being interested in the possibilities of the project, and would at an early date, make a special trip to that section to determine whether or not a survey would be made of the proposed reservoir and irrigation district.

Dean Nagle, who was a member of the Board of Water Engineers at the time Capt. Stanley made his survey of the Colorado river project, stated to the Water Engineers that the project was considered entirely feasible, and one in which they could well afford to interest themselves.

Herbert Fisher, an engineer on the Stanley survey, now lives in Austin, and will accompany Secretary Williams before the Board of Water Engineers for another conference today in which it is expected to entirely convince the Board of the intrinsic worth of the scheme.

RECEIVES \$476.86 FROM 120 HENS

R. M. Davis was in the city from the Crews country Wednesday, and stopped long enough to say a good word for the poultry crop in this county. "It's my wife's business," said Mr. Davis, but she gave me these figures and I know they are correct," and as he talked he handed a Ledger reporter a little slip of paper containing a summary of the chicken crop on the Davis farm. The statement said:

Eggs, 1058 dozen . \$355.36
Chickens sold . . . \$121.50

Total . . . \$476.86
and all the eggs and chickens to eat that we wanted."

Mr. Davis stated that they began the year with 120 hens, and that the above represented the income from their chicken crop for last year, and that they began this year with a nice bunch of young hens and with prospects of doing even better than last year.

At the prevailing price of cotton the above sum amounts to more than a dozen bales of cotton, and there was no cotton chopping to do, no picking to worry about, and no bad cotton on hand. A little work to look after the chickens and feed them and a little work to raise chicken feed.

Eggs today are bringing fifty cents per dozen and most any kind of an old domineer will bring one dollar at the prevailing market price.

It will be observed by the above figures that Mr. Davis received almost 34 cents per dozen for the eggs.

SEEKING ADJUST COTTON RATES

GALVESTON, Jan. 19.—Taking of testimony began here today before Special Examiner Hunter of the Interstate Commerce Commission, on the complaint of Galveston and Houston interests in which the freight rates on cotton from Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma to Galveston, Texas City and Houston are attacked. The complaint contends that existing freight rates on cotton from certain points in the three states named to Texas ports are unjustly discriminatory as compared with the rates from the same points to New Orleans.

WIDOW WINS SUIT AGAINST LIGHT CO.

Mrs. Hattie Anderson will get \$15,000 from the San Angelo Water, Light & Power Co., as damages for the death of her husband, Charles W. Anderson, October 26, 1919. This was the verdict of the jury which reported at 9:00 o'clock Sunday morning after deliberating over sixteen hours.

Anderson was accidentally electrocuted when attempting to turn on an arc light near the Orient depot in 1919. The suit brought by Mrs. Anderson was for \$25,000 claimed as the amount of which the widow was deprived as the result of her husband's death. The case occupied the entire week of the district court, going to the jury about 4:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

The jury was instructed by Judge Dubois of the district court on the vital points to consider in making the decision. Among the points considered were: whether or not Mr. Anderson was fulfilling a duty in pulling on the arc light; whether he was guilty of contributory negligence in pulling on the light which caused his death and whether the light company was disobeying city ordinance in leaving the dangerous wire exposed.—San Angelo Standard.

Mrs. Anderson formerly lived in Ballinger, her husband being a brother-in-law of W. E. Brooks. They lived in the Western part of the city, and while living here a baby was born to them. It was after they moved to San Angelo that Mr. Anderson lost his life by coming in contact with an electric wire.

WILL TAKE BOY TO STATE REFORMATORY

An officer will leave today or tomorrow with Leonard Russell, the twelve year old boy who was recently sentenced to the reformatory for forgery, and who was released on parole. The party who made application for the boy and who has been keeping him since his trial a week or ten days ago, turned him back to the court and he must remain in the state reformatory until he is 21 years old, unless he gains his pardon by good conduct.

NEGRO MURDERER COUPLE KILLED FOUND IN TEXAS AT GALVESTON

WILSON, Ark., Jan. 19.—Henry Lowry, negro, charged with killing O. T. Craig, an Arkansas planter, and the latter's daughter, Mrs. C. O. Williamson, who the negro shot to death on the Craig plantation near here Christmas, has been captured at El Paso, according to information received here today.

No time will be lost in returning the negro here for trial.

FIRE FIENDS DO MUCH DAMAGE

WORCESTER, Mass., Jan. 19.—Fire early today destroyed the Knowles building and spread to nineteen other places within a radius of a mile, causing a loss which is estimated to be more than two and a quarter million dollars.

The Knowles building is in the heart of the city and the fire spread across the street to a group of three story buildings and gained such headway that Boston and other nearby cities were called on to help fight the flames.

Reports of incendiarism are rife and it is believed that fires originated at other places instead of spreading from the Knowles building.

TOO MUCH NOISE FOR READING ROOM

The Carnegie Library is proving the most popular place in the city, and the patronage is much better than even the most optimistic workers had hoped for, but some seem to have the idea that it is a "hurrah house" instead of a library.

"We like to have the crowds," said a member of the Library Board, "and we are delighted to know that so many people enjoy their idle hours at the library, but we must put a ban on noise."

The complaint has been made that those who take part in games forget themselves and in their enthusiasm become a little boisterous and with their loud talking and laughing disturb others, who drop in to read.

The paramount purpose of the library is to serve the people with good reading matter, and the games are made strictly secondary, and if the noise makers do not desist at once, the Library Board will be forced to take the domino tables out.

When the complaint reached the writer the first question he asked was "is it the boys?" "No," said a member of the board, "it is the boys, the girls, and others, and the noise is making it unpleasant for those who come to read."

Many are making the library a "hang out" place, and that is all right. No one will object to how much or how long you spend at the library. It is as much your library as it is anybody's library, but there are certain rules which must be obeyed, or you will be deprived of what is yours now. Remember this and do not let your enthusiasm disturb others, and then it will not be necessary for the Library Board to hang out a sign which might say "keep quiet or keep out."

SEAPLANE SUNK BY GUN FIRE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—The naval seaplane N. C-5, which was forced down and wrecked while taking part in a flight of a group of naval seaplanes from San Diego to Balboa, Panama Canal Zone, has been sunk by gun fire, according to a report received at the naval radio station here. No explanation has been given as to why the seaplane was sunk.

SAYS CITY WILL GET LIGHT PLANT

Mayor Guin returned home Tuesday at noon from Austin, where he went on a double mission, to attend the irrigation conference and to look after business in connection with the building of a municipal light plant.

When called on for a report, Mr. Guin said "we have nothing to give out, further than to say that the plant will be built." He intimated that he met with success and returned home perfectly satisfied.

Mr. Guin stated that the committee in charge of the irrigation project was given every encouragement possible, but very little can be accomplished towards carrying out the plan of building the big dam until some irrigation legislation is put over. The law makers are said to be favorable to this legislation and irrigation measures are pending which will aid the Colorado valley proposition. The committee from this section met with both State and Federal irrigation authorities.

Mayor Guin said that a large committee was in Austin lobbying for the West Texas A. & M. and West Texas was going after her share of development.

COURT RESTRAINS CABLE LAYING

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Federal Judge A. N. Hand, today issued a temporary injunction, returnable next Friday, restraining the Western Union Telegraph Co. from landing the British-Brazil-Barbadoes cable at Miami, Florida.

The injunction also restrains the company from using three cables between Key West and Havana in connection with messages between the United States and Brazil, and from splicing the line from Barbadoes to Cuba.

ASKED TO MOVE HORNSBY CASE

When District Court convened Wednesday morning at Brownwood to again take up the Hornsby case, and try George Hornsby alias George Scott, for the murder of J. N. Weatherby, counsel for defense filed a motion asking that the case be transferred to some other court in the district. The motion for a change in venue was based upon the theory that sentiment in Brown county was so bitter against Hornsby that he could not be given a fair trial. The court's ruling in the matter had not been learned here up to a late hour Wednesday, but it is expected that the motion will be overruled and the case will go to trial at Brownwood, as the court had indicated a desire to give the defendant a speedy and fair trial.

MOTHER KILLS HER CHILDREN

WINCHESTER, Va., Jan. 19.—Mrs. Mary Glenn Hicks, wife of Stanley Hicks, shot and killed three of her four children at her home near here early this morning and then killed herself. The mother is believed to have been mentally deranged due to a recent attack of influenza.

The dead children are Walter, age 7; Margaret, age 5; and Stewart, age 3. The mother used a shot gun, and the position in which the bodies of the children were found indicated that they had sought to defend and shield themselves.

The father and husband, and the eldest daughter were asleep up stairs and only awoke when Mrs. Hicks turned the weapon on herself, and reached the children too late to save them.

HOUSE KILLS INCREASE BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The House of Representatives voted today against increasing the membership of the House. The membership now numbers 435, and the re-apportionment bill provided for 483.

The Legislature sets aside a healthy appropriation for an advertising account for the State University. The amount is paid out in sending a daily "news" budget to the papers of Texas. The Ledger receives from one to three budgets of this mail daily, and as a news feature it is worthless. It seldom stops on our desk, but goes to the waste basket.

The papers of Texas seldom use any of the free advertising sent out, and the appropriation made for advertising is therefore a dead loss to the State University. The publicity man gets his salary, and the post office gets its share of the money for postage. One half of the amount spent in legitimate advertising would be worth something to the University, but under the present system it is wasted.

Those in charge of the expenditure of this fund are pulling quite a "bone head" trick, if they think they can ride the papers free. The great state of Texas is able to advertise her institution of learning in a legitimate way instead of trying to ride the press.

Parties owning chickens near the court house should arrange to keep their poultry off the park, or suffer the consequences.

WILL NEED POLL TAX; THIS ELECTION YEAR
