ARBUCKLE JURY FAILS TO AGREE

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—The jury in the Roscoe Ar buckle case was discharged today after it had been assured the court that the twelve could not possibly reach an agreement on the verdict. This is the second mistrial of the case growing out of the charges against Ar buckle for the death of Miss Virginia Rappe.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—The fate of Roscoe ("Fatty") Ar buckle early today is still in the hands of the jury. The jury retired at nine-thirty o'clock last night and resumed deliberations this morning after breakfast. The case went to the jury at three-thirty o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The chances are said to be favorable for a hung jury.

22 BODIES IN DEAD LIST FROM MINE EXPLOSION

GATES, Penna., Feb. 3.—According to official account twenty-five people lost their lives in the explosion at the Frick Coal Company's mine near Gates. Twenty-two have been recovered, and three can not be reached, and may remain buried in the mine.

GATES, Penna., Feb. 3.—Six more dead were brought to the surface from the blown-in shaft of the Frick Coal Company's mine near here early today, bringing the total number of bodies recovered up to 22. Belief is expressed by some of the mine officials that the toll may mount higher as there may be other miners dead besides the three or four men who remain unaccounted for and who are believed to have been killed by the explosion yesterday.

DEBT BILL NOW UP TO HARDING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The Senate amendments to the allied debt funding bill were accepted today in the House. The measure now goes to the president, who it is expected will soon appoint a commission to open negotiations with the nations which are in debt to the United States.

CIGARETTE STUBS CLUE TO MURDER

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 3.—A half dozen cigarette stubs found near the back door of William Desmond Taylor's luxuriously appointed residence, furnished the only clue today to the mystery of the man's death, and the enigma momentarily grows deeper after twenty-four hours since the discovery of the body of Taylor, until it pales the fictitious mysteries Taylor directed in motion pictures.

The cigarette stubs gave a dark scene of the man nervously waiting in the shadows for a chance to strike at the noted moving picture director as he returned to his home. Taylor was shot down while writing at his desk, the assassin firing the fatal shot about ten o'clock.

LAST CALL FOR ARMS MEETING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The big five arms conference in meeting today for the last time, whipped into shape the treaties with China, and issued a call to mark the final wind-up of the Washington negotiations.

Says High School Students Corrupt Dance Hall Morals

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—Dance hall managers here do not want high school students as customers because the morals of the pupils are so low that their presence in the dance halls has a bad effect on the old dancers, according to Miss Jennie Binford, investigator for the Juvenile Protective Association. Miss Binford made this startling statement today in an address before the Women's Club of Chicago.

SHOW COSTS ON SHIPPING CABBAGE

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Feb. 3.—Because many cabbage shippers are unable to understand why it is that when cabbage is quoted at from \$45 to \$50 a ton at Kansas City or St. Louis, valley growers receive only from \$17 to \$19 a ton, the Rio Grande Valley Traffic Association has arranged a table showing the various costs that enter into shipments before they reach the distributor in northern markets. The table indicates that freight and refrigeration charges are considerable items.

CAUGHT WITH GOODS BUT IS ACQUITTED

J. P. Waldon, of Novice, was tried at Coleman this week on a burglary charge, and acquitted. The Novice Mercantile Co., after missing several articles out of the store suspected that it was being robbed, and employed a man to guard the store. The guard went in the front door and looked it behind him, and the rear doors were supposed to have been locked with a pad lock. Later in the night the watchman heard someone come in the store, and throwing his flashlight on the intruder, and with revolver in hand he arrested Waldon.

Waldon plead that he found the door open, and seeing a light in the store thought the proprietor was in the store and walked in. Goods missing from the store were later found at Waldon's home and identified, and he will be tried again on a burglary charge growing out of this find.

WILL OPEN SUBURBAN GROCERY STORE

J. C. (Bud) Cline is building a house on Hutchings Avenue, near the Colorado river bridge, and will open a suburban grocery store as soon as the building is completed. Mr. Cline has been with E. A. Jeanes & Co. for several years, going out a few days ago when the force decided to reduce its payroll. He will carry a general line of groceries, and expects to catch trade going and coming from town.

MAKES ATTEMPT TO MOVE PLANTS TO GERMANY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The apparent attempts to arrange for the bodily transfer of various American industries to Germany was disclosed today in correspondence between Secretary of Labor Davis and E. M. Waring, of the American Electric Cutting Company of New York city. Secretary Davis condemned the efforts to move the properties as "despicable and pernicious activity," and complimented Waring for his patriotic refusal to participate.

AUSTIN, Feb. 3.—Martial law is now in force in all of Freestone county. The order took effect at five o'clock this morning.

Governor Neff issued the proclamation yesterday afternoon but it was not made public until ten-thirty this morning, because the authorities wanted the order to take effect before it became generally known.

This proclamation does not affect martial law now in force in parts of Freestone and Limestone counties which took effect on Jan. 11th.

SAYS PASSENGER RATES TOO HIGH

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Passenger fares charged by the railroads at present are economically too high to be sustained, Clyde M. Reed, chairman of the Kansas Utilities Commission, testified today before the Interstate Commerce Commission which is investigating transportation charges.

Reed declared that the railroads should fix a general passenger rate of three cents per mile, abolishing the Pullman surcharge. Passenger travel per car mile decreased twenty per cent under the new rates.

Such is the case at London, Ont., where several such pets are annual contributors to the city's coffers.

Horseshoe Myth Universal.

The horseshoe in its most primitive form is of great antiquity. An old and very popular superstition, almost universally prevalent among peasantry ascribes to the horseshoe (especially to one which has been found in the road by chance) the power of barring the passage of witches. For this purpose the shoe is nailed to the door of the threshold, and none in his "Year Book," says, "Nailing of horseshoes seems to have been practiced as well to keep witches in as to keep them out."

Meridian of Greenwich.

The meridian of Greenwich is generally accepted as the starting line from which to reckon longitude and time all over the earth. But objections are from time to time raised against the universal adoption of the Greenwich meridian for such purposes. Recently Italian savants have emphasized these objections by pointing out that on the meridian of Greenwich clouds and bad weather are frequent, interfering with astronomical observations. They suggest that the civilized world should agree to adopt the meridian of Jerusalem as a common reference line, because there the skies are clearer, and the possibility of making Palestine neutral territory would eliminate political objections.

WILL PUT DEVIL ON THE RUN

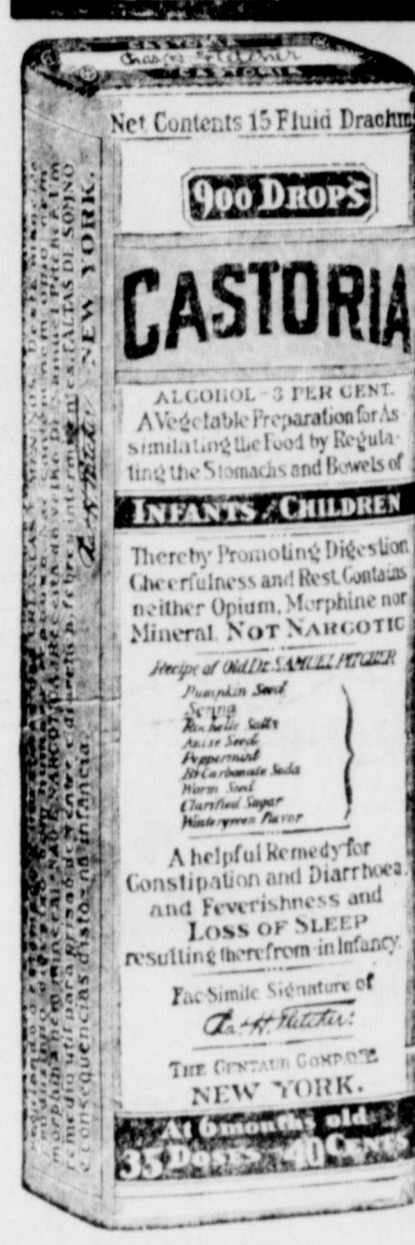

**KU KLUX GIVE
MAN TAR BATH**

Seemingly proving that it works where the law fails, the Ku Klux Klan waited on George E. Bass, a Sweetwater citizen, at Plainview, Wednesday, according to a story coming from that city. After having been severely beaten by a squad of about fourteen men, the story says, Bass was put off a large auto on one of the main corners in the business district of Plainview about eight o'clock Tuesday night. Fastened upon his back was a placard with the statement "Work of the Ku Klux Klan" written on it. After exhibiting the sign in a drug store, as he said that he had been ordered to do, Bass disappeared and has not been seen since.

Bass was captured at Floydada, according to information from reliable sources after he had fled from Plainview following his acquittal on a charge of criminally assaulting a fourteen-year old girl at Plainview about two weeks ago.

R. C. Joiner, district judge, ordered the jury in the case to render a verdict of acquittal after the complaining witness in the case had reversed her testimony given the previous week before the grand jury. In instructing the jury to return a verdict of not guilty, Judge Joiner stated that he made the decision not because he believed Bass was not guilty but because it was thought that it would be impossible to prove him guilty after the complaining witness for the state refused to tell the same story of the alleged attack.

W. K. Johnson, chief of police of Sweetwater, who was in Plainview for the trial, declared that Bass would receive little sympathy in towns where he is known for his treatment at the hands of the alleged Ku Klux Klan.

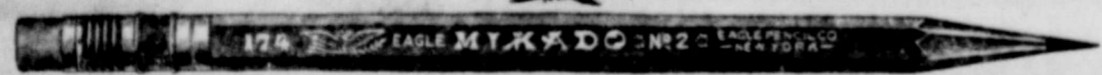
