## COUNTRY PEOPLE TO HELP LIBRARY

1455 books were issued to the reading public during the month of March, according to the monthly report of Miss Edell Belle Walker, made public late Friday. Quite a number of these books went to people living in the rural districts, according to Miss Walker. The country people residing near Ballinger are taking advantage of the library, and are anxious to see the work maintained, and have volunteered to help in financing the work.

Miss Walker reports that patronage is increasing, each succeeding month showing a greater number of books called for, and with the addition of new books called for, and with the addition of new books from time to time, this interest will continue to increase.

The librarian reports that an order for new books has been placed, or that new books will be added about the middle of this month. The work of the library was guaranteed last fall, when a committee got out and raised funds by private subscription to keep the library open for a period of six months. It was opened on January first, and the finances will become exhausted at the end of the six months, unless some plan is worked out for continuing the arrangements.

By all means the library should not be allowed to close again.

## West Texas Leagues are Coming Here Next Week

After meeting the Ballinger Bear Cats in Fort Concho Park at San Angelo next Wednesday, the San Angelo Bronchos will come here for a game with the Bear Cats in Nicholusk Park Thursday.

The Abilene Eagles will meet the Bear Cats here Friday and Saturday. This will give the locals three games on the home lot with the West Texas Leagues next week.

The Abilene and San Angelo clubs are both in the West Texas League and have their men mobilized for a two weeks' training before the West Texas League season opens on April 15th. The games with the locals will give them some good training.

Ballinger is bidding for a place in the West Texas League next year, and will probably get in by buying a franchise now held by one of the towns in the league, or by increasing the circuit. ## BRITISH COAL STRIKE SERIOUS

LONDON, April 2.—Six British coal mines which were left to the mercy of inrushing waters by striking miners pump men have been flooded. Some of the mines are said to be in such condition that they may be permanently wrecked. Scores of appeals have reached the government asking that sailors be sent to help fight against the flood waters which are pouring into the shafts.

## Negro at Dallas Branded K. K. K. After Flogging

## EMPEROR CHARLES LOSES OUT

VIENNA, April 2.—Newspapers here appear to be certain that the episode resulting from the attempt of former Emperor Charles to regain the Hungarian throne has ended. Newspapers published today the details of the manner in which Charles will be taken across the border to Switzerland, and exiled from the country.

Reports from Hungary, however, failed to show that matters had reached the final stage of adjustment. It has been learned that arrangements have been completed for Charles to return to Switzerland escorted by British, French and Italian army officers in command of a picked force of gendarmes.

BERNE, Switzerland, April 2.—The Federal council today decided to grant the request of the Hungarian government for permission to be given former Emperor Charles to return to Switzerland provided that he abstain from scattering political propaganda.

## BIG FIRE MAKES 15,000 HOMELESS

MANILA, P. I., April 2.—Fifteen thousand persons are homeless here today after a fire last night which was the most destructive in twenty years. Three thousand houses in the Northern section of the city were burned, and the occupants were left homeless and helpless in many instances.

So far only two bodies have been found in the ruins.

## AMERICAN LEGION MEETING TOMORROW

The matter of club rooms for the Legion will also be decided at this meeting.

The post will also vote on the proposition of turning over the Memorial Hospital to the state, the Attorney General having decided that it will be necessary to have the vote of all of the posts of the state before the State government can take title to the property.

## MEXICANS WILL MEET IN TEXAS

LAREDO, Tex., April 2.—All Mexican consuls in Texas have been instructed by the Mexican government to meet in San Antonio on April 9th, to consider matters affecting the Mexicans in this state. Consul General Saracho announced here today that the Mexican labor situation is probably the cause of the chief discussion.

DALLAS, April 2.—A party of masked men late last night took Alex Johnson, a negro bell boy at a local hotel, to a lonely spot six miles South of here, where they flogged him until he bled freely, and then branded with acid the letters "K. K. K." on his forehead.

Johnson was brought back to Dallas in an automobile and thrown out in front of the hotel where he had been employed. Police made an investigation and learned that the masked men had accused the negro of associating with certain white women.

Six automobiles drove to the home of the negro, where a number of masked men forcibly placed the negro in one of the cars where he was tied. With lights out and the negro pleading for his life, the party drove to a spot on the Hutchings road, where the negro was tied to a fence post and after his clothing had been stripped to his waist, he was given twenty-five lashes. Several of the masked men used the whip in turn while the negro shrieked with pain and promised never to "do such a thing again as long as I live."

After the whipping had been accomplished the negro lagged limply against the fence while members of the party produced the acid and branded the negro's forehead.

The whipping party is said to have been composed of well dressed white men, who it is believed, learned that charges had been filed in the county court last week against Johnson. The police said that the charges were filed against the negro after he was discovered in a room with a white woman who was a guest at the hotel.

## GOV. NEFF KILLS W. TEXAS A. & M.

The towns in West Texas which were making plans to get in the contest for the new A. & M. College, can now call off and devote their energies to some other line of work. Gov. Neff vetoed the bill creating the new college.

Other bills which were given the death blow at the last minute included the \$4,000,000 rural school appropriation. Neff stated that the state has not at this time sufficient funds to meet the appropriation for rural aid already made by the legislature, was his reason for vetoing the bill.

The governor signed the University land bill, and the anti-Japanese land ownership bill.

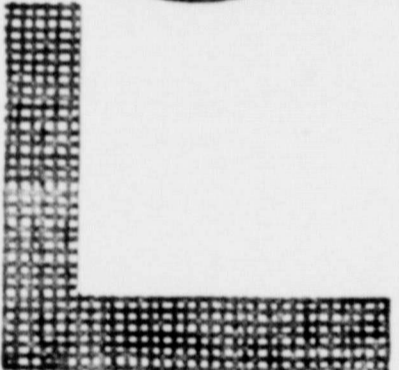

 "Broken Blossoms" is the most tragic, the most beautiful thing that has ever reached the screen. It is a drama of wistfulness, of ungracious satire, of love and of furious reality. It is reversing the old order which showed the yellow man in a heaven state of revulsion and the white man filled in contrast with brotherly love.

"Broken Blossoms" is tremendous in its cruelty, yet thru it all runs a thread of beauty which binds the yellow man into a fabric of the plot.  
 "He comes from a land filled with a mystic race who worship their gods in a mystic way. But whatever the fruits of the religion its principle is goodness. And the yellow man comes to the home of his white brother with youth's enthusiasm to spread that goodness. The author selected the Limehouse lights district of London in which to have him loose his illusions.

"There cruelty" stalked rampant and was epitomized in the person of Battling Burroughs, a prize fighter. Wistfulness, pity, horror, and agony is woven into a marvelous pattern by Lillian Gish as a waif child, daughter of Battling Burroughs.

"The thing which could have been so malodorous less delicately handled, forms the crux of the story; the love of the yellow man for the sad-eyed, bruised little girl, the Broken Blossom of the tale.

"Those who have accused Mr. Griffith of relying for his greatest climaxes on crowds and mob excitement have their arguments flung in their teeth here. There are but three characters of importance in 'Broken Blossoms', and the scant others seen are nothing less than background."
