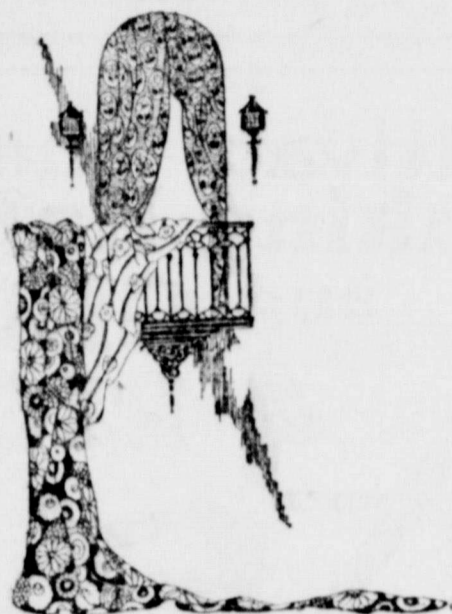

RECOVER GOODS; NEGROES IN JAIL NO SOLUTION OF BRITISH STRIKE BABY DROWNS IN GOOD FORECAST

A clever catch was put over and a portion of the goods stolen from the Weinberg & Wardlaw tailor shop recovered Thursday morning by the officers, aided by the Santa Fe ticket agent, and three negroes are in jail charged with robbery and with receiving stolen goods.

The Weinberg & Wardlaw tailor shop was burglarized Monday night. The burglar opened a rear window and several hundred dollars worth of goods were missing when the place was opened for business Tuesday morning. Circumstances pointed to the guilt of Andrew Leaks, a negro who was employed in the Hughes cafe next door to the tailor shop. The negro was arrested and placed in jail, a thorough grilling failing to wring a confession from the negro.

Suspecting that an effort would be made to take the goods out of town, the officers put the ticket agent at the Santa Fe on notice, and requested them to report if any negroes attempted to leave with trunks or grips. A negro known as "Apron String" and his wife appeared at the station for the early morning train Thursday morning, and asked that a trunk be checked to Temple. Instead of checking the trunk the ticket agent got in touch with the officers and the officers appeared at the station just in time to pull "Apron Strings" and his wife off the train and take charge of the trunk, which contained most of the goods.

The officers arrived on the scene just as the train was ready to depart carrying the negroes with the stolen goods. The trunk containing six suits, 1 pair of trousers, 1 dress, 2 skirts, and 2 caps, valued at \$329.50, and more than \$100 worth of goods, including silk shirts, is still missing.

"Apron String" made a confession and admitted that he was in on the steal, but claimed that Leaks, the negro who was being held in jail, was the "master mind" in the robbery.

The officers are still working on the case and before this is in print it is expected that all the goods will be recovered, and the negroes will be held for the next term of court to send to the pen.

LONDON, April 7.—The National union of railway men today unanimously decided to support the coal miners' strike.

LONDON, April 7.—The leaders of the coal miners union who conferred with Prime Minister Lloyd George today, refused to order the pump men, engineers and miners affected by the coal strike to resume work pending negotiations with the mine owners, and the miners and employers will not meet today as a result of this refusal.

The leaders of the transport workers' federation, which had already decided to support the miners in their strike, met today, but adjourned until four o'clock in the afternoon in order to learn the result of the conference of the miners with the prime minister before deciding what form of support they will take.

The railway men's union also awaited the result of the conference before taking any action on the strike situation and in support of the miners.

An official statement issued by the miners' representatives said: "negotiations broken down."

BUSINESS TOLD MUST OBEY LAW

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Attorney General Daugherty today sounded a general warning to business throughout the country that the department of justice will countenance no violations of law. The attorney general announced that an investigation of the illegal practices of the building material trades will be undertaken immediately throughout the country where there is a complaint of illegal practices.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The department of agriculture today forecasted the winter wheat crop at 621,000,000 bushels, basing the estimate on the condition of the crop on April 1st, which was 91 per cent normal. This report also is based on an increase of 3.1 per cent in point of condition from December 1st last year to April 1st this year, and as compared with an average decline of 4.8 per cent for those dates for the last ten years.

The production forecast is also based on the average planted last fall with the assumption of the average abandonment and the average influences on crop harvest.

The winter wheat condition in the principal wheat growing states was given for Missouri 93 per cent; Nebraska 93; Kansas 88; Texas 88; Ohio 70; Indiana 89; Illinois 96; Michigan 90; and Washington 100.

A party of about sixteen, traveling in autos, left Ballinger this week for old Mexico. C. S. Miller, Mike Boyd, J. H. Wilke and G. G. Carlisle are among those in the party. They were due to cross the Rio Grande Thursday, and will spend several days prospecting in the Mexican republic.

ROAD IS FORBIDDEN TO CUT WAGES

CHICAGO, April 7.—The Railroad Labor Board today denied permission for making a provisional revision of the wages of unskilled labor on the New York Central railroad. This railroad recently requested permission to cut the wages of unskilled labor from 17 to 31 per cent, effective April first. A dispute followed and was taken to the labor board after the railroad and employees held a conference at which they could not agree.

The dispute which has resulted between unskilled labor and the road over permanent reduction of wages will be heard on April 18th in connection with similar disputes between labor and other roads.

RUSSIAN TYRANNY IS WORST IN WORLD, SAYS

REVAL, Estonia, April 7.—Dr. Morris Zeucker, known here as a leader and organizer of the communist party in the United States, whose home is Brooklyn, N. Y., on arrival here today from Moscow, after five months in Russia, said that the decaying civilization of the soviet of Russia is the worst sort of tyranny in the world, and that conditions are steadily becoming worse.

What little foreign trade Russia is able to obtain is of no help to the people who everywhere are victims of tyranny, and are going about in a hopeless attitude because of the great constant red terror.

FILES APPEAL IN NEFF LIBEL CASE

AUSTIN, April 7.—Fisher Alsup, who was convicted of criminal libel in the county court of McLenna county in connection with statements affecting the reputation of Pat Neff, governor, filed an appeal in the Criminal Court of Appeals here today.

RAT POISON KILLS TWO AT COLEMAN

COLEMAN, Tex., April 7.—Gladys May Jenkins, six years old daughter of W. B. Jenkins, and Emalee Ada Spaulding, six year old daughter of Mrs. J. O. Spaulding, visiting in the home of W. B. Jenkins, are dead and the three year old daughter of Mr. Jenkins is not expected to live from the effect of rat poison found in the yard and eaten by the children yesterday afternoon.

The children will be buried here this afternoon.

REVENUE PLAN NEARLY READY

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Suggestions for means of raising the four billions of dollars revenue necessary to conduct the national government for the next fiscal year will be sent to Congress early next week, Secretary Mellon said today. Discussion of sources which may be tapped by the new tax problem will be concluded probably by Saturday. It was stated that thus far a definite decision had been reached only on one question, and that is for the repeal of the excess profits tax.

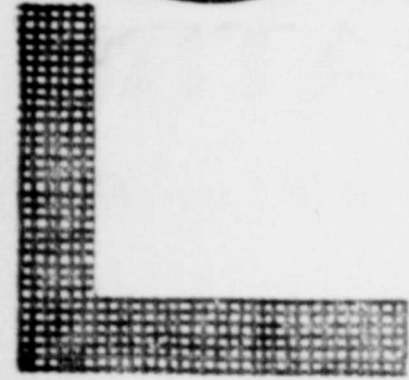

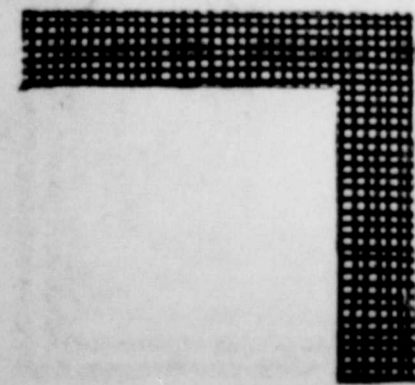

10 INNING BATTLE IN SAN ANGELO

It was announced shortly after noon today that the game for the day with the Bronchos had been called off on account of rain, and engagements made for two games with the Bronchos next week. The Bear Cats will go to San Angelo Monday, and the Bronchos will return here for a game Tuesday.

Bunger hurled the apple for the Bear Cats, and his work was very satisfactory, holding the West Texas Leaguers down to three hits.

It must be remembered that the Bronchos are league players, and are only using the Bear Cats for practice work pending the opening of the West Texas League season.

The Bronchos were due here this afternoon for a game in Nicholas Park, and the Abilene Eagles are due here Friday and

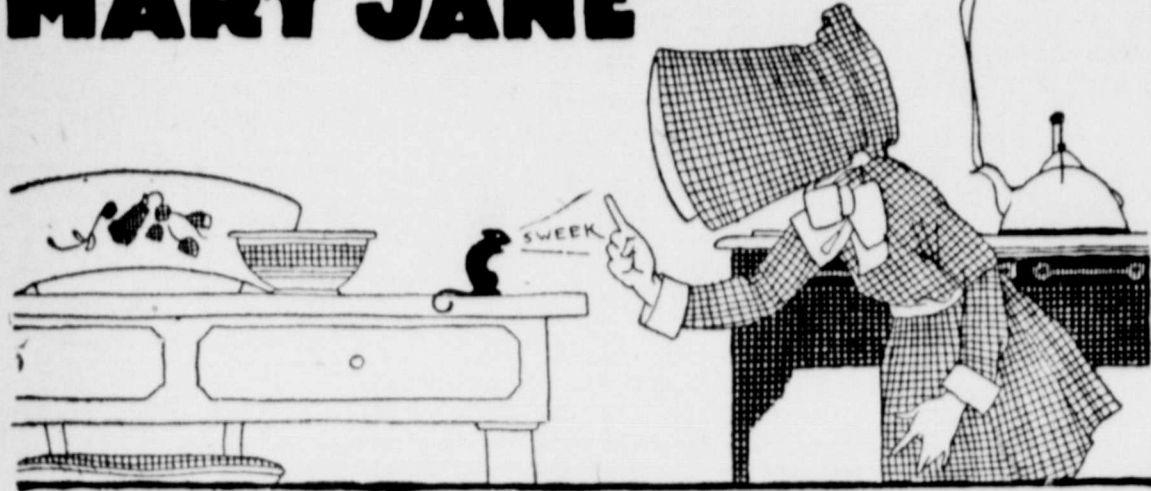

J. PATTERSON DIES IN OHIO

J. White Patterson received a message Thursday announcing the death of his brother Tom. The message came from a doctor in a hospital at Ironton, Ohio, and asked that directions for funeral arrangements be wired.

The message was dated 11:20 a. m., and the noon train one hour later brought a letter from the hospital to Mr. Patterson informing him that his brother was seriously ill in the hospital and that everything possible was being done for him. The letter was written by a doctor in the hospital and was the first information of the former Ballinger man's illness.

Deceased was also a brother of Mrs. Jim Flynt of this city, and Mrs. Sanders of Winters, and the remains will probably be shipped to Ballinger for burial. Definite announcement of funeral arrangements could not be made Thursday afternoon pending the receipt of further information from the hospital.

Tom Patterson was a Ballinger boy. He was an employe of the Hall Hardware Co here for several years, later going to San Angelo, where he was manager of a large hardware store. He took up the study of law after leaving the hardware store and attended a law school, and later practiced law at Winters.

He had been at Ironton, Ohio, a city of fifteen or twenty thousand people, for some time. No news of his sickness had been received here and cause of death is not known.

If the remains are brought here for burial they will probably

reach here Sunday at noon and will be buried Sunday afternoon.

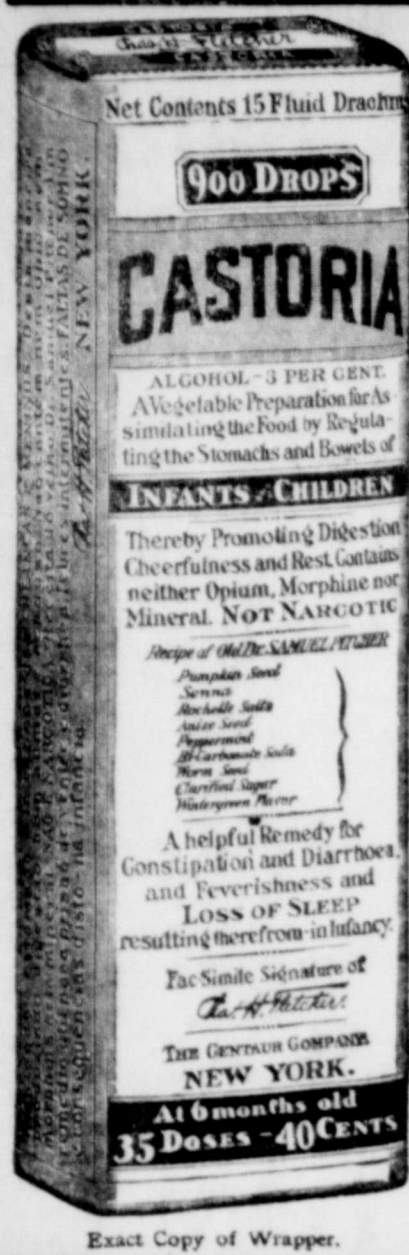

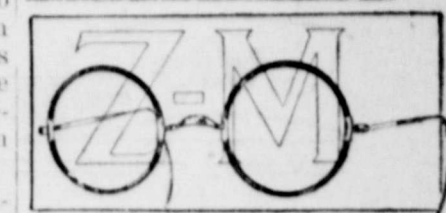
