## Ballinger Purchases Base Ball Franchise from Mineral Wells

### ROWAN GIVEN 50 YEARS

ABILENE, May 20.—A verdict of guilty, with the penalty fixed at fifty years in the state penitentiary, was returned here by the jury this morning against Albert L. Rowan, tried in the district court here on a charge of venue for the murder of G. W. Street, a Dallas postal clerk, who was killed in the robbery of the Jackson street sub-station last January.

With the trial of Rowan at an end, the next move in the post office robbery case shifts to Dallas, where next week Charles E. Gaines, alias George Wheeler, arrested in Indianapolis, will go to trial in the Federal court under indictment charging him with being an accomplice in the post office hold-up.

Postoffice officials assert that Gaines has confessed to participation in the robbery, but he denies that he fired a shot in the fusillade in which two postal clerks were wounded.

Two of the seven alleged bandits are still at large. The two at liberty were indicted under the names of George Meyers and a man known as "Johnny."

Rowan is alleged to have been the "master mind" in the robbery. It was proven that Rowan planned the robbery and furnished guns with which to carry out the robbery. He is alleged to have "spotted" the money in the postoffice and arranged with the other bandits to get it. Part of the loot was recovered in Rowan's home.

Rowan was convicted in the Federal court for the robbery a short time ago and given twenty-five years. The sentence here today runs his term up to 75 years.

### TEACHERS OFF FOR VACATION

Most of the teachers in the Ballinger schools who live at other places in the state, have either left, or will leave within the next day or two for their respective homes.

Prof. Al Mayfield will go to Austin for a few days visit and will return to Ballinger in about a week to teach a summer school and give some of the pupils who fell down on their grades an opportunity to make up the shortage.

Prof. J. O. Harris will return to his home at San Marcos for the present, and make his plans for the summer.

Miss Ella Hood returns to San Angelo, Miss Hattie Savage to Taylor, Miss Blanch Ward to Abilene, Miss Pearl Evans to San Marcos, Miss Addie Lee Smith to Smithville.

The local school board has not elected teachers for the next term, and it is not known whether any of the present members of the faculty have filed applications or not. Prof. J. M. Skinner stated that many applications were being received, and that the local board anticipated no shortage of teachers.

The teachers who reside at other places and who have been teaching here during the term just closed, made many friends here who would be glad to see them retained on the faculty.

### SAYS U. S. WILL NOT BE LED INTO LEAGUE

LONDON, May 20.—Newspapers here today are featuring the address made last night by George Harvey, United States ambassador to Great Britain, at a dinner given by the Pilgrims club.

Mr. Harvey announced that he had been directed by the State Department at Washington to represent America at the proposed meeting of the allied supreme council at which the Silesian question would be considered, but he declared that the United States would under no possible conditions be led into participation of the League of Nations.

The Daily News (of the Northcliffe Press) declared itself perplexed by America's repudiation of the League of Nations. The News inferred from Ambassador Harvey's address that the United States actually agrees with the objects of the league, but the News says, "yet the United States will have nothing to do with the greatest organization ever created for the fulfillment of the league's highest purpose, and this not because America disapproves of any one of the objects of the league, but because her people at the last election gave a decisive vote against the party of one of the league's chief founders."

The London papers welcomed the ambassador's expressions as expressions of friendship and frankness.

GALVESTON, May 20.—The election of officers for the Texas Federation of Labor in session here today was as follows: Geo. H. Slater, of Galveston, president; Robert McKinley, Temple, secretary and treasurer; F. Cunningham, Bridgeport, delegate to the national convention. The five vice-presidents are Herman Kachel, of Denison; Mrs. Minnie Boone, Fort Worth; C. F. Russi, San Antonio; L. M. Andler, Houston; C. A. Weber, Beaumont.

### IRISH CONTINUE SHOOT TO KILL

GALWAY, Ireland, May 20.—The district inspector of the constabulary and twenty policemen under him at West Port were attacked from ambush by sixty armed men today. One constable was killed, one wounded, and four of the ambushing party killed and six wounded.

Later the police attacked the ambushers entrenched in their position and carried it. The men defending the position were routed and fled across the county, pursued by government troops. Arms, ammunition and bombs were captured from the ambushers.

### POOL COTTON ON SALE HERE TODAY

The Farm Bureau is selling 400 bales of cotton pooled under the direction of the Farm Bureau here today. The cotton has been classed by an expert cotton man, and buyers are bidding on the lot. The cotton is owned by various farmers near Ballinger, and in other sections of the county.

### Now Has Berth in West Texas League; Cisco Today

The Ballinger Bear C's are playing at Cisco today, as the result of a deal finally consummated at Cisco Thursday night when the West Texas League transferred the Mineral Wells franchise to Ballinger, and the Ballinger club put up the money for the Mineral Wells team, uniforms etc.

For more than two weeks negotiations have been underway between Ballinger and the League, and the locals got down to business this week when they were advised that the Mineral Wells franchise would be transferred to a West Texas town, on account of Mineral Wells being so far off the circuit.

The fans organized a club here Thursday, elected a board of directors, officers, and put up more than \$4,000 to start the ball rolling. C. S. Guin, J. R. Lusk and LeRoy Nicholson attended the meeting of the West Texas League at Cisco Thursday night, and now Ballinger is on the circuit, and it is up to every fan to root and root hard to bring the locals out of the hole which they inherit from Mineral Wells.

It is the purpose of the manager of the local club to bring the Mineral Wells team up just as fast as possible, and several of the home boys will be signed. Bonger, Miller, Wooden, Ellis, and probably others will join the team on the road at once. Permission has been granted to carry more men than the limit allowed until Ballinger can build up her team. Fourteen is the limit. It is expected that the present schedule will be revised, as the schedule was made for the convenience of all teams with Mineral Wells in the league, and since Ballinger has been substituted for Mineral Wells the old schedule will be hard to maintain.

Under the present schedule Ballinger will play today and tomorrow at Cisco; at Ranger, May 22, 23, 24 and 25; at San Angelo, May 26, 27 and 28; and then back to Ranger for two games on May 29 and 30, before coming to Ballinger to meet Ranger here on May 31 and June 1, and Sweetwater here June 2, 3, 4, and 5, and will then be off for ten games on the road again.

An effort will be made to give the home team a rousing welcome when they play the opening game here. Fans must bear in mind that Ballinger is taking a berth in the league under the most adverse circumstances. They are taking over the tail end team and in what might be termed a somewhat disorganized state. They will play for a few days to a great disadvantage, and it is expected that this will lose.

Mr. Guin and Mr. Lusk returned home from Cisco Thursday night. Mr. Nicholson remained with the Ballinger club as business manager.

Jumping from 1251 school children in 1900 to 5,178 in 1911, and then back to 3,814 in 1915, up again to the highest peak in its history of 5,251 in 1917, with a second drop to 3,672 in 1919, Runnels county's rise and fall in educational matters is reflected today in a total of 5,071 school children.

LAREDO, Tex., May 20.—There is a dearth of domestic servants here and the suggestion that it is due to the fact that many of the Mexican girls prefer to earn their living in less laborious ways has brought up a topic for consideration by the Mothers' Club of San Augustin church here.

The club announced that it would operate a bureau of information and employment for the girls arriving from Mexican points, many of whom are said to have been driven into evil ways by lack of employment and ignorance of the language and customs of the country. The members propose to care for the girls arriving from Mexico, aid them in obtaining employment

and keep them from drifting into immorality.

### HOME OF PINK BOLL WORM DISCOVERED

TORREON, Mexico, May 20.—Agriculturists and botanists believe they have found at last the home of the pink boll worm and that it is not in cotton alone. The worms thrive in the "negro plant" and in apesosa and amargoda weeds, which grow in fertile soil in the cotton lands.

Planters are destroying the weeds, burning or chopping them down and disinfecting them, in an effort to kill the worms. The pests played havoc in the Laguna cotton district last year, running half of the crop.

Miss Rachael Page returned home Thursday afternoon from Sterling City, where she has been teaching her school having closed slightly prematurely for the term.

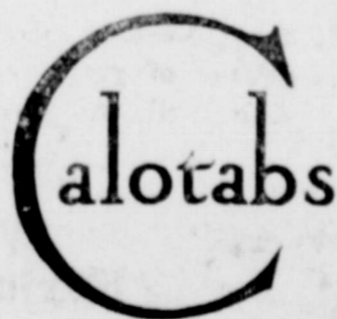

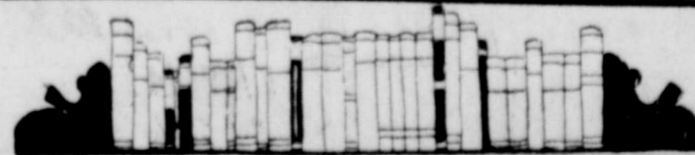

The local schools closed with an average enrollment of more than 900, and twenty-two teachers.

The teacher problem seems to have been solved by raising the salary basis to a respectable standing. Many applications are already on file with the local board.

The Civic League must be given credit for adding the lots West of the Central campus to the school grounds. Part of the block still belong to private citizens, but with the building of a new building the ground will be needed more than ever for a playground.

Nothing could be put over that would add more to the educational environment of the city than making the six weeks' stay of the several hundred teachers in our midst pleasant this summer. The Normal will help put Ballinger more prominently on the school map.

Under the direction of the State Health Department, the third annual negro health week was observed recently in the negro schools of the state. The negro schools, churches, lodges and societies co-operated in making the week a success. Negro ministers preached to their people on diseases and their prevention, emphasizing the tuberculosis problem, and no doubt much good was accomplished. Negroes in the homes of white people as servants should be healthy, or the whites will suffer.

Many schools throughout the country are installing scales in order that the children may be taught the importance of caring for the body, by becoming interested in their gain in weight—growth. The teachers are instructed to teach the children what the normal weight of a child should be, with respect to age, height, etc., and in this way get the children to strive to nourish and care for their body in a way to overcome short weight, or reduce over weight.

Mr. Father, or Mrs. Mother, you might have been educated in a log cabin and might have been forced to walk a considerable distance to school, but that is no reason why you should insist that your child not be given better advantages. Remember we are living in a day—just a little faster than the boyhood or girlhood days through which you

## Little Interest is Manifested in School Bond Election; Majority is Predicted

The overwhelming vote for the municipal light bonds recently seems to have given the citizens of this city and of the Ballinger Independent School District an indifferent feeling about bond issues.

The pending election for the purpose of determining whether the local school board shall issue \$35,000 worth of bonds for school improvement or not, will either carry by an overwhelming majority, or it will be defeated by a lack of interest.

So far the bond issue order has not caused as much comment as an order for an ordinary school trustee election. The people either intend to vote for the bonds without making any hurrah about it, or they haven't sufficient interest in the matter to put on a campaign.

It is generally conceded that the local schools are in a muddle of a fix, or will be carried on for the next term under difficulties, if some plan for relieving the situation is not worked out.

The school board has adopted the plan of issuing bonds and building another building to take care of the increased enrollment. This plan so far has not developed any serious opposition.

It has been suggested that it would be cheaper to contract with someone to transport the children from town to South Ward and use that building for another term, than it would to issue bonds and build a new building at the present high prices of material and labor. The opposition claims that the children could be transported to and from South Ward at a great deal less expense than the cost of the bonds and the building of a new building.

As to whether this would be practical or not, we cannot say. It is true that the district has sufficient school room, if it was in the right place. Unfortunately the surplus room is out of the city while the scholastics are in

the city, or at least demand that they be given room in the Central schools.

It is possible that a saving could be realized could the building be postponed, but nothing is certain, and in the meantime Ballinger's educational advantages will suffer.

Education of the children is necessary to the success of the American government and essential to society. Money invested in schools now counts for a higher citizenship in the future. Public schools are maintained from taxation, and unless the people go down in their pockets and put up the money the schools will suffer.

Compared with other districts the local district is in much better condition financially than the average. The schools were maintained on full term here, while at many other places, the term was either cut short, or the people had to raise the necessary funds by public subscription to keep the schools going.

The schools are the best advertisement for any community. The man who is looking for a place to locate and raise his family investigates first the educational advantages. Ballinger can not afford to lag in this.

### DOWN AND OUT MAN SENDS IN TALE OF WOE

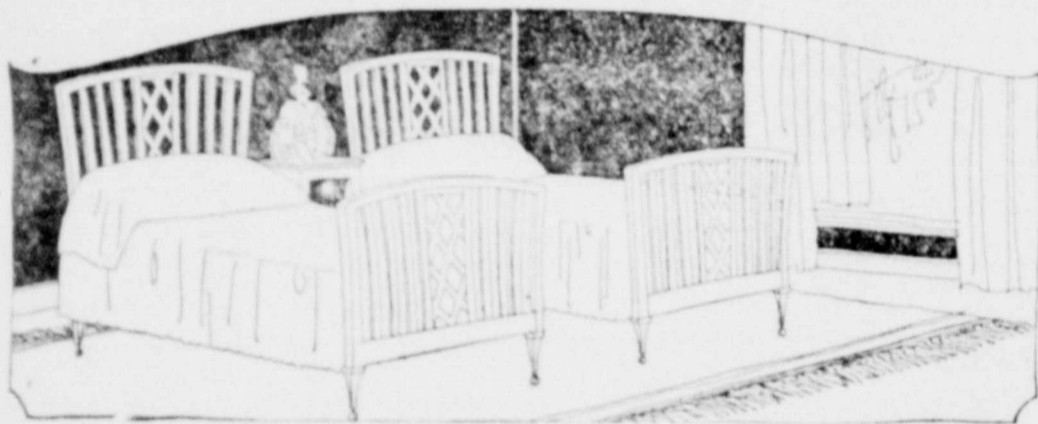

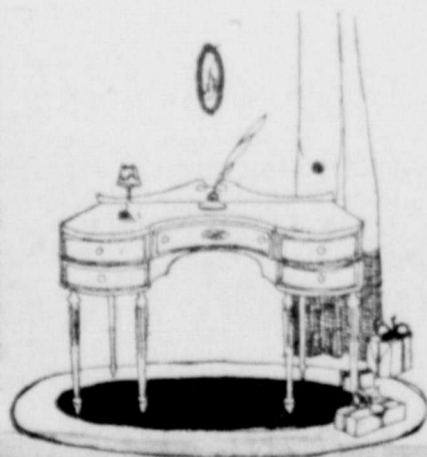

### SCHOOL OPENS SAVING BANK

Mr. Ellis said: "Aside from the fact that children are being given training in the regular courses of study at Peabody School is the fact also that the student body is being developed in a most worthy and beneficial line. ### WESTERN CHIHUAHUA GREAT IN RESOURCES

EL PASO, May 20.—The area of clear white pine beginning in Western Chihuahua, Mexico, embraces 3,500,000 acres and will afford a daily cutting of 3,500,000 board feet of lumber for the next 100 years, according to a folder describing the territory around El Paso, which has just been published by the chamber of commerce.

The folder said that the livestock industry in this section of the United States and Northern Mexico represents \$250,000,000, capable of making \$40,000,000 worth of products annually. Hides, leather, wool, mohair and fertilizers amount to \$70,000,000 and mine products to a like amount.

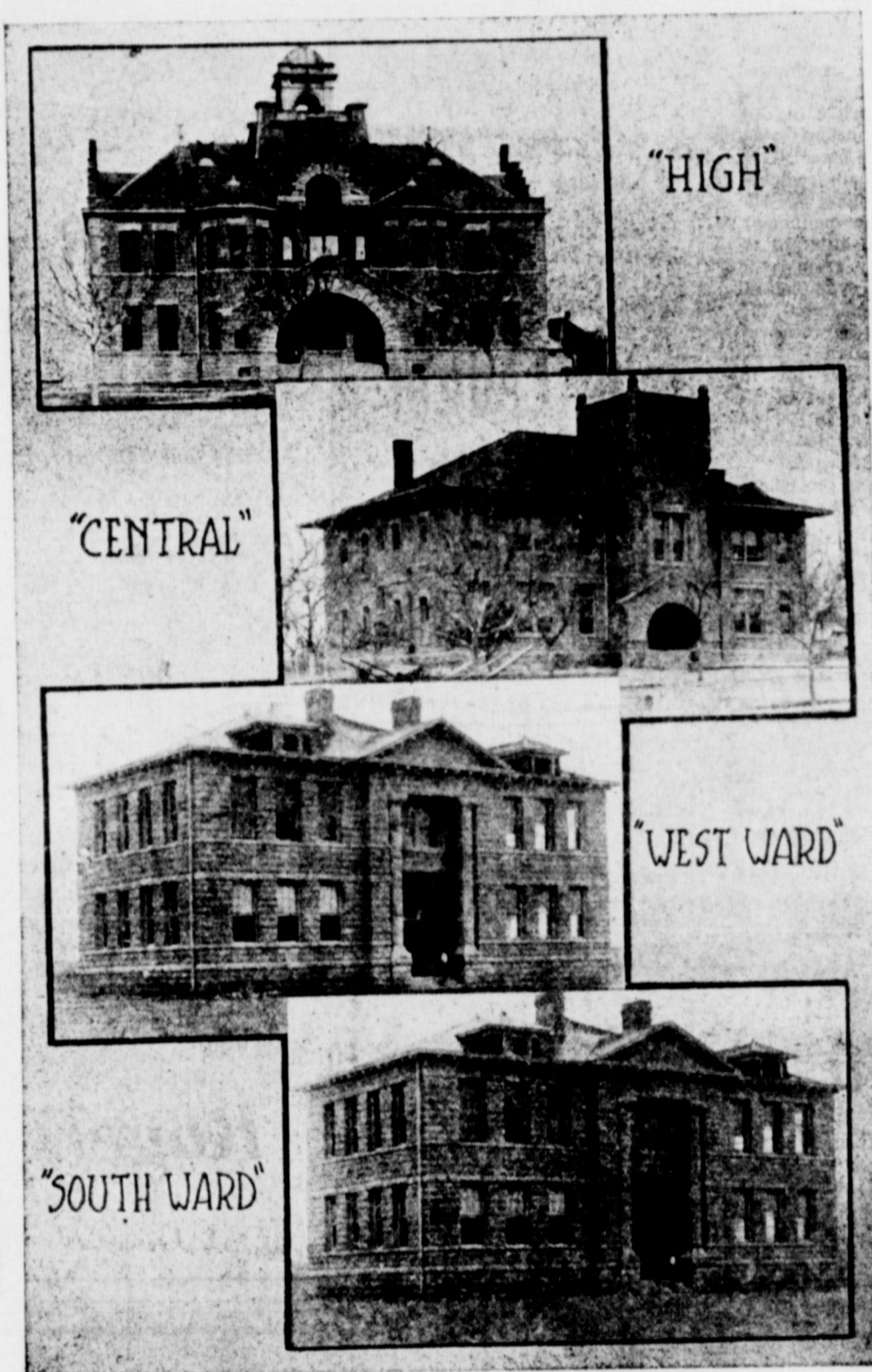

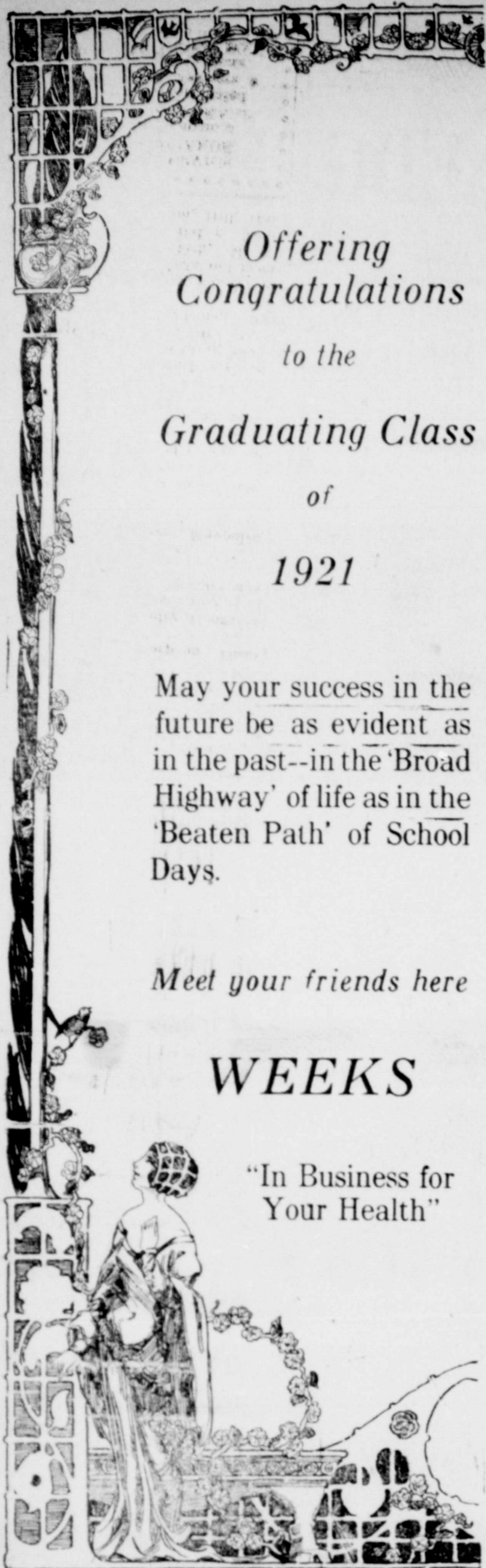

HOW AN ISLAND WAS DESTROYED BY A NATURAL INFERNAL MACHINE

Recent volcanic activity in Hawaii serves to emphasize the fact that the Pacific, one of the great "safety-valve regions" of the earth, is seldom free from an outpouring of molten materials. Many of the islands of this largest ocean are of volcanic origin. Great streams of lava went up first in one part of the Pacific then in another.  
 One of the greatest regions of volcanic disturbance has been in and near the island of Java. In the southwestern corner of the Pacific, where that body of water meets the Indian ocean.  
 Volcanic-made in the first place, and constantly being remade by them, Java has more volcanoes than any area of its size in the world. Estimates of the active and extinct craters range from 100 to 150. Everywhere in Java, in the huge crater lakes, in fissures that now are river beds, even in ancient temples, half finished when interrupted by some fiery convulsion, are evidences of cataclysmic forces—such turbulent forces as now are in continuous hysteria in the Valley of the Ten Thousand Smokes in Alaska, and break their crusted surface cage intermittently in Java.  
 The "treacherous Klot," as the natives call it, all but wiped out the town of Britar, but even its devastation, as reported to the state department, was mild compared to the violent upheaval of Krakatoa in 1883. Then mother nature turned anarchist and planted a gargantuan infernal machine on the doorstep of Java.  
 Krakatoa is a little island in the Sunda strait, between Sumatra and Java. Australians, as far from the explosion as New York is from El Paso, heard the terrific detonation; more than half the island was blotted out, parts of it were flung aloft four times as high as the world's highest mountain, and to touch bottom below the water's surface where most of the island had been, henceforth required a plumb line twice as long as the height of the Washington monument. Skyscraper waves flooded adjacent islands and rolled half-way around the earth. Every human eardrum heard, though it may not have registered, the air waves as they vibrated three or four times around the earth.  
 Krakatoa levied a smaller toll in human life than Klot, because of its isolation, and many of the 35,000 deaths from Krakatoa's eruption were at far-distant points by drowning.  
 An eruption anywhere on the island means disaster, for Java, about equal in area to New York state, supports a population greater than the combined populations of the Empire state and the four other most populous states in the Union—Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio and Texas.  
 In the native folklore are innumerable stories of the earth opening up to swallow a dancing girl. Such tales betoken another physical feature of the island fraught with human tragedy. Not only has it steaming vents, spouting geysers, sulphur lakes, but great chasms open and close, and they have been known to swallow villages.

UNIVERSITY CLASS PUBLISHES PAPERS

AUSTIN, May 20.—The journalism class of the University of Texas recently had the experience of editing and publishing a real newspaper. The publishers of The Austin Statesman allowed the members of the class to edit the paper for two days. The students took the places of Statesmen employees from editorial writers to reporters. All of the Statesman staff left the building and did not appear either day, leaving the editions for those days entirely to the students.  
 W. D. Hornaday, professor of journalism, superintended the publishing of the paper.  
 The Austin American, the morning daily, has agreed to allow the journalism class to edit the paper for experience of the "night side."

OVER HUNDRED DEGREES TO BE GIVEN BY S. M. U.

DALLAS, May 20.—One hundred and seven degrees will be conferred by Southern Methodist University on June 14, according to R. L. Brewer, registrar. This is the largest number of degrees to be given since the founding of the university six years ago. Of these, 87 will be the degree of Bachelor of Arts, 5 of master of arts, 5 of Bachelor of Music, and 10 of Bachelor of Music.

The commencement address will be delivered by Dr. C. M. Bishop, president of Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, on Tuesday morning, June 14, when the degrees are conferred in the university gymnasium. At this time, Dr. H. A. Boaz, president of the university, will make his annual report.
