MEMORIAL FOR HENRY GRADY

ATLANTA, Ga., May 24.—On the seventy-first anniversary of his birthday, memorial services were held here today for Henry W. Grady, newspaper editor and orator, whose writings and speeches during the reconstruction days of the North and South did so much to clear away misunderstandings between the states.

The memorial program today included the unveiling of a monument to him here by Betty Black, his grand daughter, and the placing of a wreath at the base of the monument. Full military honors were rendered by the Confederate and Union veterans, and also by veterans of the world war.

KILLED WHILE "BULL-DOGGING" WILD STEER

Jerry Wright, a West Texas cowboy, and well known in this section of the state, was killed at Parsons, Kansas, last Saturday while taking part in a rodeo. Wright was gored to death while bulldozing a steer. He was one of the principal performers in the stock show at Ft. Worth last March, and was a winner in the rodeo events at Brownwood and in Ballinger last fall. He was raised in the Brady country, and had spent most of his life in this section of the country.

Where All the American Radium Is Produced



In the wilds of Montrose county, Colorado, lies the mill of the Standard Chemical company of Pittsburgh, Pa., through which has passed all the ore from which has been obtained more than half of the world's available supply of radium. For every gram (thimbleful) of radium produced by the company, 500 tons of ore have to be reduced, purified and sent through 5,000 different stages, taking at least six months. DOING DUTY IN BORDER TROUBLE

PARIS, May 24.—Germany replied today to the French communication received yesterday on the Silesian situation. The reply declared in effect that Germany had taken the most rigorous measures toward closing the Upper Silesian frontier.

Premier Briand, when questioned by a group of Deputies before a meeting of the Chamber of Deputies here today, said there is no reason for the occupation of the Ruhr region because the aspect of the Silesian question had been changed, and the premier stated that if the Ruhr district was occupied without the support of the allies, it would be equivalent to an abandonment of the Versailles treaty.

NATIONS HONOR AMERICAN DEAD

PARIS, May 24.—All nations with which the United States was associated in the world war, will pay a tribute to the American soldier dead next week. The ceremonies covering two days will take place in Paris beginning Sunday and ending with a memorial in Suresnes cemetery.

ROWAN TAKEN TO DALLAS JAIL

ABILENE, May 24.—With his motion for a new trial overruled, Albert Rowan, given fifty years in the penitentiary, here Friday by a jury in the district court, where he was tried for the murder of George Street, a postal clerk in Dallas, left today on the Sunshine Special for Dallas, where he will be lodged in jail. Rowan was accompanied by Sheriff Bond and Deputy Sheriff Shores.

KIDNAPPED MAN WHIPPED BY MOB

DALLAS, May 24.—The whereabouts of John Moore, age about thirty-two, who was kidnapped from his home here last night and severely whipped by a bunch of masked men, was not known at a late hour today.

Moore promised his captors that he would start walking for Grenada, Mississippi, before day break this morning. He had just been released from jail under bond following his arrest last Saturday on charges of aggravated assault made upon a 12-year old girl.

Between fifteen and twenty men in automobiles went to Moore's home at midnight, seized their victim and proceeded to a lonely spot in the Trinity river bottom seven miles from Dallas. Here Moore was stripped to his waist, and while begging pitifully he was lashed with a horse whip and warned to leave Dallas before dawn. He was then brought back to the city, where he was thrown from the automobile into a crowded downtown street as the mob drove on and dispersed without making their identity known.

NARROW ESCAPE IN HOTEL FIRE

DALLAS, May 24.—A number of guests had a narrow escape from fire which destroyed the Ray Hotel and damaged adjoining property here last night. The monetary loss was estimated at \$500,000. The firemen said that defective wiring caused the fire.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—American ship owners might have signed an agreement with the marine workers before May first, but they cannot see their way clear to enter an agreement now, Secretary Marvin of the Ship Owners Association, declared today before going into conference with Secretary Hoover and Secretary Davis, and officials of the Shipping Board.

CORONER SAYS M'NEILL DEATH WAS SUICIDE

SONORA, May 24.—A verdict of suicide in the case of Nelson McNeill and a verdict that Elizabeth Dorothy Harris McNeill's fiancée, met death from gunshot wounds inflicted by persons unknown, was returned by Justice of the Peace Balch, of Sonora, today.

District Judge Connell of Sonora, today intimated that he would not call a special session of the grand jury to investigate the affair, but would wait and let the matter come up before the next regular term of court in October.

Relatives of McNeill here today indicated that they would not employ counsel to prosecute Dick Harris and son S. H. Harris, but said that the father of the young man might take such action.

Dick Harris and son left here today for Valley Mills with the body of their daughter and sister.

The remains of Miss Dorothy Harris, killed in the tragedy at Sonora last Saturday afternoon, passed thru Ballinger Tuesday afternoon. The remains were accompanied by the father and mother of the young lady, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Harris, and brother, S. H. Harris. The body was being carried to Valley Mills, in Bosque county, for burial.

Accompanied by Dr. Goodall, of Waco, the remains of Nelson McNeill, the young man who was killed following a battle with his sweetheart's father and brother, near Sonora, last Saturday, passed thru this city Monday afternoon on the Santa Fe. The remains were being carried to Valley Mills for burial.

Dr. W. T. McNeill, father of the young man, was not able to go to his son's aid when he received news of the tragedy. He was ill at home, but several relatives passed thru Ballinger en route to San Angelo Monday morning. In the party were A. A. McNeill, James A. McNeill, and G. E. Scrutshfield. They did not return to Valley Mills with the remains, but went to Sonora to see that those responsible for their brother's death got justice.

The tragedy was the most sensational in the history of West Texas. The father, mother and brother of Dorothy Harris, chased the young man, who was eloping with the girl, more than four hundred miles in an auto. Unexpectedly the parties

The Sunset Magazine gives a note of warning against fake moving picture promotion schemes, and says "there are fortunes in moving pictures—if they can be sold. But the average man or woman with a thousand dollars in the savings bank or in Liberty Bonds has no more chance to make a fortune out of movie shares than an Arizona jackass has to develop a Caruso voice. Experience shows that the suckers who bought oil and mining shares lost 98.8 per cent of their money." Thus it will be seen that when you buy stock in such enterprises you are betting 98.8 to 1.2. That is entirely too much odds to bet on anybody's game.



TWO CHURCHES COMBINE WORK

With a view of ultimately forming a permanent union of the two local Presbyterian churches, a resolution was unanimously adopted at a joint meeting of the two sessions Monday night, providing for combining the local work of the two churches.

The resolution will be presented to the two congregations Sunday, and, if adopted, the First Presbyterian Church and the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church will work as one in carrying on the local work.

The resolution provides that Rev. W. C. Kunze, who was recently called to the pastorate of the Eighth Street Presbyterian church, will serve the united congregation as pastor, and that all the local activities of the two churches will be combined.

Due to Presbyterian affiliations of the two respective churches, it was not deemed practical to enter into a plan of organic union at this time. The General Assemblies of the U. S. A. church and U. S. church are working out a plan for the union of the two bodies, and it is probable that the details incident to uniting the two local churches will be worked out by the Assemblies, and in that event there will be nothing for the two Presbyterian churches in this city to do but continue as one church under whatever plan the Assemblies recommend.

During the entire life of this city the two local Presbyterian congregations have maintained separate churches, employing separate pastors and carrying on the work at double the cost of what could have been handled

by the united effort of one organization.

Realizing that a waste of money and effort was being experienced in this overlapping and duplication of work, the leaders of the two churches set about to work out some plan of co-operation which would prevent this, and at the same time strengthen the Presbyterian church in this city. It is believed that a plan has been adopted which will meet with the approval of the membership of the two congregations.

There is no difference in the doctrinal principles of the two churches. One is known throughout the country as the Presbyterian Church U. S. A., and the other as the Presbyterian Church U. S. The U. S. A. church in this city was formerly the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, uniting with the U. S. A. Church in 1906.

The announcement that the two churches will worship together and work as a united church, will be gladly received by other churches of the city. By combining their efforts the united church will be one of the strongest churches in the city, with one of the strongest Sunday schools in the city, and will stand for greater good in the community than the two churches standing alone with divided efforts.
