LIGHT BONDS ARE CASHED

The municipal light bonds which this city voted almost unanimously for a short time ago, have been converted into cash, according to a telegram from the bond brokers to Mayor Guin Tuesday.

The local city commission accepted an offer on the bonds a few days ago, and they were forwarded to the bond buyers with draft attached, and the telegram received Tuesday stated that the draft had been honored and the bonds accepted, and the cash from the sale of the bonds immediately goes to the credit of the city in the city depository.

What next? If cash talks the city should now be in a position to push matters mighty fast, and that is what the city commission is doing. Engineers will be on the job in a few days, and no further delay should be encountered. It is believed that the company now supplying the city with current has run its course with the courts. An effort was made to prevent the approval of the bonds, but an O. K. was placed on the bonds which made them sell good. It is possible that some kind of an injunction may be tried out, but the city commission fears no further blocking of the municipal development.

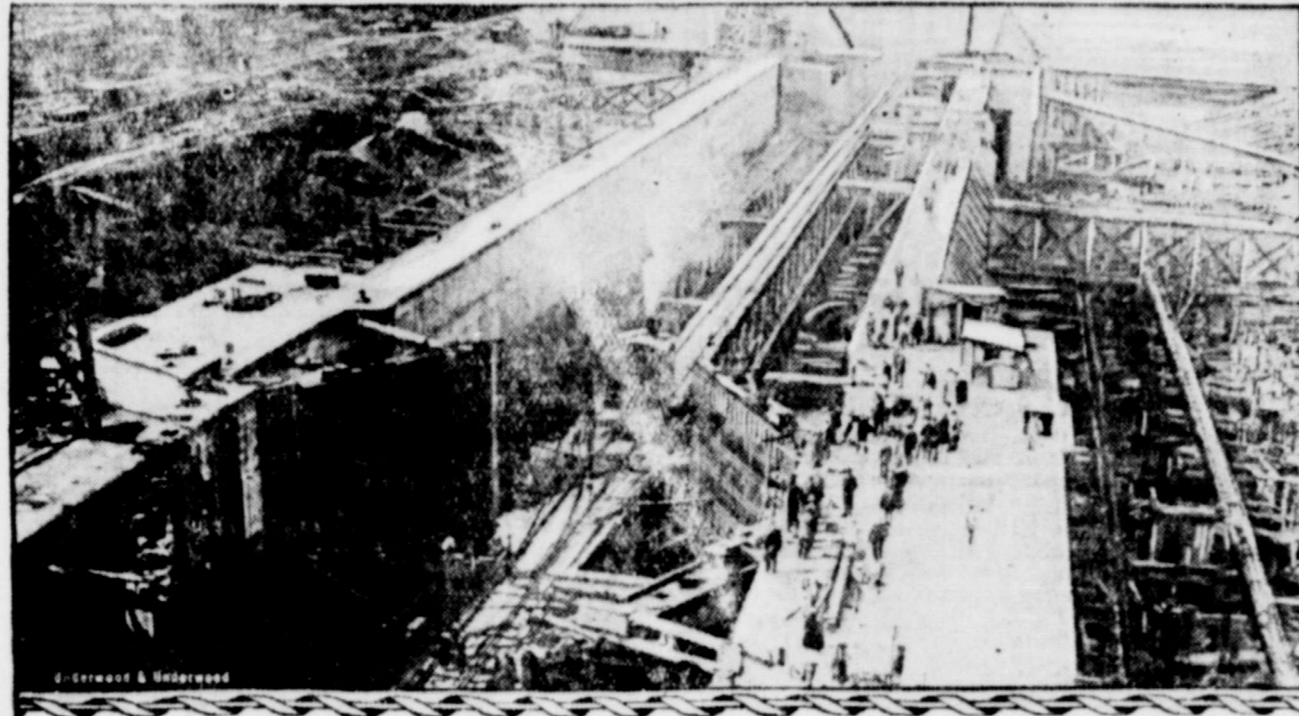

HERE TO PLAN JOINT INSTITUTE

Representatives of the educational department of a number of counties West of Ballinger were here Wednesday to attend a meeting of county judges and school superintendents for the purpose of working out plans for a joint institute here next fall.

It will be recalled that a joint teachers' institute was held at San Angelo last fall, and the success experienced in throwing institutes of several counties together into one large joint institute was so great, that the plan will be continued and Ballinger has been selected as the place for the next institute.

The institute will bring teachers here from eight or ten counties, and as the law requires that all teachers attend an institute one week in each year, it is expected that Ballinger will have a full house for the institute week. Several hundred teachers will be here, and County Superintendent Bugg will need the assistance of the citizens in making the affair a big success.

In addition to the institute next fall, the city will entertain the teachers who will come here for the normal this summer, thus giving Ballinger two important teachers' conventions this year.

GOLF PLAYERS IN ANNUAL CONTEST

DALLAS, May 25.—Sixteen of the twenty-three club members of the Texas Golf Association are represented in pairings here today for qualifying in the round of the fifteenth annual state championship tournament. There are 174 entrants, as follows: Houston 12; San Antonio and Wichita Falls 9 each; Corsicana 8; San Angelo 6; Austin 3; Mel Kinney and Bryan 2 each; Texarkana and Beaumont 1 each. The local club has 105 members, many of whom are participating in the try out for the state contest.

LEGION HOSPITAL GETS SUPPLIES

Those faithful, patriotic women who worked so energetically to produce supplies and comforts for our boys in the dark days of the war, will be gratified to learn that final distribution of the remaining supplies has at last been made, and in a way that will add some little bit to the comfort of those of the boys who were the greatest sufferers.

Recently a letter was received by Representative Stephens, from the Secretary of the Board of the American Legion Memorial Hospital at Kerrville, Texas, that this institution could use to good advantage some of these supplies, and this week a large box of quilts was forwarded to this splendid institution to add to the comfort and convenience of the inmates.

We feel sure that this disposition of the goods will meet with the hearty approval of every devoted Red Cross worker in Runnels county.

The Red Cross of Runnels county shipped out hundreds of garments during the war. The knitters worked faithfully in making sweaters, Sox, etc., while thousands of bandages and hospital garments were made and shipped to army headquarters and overseas. It will be good news to all those interested to know that the local chapter has now made a contribution to the Legion hospital.

BALLINGER TEAM AT HOME TONIGHT

Six automobiles left for Abilene shortly after noon today, where they will meet the Ballinger baseball club and bring them to Ballinger tonight, and tomorrow the team and a large number of fans will go to San Angelo for a three game series with the Bronchos on the Angelo lot. The team was en route from Ranger to San Angelo, and would have had to spend the night in Abilene and come to Ballinger tomorrow on the A. & S. if fans had not arranged for the trip by auto to Ballinger. The boys will get a night's rest here and be ready for the game with the Bronchos tomorrow.

Supt. J. H. Armstrong, of San Angelo, and Judge R. Davenport, of Paint Rock and other county and city superintendents, are here to attend a meeting at the court house, this afternoon, for the purpose of discussing a joint institute to be held in Ballinger this fall. Teachers from nine or ten counties will be present.

WACO, May 25.—Joe Lumpkin, age seventeen years, son of J. H. Lumpkin, who killed his father last night when the latter advanced upon the boy's mother and threatened to beat her brains out with a club, was admitted to bail today, in the sum of \$1,000, a charge of murder being filed against the lad. An examining trial has been set for Friday.

According to the coroner who held the inquest over the remains of Lumpkin, the shooting was the culmination of a series of quarrels between the boy's father and his mother. In a statement under oath the boy said that he shot his father only when his father started towards his mother with a club, and after he had said he was going to brain her. The boy's statement was corroborated by his mother.

The boy fired through a screen door, the bullet piercing his father's brain and killing him instantly.

HIGH COURT SAYS TWO MUST HANG

AUSTIN, May 25.—Death sentences were affirmed in two cases by the Criminal Court of Appeals today. The death sentence of Jordan Isreal, convicted of murder in Falls county, was upheld and a motion for rehearing overruled by the court.

The appeal of Floyd Ray, given death sentence in Wichita county for criminal assault, was dismissed, and Ray will hang. Motion for rehearing in the case of H. W. Barnes, sentenced to fifty years in Tarrant county for murder, and the 25 year sentence of Porter Meeks, convicted in Dallas county for robbery, were affirmed by the court.

Sam Petty was in the city from the Token country, Wednesday, and reported that the grain crop was maturing nicely. Mr. Petty stated that the new variety of wheat, known as spring wheat, or Russian wheat, was making good this year.

APPROVES STATE UNIVERSITY DEAL

AUSTIN, May 25.—Attorney General Cureton today approved the University land acquisition bond, which is a bond executed by the Chamber of Commerce of Austin, with nineteen citizens as sureties, pledging to the State that the land purchased in the University expansion bill shall not exceed the sum of \$1,350,000, the amount appropriated for purchasing the land. The bond was required in legislative action in passing the bill.

CUSTOMS HOUSE IN DUBLIN BURNS

DUBLIN, Ireland, May 25.—The customs house in Dublin was destroyed by fire today, according to Central News dispatches. The building was set on fire by a large number of Sinn Feiners, says a statement issued by the Dublin Castle. The building was recognized as one of the finest public edifices in the United Kingdom. It was fired by the use of a pistol.

PROVIDING PLACE FOR SCHOOL BOOKS

Carpenters are busy erecting shelves in the county depository for the use of the State school books. The depository is on the third floor of the court house and is very nicely equipped. Supt. John J. Bugg is in charge of the books for Runnels county, and reports that a close tab is being kept on all of the books that go out of the county depository, and that few are being lost. Each school has its own depository and custodian, and they send in a report to Mr. Bugg every month.

NEFF AND THOMAS GET D. L. DEGREE

BROWNWOOD, May 25.—The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Gov. Neff, and Cullen F. Thomas, of Dallas, by the Howard Payne College at its thirty-second annual commencement here today. Governor Neff delivered the baccalaureate address. Following the address Mr. Neff was a guest of the Rotary Club at a luncheon.

PLAN TO SETTLE BOUNDARY SCRAP

PARIS, May 25.—The latest plan for settling the Upper Silesian controversy, supposed to be a British suggestion, provides for giving Poland and Germany respectively, the communes that voted in their favor in the recent plebiscite, but to hold the entire territory under control of a special commission for a period of thirty years.

GALVESTON, May 25.—Dr. Oscar Davis, former State Health Officer, was found dead in a bath tub at a local hospital today, with his throat cut. A razor was lying near by the tub.

He came to Galveston nearly a week ago and had complained to friends that he had been suffering pains occasionally near the region of the heart, but there were no serious symptoms, according to attending physicians.

CHICAGO, May 25.—More than one hundred wage disputes submitted by railroads throughout the country have been filed with the Railroad Labor Board, it was learned today. The disputes will be heard beginning June 6th.

PIONEER MCKINNEY VETERAN DIES

MCKINNEY, May 25.—R. L. Parker, age eighty, a Confederate veteran, and for forty-eight years a business man here, died at his home today. He is survived by a widow and five children and one brother, Warren D. Parker, of Dallas. The surviving sons include Ernest J. Parker, editor of the Sherman Democrat, and W. A. Parker, editor of the Lindale Reporter. The funeral will be held tomorrow.

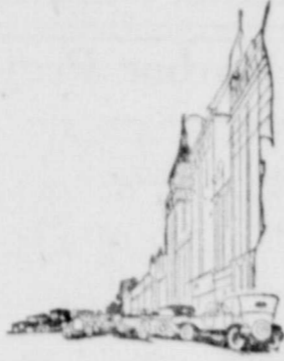
MAE MURRAY DANCED WAY INTO PICTURE WORLD VIA "FOLLIES"

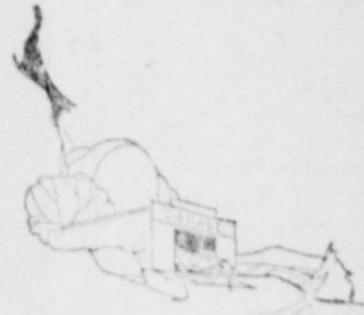

SCHOOL BOND ISSUE CATECHISM

The following questions were propounded by the Y. M. B. L. to Dr. S. B. Raby, Chairman of the School Board, for the purpose of furnishing correct information to the voters in compact form. The answers are given as furnished by Dr. Raby:

Q. "How much does our School District now owe?"

A. "The outstanding bonds against the district are at present \$305,000.00."

Q. "Why is it necessary to build a new building?"

A. "To take care of the steady increase in scholastics, and to relieve the crowded condition of the High School, where part of the pupils are now using the attic in violation of State laws."

Q. "Why is it necessary to raise the tax rate to 65c on the \$100.00?"

A. "To enable the School Board to employ competent teachers—and to pay necessary expenses—and to take care of interest and sinking fund on outstanding indebtedness."

Q. "Two propositions are to be submitted, one for the bonds, and one for the tax. What will be the result of voting for the bonds and against the tax?"

A. "If the bonds are voted without the tax, the new building could not be built."

Q. "What would be the effect of voting for the tax and against the bonds?"

A. "It is absolutely necessary that the tax be voted in order to care for the expenses outlined above. If the bonds are not voted, the new building cannot be built."

Q. "If the bonds and tax are voted, when, in your opinion, will the board begin the construction of the new building?"

A. "The Board has plans underway to begin construction within a few days after the election."

Q. "Is it true that the plans and specifications of the new building must conform to State regulations?"

A. "Yes."

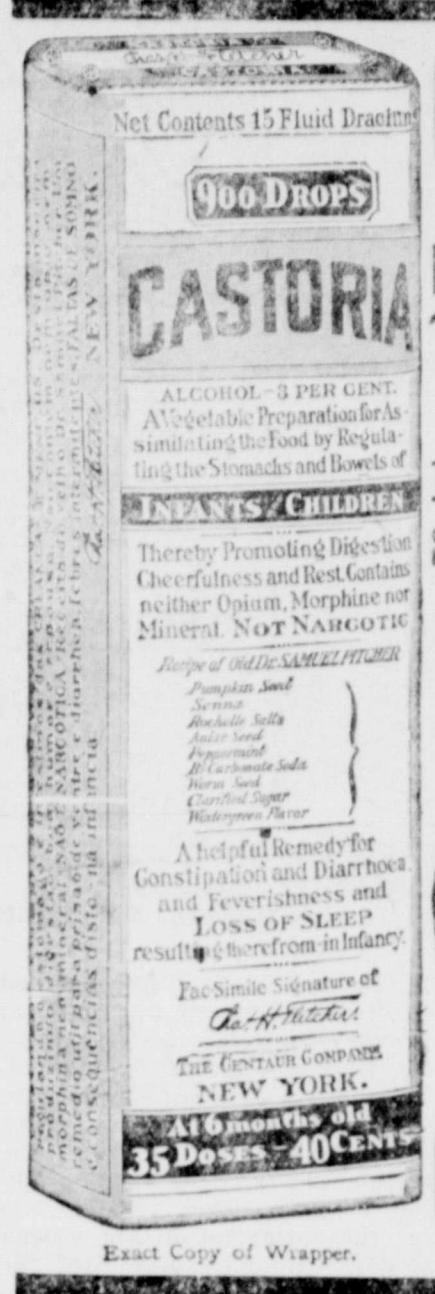
