Cactus-Boa

Three Deaths—Early Kings Mills, Ohio—Three times in the last twenty years the white blossom of the cactus plant in the home of Oscar Connelly, appeared. And each appearance of the single, waxen flower has been followed by the death of some member of the family. For several months after his wife's death Connelly kept the plant. Now he has thrown it away, hoping perhaps to break the spell of the "death cactus."

For years the prickly little plant had been in the home without blooming. Then, in 1912, the owner's son was stricken by typhoid fever. Simultaneously the cactus bloomed, producing the solitary flower and exuding a sickening-sweet fragrance. A few days after the flower withered the son died.

Until 1927 the plant again did not bloom. In that year a daughter, Mrs. Mary McCullum, became ill. The "death cactus" bloomed. Mrs. McCullum died a few days later.

A few months ago the plant again showed signs of increased life. The family was alarmed when Mrs. Connelly became ill. She asked her sister-in-law, Mrs. Annie Bateman, to bring the plant into the sick room.

Before the plant was taken away it had withered. Mrs. Connelly died a week later.

Falling Downstairs

Caused 1,800 Deaths—London—Falling downstairs out of bed, and over broom handles and buckets, may be dull accidents in most cases, but they caused the death of almost 1,800 women last year.

This was revealed recently by Miss Margaret Hamilton at a woman's session of the National Safety congress held here. The session was considering the problem of "Stacy in the House."

Figures presented to the congress (those of 1930, the latest available) showed that falling downstairs cost the lives of 675 persons, falling out of windows took 135 more, while falling from bed sent no less than 58 into the hereafter.

Unclassified Animals

Jealous of discovered beast hunters have tried to suppress the Nandi bear, or, as natives call it, the chinkist, a creature half bear, half gorilla, which lurks in the dense forests of S. 27th Africa, prowling native kraals and preying on cattle, goats, women and children. Its weird, three-toed footprints belong to no known animal, but such great authorities as the late F. C. Selous and Capt. Blayne Percival for 25 years game warden in Kenya, have asserted their belief in its existence.

Gold Tadpoles Found

in State Fish Hatchery—Columbus, Ohio.—T. H. Langlois, chief of the bureau of fish propagation of the division of conservation, reported to State Conservation Commissioner William Reinhart that golden tadpoles had been found in the state fish hatchery at Xenia, Ohio.

Declaring that he had never heard of a golden tadpole before, Langlois expressed the opinion they were the young of the leopard frog. He served that such tadpoles were ordinarily black, but that the golden color may have resulted from pigmentary changes.

"Still another theory was advanced by state museum authorities, who pointed out it might be albinoism, although albino phases have never been discovered in adult frogs and albino tadpoles would naturally be white."

The golden tadpoles are being segregated by Ernest Harner, superintendent of the Xenia hatchery, for study and experimental purposes.

Early Motion Pictures

The modern motion picture dates from about the year 1850, when Edison produced his kinesiograph, the first machine of the kind using film. Edward Muybridge, often called the "father of moving pictures," had preceded him by about 20 years, but was handicapped by the fact that he had to use glass plates. Other pioneers before Edison were Sellers, Lincoln, Marey, etc. In 1894 C. Francis Jenkins was the first to produce moving pictures by modern methods. The first public showing of moving pictures was made in June, 1894.

CITATION BY PUBLICATION

You are hereby commanded to a nation Joe J. That by proper assignment and conveyance from said West Texas Construction Company, Contract No. 11, Plaintiff became the owner of said certificate and is now the owner and holder thereof.

That the total amount of said certificate unpaid is \$37.77 with annual interest thereon at the rate of 8% per annum from October 31, 1927, which is payable in five installments. The first installment for the sum of \$47.55 became due and payable October 31, 1927.
