NO POWER GIVEN R. R. COMMISSION

AUSTIN, May 28.—The Texas Railroad Commission has no power to force railroads of the state to place electric fans in all or part of their rolling stock for the convenience and comfort of their passengers, according to a ruling given today to Allison B. Mayfield, chairman of the commission, by Assistant Attorney General Wallace Hawkins.

The ruling was given at the request of Commissioner Mayfield, who was seeking to prohibit the Texas & Pacific Railroad from removing electric fans from passenger cars. The fans were being removed as a matter of economy and the chairman claimed this was not sufficient reason for removal.

Mr. Hawkins ruled that the commission has no power to force railroads to place accommodations usually designated as desirable or luxurious in the coaches.

SAYS FEW LAND SALES BEING MADE

"Few sales are being made in the land business," said C. A. Doose, Friday morning, when asked by a Ledger reporter how the land business was. Continuing, Mr. Doose said, "The cattlemen and sheep men have all been knocked out by the price of cattle and sheep and are not wanting any more land, and the farmers who have been raising cotton have been discouraged by the drop in cotton since last August, from forty cents down to eight and nine cents in December, and that is the reason the real estate business went to the bad."

Mr. Doose reports that only two sales have been made lately, one to R. E. L. Meyers, of Austin, and to Mrs. B. W. Wright, a Rannels county party. Mr. Meyers has made frequent trips to Rannels county ever since 1900 and is well acquainted with it. Mr. Doose shows his faith in Rannels county farms by purchasing 662 acres of farm land just north of the Colorado river.

B. W. Wright and family, who came to this county twenty years ago, purchased a farm from Mr. Doose for eight dollars an acre. Mr. Doose said that he sold this same piece of land a few weeks ago for Mrs. Wright, at fifty dollars an acre. This shows how much the value of Rannels county land has increased in a period of twenty years. After selling this land, Mrs. Wright purchased from Mr. Doose a hundred acre farm in the Western part of the county.

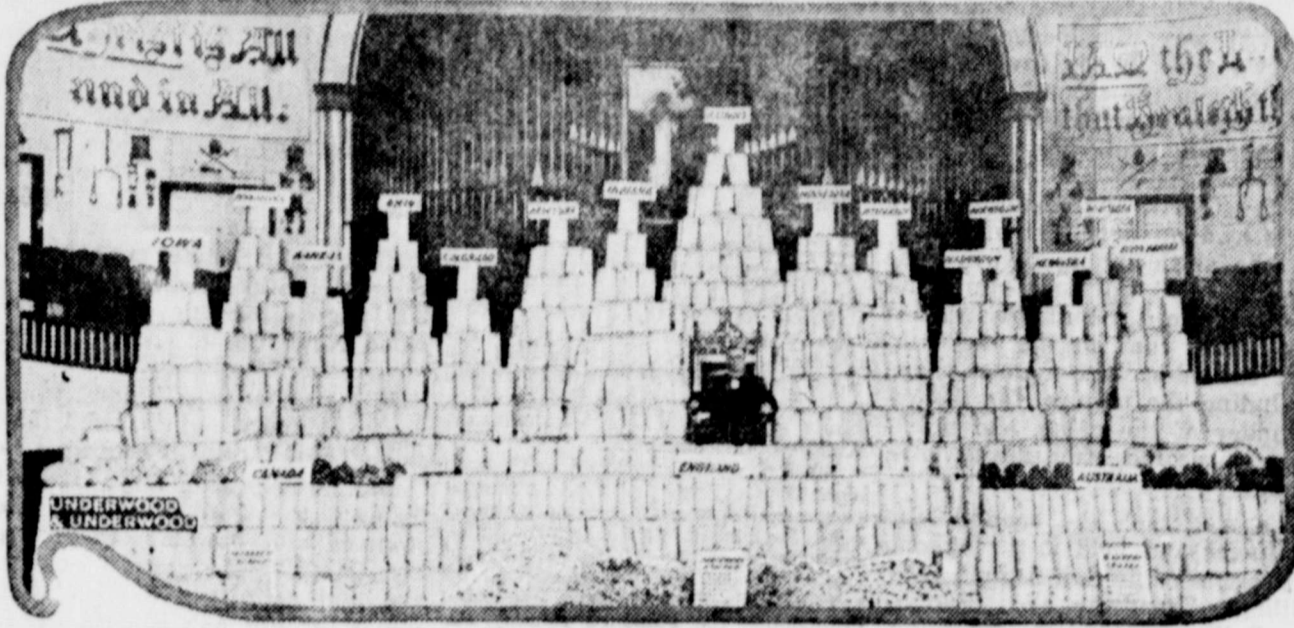

TWO DEAD IN FT. WORTH FIRE

FT. WORTH, May 28.—"Dusty" Rhodes, age sixty, a railroad man, was burned to death, and Dr. J. B. Plunkett, age fifty-four, of Duncan, Okla., was seriously injured early today when a fire of unknown origin destroyed the Grammar Hotel here.

A woman and child who are missing, are being sought. Damage to the hotel and adjacent property is estimated at \$50,000.00.

TEXANS TO GO TO WHEAT CONVENTION

PAMPA, Tex., May 26.—Texas will be represented at the national convention of the National Wheat Growers' Association at Hutchinson, Kansas, June 2nd, according to C. C. Dodd, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Wheat Growers' Association. Other states entitled to participate in the national convention are Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado and Oklahoma.

Aaron Sapiro, counsel for the Texas organization, will address members of the state organization at Amarillo, Texas, on June 4th, going to Amarillo from Euid, Oklahoma, and points in Kansas. The plan for representation in the national convention provide that each county in Texas shall have one delegate at large and one delegate for each 250 members in the county or major fraction thereof. Where counties fail to send delegates, they are empowered to authorize the delegates from other counties to cast the vote of the absent delegates.

Election of national officers and a national board of directors of which two each will come from North Dakota and Kansas, and one each from Nebraska, Colorado, Oklahoma, and Texas, comprises the business of the convention.

NO VERDICT IN I. W. W.'S JAILED MURDER CASE AT DENVER, COLO.

HOUSTON, May 28.—The jury in the Ussery case, in which Walter Ussery, formerly of Gatesville, was on trial on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Mortie Conroy, a rent car driver, who was killed last February, was discharged today, after reporting to the court that they were deadlocked with no hopes of reaching a verdict.

The jury deliberated fifty-nine hours. Carl Parker, who fired the shots into Conroy's body, was recently given a death sentence. Ussery was alleged to have been a member of the party who was in the car at the time Conroy was killed.

UMPIRE "CANNED"; BROWN MANAGER

N. S. Rives, President of the San Angelo baseball club, and C. S. Gunn, president of the Ballinger club, sent a joint telegram to Walter Morris, President of the West Texas League, Friday night, in which they stated that the two teams would not play another game in which Chas. Johnson officiated as umpire.

Under the rules of organized baseball, this releases Johnson, the presidents of the two clubs having the right to discharge an umpire. Johnson's decision in the San Angelo-Sweetwater games last week were very unsatisfactory to the Angelo players, and his decisions in the two games at San Angelo Thursday and Friday resulted in the joint protest.

Vernon Brown, one of the most popular members of the West Texas League, will be tendered the management of the Bearcats when the club returns here from San Angelo tomorrow. Brown was a favorite with the San Angelo fans, and when he appeared at the bat with the Ballinger team in the first game Thursday, the Angelo fans presented him with a large bouquet of flowers. It is expected that the popular player will take charge of the local team and pull them out of the hole.

DENVER, Colo., May 28.—Twenty-seven alleged members of the I. W. W. were jailed here last night after they attempted to commandeer a Union Pacific freight train and run it to Denver from Cheyenne, Wyoming, according to the police.

A squad of twenty-two policemen met the train outside the city when they received a report that the alleged I. W. W. were on it. Members of the crew on the freight train notified the division headquarters of the Union Pacific railroad here that when the train reached Greeley, Colorado, that a gang of men had taken possession of several cars and refused to leave.

Denver policemen, headed by two sergeants, were sent to meet the train and took the men into custody. The men arrested said that they had been driven out of Cheyenne. Charges of vagrancy have been placed against them.

GERMANY IS PAYING UP

PARIS, May 28.—The first real payment on the German reparations account was announced from Berlin yesterday. The payment is in form of twenty bonds, about ten million dollars each.

Eighty million of this amount is payable at New York, sixty million at London, and sixty million at Paris. The bonds are endorsed by the Reichbank, the Disconto Gesellschaft, and the Dresdner Bank.

MUSICAL RECITAL WAS BIG SUCCESS

A big crowd attended the recital at the Carnegie Library last night given by the pupils of Mrs. Ben J. Harris, and all are loud in the praise of the splendid program given. The threatening rain kept many away, but the auditorium was filled to its capacity and applause after each number showed the appreciation of the big audience.

WACO NEGRO BOXCAR ROBBER

WACO, May 28.—The arrest of Fred Jackson, a negro, and his alleged confession to local authorities is said to enable officers to uncover a series of box car burglaries on the M. K. & T. Railroad from Bell Mead to LaGrange, Texas. More than \$1,000 worth of stolen goods was recovered and the work is not yet completed. Eight other arrests have been made.

POLITICS LEAD TO KILLING

SOUR LAKE, Tex., May 28.—Of three men who were warned last Saturday to leave town, one is dead, another has left town, and the third was tarred and feathered last night. The last named is Joe J. Devere, justice of the peace, and he will leave town tonight.

Two preachers and twenty-three other citizens are still acting as deputies. The trouble is the result of a political fight to dissolve the city corporation, which is now pending before the State Supreme Court.

LOCALS LOSE AFTER GOOD LEAD

After taking a four run lead in the first and second inning, and after outplaying the San Angelo Bronchos in every position up to the sixth session, the Ballinger Bearcats again went down in defeat at Angelo Friday afternoon. The score was 13 to 11.

The game started out all Ballinger's way, the locals looping in two runs in the first inning and two in the second. San Angelo came in with three runs in the second, while the locals pegged the rubber for three scores in the fourth and maintained a nice lead up until the big break in the sixth inning when the Bronchos piled up eight runs, and took the lead. Ballinger rallied with four runs in the seventh, but the odds were against them, including the umpire, for the remainder of the game, and neither team scored after the seventh round.

Cantrell took the mound for Ballinger and held it throughout the game, while San Angelo used Billings, Treadway and Baugh, the Ballinger sluggers smashing both of the first two pitchers to the danger point.

A number of errors made by the local team came at critical stages of the game, while the Bronchos made their hits count for the most. The last three innings of the game were played under difficulties. A dust storm came up and both teams worked to a disadvantage, and this coupled with the action of the umpire in ruling Brown, Ballinger's new manager out of the park, because Brown registered a complaint against the ump's exceedingly rotten decisions, took the pep out of the locals and converted what loomed up as a big victory in the beginning to defeat in the end.

About fifty or sixty local fans motored to San Angelo to see the second game of the series with the Fort Concho boys, and notwithstanding the hoodoo still holds the Bearcats in its grip, the fans' faith in their team is still one hundred per cent perfect.

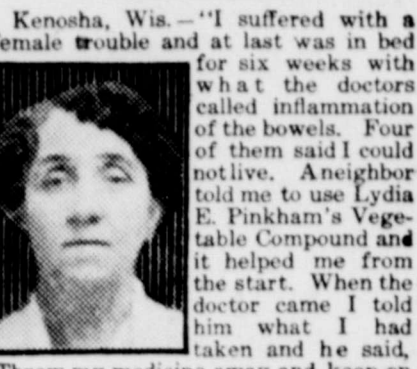
Score by innings table showing runs, hits, errors for Ballinger and San Angelo.
