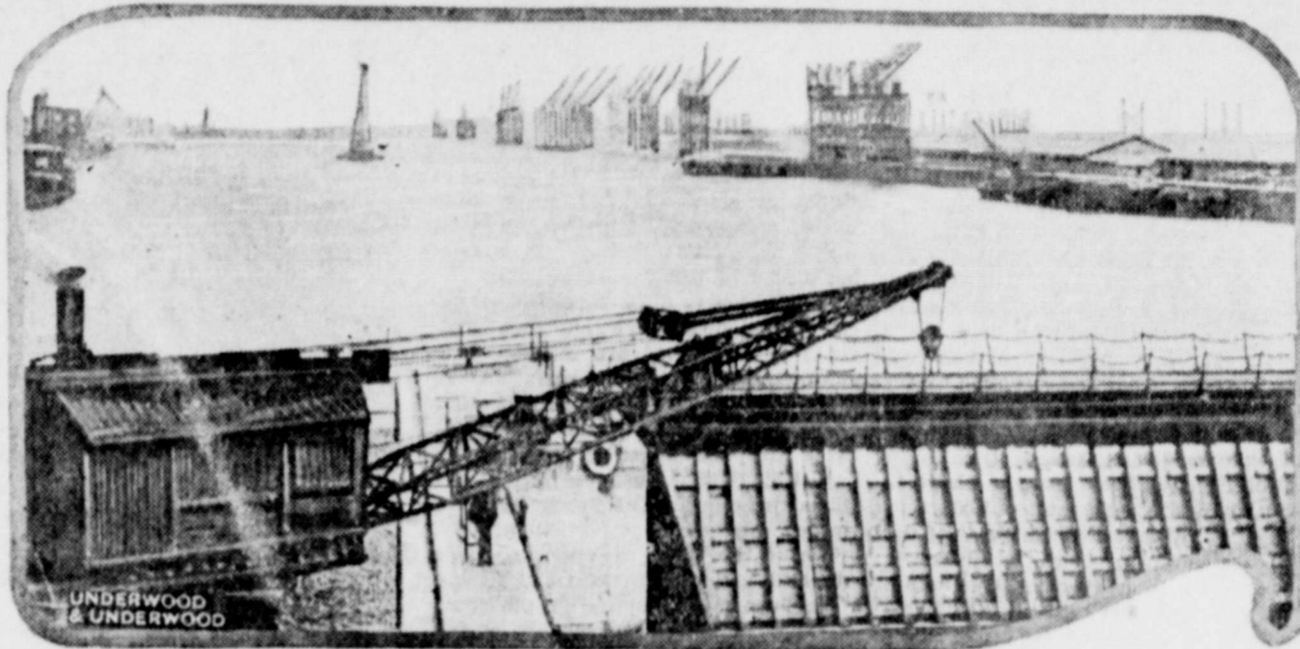

## TURKS KILL MANY PEOPLE

LONDON, June 3.—The Athens correspondent for the Exchange Telegraph Co. says that under date of Thursday, the Constantinople reports tell of new and frightful massacres of Christians at Samsun and Trebizond, on the Black Sea coast near Armenia. The reports say that the streets of the cities are strewn with Greeks, and many shops of the two cities ransacked. An American destroyer arrived at Samsun to protect Americans there, according to the first reports of the massacre received here.

## DEDICATES WHITE HOUSE OF SOUTH

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 3.—The South of the "sixties" and its children, dedicated here today one of its most precious shrines—the White House of the Confederacy.

Representatives from the states that withdrew from the Union in 1861 and sought four years of war to maintain the Confederate States of America, participated in the re-opening and dedication of the old mansion in which Jefferson Davis, as president of the confederacy first took up his residence.

Prominent among those present for the dedication were men who wearing the grey, sought to make permanent that government and to establish without question of right, the course decided on by Davis and his associates.

The dedication ceremonies consisted of a parade of the civic organizations of the city. The parade formed and led to the capitol, where Jeff Davis took the oath of office. The program calls for further exercises tonight.

## SMELTER BUSINESS IS PICKING UP NOW

TORREON, Coahuila, Mexico, June 3.—The smelter here is now receiving plenty of ore to maintain operation, the railroad facilities have been improved, and a number of mines not far from here having been opened recently. Silver ores are brought from the San Diego mines, near Velarde and lead-silver ores from San Juan de Guadalupe mines.

## FREED OF MURDER ON VISION PLEA

BERLIN, June 3.—Salomon Tellirian, an Armenian student, who last March shot and killed Talaat Pasha, former Grand Vizier and minister of finance of Turkey, was acquitted in assize court here today.

In making his defense, the Armenian asserted that his mother, who was murdered in an Armenian massacre in 1915, appeared to him in a vision and implored him to kill Talaat in revenge for the massacre of one hundred thousand Armenians. Talaat was killed in the suburbs of Berlin last March.

## HISTORIC RECORDS ARE FOUND IN WEBB CO.

LAREDO, Tex., June 3.—Deeds and other documents relating to ancient Spanish grants have been found in records of Webb county, some of which date back to the middle of the eighteenth century, and a number of the older buildings in Laredo, some of which only recently have been torn down to make room for newer structures, antedate the American revolution.

Strange and quaint customs are still followed by the Mexicans here and tourists evince interest in the ancient ways that survive the passing of the years. Laredo was founded in 1754, when a royal decree was issued, constituting it a town under Spanish rule. The name came from a city of Old Bastille, on the Bay of Biscay, not far from the noted old port of Santander. It is presumed that the commander of the Laredo district when it was founded was from Vizcaya and for that reason chose the name of one of his neighboring towns, if not his own home town. Laredo, which from its position on the Rio Bravo del Norte, as the Rio Grande still is known to many in Mexico, was an important outpost of northern Mexico.

## STIKERS REFUSE OFFER

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Negotiations of the marine engineers and the Shipping Board for a settlement of the wage dispute and disagreement over working conditions, was broken off today, declared W. S. Brown, president of the Marine Engineers Beneficial Association.

LONDON, June 3.—The executive body of the striking coal miners today finally rejected the government proposals for a settlement of the strike. The strikers will remain off duty and there seems to be little hope of settling the trouble as the government has failed in its efforts.

## TO REBUILD NEGRO QUARTERS

TULSA, Okla., June 3.—Martial law will be lifted in Tulsa this afternoon, it was announced by Governor Robertson. The announcement did not give the exact time, but said the city would be free from martial law before night.

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 3.—A thorough investigation of the race war at Tulsa by Attorney General Freezing was ordered by Gov. Robertson today.

TULSA, Okla., June 3.—Definite plans for building homes to shelter the thousands of negroes who were rendered destitute here Tuesday night and Wednesday by the burning of negro quarters in a race riot, are being worked out today by a civilian relief committee.

The business men of the city have pledged to erect as many houses as needed in the shortest time possible, and only the details for putting the building into action remain to be worked out. One plan proposed is to clear away the debris from the section levelled by the fire and erect permanent dwellings, costing from \$300 to \$1,000 each. Another scheme under consideration is to form a corporation, buy land in the Northern section of the city and build a new negro colony.

The number of known dead today remains at thirty, and martial law has been greatly modified, although the law remains in effect, but troops on duty had little to do except aid in relief work among the negroes.

## PEACE MEASURE REPORT READY

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The House foreign affairs committee, with the Democratic members dissenting, voted today to report the Porter resolution terminating the state of war between the United States and Germany and Austria-Hungary. The Republican members voted solidly to adopt the Porter measure as a substitute for the Knox resolution which was passed by the Senate repealing the declaration of war. The Democrats merely voted present when their names were called.

Chairman Porter announced that the resolution would be presented to the House next week for its immediate consideration. A minority report will be filed by the committee of Democrats.

## BYNG MADE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF CANADA

LONDON, June 3.—The appointment of Lord Byng, of Vimy, as Governor General of Canada, as successor to the Duke of Devonshire, was officially announced today.

Edgar Rasbury and Ralph Van-der-voort will leave tomorrow afternoon for Tampico, Mexico. Mr. Rasbury has been in Tampico for the last few weeks and is returning there to resume his work in a bank.

## TOWNS TO ADVERTISE BANKHEAD HIGHWAY

EL PASO, June 3.—Cities along the Southern border of New Mexico and Arizona, or better designated as those along the Southern route of the Bankhead National Highway from El Paso to San Diego California, have formed an organization to advertise the route to tourists. The cities will

tax themselves to advertise the sights and other advantages of the route and to provide free maps and logs.

From 75 to 90 per cent of the transcontinental travel across the West goes through Northern Arizona, highway officials here said. One reason given for this is that the Southern route is comparatively new, altho it is said to be better than the Northern highway.

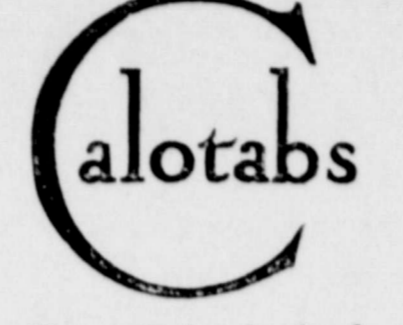

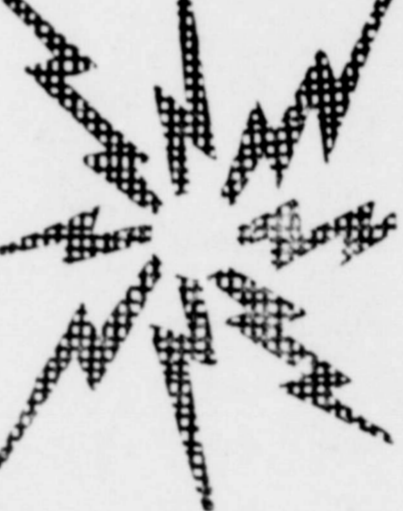

# BEAR CATS SWAT SWATTERS 12-1

Hank Baldrige redeemed himself of all baseball errors charged against him during his entire baseball career, when backed by a bunch of ozone clawing Bearcats, who pulled the apples out of the air, and from the wire entanglements bordering the battle field, held the Sweetwater Swatters to two little bingles and one scratch run.

If revenge has a sweetness, Hank enjoyed that sweetness to its full measure in the first game played here against the Swatters. He absolutely refused to show any mercy to the team which saw fit to hand him a pink slip not so very long ago. And in his onslaught he had the almost errorless support of his team mates.

"Pop Boy" Smith's Swatters worked behind Pitcher Word, and were as helpless as a Bearcat kitten in stopping the hits which the locals shot back from the rubber to the tune of an even dozen. Samuel Knight lifted one clear of the right field fence, while Fuller and Baldrige touched the Swatter twirler for two sacks and Langford landed out one for a three base pace. Word saw four hits marked up against him in the sixth with three runs resulting, and three hits and seven runs in the seventh, when he added to the faltering in the seventh four walks, and it was also in this session that Langford hit the ball for third station and Knight made the full trip.

Liles, the Bearcats' invincible left fielder, sent a thrill through fandom when he made a marathon dash to deep left garden and pulled the ball out of the ozone with a feather edge catch in one hand, robbing Word, who was first up in the fifth out of what looked good for a three bagger.

The visitors scored their consolation run in the fourth without a hit up to that period of the game, when Johnson failed to get out of the way of one of Baldrige's bullets, and took first, later advancing to second on an error, and finally making home on a scratch play, when Thrash went to first on fielder's choice.

The game was staged to the liking of the local fans, and the confidence which the fans already had in their club strengthened for greater support.

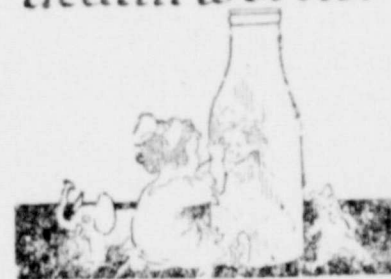

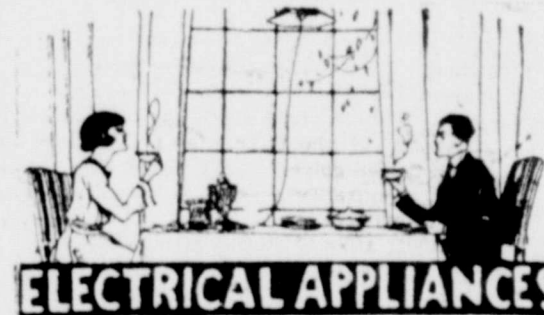

A very large part of the tax raised is paid to the teachers who teach the school. What do they do with it? Oh, they pay most of it for board, clothing and other necessities. That being done they have very little left. Many have hardly sufficient to maintain themselves thru the vacation."
