MILES COMING IN WITH HER QUOTA

Word was received from Miles today that the committee in charge of raising their quota for the irrigation survey secured \$300.00 in one hour's work. The quota for that city is \$500.00, and the committee states that the full amount will be raised. This is considered very encouraging, for the Miles people raised nearly \$10,000.00 for the Stanley survey, and it was at first feared that they might not care to invest further.

This splendid response on their part is a tribute to their faith in the irrigation project and in this entire section.

The local office of the Irrigation Association is addressing a thousand letters to the citizens of Bronte, Rowena, Sweetwater, San Angelo and Ballinger, outlining the situation that exists, and emphasizing the advantages that will accrue from the project when it is completed.

Letters are also being sent to many of the owners of large tracts within the district who live away from here. The Board of City Development of San Angelo has been asked to secure \$500.00 in that city. No response has been received yet, but it is believed that favorable action will be taken by the board.

Troubles are Adjusted at Meeting of W. T. League

Ranger withdrew from the West Texas Baseball League and Sweetwater was reinstated at a meeting of the league held in the club rooms at Ballinger Friday night.

The meeting was most largely attended and was one of the most important sport meetings ever held in this city, with about seventy-five representative citizens from Ranger, Sweetwater, Abilene and San Angelo present, in addition to the representatives of the local club, and newspaper correspondents representing various state dailies.

The meeting was called to order by Dick Hodges, of Abilene, vice-president of the league, in the absence of the president, J. Walter Morris, of Fort Worth. It was stated that Mr. Morris was in Oklahoma.

The question of Mr. Hodges' qualification to act as president of the league was brought up by N. Shaw Rives, president of the San Angelo club, the by-laws providing that stockholders in any club in the league could not serve as president. Mr. Hodges immediately transferred his stock in the Abilene club to Oscar Parker, of Abilene.

The call for the meeting was made unanimous when Mr. Rives signed the call, Ballinger, Abilene and Ranger having previously signed it.

The league adopted a motion limiting discussion to one member, or representative from each club, and only the president of the club, or his duly authorized representative be allowed to vote.

The league voted unanimously asking J. Walter Morris to tender his resignation as president of the league, and it was agreed that Mr. Hodges, vice president, act as president until Morris' successor is elected.

The acting vice-president was authorized to employ an auditor to audit the books of the league, and that President Morris be directed to turn over all books of the league, and that President Morris be directed to turn over all books and money to the vice-president.

Up to this time the Sweetwater club had not had a voice in the meeting, it having been ruled that Sweetwater was no longer a member of the league, by action of the president in ruling them out as a result of the controversy between San Angelo and Sweetwater as to who was the winner of the first half of the split season.

Mr. Hodges stated that this question was now before the meeting. Mr. Waggoman, a banker and prominent business man of Ranger, stated that Ranger wished to withdraw from the league in favor of Sweetwater, or in order that Sweetwater might remain in the league and be one of the four clubs composing the league. He stated that his town and the fans realized that it was impractical for Ranger to remain in the four club league with Ranger so far away from the circuit.

Judge Hamner, speaking for Sweetwater, stated that his club had nothing to say until the league rescinded the action of President Morris in ruling them out of the league. The league then voted unanimously in rescinding Morris' action and the presidents of the respective clubs went into executive session to discuss the controversy between San Angelo and Sweetwater.

After a lengthy discussion, and after both sides had been heard, it was unanimously agreed that San Angelo and Sweetwater meet at Abilene on July 23rd, and play one game to decide who won the first half. Both the clubs agreed to abide by the result of the game, and the ruling of President Morris in the matter was set aside.

The request of the Ranger club that they be permitted to withdraw was granted, it being unanimously agreed that Ran-

ger receive one-fifth the money on hand in the league treasury, after all bills had been paid to date, and that Ranger be allowed to retain her franchise and players. The president of the Ranger club stated that the players would be sold, and it is said in this connection that Ballinger is negotiating for their best pitchers.

In coming back into the league Sweetwater agrees to accept Ranger's standing, and the league will announce a new schedule Monday. The first games next week will be played with Ballinger at Abilene, and Sweetwater at San Angelo, and the locals will be away from home for nine games, three at Abilene, three at Sweetwater, and three at San Angelo.

After a little friction which prevailed in the meeting to begin with, perfect harmony reigned, and there was no personal feeling injected into the discussion, and the men representing the life of baseball in the West Texas League parted with a good will and optimistic outlook for a successful last half.

Among the prominent citizens from other towns here to attend the meeting were: Oscar Parker, banker; Dick Hodges, M. B. Hanks, manager of the Abilene Reporter, of Abilene; Judge N. K. Hamner and twenty-four other prominent business men of Sweetwater, N. S. Shaw Rives, banker, and Sam Crowther, hard ware merchant, John Brewer of the San Angelo Standard, and about a dozen other prominent citizens of San Angelo; Mr. Weeks, and other directors of the local club.

EVERY FAN MUST DO THEIR PART

It is now up to Ballinger to stand solidly behind the directors of the baseball club and see the club through to a successful finish. The club is not receiving the financial support it should have and must have, if it succeeds, and Ballinger remains on the map.

As a business proposition league baseball has put more life into this city than any amusement inaugurated here in the history of the city. It is not only the biggest advertisement ever given Ballinger, but many people are brought here, and there is something doing every day when the club is at home.

If everyone who is interested in the welfare of Ballinger, will do their part—even nothing more than buy a ticket, attend the games, the club will go through as a winner. We can't afford to fall down at this stage of the game.

The club is adding new players—strengthening the weak places, and will make a strong fight to win a sufficient number of the sixty games yet to be played to put us at the top in the last half, and then take the pennant in the championship series at the close of the season.

A committee will start out Monday to sell season tickets for the thirty remaining games to be played at home. If one hundred tickets are sold the directors will be in a position to keep the club going. If financial support is not guaranteed, Ballinger can expect to be found bringing up the rear. Let's play ball.

TEXAN ATTACKS TARIFF BILL

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The Democratic attack on the Fordney tariff bill was opened in the House today, with Representative Garner, of Texas, ranking Democrat on the ways and means committee, asserting that "there is not a Republican in the House who can distinguish between this bill and the Hayne-Aldrich bill." Mr. Garner pressed the Republicans for a statement regarding the amount of revenue the bill would produce but not one answered his challenge.

HAS LONG DISTANCE TALK

Tom Price, umpire for the West Texas League, who has been working on the local lot for the "at home" series of the locals, talked to his wife in Phoenix, Arizona, Friday night. The call was put thru in forty-five minutes, and Mr. Price stated that he could hear his wife, and she could hear him just as distinct as if they were conversing in the same room. The conversation was transmitted over about one thousand miles of wire. Mr. Price stated that it was the first time he had talked to Mrs. Price since leaving home last April, and he was just a "little homesick" and paid the price for a few minutes talk with the home folks.

FUNERAL FOR 1500 SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Gen. Pershing left today for Hoboken, New Jersey, to attend the funeral in that city tomorrow of 1500 American soldiers dead whose bodies have been returned from France. General Pershing will assist in the funeral ceremonies, being one of the principal speakers of the occasion.

JACK JOHNSON GETS FREEDOM

LEAVENWORTH, Kans., July 9.—Jack Johnson, former heavy-weight champion prize fighter of the world, was released from the federal prison here today after serving ten months of a year's sentence for violating the Mann act. The negro's attorney tried to effect his release in time to permit Johnson to attend the Dempsey-Carpentier fight, but the authorities refused to grant the pardon in time. Johnson made two month's time by good behavior. It is said that he made a good prisoner, and accepted his punishment with much humility.

PEACE PROSPECT FOR IRISH BRIGHT

LONDON, July 9.—Premier Lloyd George will accept Eamonn deValera's proposal to meet the republican leader for the purpose of discussing a basis for the formation of a conference, it was authoritatively announced today. The meeting will probably occur next week.

The fact that a truce between the crown forces and the Irish Sinn Fein would become effective Monday at noon is taken as an indication in some quarters to mean that the meeting will not long be delayed.

The government is subordinating all other problems for the question of Irish peace. The Irish office stated today that de Valera had issued instructions to his supporters to cease attacks upon civilians and discontinue military maneuvers. Instructions also were to prohibit the use of arms and abstain from interference with property and discontinue action which would likely cause disturbance of peace or which might necessitate military action.

DUBLIN, July 9.—Eamonn de Valera issued a manifesto today urging national unity during the peace negotiations with "unbending determination to endure all that is still necessary." With this is a warning coupled against "undue confidence in the result."

BELFAST, July 9.—New developments in the Irish political situation was received in Belfast today. The Belfast News captioned an editorial referring to the Eamonn deValera conference as "Trucking with the Murder Gang." The News said that it believed that universal opinion will consider such an agreement the most dishonorable in British history.

LONDON, July 9.—Both the government and Sinn Fein factions have ordered their supporters to cease all activities which might lead to further hostilities.

BULLET HOLE IN ENGINEER'S HEAD

HOUSTON, July 9.—Further evidence of foul play in connection with the explosion of an engine on the Southern Pacific rail road near Piasano yesterday, was received at the general offices of the system here today. The report received here stated that a bullet wound was found in the head of Engineer Bohman, who was thrown from the engine four or five miles before his engine blew up.

A brakeman on the train who started towards the engine when the train began to slow up, got within four car lengths of the engine when the explosion occurred. He stated that he saw a man running from the train.

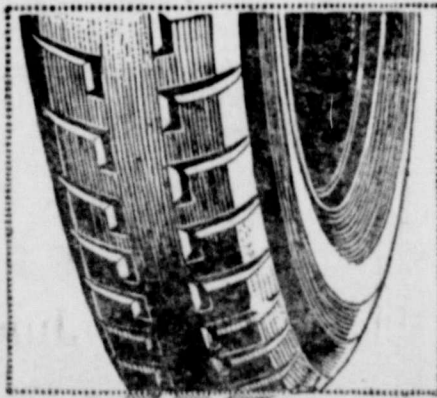

MACHINERY HERE FOR LIGHT PLANT

The Interstate Electric Corporation does not seem to be getting very far with its suit against the city to block the building of the municipal light plant. It was announced Saturday morning that one car of the equipment and a large local shipment of supplies for the city's plant had arrived, and that the contractors were pushing the movement of machinery and equipment as fast as possible and that actual construction work would begin at once.

The foreign corporation filed suit to stop the city from expending the money realized from the sale of the bonds, alleging that the bonds were illegally sold. As The Ledger understands the situation the city commission has contracted for the construction of the plant and the installation of the machinery, and the contractors are moving ahead with the work. The contractors seem to think that Ballinger money is as good as anybody's money, and the city has put over the deal in such way that the suit to stop same was instituted a little too late.

The company now supplying the city with lights and power has resorted to every way allowed under the law to stop the city in its work, and will no doubt make another attempt to tie the work up, but the city has the project well in hand, and acting under the advice of able attorneys they feel that no further delay will be caused.

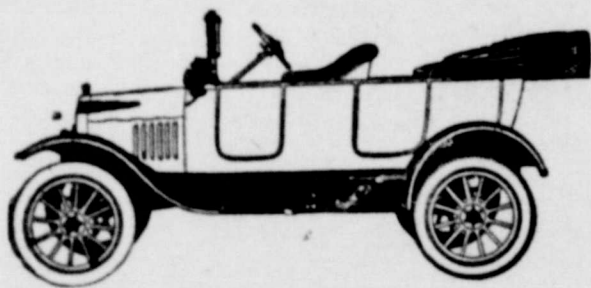
