## MOB HANGS MAN TO PUSH LIGHT PLANT WORK IN COURT YARD

HATTIESBURG, Miss., July 23.—Casey Jones, a white man, who was recently convicted of the murder of Mrs. J. S. Moseley, and sentenced to be hanged on July 18th, but whose case was pending on appeal in the Supreme Court, was taken from the jail here by a mob early today and hanged in the court house yard.

## DROPS DEAD FEEDING HOGS

Joe Tegal, a pioneer citizen and successful farmer of the Rowena-Offen country, died suddenly Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Mr. Tegal had been about his usual work during the day and was feeling as well as usual. He was feeding his hogs when he suddenly dropped dead. Physicians attributed death to rupture of a blood vessel on the brain.

Deceased was 64 years of age, and had been a resident of this county for nearly thirty years. He came here when land was cheap, and when farming was a side line, the country being a stock raising country. He settled South of Ballinger and has prospered with the progress of the country, and raised a family here. He is survived by a wife and several children.

Undertaker Ostertag was called out to the Tegal home following the death and embalmed the body, preparing it for burial. The funeral was held at nine o'clock Saturday morning and the remains laid to rest in the Rowena cemetery.

## RECEIVES NEWS OF BROTHER'S DROWNING

I. M. Cumbie and sister, Miss Lena, of Bronte, passed through Ballinger Friday afternoon, in response to a message stating that their brother, Rev. Drue Cumbie had been drowned. Up to the time they left Ballinger the body had not been recovered from the gulf where Rev. Cumbie and seven others were swept away by the undertow.

Rev. Cumbie was born and raised at Bronte. For the past several years he had been living at Dallas and other places, and at the time of his death he was assistant pastor of the Baptist church at Breckenridge. He and his wife were members of a party of about forty from Breckenridge who went to Palacios to attend the Baptist encampment. He has a child buried at Dallas, and the brother and sister who passed thru Ballinger Friday stated that it was probable his remains would be buried there, if they were recovered.

As The Ledger goes to press the Swatter-Broncho game stood 5 to 3 in favor of the Swatters.

While the attorneys for the Interstate Electric Corporation announced that they would appeal the case in which they lost out in the local court Thursday, the city commission is pushing the building of the new municipal light plant. The court refused to grant the injunction and there is nothing in the way to prevent the city from going ahead with its work. The contractors are expected here at an early date to begin actual construction work. Three or four car loads of the material has arrived, and the beauty part about the proposition is that the city has paid for the installing of the new plant and has money in the treasury.

An idea of how the citizens feel about the proposition is reflected in the volunteer service offered the city. A number of citizens have volunteered to help in any way they can in carrying on the work.

The city commission has a large majority of the light and power consumers under contract to use the city electricity when it is ready to be turned on, and loyalty to the city's interest will no doubt exert itself when the new plant is put in operation.

## SWATTERS TAKE TWO FROM CATS

While losing two games to the Sweetwater Swatters, the Bearcats returned home Friday night not the least bit discouraged, but with an optimistic spirit which will win.

## NEFF SHOWS UP CUMBIE'S BODY STILL MISSING

AUSTIN, July 23.—The first item of Gov. Neff's charges of graft was revealed to the appropriations committee today when State Fire Marshal Tilley was asked regarding the padding of expense accounts in his department. The item of graft in this instance as submitted by the governor showed that six fire inspectors had padded their accounts to the amount of approximately \$17.50 each.

## FORMER CITIZEN GETS IN BAD

WICHITA FALLS, July 23.—Dillon Dannelley, grocer of Burk Burnett, formerly of Dallas, was bound over to await action of the grand jury by Justice of the Peace R. V. Gwinn, under bond of \$10,000. This bond was set following a preliminary hearing on two statutory charges.

Dannelley's two daughters and his wife stepmother of the daughters, testified for the state. Dannelley pleaded his own case and cross-examined the witnesses. It appeared from the method of his cross-questioning that he branded the entire affair as a frame-up to have him shipped out of the country.

Dannelley was the man who ten days ago received a warning from the K. K. K. at Burk Burnett to leave town and when placed under arrest a mob congregated at the city hall demanding the prisoner be turned over to them. One of the defendant's daughters who testified against him is 17 years old and the other is 15.

## PASTOR OUT OF TOWN

A telegram was received from Rev. W. C. Kunze, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Saturday afternoon, stating that he would not return home until next Wednesday. Rev. Kunze and wife are attending the Presbyterian encampment at Kerrville. There will be no preaching at the Presbyterian church Sunday, but Sunday school and Christian Endeavor will meet at the usual hours.

PALACIOS, Tex., July 23.—The body of Rev. Drue Cumbie had not been recovered up to one o'clock this afternoon. A searching party continued to drag the bayou in the vicinity where the party was drowned. The seven other bodies which were recovered will be sent to their homes for burial today.

Rev. Cumbie was assistant pastor of the Baptist church at Breckenridge. He was a member of a party of forty Breckenridge people who came to Palacios in a special car as the guests of Cliff M. Caldwell, a wealthy oil producer of Breckenridge.

## TO ABANDON SIX ARMY CANTONMENTS

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Six army cantonments will be abandoned by the War Department, Secretary Weeks announced today. Two of the camps to be abandoned are Camp Devens, Mass., and Camp Meade, Maryland.

## MEXICAN OIL FIELD BURNING

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 23.—Four thousand men are working at top speed on six hours relays, striving to prevent further spread of an oil fire which has been burning since Wednesday, and which up to date has caused a damage estimated at several millions of dollars, in the Amatlan fields in Mexico, according to advices received by the Pittsburg oil companies.

## IRISH HOPES OF PEACE BRIGHTEN

LONDON, July 23.—The outstanding feature of the government's Irish peace proposals is a concession of fiscal autonomy, extending the right of self government, it was learned today from high authority. The position of Ulster is amply secured in the proposal.

Dispatches received from Dublin state that the hope of settlement is rapidly increasing in that city. Gen. Smuts, South African premier, is expected to leave for Ireland early next week to place his services at the disposal of de Valera and Craig, during the critical consideration of the proposals for peace.

## SEEKING MAN IN ARIZONA DESERT

PHOENIX, Ariz., July 23.—Searchers in the vicinity of where John Knight's car was found today found the charred fragments of papers known to have belonged to Knight.

DALLAS, July 23.—John J. Knight is well known in Dallas and Wichita Falls oil circles. He left Dallas on June 29th with Pickens Burton, a prominent Dallas automobile man. Burton left Knight at El Paso and returned to Dallas on July 2nd. Later he received a telegram from Knight stating that he was having a good time in El Paso. Dallas police say that Knight was last seen in Phoenix on July 15th.

## PHOENIX, Ariz., July 23.—

Sheriffs' posses on horseback are today searching the desert for J. J. Knight, of Dallas, Texas, whose automobile was found stuck in the sand sixty miles Northwest of Phoenix last Sunday. No trace of the man has been found, and it is feared that he met with foul play.

## WOUND FATAL ABILENE ATTY.

ABILENE, July 23.—Attorney Clint Chambers, who was shot last Wednesday died today. Officials stated that Harry Carter, who surrendered following the shooting, will probably be held Monday.

Chambers was representing Mrs. Carter, who had filed suit for a divorce against Carter. Carter had been cooking in a local cafe and he went to the office of Chambers and using a .45 Colts automatic, fired six shots, three taking effect. Chambers begged the man not to shoot him, stating that he had not done anything to be murdered for, while Carter, cursing him, fired the six shots at close range, as Chambers crouched behind his desk trying to get out of range of the bullets. Carter threatened to kill a bystander who plead with him not to shoot the lawyer.

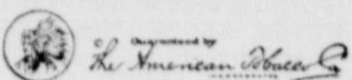

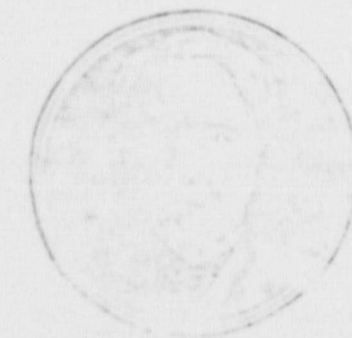


**WINTERS IS WITH US**
