B'WOOD MAN IS MURDERED

KINGMAN, Ariz., July 26.—Lem Smith, of Brownwood, Texas, whose body was found by the road side nine miles East of Topock yesterday, was shot in the back of the head, according to word received here today. A man by the name of West, also of Brownwood, who passed thru Kingman last Saturday night with Smith, is missing.

BROWNWOOD, July 26.—News of the finding of the body of Lem Smith near Kingman, Arizona, was received here Monday. Smith and a man by the name of West left here about two weeks ago for a trip overland in a Ford car, to points West. Smith had been living here for quite a while and had a good reputation. West came here a short time ago and formed a friendship with Smith, and the two planned a trip West.

Smith wired a local bank Friday for \$100, and later, some time Saturday, he sent a telegram for the balance of the money he had on deposit here, amounting to about \$300. He directed that the money be sent to him at Magdalena, New Mexico, and officers are now watching the postoffice at Magdalena, where it is expected that West will be arrested when he calls for Smith's mail.

MINERAL WELLS TO SUE W. T. LEAGUE

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram Sunday stated that the West Texas League had been made defendant in a suit filed in the district court by the Mineral Wells baseball club. The plaintiff's petition asks for recovery of \$1,000, which it is alleged, had been paid to the West Texas League as a guarantee to the club's fulfillment of its contract.

The plaintiff alleges that in the spring of 1921, it paid into the treasury of the league, \$800, and later paid an additional sum, and that at the time it withdrew it had \$1,000 on deposit with the league.

The facts in the case, as related by local citizens who attended the meeting of the league at Cisco, and purchased the Mineral Wells franchise, are that the contract of sale provided that Ballinger get the entire holdings of the Mineral Wells club, including players, uniforms, balls, bats, etc., and the deposit which the club had with the league.

Those who are familiar with the facts declare that the Mineral Wells club cannot recover the deposit they had with the league, as it was a part of the assets of the club which Ballinger received.

TURKS LOSE 75 PER CENT ARMY

LONDON, July 26.—The Turkish Nationalist government, owing to Greek advances in Asia Minor, has been obliged to transfer their seat of government to Sivas, according to dispatches received here today from Constantinople.

The Greeks are invading the territory held by the Turks.

ATHENS, July 26.—The Greek official agency in this city announces that the Turkish losses in killed and wounded and captured prisoners and missing, amount to seventy-five per cent of their entire fighting forces in Asia Minor.

COME TO COURT WHEN CONVENIENT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. July 25.—Judge Smith in an opinion rendered today on the question of the arrest of Governor Small of Illinois, for embezzlement held that warrants should be served on the governor, but that the executive should be permitted to appear at his own convenience within a reasonable time.

FEDERAL AID TO STOP PELLAGRA

WASHINGTON, July 26.—President Harding today sent a message to Congress asking for legislation authorizing the war finance corporation to handle the funding railroad indebtedness and to increase credits for financing agricultural exports.

Mr. Harding stated that there were no "moral" obligations upon the government to aid in either measure. He commended the war finance corporation as an agency of great value in restoring economic conditions. The president declared that no additional money would be asked of Congress and no additional taxes incurred.

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Federal agencies, acting at President Harding's direction, are working with emergency speed today to relieve conditions in a large section of the Southern cotton belt, which is reported by the public health service to threaten a near state of famine, coupled with a widespread epidemic of pellagra.

MAN TRIES KU KLUX ON SELF

AUSTIN, July 26.—The mystery surrounding the alleged beating, binding and gagging of Earl Peters last week near Chandler, was solved today by county officers, who announced that Peters, in a sworn statement, absolved all persons suspected of connection with the affair. Peters declared that he walked into the country, bruised and gagged himself. He gave no motive for the act.

TWO AMENDMENTS ARE ADOPTED

Incomplete returns indicate that the voters of Texas, though few in number, voted for adopting the amendment increasing the Confederate pension tax from five cents to seven cents. This amendment has a small majority lead, and may yet be lost, but forecasters predict that it has been adopted.

The other amendment which was adopted, carrying by a big majority, was the suffrage amendment, giving equal rights to men and women.

W. T. Garner returned Monday from Bell county, where he went to accompany his family on a visit. The family remained for a longer visit in Killeen. Mr. Garner stated that a good rain fell at Santa Anna Monday, but it did not extend very far this way. Crops in Bell county are good, according to Mr. Garner.

AUSTIN, July 26.—An investigation by a joint committee of the legislature, composed of five representatives and three senators, of the charges made by the governor of graft irregularities and extravagance, was ordered today when the Senate adopted the House concurrent resolution.

AUSTIN, July 26.—The House started to work today by adopting a concurrent resolution by Representative Satterwhite and Representative Quaid, proposing that mismanagement and misapplication of funds, graft, and padding of expense accounts in certain departments as complained of by Governor Neff in evidence submitted the finance committees, be thoroughly investigated. The resolution provides for five representatives and three senators to form a committee to investigate the charges and report back to the present session. The committee will be empowered with the same authority as a district court, and witnesses will be summoned and evidence taken. The resolution goes to the Senate.

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JOY RIDERS OR MELON RUSTLERS

Some one opened fire on a bunch of boys in South Ballinger Sunday night, and two reports were going the rounds yesterday. One story said that the boys were out joy riding, and stopped to explore a melon patch, leaving the motor to their car running, and after going a few steps from the car discovered a man crouching in the weeds. They made a break for the car and were fired at from three different directions. Shot rained about them, and the top to the car was perforated, and one boy suffered a slight wound in the neck.

The boys reported to the officers, giving the names of parties whom they thought did the shooting, but no arrest has been made.

Another report says that the boys were raiding a melon patch when someone—presumably the owner of the field, opened a little barrage and the boys beat a hasty to the rear march.

BRONCHS LOSE; MGR. PROTESTS

Manager Luke Robinson filed a formal written protest at the close of the sixth inning in the game here Monday between the Bearcats and the Bronchos. Robinson based his protest on the failure of the score keeper to score McKay, who came home while Truesdale was being thrown out at second. Truesdale was the third man out. San Angelo made two runs in this inning on three hits, and with two men down, and McKay having singled and gone to second later on Earnshaw's error, Truesdale was given first base on balls. Higginbotham hit to right field and made first. Langford fielded the ball and threw it to second and Earnshaw touched out Truesdale as he overran second base, making the third man out, while McKay was skipping from second to home plate, and according to the score keeper McKay did not reach home before Truesdale was thrown out. The umpire watching the play at second base did not see the position of McKay when Truesdale was out. Following is the text of the protest as filed by Robinson and forwarded by the score keeper to the president of the league:

"Game July 25th between San Angelo and Ballinger played under protest, because McKay was not allowed to score from second base on a clean hit. The ball was played to second to catch Truesdale who was on first when ball was hit. Truesdale overran second base and was tagged for the third out. We think McKay was entitled to score. Umpire Aiken would not make a decision.

"Luke Robinson."

The Bearcats won the game 7 to 3. Had the score been credited it would have been 7 to 4. Should be president of the league rule in the protest in favor of the Bronchos the game will be played over. The umpire stated that it was up to the score keeper to say whether McKay scored before Truesdale was called out and the score keeper said that McKay did not reach home in time to be counted.

A large crowd of fans saw the locals take the Bronchos for a good cleaning in the first game of the series. Hank Baldridge was in good form for the first five sessions, holding the visitors to five hits, and scoreless. In the sixth Hank was relieved by Ferguson when the Bronchos touched him for three hits, filling the seats.

Burleson held the locals to a total of nine hits, but three doubles in the third coupled with one error netted the Bearcats three runs, and one double and a single coupled with one error in the fifth netted two runs. The first score for the locals in the second was made on one walk and one hit, and the last run in the seventh was due to one single and a double.

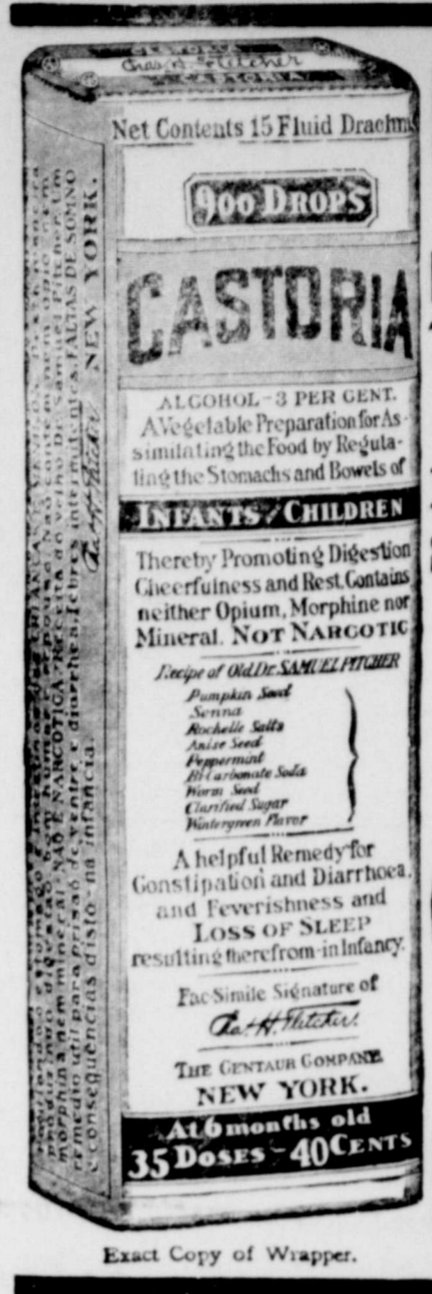

MOTHER IN JAIL BABY ADOPTED

(San Angelo Standard) Merciful fate has intervened on behalf of little Helen Hall and rescued her from the cruel and inhuman treatment which she received at the hands of Buster and Ruby Russell. The little girl was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Walling at a juvenile hearing before Judge Charles T. Paul of the county court Monday morning.

Mrs. Ruby Russell, mother of the child, waived the hearing and relinquished all claims to the child in favor of Mr. and Mrs. Walling. The mother of the child and her husband, Buster Russell, are now serving out a sentence to one year's imprisonment in the county jail upon conviction of a charge of aggravated assault in connection with the beating of the child.

It was a touching scene enacted in the courtroom this morning following the proceedings when the little girl took leave of Mrs. Pat Conway, motherly jailer, in whose care she has been for several months. The little child seemed to be happy in contemplation of her new mother and father, but clung to Mrs. Conway as if she were leaving the only person she had ever loved. Tears filled the eyes of the jailer as she took leave of her little charge.

As the mother of the child left the courtroom to return to her cell at the jail she asked the child whom she said she had mistreated unconsciously while under the spell of an epileptic attack, to kiss her good-bye. Instead of bidding her mother farewell the little girl clung closer to the only mother she had ever known and steadfastly refused to kiss her mother. Sympathy for the little girl has been voiced by persons in distant towns. A number of letters from persons over the state expressing sympathy for the little girl and offering to give her a home have been received by the local authorities.


