## YOUNG FARMER DIES SUDDENLY

Paul Schwertner, son of Frank Schwertner, and a prominent young farmer of this county, died suddenly at the Halley & Love sanitarium at nine o'clock Wednesday morning. He underwent an operation for appendicitis last week and was ready to be carried to his home when he had an unexpected attack of heart trouble and suddenly died.

Deceased was thirty-four years old, and is survived by a wife and three children and other relatives. A brother lost his life in the world war. Mr. Schwertner had been a citizen of this county for many years, coming here with his parents when a boy, and the family is numbered among the pioneers of the Rowena country. The death robs the county of a good citizen, the wife of a good husband and the children of a good father.

The remains were removed to the home in the Baker Flat community near the Cross Roads school, and the funeral will be held Saturday afternoon burial taking place in the Rowena cemetery.

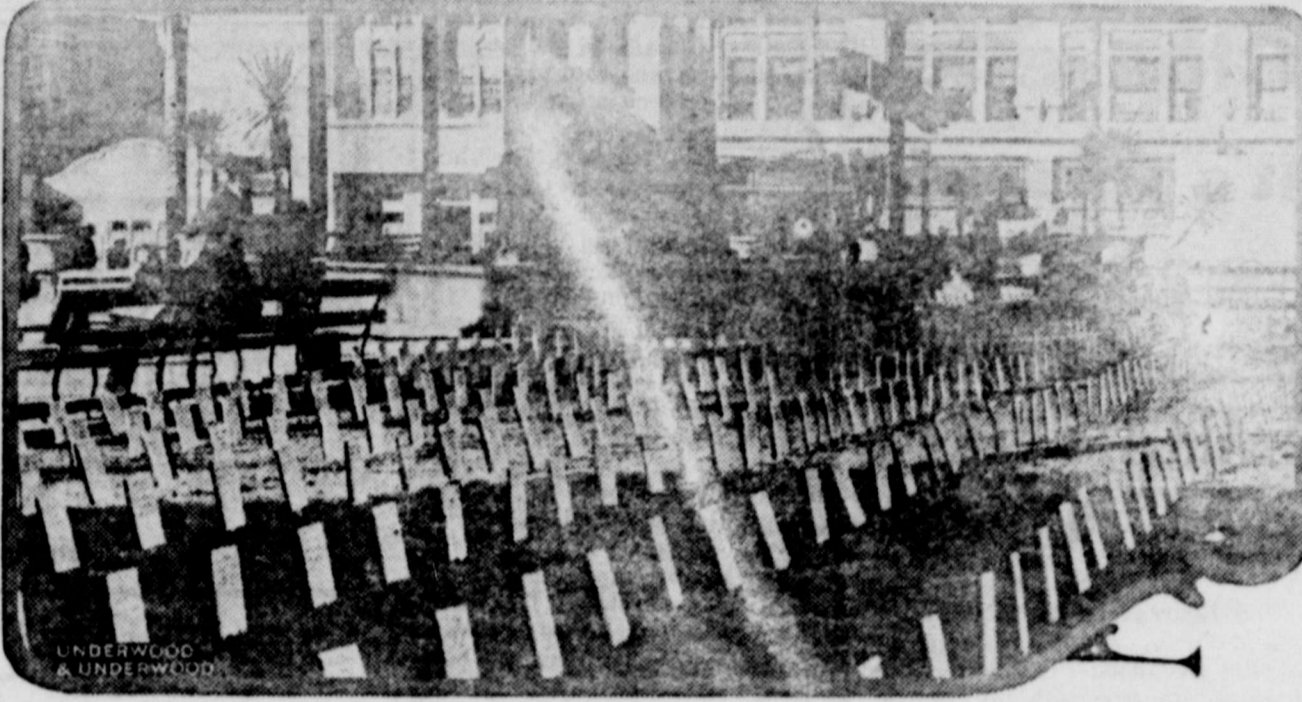

## Fred Boswell Drowns While Bathing In Colorado River

Fred Boswell, age ten years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Boswell, is the first to pay the price with his life for the lack of a public swimming pool at Ballinger.

Fred was drowned in the Colorado river about one hundred feet from where Elm Creek empties into the Colorado river, about five-thirty Tuesday afternoon.

His body was recovered from the river within about thirty minutes from the time he went down, but all efforts to resuscitate life failed, which impressed those who worked to save the boy's life with the need of a pulmotor, another thing Ballinger is short on.

The little boy and a companion went to the river to go in swimming some time after the baseball game started. They were seen around the gate at the ball park, and it was only a short time later that Fred's companion came back to the park breathless and called for help. A bunch of men from the park rushed to the scene of the drowning and recovered the body within a few minutes, the water where the boy lost his life being four or five feet deep, and barely over the boy's head where he went down.

Fred undressed and plunged into the water before his companion undressed, and he went down almost immediately, according to the companion. The companion stated that a Mexican came along about the time Fred drowned, and he tried to get the Mexican to help save Fred, but the Mexican said "water too deep," and he would not make any effort to rescue the drowning boy.

The remains were carried to the home of deceased on Ninth Street, and prepared for burial by the Lankford Undertaking Co., and it was later announced that the funeral would be held at five o'clock Wednesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. E. D. Messer, pastor of the Nazarene church, and interment made in Evergreen Cemetery.

Fred was the youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Boswell, and the tragic death brings to that home a cloud of sorrow and grief which humane words can not remove. Two brothers, Oscar, of this city, and Ed. of Fort Worth, and two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Crisco, and Mrs. Rosalee

## PROPOSE TAX ON AMUSEMENT

AUSTIN, July 27.—Representative Nelson introduced a bill in the House today proposing to levy a one cent tax on each ticket to amusement places in Texas. Such revenue if created would go to the rural school fund.

Governor Neff sent another special message to the legislature today again recommending a strict economy in all departments and the abolishment of overlapping and duplications of departments and useless offices. The governor asked that all appropriations be itemized, and concluded his message by saying, "The eyes of Texas are upon us."

## JAPAN ACCEPTS HARDING INVITATION

WASHINGTON, July 27.—A communication from Tokio is believed to contain a formal acceptance by Japan of President Harding's invitation to participate in the international discussion of the Far Eastern questions and the question of disarmament. The communication reached the state department today.

## TURKS PLEAD FOR PEACE

ATHENS, July 27.—Information from all sources indicates that resistance of the Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor has been completely broken, the Greek official news agency declared today.

DALLAS, July 27.—All courts closed here today in respect for the late Judge James Melville Talbot, Justice of the Fifth Supreme Judicial District Court, of Civil Appeals, who died suddenly Monday. Burial will take place here late today.

## TEXAS SECOND STOCK VALUES

DALLAS, July 27.—Texas ranks second in value of livestock and third in value of farm property, the Texas Industrial Congress announced today. Iowa outranks Texas in livestock values and Iowa and Illinois are the only states leading Texas in farm property value. That is due largely to the higher grade of livestock in Iowa as compared with Texas, and to the better improved farm property in Iowa and Illinois.

### CREATES ZONES ARMY SUPPLIES

WASHINGTON, July 27.—President Harding today signed an executive order to co-ordinate purchasing for the army and the navy shipping board and to permit the transfer of surplus supplies from one government agency to another. It is understood that the order had been suggested by Secretary Dawes of the budget bureau and the plan is to divide the country into zones corresponding to the army corps areas and provides for a purchasing agent in each area, all working under the purchasing supervisor at Washington.

### TWO AMERICANS FALL IN COBLENZ

COBLENZ, Germany, July 27.—Two American aviators, Lieutenant Carl Derby Gunter, of Frankfort, Ind., and Corporal L. O. Rogers, of Hillsboro, Texas, were killed yesterday when their airplane crashed at Weissenthurn Field near here.

### DEMANDS RUSSIA FREE AMERICANS

RIGA, Russia, July 27.—An official demand by Secretary Hughes for a release of American prisoners in Russia, was delivered by Consul Albrecht to the Bolshevik minister here last night.

### MEXICO ACTS ON OIL DEPOSITS

MEXICO CITY, July 27.—The Chamber of Deputies last night voted down a request by President Obregon that he be granted extraordinary powers to adjust Article 27 of the constitution of Mexico, which nationalized the oil deposits of Mexico. The Senate almost unanimously voted to grant the request.

### TAX REVISION FOR PERMANENT ACT

WASHINGTON, July 27.—It is understood that a virtual agreement was reached at a White House dinner conference last night for the Senate consideration of a tax revision before a consideration of the Senate permanent tariff bill.

Representative Cox of Taylor county, made the motion to table the resolution, stating that at this time he was neither commending nor condemning the Ku Klux Klan, but that he thought the resolution out of place.

He gave a deliberate answer to all questions, and reiterated the statement that the K. K. K. is lawless because it is alleged to do its work under disguise.

## REV. DRUE CUMBIE BURIED, BRONTE

Dr. George Truitt passed thru Ballinger Wednesday afternoon en route to his home at Dallas. He had been to Bronte to conduct to service at the funeral of Rev. Drue Cumbie, who lost his life by drowning while in bathing near Palacios last Thursday. Dr. Alvin Swadell and family went to Bronte Wednesday morning to attend the funeral and Dr. Truitt accompanied them back to Ballinger and caught the afternoon train for his home.

The remains of Rev. Cumbie were laid to rest at Bronte at ten o'clock Wednesday morning with impressive ceremonies, and one of the largest crowds attending that ever attended a funeral in West Texas. Friends from neighboring towns and for miles around gathered at Bronte to pay a tribute of respect and love to the good man who was born and raised in Bronte.

The body of Rev. Cumbie was recovered late Sunday, after a continuous search of three days, and was shipped to Bronte for burial, accompanied by his brother, mother, and sister, and a party of friends from different points who were at Palacios with Rev. Cumbie, or who went there when they received news of his death. Rev. Cumbie was pastor of the Baptist church at Breckenridge, and was a member of about forty Breckenridge people who were attending the Baptist encampment at Palacios, going in a special car as the guests of a wealthy Breckenridge of man.

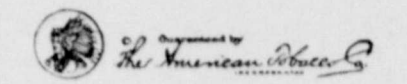

**BEARCATS PLAY SHUT OUT BALL**

The Bearcats made it a shut-out—2 to 0, against the San Angelo Bronchos Tuesday and chalking up two straight games of the present series. Cantrell held the visitors hitless to the eighth, when Manager Robinson nailed a good one, counting for two bags, tried to make it to the third sack and lost when Liles recovered the ball in deep left, passed it to Briscoe who shot it to Knight in time to tag Robinson off third base. This was the nearest the Broncos came to scoring, no Nag ever getting to third during the game. The locals only made two little bobbles, and they did not count for anything, as the game was air tight throughout on the Bearcat side.

Coeke, a new twirler for the first time and did some for the first time, and did some clever firing across home plate himself, holding the locals to eight hits, several of that number being bunts, bingles, or scratch hits, and the perfect support behind Coeke prevented the locals from hanging up figures above the naught mark, except in one inning, when Speegle and Briscoe went around on runs started by safe hits. In the third Speegle and Briscoe led off with singles. Brown hit to pitcher and was thrown out at first, advancing both Speegle and Briscoe. Knight came up with a hit, scoring Ballinger's entire tallies for the game.

Coeke was touched for three hits in a row in the eighth inning, Brown, Langford and San Knight getting singles, filling the stations, after Speegle and Briscoe had been thrown out, the first on first base and the latter on a fly to left field. It looked bad for Coeke, but the third out relieved the situation for the Broom Tails when Earnshaw drove a fly to Robinson's mit.

The game was featured by sensational plays at different stations on the field, Briscoe bringing down the grand stand when he leaped across the infield and scooped up a hot line drive which had cut thru the pitcher's box. The fielding of the visitors in the outer garden also robbed the locals of a number of scores.

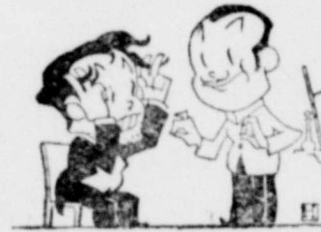

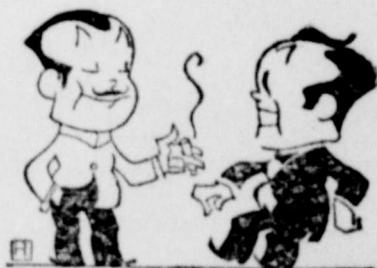

**KERRIGAN IN MYSTERY

The detective gives him an imitation, follows him to the headquarters of the thieves, and effects a capture of the entire gang.

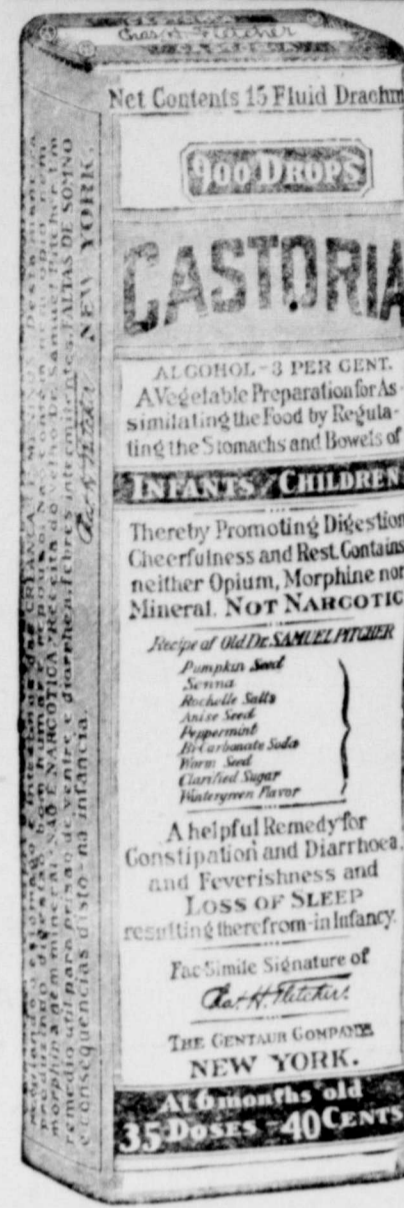

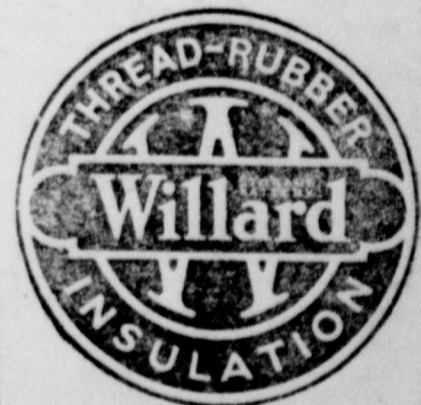

**AN ORDINANCE**

Fixing and defining the fire limits of the City of Ballinger, and providing a penalty for violations of this ordinance.

Be It Ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger, Texas.

Sec. 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons or for any officer, agent or employee of any corporation, to erect or construct or cause to be erected or constructed on Blocks 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in said City of Ballinger, or on any portion of the land embraced and included in any of said City Blocks, any building or structure of any character, of wood or other combustible material, or any building or structure with walls of wood, covered with iron or tin, or any additions or repairs made contrary to the provisions hereof, erected or made after the passage of this ordinance, to remain on any of said blocks above enumerated, or each and every day that any person or persons shall allow any building moved from one part of said prescribed fire limits to another part of same, or moved into and upon said limits from elsewhere, shall constitute a separate offense, and the person so offending shall be liable for each day to the penalty prescribed in Section 5.

Sec. 7. It is provided however, that awnings to be hereafter constructed over the sidewalks on any portion of the above described blocks comprising the fire districts, may be constructed of uniform material now in common use within said fire limits, in case a written permit to so construct such awnings shall first be obtained from the City Commission of the said City of Ballinger.

Sec. 8. It is further provided that nothing in this Ordinance shall prevent the City Commission at a regular meeting there-

of from granting building, addition and repair permits for the purpose of erecting buildings of other material than that specified herein, on the lots situated South of the alleys on Blocks Nos. 16-17 and 18 and fronting on Strong Avenue.

The rule requiring more than one reading is hereby expressly suspended and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

Passed and approved this the 26th day of July, 1921.
