MOTION FOR NEW TRIAL IS DENIED

District Judge Woodward heard the motion of the defense for a new trial in the Boland murder case Saturday morning, and after hearing argument from the counsel for defendant, the court overruled the motion. Defense immediately gave notice of appeal, and asked the court to fix bond. The court fixed bond at \$7,500. Judge Woodward passed sentence on Boland, and remanded him to jail pending the action of the court of criminal appeals, or until bond for the convicted man is made and approved by the court.

The court also passed final judgment in the Graves divorce case giving the children to the mother, Mrs. Pearl Graves, and also decreeing property rights to Mrs. Graves, save and except personal property of defendant and defendant's interest in community property which will be adjusted by compromise.

Court adjourned for the term at eleven thirty Saturday morning.

KILLS RATTLESNAKE ON EIGHTH STREET

Dr. C. W. Cheatham missed placing his No. 9 on a rattlesnake by about four inches as he was coming to town Saturday morning. The snake was coiled and ready for business near the sidewalk at the home of Mrs. Jno. I. Guion on Eighth Street. The snake had evidently been loitering around that vicinity of Eighth Street for some time, as it was covered with dust. The snake was put to death, and for fear that some of his friends might think that he had been seeing snakes, Dr. Cheatham plucked the rattles from the reptile and brought them to town. The snake had six rattles and one button.

KRAFT BREAKS HITTING RECORD

FT. WORTH, Sept. 17.—Clarence Kraft, Ft. Worth's first baseman, set a new hitting record for the Texas League when he increased his hits to 205. This includes Wednesday's game. The previous record for the greatest number of hits in the Texas League for any one season was 200.

MAY BUY BIG HUN BALLOON

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The procurement of a dirigible of the Zeppelin type from Germany, if possible, to replace the ZR-2 and the continuation of the construction of the ZR-1 now under building at Lakehurst, N. J., was recommended today to President Harding, Secretaries Weeks and Denby, by the official national advisory committee on aeronautics.

NAZARENE REVIVAL BEGINS TOMORROW

Rev. J. C. Wells and Mrs. Bessie Williams, the Nazarene evangelist, arrived at noon Saturday and the revival will begin at the Nazarene church tomorrow. Rev. Wells is here to conduct a business conference of the church tonight, and will remain over a day or two for the revival. The singer, Mrs. Beasley, will arrive later for the revival.

HOTEL MUST PAY TAX ON LODGING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—Under an amendment to the House tax bill adopted today by the Senate finance committee, hotels will be required to pay a tax of ten per cent in excess of five dollars per day charged transients for single rooms and in excess of eight dollars charged for double rooms.

LINN GALE HELD ON GOVERNOR'S ISLAND

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Linn A. E. Gale, whose communist activities in Mexico attracted considerable attention and who is now being held on Governor's Island on a charge of evading the draft, has renounced his radical beliefs, according to reports coming from the island. Military authorities said that no official cognizance had been taken of Gale's promises to sever his connection with the radical movement.

IRRIGATION BILL BEING FOSTERED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Henry M. Eaton, Washington representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, announced today that detailed plans to push the Smith-McNary irrigation bill thru congress would be placed before the executive officers of the Western Irrigation Congress.

This is the bill that has the official indorsement of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Irrigation Bureau, headed by Hon. J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls. Former Governor Sperry of Utah, now commissioner of the government land office, chairman of the Western Irrigation Congress, has appointed a special committee to push the matter. Representative Claude Hudspeth of El Paso, is one of the members of this committee.

The Smith-McNary bill would appropriate \$250,000,000 to purchase bonds from irrigation districts to encourage and facilitate irrigation projects. If the measure passes, it is not improbable that several reservoirs and dams will be constructed on the Colorado, Canadian, Concho and Llano rivers in Texas as well as on the Pecos.

PLEADS GUILTY TO COTTON THEFT

Sheriff Flynt was successful in his hunt for parties who visited several cotton fields in the North end of the county one night this week and stole a quantity of cotton. The sheriff received notice Friday to come to Winters and make an investigation, and Friday evening he returned with two young men giving their names as Amos Walden and Nalgie Hall.

Mr. Flynt went to the fields of W. J. Gardner, J. M. Johnson and a man by the name of Cotten, where he got trail of the thieves and followed it North. After several hours detective work he found a wagon sheet and two cotton sacks which were identified as the property stolen from the cotton fields, and later he learned where the cotton was ginned, and the arrests followed.

Saturday morning the young men plead guilty in justice court to stealing the cotton and adjusted the matter by receiving punishment. Fortunately the young men stole cotton from three different fields, keeping the amount taken from any one field to below the value of fifty dollars and confining the charge to a misdemeanor. The cotton was sold at Abilene.

The young men arrested for the theft, and who plead guilty, reside in Taylor county. Mr. Flynt did a quick piece of detective work in running them down and bringing them to justice, and the quick punishment should be an example for others.

BREACH WITH IRISH WIDENS

LONDON, Sept. 17.—Lloyd George, replying today to the communication received from Eamonn de Valera last Friday, says that to receive the Sinn Fein delegates at the proposed conference as representatives of an independent sovereign state would "constitute a formal and official recognition of Ireland's severance from the King's domain. Premier Lloyd George says so long as de Valera insists for a conference on this basis a conference is impossible.

THREE HOMES BURN IN LUFKIN, TEXAS

LUFKIN, Tex., Sept. 17.—The residences of Senator Fairchild, Rex Bumpers and Bruce Lindsey all burned last night. The origin of the fire is unknown.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—The Quest, a small ship on which Sir Ernest Shackleton will explore the uncharted sections of the Antarctic seas, left the Thames river today on a start of the two year voyage. Large crowds gathered at the docks to wish Sir Ernest and his party a successful voyage.

DALLAS VOTING ON BIG BOND ISSUE

DALLAS, Sept. 17.—Dallas taxpayers are voting today on a proposition to issue \$1,250,000 in bonds for street improvements.

COTTON DROPS \$15.00 PER BALE IN ONE WEEK

The cotton market closed Saturday about 55 points lower than for the previous day, making a net loss for the week of about \$15 per bale.

Saturday a week ago New York October closed 20.75, while for the present week's close October New York was quoted at 18.10. The market for the last week has been unsteady, and buyers have been sluggish. Ballinger spots ranged around 18 cents Saturday.

MEMORIAL FOR ZR-2 VICTIMS

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Memorial services for the fifteen men in the American navy who lost their lives in the ZR-2 disaster, will be held today at the Brooklyn navy yard. The bodies of Commander Louis H. Maxfield and companions in death, reached here yesterday on the British steamer Dauntless, under a guard of honor of blue jackets and marines. Naval officers of Great Britain, France and Argentine, and high government officials and representatives from many states and cities will be in attendance.

It is the first time since the war that the gates of the navy yard have been thrown open to the general public and citizens invited to attend services held in burying dead heroes. The rituals for the dead will be read by both Catholic and Protestant chaplains. Three of the bodies will be taken to the Arlington national cemetery for internment. The body of Commander Emory Coil will be aboard an American ship and taken to sea, where it will be deposited for final rest beneath the Atlantic waters. The other bodies will be turned over to relatives.

PRISON WARDEN DIES FROM INJURY

HOUSTON, Sept. 17.—Dewitt Oliver, assistant warden of the Huntsville prison, died today as the result of injuries received three weeks ago when he was thrown from the walls of the prison by escaping convicts.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The prosecution won again today when the motion for a continuance in the Roscoe Arbuckle case was granted. Arbuckle was arraigned on the charge of manslaughter, but was continued until Sept. 26th.

In the meantime it is expected that District Attorney Brady will push the charge of murder before the grand jury in an effort to indict Arbuckle for the murder of Virginia Rappe.

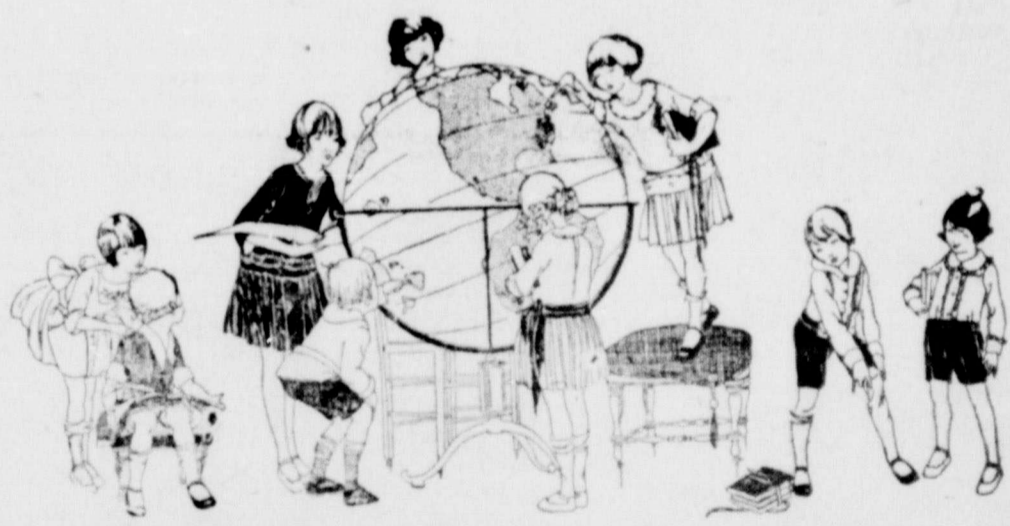
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The film comedian "Fatty" Arbuckle is scheduled to appear in a new court scene as the result of the recent tragedy connected with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, a motion picture actress. Today he will be arraigned in the superior court on the indictment charging manslaughter. The arraignment will be a mere formality, it was said.

District Attorney Brady will ask for a continuance on the man slaughter charge until action is taken by the grand jury on the charge of first degree murder which is still pending in the justice court.

Crowds long before court opened today attempted to gain places of vantage in the court room of Judge Louderback, and the court room was packed to "S. R. O." before Arbuckle was brought from his cell to answer to the charge.

Arbuckle in all court appearances so far has shown an inclination to shun the crowd and declines to face the curious any more than is necessary. Scores of letters and telegrams addressed to Roscoe Arbuckle, continue to arrive at the jail where the comedian is confined, while District Attorney Brady is being appealed to from all over the United States in letters and telegrams urging him to see that the man responsible for the death of Virginia Rappe be punished.

If Arbuckle is freed of the murder charge, maybe the pro enforcement officers will go after him. At best it seems that Fatty is done for.

Mr. Harding's new word, "normalcy," does not seem to be getting us anywhere. We are told in today's news that the cost of food increased four per cent during the month of August.

We are right up against poll tax paying time and next year is election year. A man can pay his wife's poll tax without an

Only three or four months and political announcements will begin to appear in the newspapers. Judging from rumors "Miss" and "Mrs." will be prefixed to the names of several candidates. THE WATER PROBLEM

Editor The Ledger:
"There are many vital problems confronting the citizenship of Ballinger today, including street paving, better schools, adequate water supply, cardinal roads, and the securing of minor conveniences, such as a municipal swimming pool, county rest room, and tourists camp ground, but the one outstanding problem is undoubtedly the water situation.

Just three months ago the dams impounding the local supply were full to the overflowing, but today the water is low, street sprinkling has been discontinued and a ban placed on the watering of trees and lawns. So it is evident that without rain on the upper reaches of Elm creek that Ballinger has only ninety day of water in her reservoir at any time.

It is not the purpose of this letter to offer any solution for the situation, or to recommend the building of any particular reservoir at any particular place. But it is certain that before many more months have elapsed, Ballinger must face squarely the problem of providing additional storage.

Mineral Wells, Abilene and Cisco, towns of about 10,000 population each, are spending hundreds of thousands of dollars for more water. Stamford, a city no larger than Ballinger, is going 15 miles from town for her water supply. If Ballinger is to supply her bare needs, let alone bid for competition with other West Texas towns, she, too, must arrange to secure more water.

But these cities could not expend such sums if they allowed their taxable valuations to sink to a point less than 50 per cent of their actual value. And in that lies the ultimate solution of the problem. Tax reductions for school purposes this year will not exceed \$3,000,000. Practically every residence and store building in town is full to overflowing, and additional ones are being built. This means that the value of Ballinger property is bound to be above normal. In addition there are hundreds of thousands of dollars in cash and mortgages, not usually rendered.

If tax reductions made to the city do not exceed \$1,000,000.00, Ballinger's pending power will be restricted to an additional \$20,000.00. If tax reductions are raised to \$4,000,000.00, an additional \$125,000.00 can be voted. A low property valuation, with a high tax rate, reflects unfavorably against the city. A high property valuation, with a low tax rate will increase the popularity of Ballinger as a city in which to purchase property and to live.

"The location of a college, or of an industry, or of many more individuals in this city is a physical impossibility unless they can be assured of an adequate water supply. We are rapidly reaching the end of the road. Shall we blaze a trail forward—or shall we turn back?"

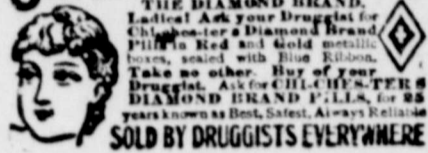
