SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22.—Further testimony of Jesse Norgard, former motion picture studio watchman, first witness called today in the Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle trial, was offered by the state. Norgard worked at the Culver City studios where Miss Virginia Rappe and Arbuckle were employed in August 1919.

Norgard said that Arbuckle offered him fifty dollars for a key to Miss Rappe's room, and he declared that he declined the offer, and refused to permit the comedian to enter the young lady's room.

## WINTERS MAN FATALLY SHOT BIRD HUNTING

Special to the Ledger:

WINTERS, Nov. 22.—D. M. Hillyard, cashier of the First National Bank of this place, is dying as the result of accidentally shooting himself while shooting birds near his home here, about two o'clock this afternoon.

First details are meagre, but circumstances indicate that Mr. Hillyard had stepped out back of the house to shoot some birds for his wife, who has been ill for several months, and in some way, presumably while crawling through a wire fence, accidentally discharged the gun, the charge taking effect in the left side of his back at close range, setting his clothing on fire.

A negro at the Hillyard home heard the man's cry and rushed to his aid. Friends were called and medical aid summoned, but Hillyard is in a dying condition at this hour and expected to die within a short time.

The first reports caused some to believe that Mr. Hillyard had shot himself with suicidal intent, but those who knew him best could not believe this and it soon developed that the tragedy was purely an accident. Mr. Hillyard had been at the bank during the forenoon, and was as jolly as usual. He had gone home to dinner, and after dinner picked up the gun and stepped out to shoot a bird for Mrs. Hillyard. The bank's affairs are in good shape, and further than having been worried over the condition of his wife Mr. Hillyard was known to have no troubles.

Mrs. Hillyard had been in a sanitarium at Temple for six weeks, returning home Sunday. Mr. Hillyard met her at Ballinger and was rejoicing over her improvement, expressing the good news to almost every one of his close friends he came in touch with. He is one of the best citizens of Winters, and the tragedy has cast a gloom of sorrow over this city.

A phone message from Sheriff Flynt, who rushed to Winters as soon as he heard of the shooting of D. M. Hillyard, to The Ledger at three-thirty this afternoon, stated that there was no question but that Mr. Hillyard shot himself accidentally.

A later message from Mrs. Ed Eason to The Ledger stated that Mr. Hillyard was still alive, but the physicians held out no hope for his recovery. He was still conscious and able to give an account of the tragedy. According to his version of the accident, he had finished his dinner and started back to the bank, when he saw some doves out back of the house. He went in the house and got his gun and told Mrs. Hillyard he was going to kill her a dove, and was in the act of slipping up on the birds, crawling and dragging the gun behind him or by his side, when it was discharged. Three ribs were torn out and a large wound made in his left side.

## MAN WAITING TRIAL TAKES OWN LIFE

AMARILLO, Nov. 22.—Chas. Hensle, about forty, held on a charge of burglary of a local drug store, committed suicide in the local jail last night. Hensle hanged himself with a cord which he attached to the window sill. He was scheduled to be placed on trial this week.

## TO MAKE TEST WATER PROJECT

"An engineer will come here from Wichita Falls to look over the Elm Creek dam proposition," said Stuart Williams, secretary of the Y. M. B. L. Tuesday. Mr. Williams did not go into details, but stated that he understood that a thorough survey of the proposition would be made, estimates figured, and the city would be out nothing for this work in case the municipality went into the proposition and let the contract for the building of the dam.

Chief Engineer Holder, of the United States Geological Survey, furnished the city with valuable information free of cost, and the city has been pointed to a way out of its water troubles. While no estimate as to the probable cost of the new project has been made, it is believed to be a proposition entirely within the reach of the city's financial ability, and if so the city should lose no time in pushing it to a successful finish.

Ballinger can not grow a peg until the water problem is solved. We have water all about us, and the citizens should not rest until it can be announced to the world that Ballinger is drought proof. The city's future depends on guaranteeing to every enterprise and every citizen all the water they want for all purposes, and the Elm Creek dam offers the solution.

## Setting Stage for Fair and Merchants Exhibit

### LACK RED TAPE HELPS MEETING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Opinions have been exchanged among the delegates to the disarmament conference with such unprecedented directness that the conference, only ten days old, some of the experienced diplomats believe they can see almost with precision what it will and will not be possible to accomplish.

Following the example of the American delegation in laying down sweeping naval reduction proposals, representatives of other powers put aside, almost without exception, diplomatic in-direction that usually befores such negotiations and reversed the dietum of Tallyrand "that language is given to diplomats to conceal their thoughts."

With the respective heads of the American, British, and Japanese delegations working in direct personal conference almost daily on a naval reduction plan, indications are that the agreement on all-but details is near. Hope is expressed everywhere that a successful outcome will be reached on all other problems.

A consideration of the Chinese aspects of the Far Eastern problem continued today. It was decided to appoint a sub-committee to study the Chinese fiscal affairs.

PARIS, Nov. 22.—"France speaks through the mouth of Briand," is almost the universal caption in the morning newspapers over the account of the French premier's address at the Washington conference yesterday.

BERLIN, Nov. 22.—Japan, although one of Germany's enemies in the World War, continues to command an increasing measure of sympathy from the newspaper commentators in their writings on the Washington disarmament conference.

The heads of all committees are busy and are receiving the loyal support of their assistance in perfecting final details for the three days Fair and Exposition which opens here on Thanksgiving Day. So far not the slightest hitch in the plans has been encountered and everything is working to an end that spells success.

S. L. Williams, in charge of the merchants' exposition building, stated that all space had been engaged, and then some, and that this part of the show promised to be a credit to the city many times as large as Ballinger. The exposition will be in the Ballinger Club room building, first floor, facing the court house square.

The home products show will be held in the Chastain building on Hutchings Avenue, and Miss Luey Stephenson, superintendent of this part of the fair, has listed many entries and the building is being arranged for the home products and agricultural exhibits.

"We will have the horses and mules here for the fair," said Raby Padgett, who has charge of that part of the program. Marston Cotton will look after the cattle exhibit, F. T. Rushing the hog exhibit, and D. Oliver the sheep exhibit. The livestock exhibit will be held in the Ser-ratt barns on Eighth Street East of the postoffice, and the best array of livestock ever exhibited here will be penned in the stalls and large lots of this feed yard.

The poultry exhibit will be held in the Giesecke building on Eighth Street. J. A. Reese is chairman of the committee in charge of the poultry show, and those who have attended poultry shows in Ballinger before, can expect an even greater show than ever made here before. Interest in poultry during the last

few years has made this easy. The finance committee reports that it met with splendid success in financing the work and getting the funds together for the cash premiums to be awarded. The merchants and citizens contributed liberally for this, and as usual the cash was raised in the Ballinger way of doing things.

County Farm Agent Eaton and Secretary Williams will have general supervision of the work, and any suggestion or assistance will be gladly received by them. It is up to every citizen to throw shoulder to the wheel and make the big free Fall Fair, Carnival and Merchants' Exposition a grand success.

By ways of amusement the Diamond Amusement Company is on the grounds constructing their tents and booths. The Lanford lots South of the post office are being cleaned off and the carnival will occupy this space, bringing the amusements close to the business district and near the other part of the fair.

Gillstrap's Rodeo will exhibit daily and nightly in the baseball park. Those who have inspected the rodeo outfit declare it the most promising for thrills in the wild west line ever brought here. This feature of the program will attract the boys from far and near, and every thrill staged in a rodeo lot is promised to be enacted here during the three days.

For those who enjoy the milder form of entertainment the local picture theatres will stage special features, giving continuous performances, matinee and night.

With all the various attractions there will be plenty for the folks seeking amusement, and for those who do not wish to part with their cash in investing in show tickets, the exhibits will be large and varied enough to keep them busy for hours.

## BIG GAS BILL LEADS TO STILL

HOUSTON, Nov. 22.—A "telltale" gas bill amounting to \$43 led to the capture here today of what officers claim is the largest distilling plant ever seized in Houston. A man was arrested with liquor in his possession and he gave the name of the person he purchased the booze from.

A second man was arrested, but refused to give his address. Officers inspected the gas company's records for large bills at small houses, and the raid followed.

## CHARITY BOARD TO MAKE ITS REPORT

C. R. Crews, treasurer of the United Charity Board, furnished The Ledger with figures which will constitute his annual report to be made at the union Thanksgiving services Thursday, when the board will elect officers for another year, and take a collection in support of the work.

According to the report the charity board has received during the last year \$363.76 and has paid out for supplies \$357.56, leaving only the small balance of \$6.20 on hand with demands increasing daily, and a winter's work before the board.

It will be observed that the money spent was for supplies. Mr. Crews says that the board has not furnished cash to anyone, always supplying the necessities of life where an investigation showed that food, fuel, clothing and medicine was needed.

Mr. Crews expressed the opinion that some lost motion might be eliminated by combining some of the charity work, and not maintain more than one board doing charity work. This matter will come before the union services on Thanksgiving day.

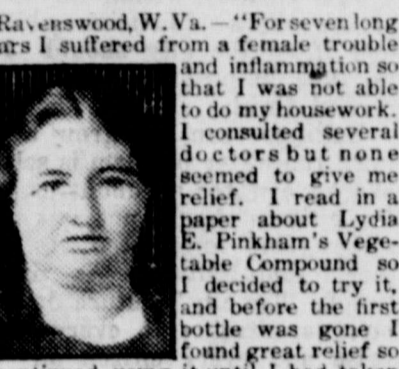

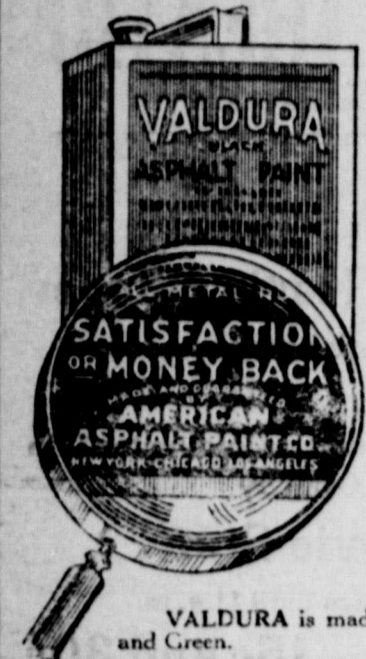

While some deplore the fact that the Ballinger fair opens on Thanksgiving, there is no reason why the day should not be most fittingly observed, and all pause for a period to give thanks for the blessings this country enjoys, and has enjoyed for the last twelve months.

As usual business will be suspended for the day, practically every place of business in the city remaining closed for the day. 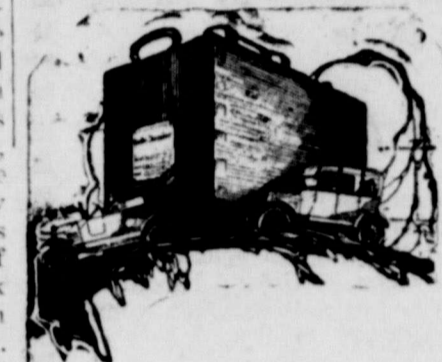
HUSBAND MAKES HIT WITH HIS WIFE
