Notice to All County Taxpayers

The Commissioner's Court desires to call attention to the fact that at a recent session of the legislature a law was passed which provides that where delinquent taxes are paid before January 1, 1933, no interest or penalty will be charged, regardless of the number of years they have been delinquent.

We feel that many who owe taxes do not know of this law nor how much they could save by paying their taxes before January 1, 1933. The following is an example of the amount saved if paid during 1932. If one owes \$52.05 taxes it can be paid in full, if paid during 1931, for \$52.05. If he owed \$52.05 taxes for the year of 1930 and did not pay it before January 1, 1933 he would be compelled to pay \$61.80 or \$9.75 interest and penalty; if he owed \$52.05 for the year 1928 and did not pay it before January 1, 1933 it would cost him \$69.92 or 17.87 interest and penalty; if he owed \$52.05 taxes for the year 1925 and did not pay it before January 1, 1933, it would cost him \$90.42 or \$38.37 interest and penalty. Delinquent taxes for various years and amounts would increase proportionately if not paid before January 1, 1933. Hundreds of people took the advantage of a similar law in the latter part of 1931 and paid their taxes and many are doing so now. This particular law will not be in effect after December 31, 1932. The Commissioner's Court will not have, nor has it ever had, the power to remit interest and penalty on State and County taxes. We deem it our duty to call attention to the above mentioned law. County and schools need the taxes in order that roads may be maintained, jurors paid, schools kept open, etc. Furthermore, we candidly believe that the amount saved to the taxpayer who pays during this year

Falling Downstairs

Caused 1,800 Deaths

London.—Falling downstairs, out of bed, and over broom handles and buckets, may be dull accidents in most cases, but they caused the death of almost 1,800 women last year.

This was revealed recently by a Miss Margaret Bonfield to a Women's section of the National Safety congress held here. The session was considering the problem of "Safety in the Home."

Figures presented to the congress (those of 1930, the latest available) showed that falling downstairs cost the lives of 675 persons, falling out of windows took 135 more, while falling from bed sent no less than 58 into the hereafter.

Bad Cooking and Crime

We have seen it written a good many times that bad cooking was at the bottom of a large portion of the world's crime; and we have never found any reliable statistics to support the claim. Why don't the indefatigable researchers and surveyors go about among our criminals and delinquents and ask them how the cooking was in their homes? Personally we think, and have often said, that it would be a better world if there were more good apple pie than there is, but we cannot prove even that.—Boston Herald.

Early Ferment Beverages

Dr. Harry W. Wiley says that wine is the cause of most important of fermented beverages. He says: "It could not be made early discovery, because of its early use, crushed and left to natural fermentation, undergoes the alcoholic fermentation. Primitive man must, therefore, have been acquainted with the properties of the fermented juice of grapes, especially of grapes. 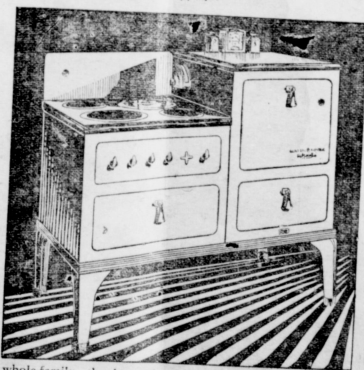

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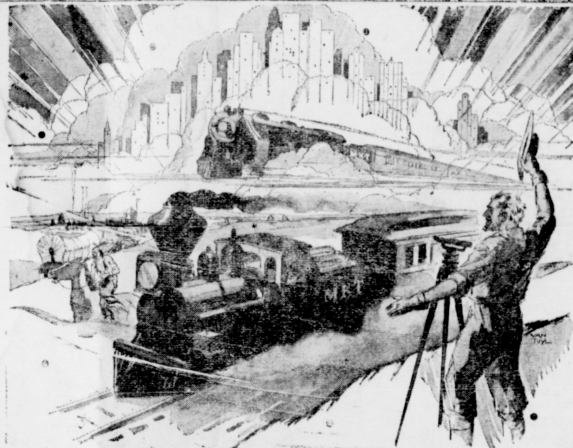
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
