## PLANS TO AVERT COAL STRIKE BEING PUSHED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 27.—With plans complete for the nation-wide coal miners strike of a half million men, union leaders here today awaited developments in the program for a complete tie-up of the country's coal industry through the call made to the two hundred thousand non-union miners to join the strike, which is scheduled to take place Friday night at 12 o'clock.

The unions will use every effort possible to get the non-union workers to help them enforce their demands for a new contract carrying with it 19 demands.

NEW YORK, March 27.—The labor members of the anthracite wage scale sub-committee returned from Cleveland today to renew negotiations with the operators in an effort to avert the general coal miners strike which has been called for next Saturday night.

## GIVES UP SEARCH FOR FLYING BOAT

MIAMI, Fla., March 27.—The airplane search for the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. August Bulte, and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Smith, of Kansas City, and Mrs. J. S. Dickson, of Memphis, Tennessee, who were lost when their flying boat, Miss Miami, was wrecked at sea last Wednesday, has been discontinued. A sub-chaser service has been sent out in the hope of finding some victims of the tragedy.

Robert Moore, the pilot, and sole survivor of the flying boat, is slowly recovering from the exposure, and is able to give an account of the tragedy. He was more dead than alive when rescued from the craft after floating in the water for nearly forty-eight hours.

## CORSICANA JUDGE DIES LAST NIGHT

CORSICANA, Tex., Mar. 27.—Judge L. B. Cobb, age 73, died here last night. His funeral will be held Tuesday.

## CAR TURNS OVER IN ELM CREEK; TRAVELERS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

Edwin Kilgore and eighteen months old baby and Mr. Kilgore's mother-in-law, Mrs. McNeill, and twelve year old son, had a narrow escape from death by drowning when their car plunged over the causeway on the Ballinger-Runnels road three miles North of Ballinger about ten o'clock Saturday night.

It was a miraculous escape for the occupants of the automobile, and they suffered from cold before reaching a home nearby where they received aid.

## 3 HOBOES KILLED IN WRECK

ROYSE CITY, Tex., Mar. 27.—Three men were killed and one seriously hurt, and two slightly hurt, one mile East of here early today in a Katy freight train wreck. The dead are Roy S. Gullett, Bruce Frazier, both of Peoria, Ill.; and Elvin S. Hill, of Denison, Texas. Ray Modlin, of Parsons, Kansas, was seriously injured, and a man said to be Frank Smith, formerly of Dallas, was slightly injured.

The men were reported to be beating their way to the oil fields at Mexia where they hoped to get work. They were riding a flat car loaded with steel when a coupling broke, or the car jumped the track, causing the wreck.

## MASS MEETING TO SAVE RAILROAD

FT. WORTH, Mar. 27.—A mass meeting of the citizens of the territory of West Texas to be affected by the suspension of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad, will be held at Sweetwater on April 10th, it was announced here today. Unless the road is given financial aid it will be forced to suspend operation, it is said, as the loss sustained last year cannot be overcome and the road kept going. The road is still operating at a big loss.

## BURGLARS PLAY A LOSING GAME

HOUSTON, Mar. 27.—Burglars at the Houston Heights post-office early today made a water haul, failing to get enough money in the raid to pay for the nitro-glycerine which they used in blowing the safe. The yegs used several charges of explosive, and all but one small plating of the safe was cracked when the neighborhood was aroused and the burglars were forced to retreat.

The party was traveling in a Ford car with the curtains up, and were en route from Wichita Falls to Talpa on a visit to relatives. The rain of Friday night had put Elm Creek on a rise and the water was flowing swiftly over the causeway, and Mr. Kilgore declares that it washed his car off the roadway, while some are inclined to believe that he drove too close to the edge of the causeway and missed the road. The water was high enough to come up on the running board, but other parties had negotiated the crossing successfully.

The car turned completely over, falling in the deep water below the causeway. Mr. Kilgore broke thru the top and managed to rescue the occupants of the car, the baby being pulled from the water in time to save its life. Wading out of the water, the parties made their way to the home of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Kemp, a few hundred yards from the crossing, where they aroused Mr. and Mrs. Kemp, who made a fire and rendered first aid. A physician was called from Ballinger on account of the baby's condition. Later relatives were summoned from Talpa. Mrs. McNeill and the baby were cared for during the night by Mr. and Mrs. Kemp, while the other parties came on to town.

The car was recovered Sunday morning, and the family was met here by relatives from Talpa and carried on to that place. Clothing, a hand bag containing ten dollars, and other articles, including one hundred pounds of nails, were washed from the car. Parties were seen to pick up some of these articles Sunday on the creek below the causeway, and they should return them to Mr. Kemp, where they will be called for.

## PARRISH SINKING; DEATH EXPECTED

WICHITA FALLS, Mar. 27.—Attending physicians report that Congressman Lucian W. Parrish is sinking fast, after taking a turn for the worse yesterday, and it is not expected that he will live but a few hours. Congressman Parrish suffered dilation of the heart Sunday after suffering for several days with cerebral meningitis, caused by injuries sustained in an automobile wreck. He is unconscious and his temperature was 103 this morning.

## MANY WORK TO CLEAR WRECKAGE

BEAUMONT, Mar. 27.—Hundreds of workmen began today to clear away the wreckage in the devastated sections which suffered from the tornado which struck here and at Fannette late Saturday.

The death list is still confined to two people. The man who died here from injuries sustained in the storm Saturday night after being brought here from Fannette, was identified today as Walter Gerould, of Gueyden, Louisiana. The funeral of Andrew J. Johnson, the other victim of the storm, was held here today.

## TESTIFIES IN WAGE CUT CHARGE

CHICAGO, March 27.—B. M. Jewell, head of the railroad shop crafts, went before the United States Railroad Labor Board today and opened rebuttal testimony for the employees against the answer of the railroads last week to the union charges that the roads were seeking a wage reduction, and that the roads had not held proper conferences with the men as required by the transportation act.

## ON TRIAL FOR KILLING PARTNER

FT. WORTH, Mar. 27.—J. M. Champ, former auto accessory dealer and proprietor of a hotel at Mexia, went to trial here today on the charge of murdering Earl Hensley, his former partner and business associate at Mexia. Champ is charged with having followed Hensley to Fort Worth and shot him here following a quarrel over business matters.

A QUESTIONNAIRE AND THE ANSWERS

The Ledger is not a bureau of information, and does not propose to answer all questions, but in reply to Mr. N. Passur who addresses his questions to The Ledger, the following questionnaire and answers will not be amiss at this time:

Q: "What has become of all the 6-inch pipe that I helped vote water bonds for last year?"

A: Answer: You did not help vote bonds for any six inch pipe. If you voted for the bonds you voted for money with which to buy eight inch pipe to be used in replacing the four inch pipe on Hutchings Avenue and cut the insurance rate. The eight inch pipe has been on hand for some time waiting until the city quit pumping water from the river so the change could be made. The four-inch main will be used in replacing a two-inch main on Broadway where there are a large number of water patrons who cannot get water only during certain hours on account of the small pipe. The new main will be put down within a few days, as the pumping plant has been moved back to the creek.

Q: "Where is all the extra street lights that I helped vote electric light bonds for last year?"

A: The world was not made in a day. The city has been busy connecting consumers first. The city is provided with more street lights than it ever had before, and they are not costing \$1000 per month either. Material for more street lights has been purchased, and in the course of time this city will have more lights than ever.

Q: "What has become of the cheap ice the Citizens Ice Company was going to give us this year?"

A: The city has nothing to do with the ice plant. You did not vote any bonds for it.

Q: "What kind of streets are we going to have if these street bonds carry?"

A: You are going to have the kind of streets competent engineers recommend and as cheap as competitive bidding will do the work.

Q: "What kind of a water system will we have if these water bonds carry?"

A: Wait and see how much it rains. A competent engineer, Dean J. C. Nagle, spent several days here making a survey and study of Ballinger's water problems. He recommended a program which the city commission is trying to carry out, and which Mr. Nagle said would practically double the water supply. We have approximately a ninety day supply at present.

STREET PAVING

In discussing the proposed water and street bond issue, much is being said by the opposition as to what kind of paving is to be put down, and who is to select the kind of paving, and who is to have charge of the work, etc, and some have gone so far as to say if it is done their way they are for it and if it is not done their way they are against it.

The city commissioners have never posed as paving experts, but they are both successful business men, men of integrity, and men who have made a success of their private business affairs, and it is reasonable to assume that they will employ for a few months a paving engineer, and a man who will make bond for the faithful performance of his duty and the fulfillment of his contract.

It will be the duty of this engineer to select the paving which is best suited to Ballinger's needs, and then superintend the laying of that pavement, staying on the job every day until the work has been accepted by the city commission and paid for.

Such would appear to be the only safe, sane and sensible business plan, and our city commissioners being responsible business men, both heavy tax payers and as vitally interested in Ballinger's welfare as any citizen in the city, should be depended upon to put over the best plan possible and that which will be worth the most to this city.

It should be remembered that both of the city commissioners are heavy tax payers, and in addition to bearing their part of the tax burden they are devoting their time in serving the city without pay, while there are some who pay very little taxes who fight every move for the progress and development of those things which are for our best interests.

There should be a better spirit of co-operation instead of a spirit of fight and tear-down on the part of some. If you think you can do it better than the men you have selected to handle the city's affairs, you are the man the city is looking for, and when the next election is held you should offer your name for the place.

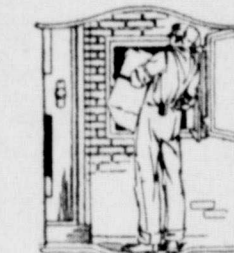
