Annual Rainfall.

There has been recalculated from recent data the amount of rain annually falling upon the earth's surface. 



Gold is divided into twenty-four carsts, the "k" mark meaning "carat." Pure gold contains twenty-four carets. The mark "14k" on an object made of gold means that there are fourteen parts of gold and ten parts of alloy, generally copper, in its makeup. Articles made of pure gold would not retain their shape, so the alloy is added, 14-carat gold being most generally used in the manufacture of jewelry.

Delays That Were Fatal. Former King Karl stopped for dinner at a time when he should have gone on; and all history suggests that such delays are nearly always fatal.


