First National Bank Gorman

United States Government Revenue Act for 1932 Section No. 751; provides that a tax of TWO CENTS be imposed on all checks except those cashed at the window of the bank. Such counter checks cashed at the bank are not subject to this tax. This bank has no choice in the matter but is compelled to collect said tax of TWO CENTS per check and remit the Government monthly. Naturally, this new tax imposes a tremendous amount of detail on all banks.

This tax was effective June 21st and all checks presented on or after that date will be taxed in accord with the new law, by charging the customer's account at the rate of two cents per check.
