## A Capacious Can



Do you remember the story of the magic pot, which danced into the old woman's cottage, and cooked magic meals? The more the old woman and her husband ate, the more the pot cooked.

The nearest thing we know to this sort of a housewife's millennium is a No. 2 can of fruits for salad which can be extended and extended. It can serve four persons, six persons, eight persons, depending on how many fresh fruits in season, you add to it. If yours is a family of four persons, just chill the can, serve contents on crisp lettuce hearts with creamy mayonnaise. If guests increase your number to six, add bananas to the already delightful variety of fruits. If two more guests drop in, add apples and bananas—and your salad is even more delicious and healthful with minerals and vitamins.

Try this extension of the magic can:

**Molded Cream Cheese and Fruit Salad:** Soak one-half tablespoon gelatin in one tablespoon cold water, then dissolve in two tablespoons hot milk. Add two well-mashed cream cheeses, one-half teaspoon salt and one-eighth teaspoon paprika. Fold in one cup heavy cream, whipped, and pour into a ring mold. Set away to harden. Open a No. 2 can of fruits for salad, add two small bananas, drain well and set away to chill. When ready to serve, mold the cheese ring on a large, round serving plate. Fill the center cavity with the fruit and pour over a French dressing with chopped fresh mint leaves. Garnish edges with small cup-shaped lettuce leaves, each holding a spoonful of mint jelly. This serves eight persons.

Things are looking a little better now if we are to judge by what we see in the papers. Cotton is looking upward and is now worth from 4 to 5 cents, as a result of the paper report of the ravages of bollweevils and a low estimate of the present crop. in some way or other beneficial results of these ameliorating conditions will trickle down until they envelop Woodson and Trookerton county in their fold as the Lone Star State. The republicans argue that if Hoover is elected good times will be forthcoming; the democrats know that if Roosevelt is elected prosperity will rush around the corner. So if both are right we will be setting pretty after November.

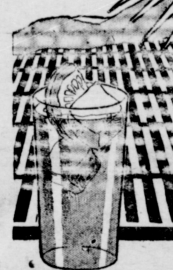

**Organ Charis Romides**  
The organization known as the Society of the Daughters of the Barons of Bannymede was organized in 1915 by Mrs. Robert G. Hogan of Contonville, Md., who conceived the idea of an organization for women similar to a men's organization, the Barons of Bannymede, which was organized but undeveloped on account of our entry into the World war. The membership is limited to those who can trace their ancestry in a direct line to a baron who in the year 1213 A. D. compelled the signing of the Magna Charta by King John at Runnymede. The constitution is American.

**Bottles in History**  
The first bottles probably were made of animal skins. In ancient Egypt bottles were made out of such materials as stone, alabaster, porcelain, ivory, gold, silver, bronze and glass. The Phoenicians and Romans also made glass bottles. Earthenware bottles were possessed by the Egyptians and Hebrews, and still are used in the East. Venice held the monopoly of the manufacturing of glass bottles in the Middle ages. To China, a beautiful bottle of various forms and substances such as jade, stone, and rock crystal, which have long been known. Bottles made of the dried rind of oranges are used by Italian countries. The first bottling machine was invented by the Englishman, James Atkin in 1822. The first fully automatic machine was invented by Michael J. Owens in America between 1850 and 1900.

**HAWAIIAN ICES**



**ISN'T there something wrong** with this headline? Hawaii, as everyone knows, is a land of warmth and sunshine, of dolce-far niente and flowers, and a complete stranger to strenuousness, snow and ice. Yet some of the best ices that ever tickled your palate are made of pineapple that comes from Hawaii. Here, for instance, are two sherbets which enable you to choose between the coolness of mint and the warmth of ginger, combined with the unique taste of pineapple.

**Pineapple Mini Sherbet:** Put one cup water, one-half cup sugar, two tablespoons corn syrup and one-half cup of after dinner mints in a saucepan and boil two or three minutes. Add one teaspoon gelatin which has been softened in two tablespoons cold water, and stir until dissolved. Cool. Add the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed pineapple and three tablespoons lemon juice, pour into the refrigerator tray, and let freeze to a mush, stirring occasionally. Then fold in three stiffly-beaten egg whites, and continue freezing, stirring several times. Serves six.

**Pineapple-Ginger Milk Sherbet:** Scald three-fourths cup evaporated milk, three-fourths cup sugar and three tablespoons of chopped preserved ginger. Cool. Add the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple, two tablespoons lemon juice and two cups ginger ale, and freeze in an ice cream freezer. Serves eight.

**Ice Creams, Too**  
Not only ices, but ice creams. Here are two, both strictly tropical.

**Tropical Ice Creams:** Mix one

tablespoon flour, two-thirds cup sugar and a few grains of salt, and add two slightly-beaten egg yolks. Add one cup scalded milk, and cook in double boiler until creamy. Chill. Add the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed pineapple, two-thirds cup banana pulp, two-thirds cup orange juice, and two tablespoons lemon juice. Pour this mixture into a refrigerator tray and let it chill until it starts to freeze, stirring every ten minutes. Add one cup of beaten cream, mixing it in thoroughly, and continue freezing, stir once or twice. Serves eight.

**Hawaiian Ice Creams:** Cook three-fourths cup sugar and one-fourth cup water five minutes. Soak one-half tablespoon gelatin in two tablespoons cold water, and dissolve in the hot mixture. Add one-half cup syrup from canned Hawaiian pineapple and two tablespoons lemon juice, and chill. Add two cups cream (or one cup cream and one cup evaporated milk), and pour slowly on two cups avocado pulp, stirring constantly. Pour into a refrigerator tray and freeze, stirring several times. Serves eight.

**More Delicious Sherbs**  
But these are by no means all of the delicious sherbs that come out of the Hawaiian Islands. Among the other delectable frozen dishes from this far-off land are:

**Pineapple Mousse:** Put the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed pineapple, four tablespoons water and eighteen marshmallows in a double boiler, and steam until the marshmallows are thoroughly dissolved. Add two tablespoons lemon juice and three tablespoons sugar,

and let get very cold and thick. Fold in one cup beaten cream, pour into a refrigerator tray, and let freeze. Serves six.

**Pineapple Maple Parfait:** Beat four eggs. Beat one cup maple syrup and one cup syrup from canned Hawaiian pineapple, and pour slowly into the eggs. Cook in double boiler until the mixture coats a spoon. Chill, add one and one-half cups beaten cream, and freeze in refrigerator trays. Serves six.

**Southern Cross Coupe:** Beat one cup cream, add four tablespoons confectioner's sugar and two tablespoons brandy, flavoring, and freeze in a refrigerator tray. Combine the contents of one 8-ounce can of Hawaiian pineapple tidbits, one sliced banana and one-fourth cup chopped dates, and fill tall parfait glasses half full of the mixture. Top with the frozen brandy cream, and garnish with bits of red and green cherries. Serves six.

**Tropical Ice Tea**  
The chilled beverages, too, that come from this land of unusual heat, have a tang peculiarly their own. Take tropical iced tea, for instance. Here is the recipe:

Dissolve three tablespoons confectioner's sugar in the contents of a can of unsweetened Hawaiian pineapple juice, and tint a delicate shade of green. Pour into ice cube refrigerator pans, drop a maraschino cherry into each compartment, and let freeze. Made iced tea as usual, serving it to taste while still hot. Chill. Serve in tall glasses with or two of the pineapple cubes and a wedge of lemon. One recipe will make ten to twelve cubes.

**Peaches Predominate.**

Of all the fruits grown in this country, more are eaten as peaches are consumed than any other fruit. Perhaps their popularity is due to the fact that peaches have the looks and taste, the rosy cheeks and sweetness which have made them synonymous for pretty girls.

**Some Peachy Recipes!**  
But whatever the source of their popularity, you'll find the peach season, and dessert sauce which follows, most pleasing indeedly.

**Peach Sauce:** Arrange alternate slices of orange sections and canned sliced peaches in petal form on a bed of lettuce. Combine equal quantities of chopped dates and chopped salted peanuts, mix with mayonnaise. Form into balls and place one in the center of each peach. Chop dates, slice nuts, and make a thin border around the date ball. Serve with cream mayonnaise to which has been added a little chopped pimiento and chopped green pepper.

**Peach Merringues:** Cut nice sponge cake in rounds with the cookie cutter. Slightly moisten each round with the sides from a maraschino cherry. Put half a peach cut side up, on each piece of cake and fill cavities with a mixture of cream and meringue, using three tablespoons confectioner's sugar in one cup white, and pile delicately over the peaches. Bake in a very slow oven until the meringue is done—300° for fifteen minutes.

**Peach Hard Sauce:** Cream one-third cup butter and one cup confectioner's sugar, add one-fourth teaspoon vanilla and two-thirds cup of dissolved, drained peaches. Chill and serve over pudding or cake.

**VALUE OF MILO TREBBLED BY STEERS**

**BENJAMIN**—Milo maize worth \$5 to \$6 per ton in Knox county this year was sold for \$17.26 per ton fed to 45 steers by Jack Idol, manager of the League Ranch. Steers worth \$925.89 were last January put on wheat pasture and a ration of ground maize and cottonseed which was later supplemented with wheat, oats, corn, and hoggart bundles. At the end of 145 days the steers had gained 261 pounds and were sold at an average weight of 877 pounds for \$2131.20 net. All ranch grown feeds were charged at top local prices and the profit expressed in terms of 46.9 tons of maize fed, which was figured to have brought at least three times its market price.

**ALICE**—Barnyard manure applied to a cucumber crop brought H. Walgemuth of Jim Wells county \$8.83 per ton, according to his report of a demonstration conducted with L. A. Pierce, county agent. From a plot of 2.1 acres to which 12 tons of manure were added, 1251 worth of cucumbers were sold. The matured land yielded 145 bushels per acre while unfertilized land gave only a 7 and one half bushel yield.

**BRADY**—After selling the top end of his calves to Northern feeders, Dick Winters, rancher of McCulloch county, fed out the cut backs for a net profit above feed cost of \$8.37 per head on 74 calves gained an average of 1.65 pounds per day for 206 days, put on at a feed cost of 3.88 cents per pound. The ration consisted of maize heads, barley, oats, corn, bundle cane, maize, and hoggar, and peanut hay. The last 100 days limestone was fed at the rate of 1 per cent of the whole ration. The feed consumed per head was 3090 pounds.

**CROWELL**—Calls for 30,000 strawberry plants for August and September delivery lead Claude Dodd to think that Ford county is going in for strawberry cultivation. Starting in March a year ago with 100 plants as a demonstration with Miss Dosca Hale, home demonstration agent, he has had all the berries needed at home this year and has sold \$15 worth of berries and \$50 worth of plants. Of the original plants 80 lived and from these he propagated 7000 plants last fall. Few strawberries have ever been grown in the county and until lately they was the only patch to be found there.

**Cruises and Cheeses**



If you like to peek in pantries filled with good things to eat, you would be interested in the supply room on board a big ocean cruiser. For one thing, there is apt to be a whole room devoted to stores just cheese alone.

**Tons of Food**

If you take the West Indies cruise, for instance, on board the Kungsholm, chef Hjalmar Hokansen will not only take you around to see some twenty-five tons of potatoes, four thousand pounds of beef, fifty thousand eggs, two thousand pounds of coffee, three tons of sugar, preposterous amounts of evaporated milk, and some 5,000 pounds of Swedish health bread, but he will point with greatest pride to a large refrigerator room which contains nothing but cheese.

There are little round boxes of Gruyere cheese from the land of the pale Edelweiss, stacks of pumpkin-colored cheese from pastoral villages in Wisconsin where Holsteins are alleged to nibble daisies along with their meadow grass, as well as the snappier cheeses from France and Italy, and the appetizing yellow Swedish cheese.

One's own household cannot give space to a room just for cheese, nor does the average home refrigerator have room for the variety of cheeses one would like to keep on hand for late suppers, after-theatre parties, and impromptu eats most any time. But now that so many delicious varieties of cheese can be bought in cans, a generous shelf of the pantry can be devoted to cheeses without fear of their becoming too "snappy" for use.
