CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR HERE

Hon. Fred S. Rogers, of Bonham, arrived in Ballinger Thursday and at two-thirty was delivering an address on the court house lawn speaking to a fair sized crowd in the interest of his campaign for governor.

Mr. Rogers spoke at Big Spring Tuesday, and came from that place to Ballinger. He will go from Ballinger to Coleman, where he speaks tonight. He is the first gubernatorial candidate to come this way this spring.

Mr. Rogers is a pleasant gentleman, and is advocating some important measures. He served eighteen months in France and is a member of the American Legion.

The candidate declares conditions involved in the present political campaign in Texas are different from any previous campaign.

"I don't think there ever was a time when the farmers were sticking together like they are now," said Mr. Rogers in talking to a bunch of friends Thursday morning. He stated that the farmers were disgusted with the condition of their schools and the high taxes they were being forced to pay. He said that the farmers were strongly organized under the Farm Labor Union in North and East Texas.

COKE GETS RAIN MONDAY

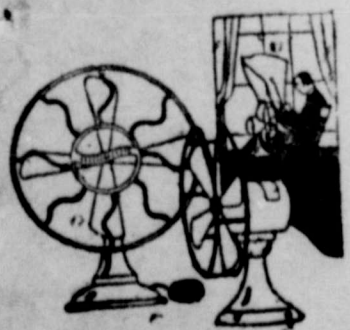

FORD REJECTS U. S. PROJECT

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Henry Ford's reply to the counter proposal which was drafted by the House military committee, for development of the government projects at Muscle Shoals, Alabama, was presented today to the committee by J. W. Worthington, a representative of Mr. Ford.

Mr. Worthington presented the reply immediately upon his arrival here from Detroit, where he conferred with Ford. The answer definitely rejects the provision of the committee plan which eliminated the steam plant at Gorgas from the properties to be disposed of by the government. Ford claims that the steam plant is necessary to the economical operation of the properties.

ABILENE CHIEF POLICE DEAD

ABILENE, June 1.—John J. Clinton, age 74, a picturesque Westerner and pioneer Indian fighter, a Confederate veteran and long time peace officer, died last night after a brief illness.

Deceased was chief of police of Abilene for thirty-seven years, and was one of the best known peace officers in Texas. He had figured in many watch night parties on New Year's nights, and for thirty-seven years he had stood on the same spot on a front corner in the business district of the city and watched the old year pass out and the new year come in. On the last stand he made, and which was the thirty-seventh time he stood on the same corner on New Year's eve, a few months ago, he was accompanied by a large number of citizens of Abilene, among whom were many of the pioneer of Abilene and Taylor county.

TRAPS 325 WOLVES IN ONE COUNTY

WINS FOURTH IN STOCK JUDGING

County Agent Eaton is at home from Brady, where he went with a bunch of boys to attend a livestock judging contest in which eight counties competed for a loving cup presented by the Brady Chamber of Commerce to the county team making the best record in livestock judging. Mason won first place, San Saba, second; Llano, third; and Runnels county, fourth.

The livestock judging meet is an annual affair, and the various counties in the district will compete for the cup again next year, and attempt to take it from Mason. Of the thirteen counties comprising the district, eight counties were represented at the Brady meeting, about thirty boys entering the contest.

Walter Patterson, Jim Gardner, James Mitchell and Claud Graham represented Runnels county, and Mr. Eaton says that while the boys worked to a disadvantage on account of not having the class of stock which was entered in the contest to judge from, they did well, and will make it interesting in the next contest.

Various classes of livestock were judged, including Herefords, dairy cattle, sheep, hogs, etc.

MANY COKE FARMERS SECURE FEDERAL LOANS

ROBERT LEE, Tex., June 1.—Many of the Coke county farmers and ranchmen are taking advantage of the federal loans from the Federal Land Bank at Houston, says John Gardner, abstractor, of Robert Lee. Mr. Gardner says that the long term of the loan and low rate of interest makes the federal loan attractive to those in this section needing working capital.

It is believed that two thirds of Coke county land owners will ultimately take advantage of these loans, which benefit to them will be the salvation of many of them since the floods, droughts and other hindrances to the prosperity of this part of Texas.

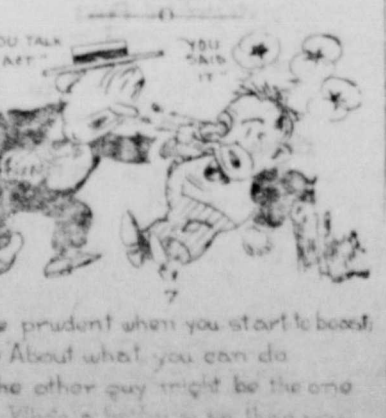

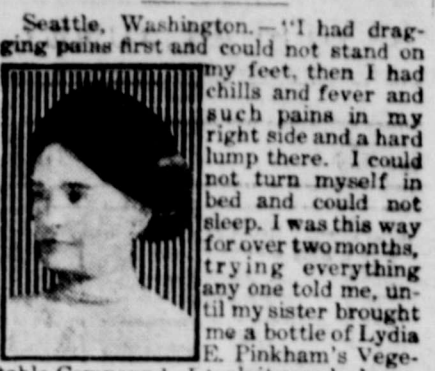

MANY HOGS IN THE CITY

There are about fifty hogs (four-legged) confined in nine pens within the city limits contrary to law, according to Chief of Police Pileher, who has been instructed to enforce the hog law to the letter.

Chief Pileher has notified all the parties who are keeping hogs in the city, in person, and he has issued a notice thru The Ledger to any whom he might have overlooked, and he declares that complaint will be filed against all parties violating the hog law after June 10th.

Conditions would be far from sanitary if everybody in Ballinger who would like to raise a hog from the scraps of the table were permitted to do so, and it is not fair to those who are deprived of this privilege, to permit a favored few to engage in hog raising within the city.

The law should apply to all or not apply at all, and to not apply at all would result in an unsanitary condition which would bring flies, disease, and a condition which the people would not tolerate.

The last word in the all-silk knitted coat is color for the top with solid white below the waist line. The illustration to the right tells the story. The original model for this sketch happened to be in the delectable new shade of amberglow for the top, with pure white for the lower portion. However, many entrancing combinations

are available, remembering that white is used always with the solid color. Notice the exquisite hand-wrought braid up the fronts and about the neck line. This is a French inspiration. The stitch with welt rib for the top is varied in the white portion with a handsome black weave.

The other tuxedo model is one of the new zephyr-weight Shetland wool knitted coats, attaining almost cobweb delicacy in its lacy openwork stitch. These semi-transparent effects are the newest idea in sweaters. The master touch is imparted in fitted cuff fastened with crystal buttons to match the shade of the coat.

COMMISSION DECLARES RESULT OF ELECTION

The City Commission met Wednesday afternoon and canvassed the returns of the street paving election and declared the result as previously published—234 to 28 in favor of the adoption of the street paving law.

The Commission is due to meet tonight or tomorrow with the advisory committee to discuss paving plans and prepare to advertise for bids. The Commission will decide on what character of paving to adopt, the blocks to be paved, and bids will be called for and the work pushed as rapidly as possible.

Good headway is being made on the water works improvements. Two blocks of the old pipe on Hutchings Avenue have been excavated, and one block of the pipe is being removed to make room for the larger main, which it is claimed will reduce the insurance key rate in the business district seven cents on the one hundred dollars. One heavy property owner stated that this reduction on insurance would more than pay his part of the taxes on the bond issue.

Four blocks of the four inch main will be moved from the business district to Broadway, where it will replace a two-inch main and give water patrons a better supply. At certain hours in the day consumers on Broadway cannot get water, as the consumers on the two-inch main are greater than it will supply.

5,000 VETERANS AT RICHMOND REUNION

Richmond, Va. (Special)—Richmond is completing preparations to entertain the 32d annual convention of the United Confederate Veterans on June 19, 20, 21 and 22. Fully 6,000 of the surviving 45,000 Confederates are expected to be within the city's hospitable gates. Most of them will be accompanied by one or more members of their families, and, in addition, there will be present members of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, Daughters of the Confederacy, the Confederate Southern Memorial Association, sponsors and maids and matrons of honor.

Comfortable Quarters.
 Because of their age the veterans this year will sleep in comfortable quarters. Thousands of them will stop at hotels and with relatives and friends, while others will be accommodated at reasonable cost, from \$1.25 to \$2 per day for lodging and breakfast, in private homes. Applications for quarters and inquiries concerning them should be addressed to Major H. B. Morgan, chairman of the Committee on Information and Quarters, Postoffice Box No. 685, Richmond. Dinner and supper, with the compliments of the City of Richmond and the Commonwealth of Virginia, will be supplied Confederate veterans who desire them on June 20, 21 and 22.

Reduced Railroad Fares.
 The Southern Railway, the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway and, in fact, practically all the transportation systems in the South have agreed to give the veterans, accompanying members of their families, and members of auxiliary organizations the benefit of reduced fares to this city and return. These rates have been fixed as follows:

Veterans and accompanying members of their families, 1 cent a mile for each mile traveled.

Members of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, Daughters of the Confederacy, the Confederate Southern Memorial Association, other auxiliary organizations, sponsors and maids and matrons of honor, one-way fare for the round trip.

Identification Certificates.
 Tickets will be placed on sale through the South in ample time for visitors to reach Richmond on or before June 19. As customary and in order to eliminate trouble in procuring tickets at the reduced rates of fare, identification certificates have been prepared and are being distributed to all veterans and members of Confederate and affiliated bodies. Individuals who are unable to procure them through usual channels should apply at once to Adjutant-in-Chief Carl Hinton, Sons of Confederate Veterans, Hotel Richmond, Richmond.

One of the most impressive exercises in which the veterans will take part will be the laying of the corner stone for the Matthew Fontaine Maury monument.

Addresses will be delivered by some of the South's greatest orators, there will be a great parade and review, band concerts, a Confederate ball and dozens of other features designed particularly to entertain and please the South's heroes.

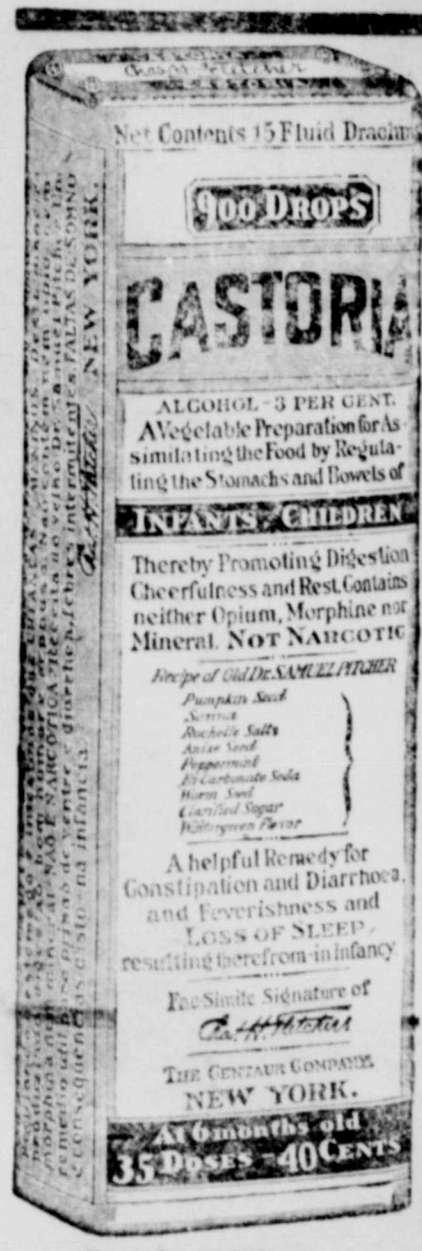
