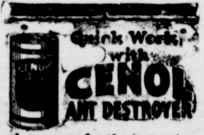

Liquid Long Preserved
 Liquid, at least 1,000,000 years old,
 is contained in a sealed cavity in the
 center of a beautiful crystal of a mineral
 known as calcite, recently ac-
 quired by the Academy of Natural Sci-
 ence at Philadelphia. The cavity con-
 tains a half gill of what is believed
 to be amber with some minerals in so-
 lution. The crystal came from lead
 mines near Rosie, N. Y. Bubbles and
 small drops of liquid have been found
 in crystals previously, but not in such

THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

● The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,884 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,826, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz, the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

● The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will simply ensue.

The Indian name for Blackwell's Island was Alachanook meaning "long island." In 1904 the island was granted to Capt. John Manning and was known as Manning's Island. His son, daughter, who inherited it, married Robert Blackwell, for whom it was then named. In 1928 the city of New York bought it for \$50,000. Recently the mosquitoes were destroyed by Wetmore Island. It now contains the Metropolitan hospital, home for the aged, the workhouse and the penitentiary.

Of all the fruits grown in this country, more can be eaten of peaches are consumed than any other fruit. Perhaps the popularity is due to the fact that peaches have the looks and taste, the rosy cheeks and sweetness that have made them synonymous for pretty girls.

Some Peachy Recipes!
But whatever the source of their popularity, you'll find the peach salad and dessert sauce which follow, most pleasing indeed.
Peach Salad: Arrange alternate slices of orange sections and canned sliced peaches in petal form on a bed of lettuce. Combine equal quantities of chopped dates and chopped salted peanuts and moisten with mayonnaise. Form into balls and place one in the center of each peony. Chop candied ginger 2x2, and make 2 white border around the date ball. Serve with cream mayonnaise to which has been added a little chopped pimiento and chopped green pepper.
Peach Meringues: Cut pale sponge cake in rounds with the cookie cutter. Slightly moisten each round with the juice from maraschino cherries. Put half a teaspoon cut side up on each piece of cake and fill cavities with halved maraschino cherries. Make a meringue, using three table-spoons confectioner's sugar to each egg white, and pile thickly over the peaches. Bake in a very slow oven until the meringue is done—30' for fifteen minutes.
Peach Ford Sauce: Creamy sautéed cup butter and one cup confectioner's sugar, add one-fourth teaspoon vanilla and two-thirds cup of sliced, drained peaches. Chill and serve over pudding or cake.

Cruises and Cheeses



If you like to peek in pantries filled with good things to eat, you would be interested in the supply room on board a big ocean cruiser. For one thing, there is apt to be a whole room devoted to storing just cheese alone.

Tons of Food

If you take the West Indies cruise, for instance, on board the Kingholm, chef Hjalmar Hokanson will not only take you around some twenty-five tons of beef, fifty thousand eggs, two thousand pounds of coffee, three tons of sugar, preposterous amounts of evaporated milk, and some 5,000 pounds of Swedish health bread, but he will point with greatest pride to a large refrigerator room which contains nothing but cheese.

There are little round boxes of Gruyere cheese from the land of the pale Edelweiss, stacks of pumpkin-colored cheese from pastoral villages in Wisconsin where Holsteins are alleged to nibble daffodils along with their meadow grass, as well as the snapper cheeses from France and Italy, and the appetizing yellow Swedish cheese.

One's own household cannot give space to a room just for cheese, nor does the average home refrigerator have room for the variety of cheeses one would like to keep on hand for late suppers, after-theatre parties, and impromptu eats most any time. But now that so many delicious varieties of cheese can be bought in cans, a generous shelf of the pantry can be devoted to cheeses without fear of their becoming too "snappy" for use.
