DISORDERS MARK SHOPMEN'S STRIKE

BODIES FOUND IN CONCHO RIVER

Special to The Ledger: SAN ANGELO, July 7.—The bodies of Miss Jewell Ball, age 17, and Guy L. Stanford, young boatmaker, were recovered from the Concho River yesterday, 40 hours after the two parties were drowned, and after a large number of searchers had spent the night dragging the river and blasting with dynamite in an effort to bring the bodies to the surface of the water.

Stanford was buried yesterday afternoon and Miss Ball was buried at 10 o'clock this morning.

Miss Ball lost her life while in wading and for the purpose of watching her younger brother and sister and three of the Stanford children, who were in wading. The girl was clad in a blue shirt waist and striped overalls and was barefooted, when she fell in the deep water. Stanford went to her rescue and lost his life in efforts to save her. The young man was almost out of the water with the drowning girl when she pulled him under and both perished.

Persons who knew Stanford, and strangers, paid a tribute to his heroism by attending the funeral and a move has been started to obtain aid and hero recognition for his widow and children from the Carnegie hero fund.

MOVE BY G. O. P. DEFEATED AGAIN

By Associated Press WASHINGTON, July 7.—The Republican move to enforce the cloture rule on the administration tariff bill failed today in the Senate when a vote on the action to enforce the existing rule was announced as 45 to 35, or 9 less than the required two-thirds majority. This would allow prohibition enforcement officers to board and search vessels within six marine leagues or eighteen geographical miles off the coast of the United States, under the amendment to the tariff bill proposed today by Senator Sterling, Representative from South Dakota and a member of the judiciary committee.

Democrats voted solidly against the measure and were joined by five Republicans.

MAN WOUNDED IN LITTLE FRACAS

Sheriff Flynt was called to the Clappitt farm, four miles Northwest of Ballinger Friday morning when it was reported that a man had been killed in a fight, between two neighbors on that farm.

An investigation disclosed that the first report circulated in town was false and that the extent of the trouble consisted in minor wounds as the result of a fight between Will Wood and Roy Smith.

The difficulty was the outgrowth of trouble over livestock and pasturage rights on the farm, and Smith and Wood went to combat with rocks and a hammer as weapons, it is alleged. Woods suffered a scratch on the face and Smith a wound on the head, inflicted either from a rock or hammer.

Both parties came to town, one to see the doctor, and the other to make peace with the law.

FIRE COMPANY CALLED TO OIL STOVE BLAZE

An unruly oil stove at the home of C. W. McKinney on Sixth Street was the cause of an alarm being turned in about noon Friday. The fire truck made the run, but the stove had been put under control before the fire fighters reached the scene, and no damage to speak of resulted.

RUSSIAN LEADER HAS BREAKDOWN

By Associated Press GENEVA, Switzerland, July 7.—George Tchitcherin, Russian soviet foreign minister, who headed the soviet delegation to the Genoa economic conference, has entered a private hospital, and is suffering from a nervous breakdown, according to a dispatch from Innesbruck, Austria, reporting his arrival there.

SAN SABA LOSES BIG PECAN CROP

(San Saba News) Webster Miller informs the News reporter that he has been examining the pecans on the river for several weeks. Some weeks ago he discovered what he feared was an attack on the pecans by case borers, and kept up a careful watch. The past week has developed the pest to be a real menace.

This pest is appearing this year nearly a month late, as it usually makes its appearance in May and hope had been entertained that the pecans would be spared this year. Apparently the case borer is making a strong bid and the damage is now anticipated to be very serious. The young pecans are in that stage of growth when the damage is fatal.

GUARD MAY NOT GO IN TRAINING

The Texas National Guard is due to go in training on July 28th for fifteen days, but the chances are good for the Ballinger company to be missing when the "top kick" calls the roll and the training camp is organized.

The law requires that at least 60 per cent of the enlistment of a company must report before that company will be admitted to the training camp, and Capt. Clinton B. Penn of the headquarters company, reports that he is experiencing trouble in getting sixty per cent of his men lined up for the trip.

Under the new law the matter of training is voluntary with the men, the law not being compulsory, and does not force a man to leave his work or place of business. Most of the members of the Ballinger company have employment and it is stated can not arrange to get away from home for the time required, while quite a number of the members are out of the city for the summer.

A check-up is being made of those who can attend the training camp and it will be known in a few days whether the Ballinger company will report for training or not.

IRISH FIGHTER WOUND FATAL

DUBLIN, July 7.—Cathal Brugha, one of Eamonn de Valera's chief lieutenants, died today from wounds received Wednesday while trying to fight his way clear after the surrender of the republican garrison in the Sackville Street area.

MAY KEEP RECORD OF AUTO TOURISTS

It has been suggested, and it is a good idea, that local garages provide themselves with registers and keep a record of auto tourists by requesting them to register when they stop for repairs or supplies.

When the tourist camp is in shape, a place should be provided for such registration, and tourists requested to write their names and residences.

Aside from furnishing valuable information such registrations would prove interesting if published from week to week showing how many tourists pass thru Ballinger, who they are and where they live.

Such undertaking would not be much trouble and would be well worth the effort for a while at least.

RESERVE OFFICER CALLED TO TRAIN

The war department has issued orders for a training camp for reserve officers, and Lieutenant Frank M. Pearce, of this city, who is on the reserve, will report for duty at Camp Travis, San Antonio, on July 11th.

Under the general orders governing the reserve officers corps all those on the list are subject to fifteen days training each year, or more, with the officer's consent, and are subject to call to duty in cases of emergency, and the secretary of war has the authority to say what is an emergency.

Lieut. Pearce signed up with the reserve corps when he was mustered out after seeing service overseas as an officer in the expeditionary force during the World War. He is now answering the call for fifteen days training and will be absent from home and from his place of business from July 11th to July 26th.

There will be more than 190 officers of the reserve in training at Camp Travis, and men will be selected from this reserve force for instructors in the citizens' training camp which will be held in August.

Be Wise and Advertise

CHICAGO, July 7.—A federal injunction restraining strikers from interfering with railroad operations, molesting workmen, and unlawfully picketing the shops, was issued at East St. Louis, Illinois, and at Shreveport, Louisiana, today.

The mobilization of state troops was ordered by Adjutant General Black, following disturbances at the Wabash Railroad yards in Decatur, Illinois.

Strike sympathizers were dispersed by the police at Burnside, near Chicago, after a demonstration here today.

ST. LOUIS, July 7.—J. M. Kurn, President of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railway, today issued a statement saying, "The strikers succeeded in driving off sixty-three of our men with threats of lynching at the road's shops in Springfield, Mo. "Another lot, consisting of twenty-eight men were taken away from the chief of police of Springfield shortly after they had been unloaded at our barracks."

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 7.—The Chicago & Alton railroad shops at Slater, Missouri, will be opened as soon as protection for the workmen can be obtained, Charles M. Miller, attorney for the road, announced today, after a telephone conversation with Superintendent Marquette at Slater.

HOUSTON, July 7.—Extra police were detailed to the Southern Pacific shop section, and three deputy United States marshals were assigned today to the International & Great Northern properties, after a number of clashes were reported to the city officials.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., July 7.—National Guard companies at Warrensburg and Booneville have been ordered to gather at their armories as a precaution, Gov. Hyde announced today.

JUDGE JOHN W. BRADY ELECTIONEERING HERE

Judge John W. Brady, Associate Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, visited Ballinger Thursday in the interest of his candidacy for reelection to the place which he is filling. Judge Brady was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Judge Rice during the Hobby administration, and was re-elected, and is making the race for the second full term.

Miss Elizabeth Jones, of Talpa, is visiting friends in Ballinger.

E. Atkinson left Thursday afternoon for Louisiana, where he goes to work in the oil fields of that state until crop harvesting time here.

The governor said that the order should not be construed as a mobilization command.

DENISON, Tex., July 7.—With the introduction of strike breakers, Denison awaits the next development of the local railroad strike situation. A few men to replace the striking shopmen of the M. K. & T. Railroad were brought here last night and will be housed by the road in their property with a private guard being thrown around the Katy shops.

TOPEKA, Kans., July 7.—A state warrant was issued today against T. Huntington, president, and Thomas Hill Erie, secretary, of the Federated Shop Crafts Union No. 11, of Topeka, in which the two officials were charged with violation of Kansas Industrial Court orders issuing a strike order which resulted in the walkout of men in the Santa Fe shops on July 1st.

CHICAGO, July 7.—With B. M. Jewell, head of the striking railway shopmen still maintaining a conciliatory attitude, but declining to make the first move toward negotiations, increasing number of outbreaks and disorders marked the closing of the hours of the first week since the railway shopmen walked off the job last Saturday.

WOULD DISARM WHOLE WORLD

By Associated Press PARIS, July 7.—The outstanding feature of the closing of the League of Nations disarmament commission here today was announced by Dr. Rivas Vicuna, Chilean ambassador to France, that Chile would demand the inclusion in the agenda of the fifth Pan-American Conference to be held in March at Santiago, the whole question of world disarmament for both naval and military forces.

July Fourth casualties total fifty dead and about 250 injured up to date with some boxes to hear from. Drownings, automobile accidents, explosions and firearms all come in for debits in the game of death. New York leads with 11 dead and 45 wounded.

THE FUNNY SIDE OF POLITICS

As a man thinketh so he is. A Washington correspondent for a Texas newspaper which is supporting Culberson for the Senate, writes from far away Washington to the said Texas newspaper; that the consensus of opinion in Washington is that Culberson will win.

The Washington correspondent, or the folks forming the consensus of opinion, are better judges than the Texas folks who are on the scene of battle. Start out and ask every man you meet what he thinks about it, and you will find the consensus of opinion pretty well divided, overbalancing only according to the section of the state where you make the test.

Every candidate has his following and it will require the counting of the ballots to tell who will be in the run-off.

Texas is a big spot on the map, and home formed opinions of the strength of any candidate is based only on the wildest guess, and if Texas folks who are on the ground cannot make an intelligent guess as to how the political winds are blowing, how can Washington politicians figure out an intelligent opinion?

In this case the "consensus of opinion" is just a piece of political propaganda which will not be worth a tinker's tam as a vote catcher.

This is an intelligent age in politics, as well as in everything else, and even the candidate thinks he can stand on the stump and bumble the people

into believing that he will revolutionize things if elected, has another guess coming. This is an age in which the goods must be delivered tied up in a nice package. People are reading with an open mind, and attend political speakings with open ears, and little the candidates are saying find lodgment therein. Even many women are refusing to let their husbands do their thinking in matters politically. There are over a million voters in Texas, and more than half of them are ready to make a choice, and that choice will not be governed by any propaganda sent out from Washington by correspondents to papers supporting some particular candidate.

A BIG TASK

The largest vote in the history of Texas primary elections will be cast in the election to be held on July 22nd, and the task of counting the ballots and making the returns will be a big one.

Not only will the increased vote cause more work on the part of the election boards, but press reporters will be forced to remain on the job late, and telegraph wires will be burdened in carrying the returns to the anxious throngs which will crowd before the bulletin boards on the night of the twenty-second.

The voting strength of Texas this year is given at 1,165,910, as compared with 811,000 two years ago, or a gain of more than a third of a million.

Two years ago fifty-five per cent of the voting strength of the state was cast in the primary. At the same ratio the total vote in the primary this year will be 641,000, or 191,000 more than was cast two years ago.

Two years ago there were only twenty-five names on the state ticket while there are thirty-three names on the state ticket this year. Most of the counties have fewer candidates for county offices than they had two years ago, but as a whole the ticket is longer than two years ago.

The Ledger is perfecting arrangements with every election manager in Runnels county to supply this office with the returns at the earliest possible moment on the night of the election, and an effort will be made to make Runnels county one of the first counties to make a report.

Returns from other parts of the state will begin to come in at The Ledger office by seven-thirty or eight o'clock, and flashes during the early hours will probably announce results in some races. Unless the vote is close The Ledger will tell who is who in its Sunday morning election special which will be delivered shortly after sunrise.

Mrs. D. C. Simpson, who was reported seriously ill, first of the week, is improving according to reports from her bedside Friday.

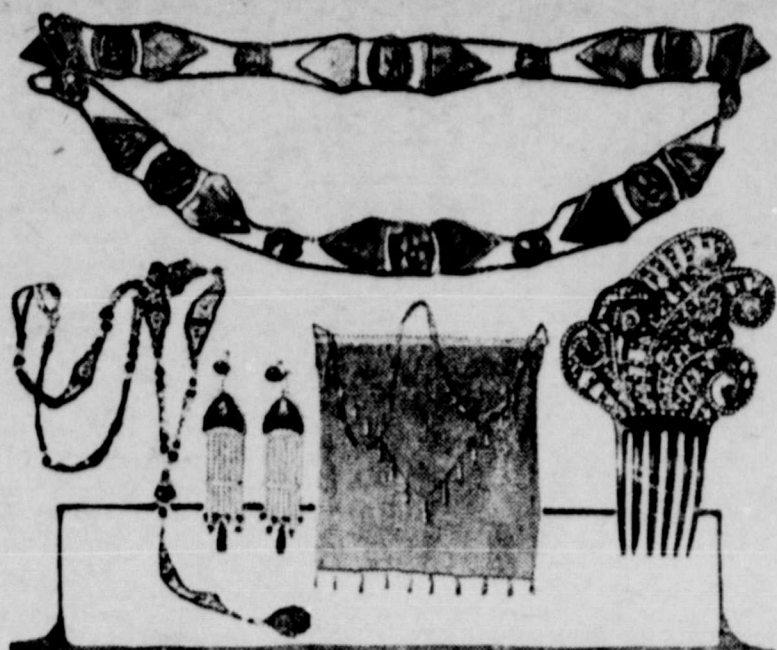
