ASKS NEFF TO EXTEND MILITARY ZONE

INSANE MAN QUILTS FIGHT ON GUARDS

HINTON, W. V., July 27.—John Fredrick, an insane man who barricaded himself in his house for thirteen days, and resisted the efforts of the officers to arrest him, after he had killed one man and wounded four others, this morning appeared at the front door, threw up his hands and asked for a drink of water.

Two troopers, who with others had resorted to every known means, including the use of tear gas and pot-shot firing, to dislodge Fredrick, gave him a drink of water and led him to the county jail. The man refused to answer questions and appears in a dazed condition. Fredrick had two bullet wounds showing that the officers had wounded him in efforts to dislodge him. Physicians who are treating the man wounded by the insane man during the firing of the thirteen days, dressed a bullet wound in Fredrick's right arm and another in his right leg.

ST. LOUIS, July 27.—President Farrington, of the Illinois miners union, today rescinded his action by calling a state miners convention at Peoria on August 3rd. He said that he was calling off the convention because of the premature newspaper reports in announcing the convention.

SPRINGFIELD, July 27.—A disruption of the United Mine Workers of America, if President Frank Farrington, of the Illinois Mine Workers Union, is permitted to proceed with his program, was predicted today by Secretary Watt, of the Springfield Sub-District.

SURVEYORS RACE STILL IN DOUBT

It will require an official count to determine who is the nominee for County Surveyor in Runnels County. The Ledger stated Wednesday that S. D. Williams had probably been nominated, but a recheck of the returns compiled by The Ledger shows that J. E. Powell is leading Mr. Williams by five votes.

Returns received Saturday night following the election gave Powell 308 votes and Williams 357. Rowena came in Monday, and that box voted 54 for Powell and nothing for Williams. This placed Powell five to the good.

There was no name on the ticket for surveyor, and a very light vote was polled for this office, and in making returns several of the boxes did not report the race for surveyor, and it will not be known until the committee meets next Monday and canvasses the returns who the nominee for surveyor is. However, since Rowena came in with the unanimous vote for Surveyor Powell, placing him in the lead, it is believed that he will lead by a small majority.

NEW BUILDING FOR WINTERS TO GIVE PARENTS BIRTH DIPLOMA

WINTERS, July 27.—Rapid progress is being made on the new Armbrecht building here on Post Office street. The new building, which is 50 by 112 feet is being built next to the Armbrecht building which is occupied by the Clements-Harwell Company. The new building will also be occupied by Clements-Harwell Co., dealers in hardware, furniture, implements and undertaking supplies. This company is adding a full line of dry goods.

The cost of the new Armbrecht building is about \$10,000. The structure is of concrete and brick with metal ceiling and will be completed about August first. C. E. Woodrow, local contractor is the contractor on the job.

A. Armbrecht the owner of the Armbrecht buildings, came to Winters in 1891 and has made this city his home ever since. He owns three brick and concrete buildings in the city and a fine 200 acre farm. He states that in the near future he contemplates building another building 50 by 112 feet and possibly other buildings later.

Work is expected to start in a few days on the new eight room school building, which will be built of stone, costing approximately \$18,000. This building will be located near the present school building and when completed both buildings will be steam heated.

105 PRISONERS ESCAPE JAIL

BELFAST, July 27.—Through a hole blown in the prison wall by a mine bomb, one hundred and five prisoners escaped from the Dundalk jail in the county of Louth today. The shock of the explosion shook the town and did considerable damage. Windows were shattered in the county hospital and dwellings were damaged in the town's best residential district.

Fifty of the prisoners who escaped were rearrested by early afternoon, and other arrests, including Michael Donnelly, commander of the Irish irregulars, is expected.

AUSTIN, July 27.—Furthering the campaign to have the birth of children registered with the State Health department, Dr. J. C. Twitchell, state register of vital statistics, has prepared birth certificates that will be presented to parents on application. A fifty cent charge is made for the certificate to pay expenses of preparation.

The certificate as prepared by Dr. Twitchell contains all of the information concerning the child and its parents. It is hand-somely embossed and has a place for a picture of the child.

Dr. Twitchell says the certificate when properly filled out will stand in any court in the country should the child's parentage or birth ever be questioned. The certificate bears the State of Texas seal and is sworn to by Dr. Twitchell, the information given him by designated registers of the various counties.

The first of these certificates was presented to William Herbert Beasley, Jr., son of Assistant State Health Officer, W. H. Beasley.

Dr. Twitchell has an ample supply of the blanks and is daily sending the full certificate to parents over the state.

96 OUT OF 106 SUPPORT CHURCH

WASHINGTON, July 27.—According to statistics gathered by the Federal Council of Churches, and printed in the Year Book of the churches which has just been issued, of every 106 persons in the United States, 10 have no religious affiliation and 96 are affiliated through membership, financial support, attendance or other ties with various religious bodies as follows:

WASHINGTON, July 27.—President Harding's conferences with the railroad executives and union shop leaders, revive hopes of an early settlement of the railway walk out.

Railway officials assert that passenger and freight service is practically normal and that increased recruiting of new workmen for the shops is building up new shop forces.

The union leaders maintain that the walkout of shopmen continues one hundred per cent perfect and effective and are insisting that there has been no return to work by the strikers.

The only disturbances reported today is the kidnapping and assaulting of three non-union men at Galesburg, Ill.

DENISON, July 27.—Adjutant General Barton and Col Nimon, commanding the National Guardsmen encamped here, on the second day of martial law, it is understood, have asked Governor Neff to extend the military zone in Denison so as to include the Missouri, Oklahoma & Gulf railway property. The trackage, roundhouse and coal shutes of this road are not included in the area declared under martial law by Governor Neff's proclamation last Tuesday. General Barton and Colonel Nimon neither affirmed or denied his report when asked about it. There has been no trouble so far and none is expected as long as the troops are on duty, according to the officers in charge.

Non-union men are replacing

the striking shopmen, new men continuing to arrive, the Katy railroad officials say, and by Friday they state that they expect to have four hundred non-union men at work in the shops. Spokesmen for the shop crafts union say that they are in the fight to the end, and claim that the union shopmen are remaining out one hundred per cent strong. The union leaders claim that sixty non-union workers brought here to work in the Katy locomotive shops quit work voluntarily last night. The strike leaders say that the men quitting their jobs had left Denison.

Representatives of both the railways and the unions expressed a willingness for the railroad property to remain under military supervision until all danger of trouble had passed.

FARMERS AFTER 10,000 MEMBERS STRANGE STORY SAILOR'S WILL

DALLAS, July 27.—A statewide campaign for 10,000 new members over present membership will be started in August by the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association, preparatory to moving the cotton crop, G. H. Alford secretary of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, has announced. This membership goal, if reached, will increase the present membership fifty per cent.

Final plans for the membership campaign will be made at a conference of county representatives from all parts of the state to be held here today.

Between 300,000 and 400,000 bales of cotton will be handled by the Texas cotton association this year, Secretary Alford predicted. Less than 100,000 bales—94,472—were handled by the organization last year. Adverse crop conditions will reduce the amount that would have been handled, the secretary said.

LONDON, July 27.—Strange as the story of any document told in fiction is that of a will which has just been admitted to probate and is now filed in Somerset House.

It is the "last will and testament" of a sailor, William Skinner, who lost his life when his ship, the Indefatigable, was sunk in the battle of Jutland. It is in the form of the ordinary identification disc. On one side, in the usual deeply punched letters, appears the name, number, rating and religion of the man to whom it had been issued.

On the other side the disc appears at first sight to be just a circular piece of smooth, polished brass. But when viewed at a certain angle, there can be seen about 75 minutely engraved words.

With a microscope they can be plainly read. They constitute Skinner's will by which he bequeathed everything to his wife. The disc had been recovered from the sea with Skinner's body and on being cleaned revealed its secret.

BALLOON MAKES RECORD FLIGHT

BELLEVILLE, Ill., July 27.—The longest flight ever attempted by the army lighter than air service was completed today when the dirigible balloon Ad-4 arrived at Scott Field near here. The balloon arrived from Langley Field, Va., a distance of 1100 miles, making the trip in forty hours and forty minutes actual flying time. Two stops were made. The balloon will be stationed here permanently.

Plaintiff further alleges that, on or about October 24th, 1907, in Tom Green County, Texas, she was lawfully married to the defendant; that they continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about August 23rd, 1921; that during their said marriage life she was a dutiful and faithful wife to the defendant and strove at all times to make his life and home happy; that she was kind and affectionate to her said husband, but that he, unmindful of his duties and obligations of his marital vows, failed to treat her with proper consideration in that, that he was unmindful of her support and happiness to which she was entitled.

That on or about August 23rd, 1921, defendant left plaintiff and has remained away from her since said date; that he left with a shipment of stock to be sold and disposed of in South Texas; that at the time defendant went away he left her and their child in Miles, Texas, unprovided for; that between that date and October 12th, 1921, she received small remittances from him, but that since said last date she has not received any support whatsoever from him, nor has she heard from him; that since said last date she has been forced to labor for and support herself and child; that he is not now nor has he since said last date provided for her support, but has wholly failed so to do.

Plaintiff further alleges that defendant's actions and conduct to and toward her are of such nature as to render their further living together as husband and wife insupportable to her.

Plaintiff further alleges that as the fruit of their said marriage one child, Winnie T. Jackson, a girl now of the age of 11 years, was born to them; that said child needs the care of her said mother, and that its best interest demands that it should be awarded to the care, custody and control of its said mother, the plaintiff herein; that she is able and willing to support and provide for the child, rear and educate it, and so desires the exclusive custody, care and control of their said daughter, Winnie T. 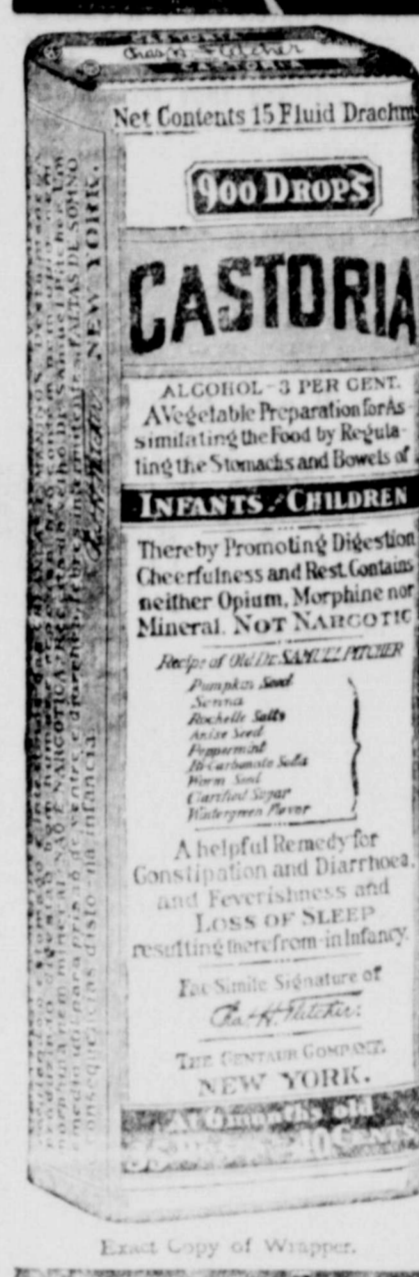

PRESIDENT TO ATTEND REUNION

NEW ORLEANS, July 27.—New Orleans will be a center of national interest during the American Legion national convention, October 16th to 21st, as a result of the presence of numerous famous political and military leaders.

President Harding has written convention headquarters that he will attend if the pressure of public affairs does not interfere. A similar reply has been received from General John J. Pershing who led the Legion men in France, and who met with them in Kansas City last fall.

During the last week, convention headquarters has been advised that Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and Kennesaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of organized baseball, will be among the distinguished guests.

Within the next few weeks, the Legion expects to receive word that a number of distinguished World War leaders of allied powers will come to New Orleans. The convention committee hopes to entertain more notables than the convention in Kansas City last year which was attended by Marshal Foch, General Diaz, General Jacques, Admiral Beatty, General Pershing and Vice President Coolidge.

Furthermore, there are many girls with a special attitude and liking for the work, who desire the opportunities for training and experience. It is the hope of the department to make the course one of the most thorough and efficient in the school."

As a means of financing the new Manufacturers and Automobile building the latest addition to the permanent improvement at the Fair, an advance sale of tickets has been announced. Denominations of "Thrill Tickets" may be purchased in advance at a discount of 20 per cent under the usual admission charges at the Fair.

Each Thrill Ticket will be good for one fifty-cent admission at either the main gates, vehicle gates, grand stand or coliseum. The tickets are offered in books containing five tickets for \$2, two tickets for \$1, or fifty tickets for \$10. The tickets are fully transferable and may be used by whoever presents them at the gates. One or two or in fact as many as may be desired, can be removed from the books and used singly or in numbers.

Remittances to The State Fair of Texas, at Dallas, will be promissory for and the proper amount of tickets sent to the purchaser.

The Mexican Artillery Band, said to be the finest musical organization in the Republic, has been secured for the State Fair of Texas, Oct. 6-15 at Dallas.

Permission for the band to come to the United States was granted by President Obregon, following a visit to him by State Fair officials. This band will be the principal musical attraction for this year's Fair, and will appear in the Coliseum.

COOKE COUNTY LIBRARY TO SHOW AT STATE FAIR

A demonstration of the methods of the Cooke County community library will be made at the State Fair, Oct. 6-15. Space has been allotted and Miss Lillian Genter of Gainesville, will be in charge. Cooke county is now supplying its rural districts with a free book service, as well as to the ninety-two rural schools of the county.

IMPLEMENT MADE TO AID FARMERS

CHICAGO, July 27.—A policy originated as "The 1922 Business Model" framed to protect the farmer against purchase of tractors, power plants, implements and the like unsuited to his needs was announced here today by the National Institute of Progressive Farming.

"It is more than a policy; it is a pledge binding upon the large number of manufacturers to the farm trade who at my request attended a meeting here recently," explained Guy H. Hall, director of the institute.

In their house cleaning during the last decade, the newspapers of the United States have been the slogan "Honest Advertising" a living fact. The impetus that this has given to business cannot be stimulated but it must run into many millions of dollars.

The newspaper reader of a generation ago who answered advertisements with misgiving, now does so with confidence.

"The newspapers therefore have done their part, but only the manufacturers themselves can establish a twin reform. The name of that twin is 'Honest Salesmanship.'

The National Institute of Progressive Farming" was developed not only to promote modern methods of farming, but to act as an interpreter between the farmer and those from whom he purchases his equipment. It was for this reason the manufacturers met in my office. Their pledge means that instructions are now going to thousands of retailers and agents throughout the country not attempt sale where there is not a certainty of profit and benefit to the buyers.

"It should be explained in the infancy of the tractor industry all sorts of unqualified persons went into that business and sales were made indiscriminately. Many of the machines did not hold up, or were unsuited to individual needs, but while many farmers wasted the purchase price, their loss was small compared to the reaction on the industry itself. That condition has been largely corrected, but the manufacturers, themselves, at our meeting, admitted, without a single dissenting voice, that a constant watch must be kept to preserve a solid growth in the future.
