## STRIKE BREAKERS HURT; UNIONS MARKING TIME

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 4.—Six men employed in the local Santa Fe shops are alleged to have been seized by unidentified parties and taken into the country near here last night and whipped with wet ropes.

Two of the men are missing and have not returned to work. Two of the four who did return have been given medical attention.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—No new developments were reported in the strike situation today. The unions have accepted President Harding's proposal, and feel that it is the railroad's next move, while the letters sent out by the telegrapher's union to the twelve big unions asking for a conference on the strike question, have brought no replies yet.

It is the opinion among leaders in both labor and administration circles that the government will have to take a stronger hand in the situation and probably assume control of the roads before the strike is settled, while some take a more optimistic view, and believe that both sides will come to terms.

### GAS ENGINE PUMPING WATER AT CEMETERY

While the Cemetery Association owns two windmills, it was necessary to install a gasoline engine this week to supply water for irrigating flowers and shrubbery in the cemetery. There has not been sufficient wind for a week or ten days to operate the wind mills, and fearing that shrubbery and flowers in the cemetery would die, the association installed a gas engine and there is water now for irrigation. Those who have not been looking after their flowers in the cemetery because the impression went out that the water played out, can now get back on the job.

E. Shepperd a member of the Cemetery board, and who is taking much interest in the work in making a report of the work said:

"The board wishes to call attention to the water users of the Cemetery Association that it is strictly against the rule to open hydrants and leave them open. Our supply will not justify the tanks to be emptied over night and then have no water to keep the young trees growing. If the rules are not regarded in the future the sexton will be instructed to cut the water off when he goes off duty.

"We are trying to serve the lot owners of the Association to the very best advantage and we believe that this request is in the interest of all concerned. We invite your criticism so that we may know better how to serve you, and suggestions will have due consideration."

## BELL'S BODY IN GRANITE TOMB

SYDNEY, N. S. Aug. 4.—The body of Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone, who died Wednesday, will be laid to rest this afternoon from the home of the deceased in Beinn Breagh Mountain, which the deceased occupied for thirty-five successive summers.

Interment will take place at sunset in a granite tomb which was blasted in the summit of the mountain at the request of Dr. Bell as his last resting place on the Beinn Breagh estate. The body will be borne to its burial place, the highest point in Eastern Nova Scotia, by members of the Bell estate, and there laid away on its lofty lookout with simple ceremonies.

The ceremony consisted in the singing of Robert Louis XXXX Stevenson's requiem. At the hour the body was laid in the tomb, it was announced that all Bell telephones in the United States would be silent for one minute.

Messages of condolence were received at the Beinn Breagh estate from William Howard Taft, Chief Justice of United States; James J. Davis, secretary of labor; New York and American Society of Civil Engineers; American Institute of Mining and Engineering; American Society of Mechanical Engineers; American Institute of Electric Engineers; United Engineering Society, representing the engineering profession of America.

## TEXAS CRUDE DROPS

DALLAS, Aug. 4.—A reduction of fifteen cents per barrel in Cement Oklahoma crude oil was announced today.

A reduction of twenty-five cents in the price of other crude oils, effective today, was also announced by the Magnolia Petroleum Co. The new prices apply in the Electric, Burkhornett, Henryetta, Ranger, Stephens county district, Strawn, Thrall districts. The Texas crude is now quoted at \$1.50 per barrel.

The Augusta, Kansas, Yale, Comanche, Cushing, Duncan, Oklahoma crude are quoted at \$1.25 while the Cement, Oklahoma, crude is listed under the new price at 85 cents per barrel, which is within ten cents of the low record price for the oil.

According to Magnolia headquarters here the price of Cement crude fell to 67.5 cents on June 4th, 1921, and subsequently advanced to \$1.00 per barrel. It recently began to decline in connection with the reductions of other oils.

Full storage tanks and large surplus supply is given as the reason for the low price.

## SENATE TO PROBE MUNSEY CHARGE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Frank A. Munsey, owner and publisher of the New York Herald, was charged in the senate by Senator Gooding, of Idaho, chairman of the republican agricultural tariff bloc, with fighting the administration tariff bill because of Munsey's investments in Europe which would be effected by the tariff bill.

Mr. Munsey demanded the charge made by Gooding be investigated, and Gooding immediately made a demand that the senate also investigate the St. Louis Globe-Democrat and other newspapers which he said were the most bitter in their attacks on the administration's tariff bill.

Senator Gooding also requested that an investigation of the Boston Herald, Chicago Tribune, New York Times, Cleveland Plain Dealer and the Minneapolis Tribune be made.

## GERMANY MOVES MONEY TO PREVENT PAYING OUT

### BIG DECREASE IN TEXAS BANKS

AUSTIN, Aug. 4.—Although deposits in the 983 state banks in Texas decreased more than seven million dollars during the past three months, as shown by the consolidated report on the condition of state banks just issued by the Department of Banking and Insurance, the present condition of Texas banking institutions is entirely satisfactory and encouraging, in the opinion of state banking department officials.

The decrease in deposits is credited to the fact that Texas farmer have marketed the largest portion of last year's crops and are now waiting for the returns from the crops of the present season. The quarter ending June 30th, it is pointed out, is the low ebb financial season in the state. With the opening of the marketing season this month, deposits are expected to show a decided increase by the close of the next quarter, September 30th.

Total deposits in state banks on June 30th showed a decrease of approximately sixteen million dollars over the total deposits on June 30, 1921. Banking officials account for this decrease by the fact that there are forty two less state banks at the present time than at a corresponding period last year. The decrease has been caused by failures, consolidations and conversion into national banks, it is said.

PARIS, Aug. 4.—German banks have within the last forty-eight hours, transferred to Holland and Switzerland between sixty and seventy million French francs, which were deposited in American and other foreign banks in Paris, the Associated Press learned today.

The money was hurriedly withdrawn from banks here as a result of the anticipation to secure by the French government part of the penalties imposed on Germany's refusal to pay two million pounds installments due for private debts contracted for before the war with French citizens.

Judging from reports on cotton crop conditions coming in from some sections of the country, in some cases chickens were counted before they hatched. Only a reduction in renditions will prevent the highest tax bill in the history of Texas this year. The tax board has fixed the state rate at the limit of 35c. 35 cents school, 35 cents ad valorem and 5 cents pension fixes the total tax to be collected by the state at 75 cents.

WAGES AND STRIKES
While other grievous figures in the present strike situation, the action of the labor board in cutting the shopmen's wages precipitated the walk out. The wage scale for the pre-war, war and present period, shows that the shopmen acted a little heavy in throwing up their jobs.
Machinist and car men are the most important workmen in the shops, and the following comparison of wage scales for the two classes throws some light on the wage part of the controversy between the unions and the rail roads:
December 1917, the wage of machinist was 50.5 cents per hour, car men 37.7 cents.
January 1920, the wage of machinist was 72.3 cents per hour, car men 68 cents.
May 1920, the wage of machinists was 85.3 cents per hour, car men 81 cents.
July 1921, the wage of machinists was 77.3 cents per hour, car men 73 cents.
Under present decision of the Railroad Labor Board, effective July 1, 1922, the wage of machinists is fixed at 70.3 cents per hour; car men 64.4 cents.

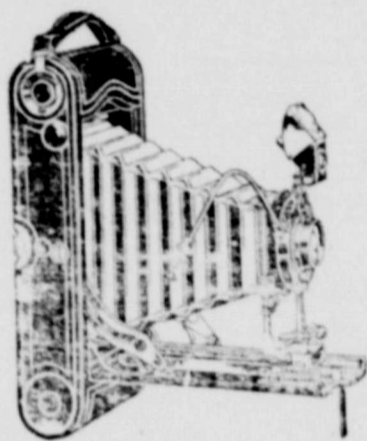
