ANNUAL MEETING OF MAIL CARRIERS

FORT WORTH, Aug. 5.—Problems of the rural mail carriers and methods of improving rural mail delivery will be the central themes of the twentieth annual convention of the Texas Rural Letter Carriers' association which will open here Monday, and continue Tuesday and Wednesday, August 7, 8 and 9. More than 200 rural carriers from all parts of the state are expected to attend the annual gathering. Plans for the meet have been completed, according to members of the local committee in charge.

Headliners on the convention program include a representative of the U. S. Postoffice department, Adolph Gene, of Austin, rural paymaster; Paul Blank, state organizer of the association and J. W. Heaton, who will speak on the obligations of the rural carrier. Entertainment features of the convention include a barbecue and automobile drive over Fort Worth Monday night, and a sociable Tuesday night.

Y. M. C. A. IS HELPING MEXICAN BOYS

The idea of the house is to teach the Mexican boys the idea of American life and the things that stand for the better part of life in general.

RECEIVES COPIES IRRIGATION MAPS

Engineer Stephens received ten copies of the advance sheets of the Colorado Valley irrigation maps from Washington this week, and he the maps in his office. 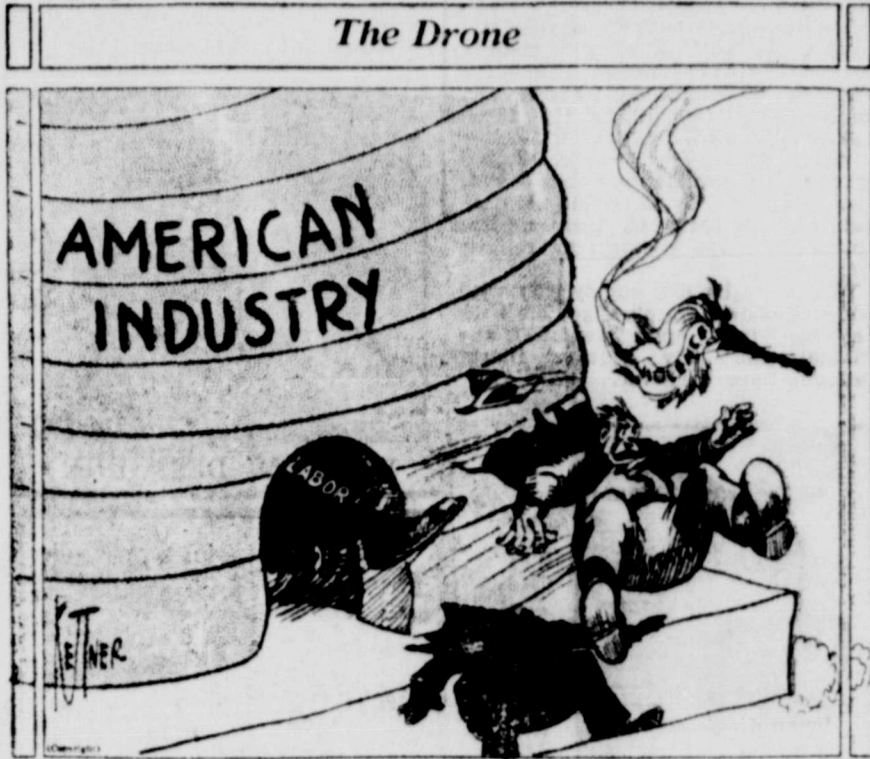

GERMANS PENALIZED ON FAILURE TO PAY DEBTS

PARIS, Aug. 5.—The French government today ordered in effect the penalties against Germany for the failure to pay in full the installments on pre-war debts to the French citizens. The penalties concern German properties sequestered in France. No military action is expected to be involved in the enforcement of penalties.

The penalties also include the immediate suspension of all payments to German Nationals for debts contracted with the French

men before the war, both in France and Alsace-Lorraine. Offices in Paris and at Strasburg which were set up to liquidate these debts have been notified to cease functioning. The agreement under which the Germans were being compensated for house furnishings, stocks, bonds and cash left in Alsace-Lorraine has also been suspended.

If Belgium and Great Britain desire to forego payment from Germany on private debts due to their Nationals this will have no effect upon the positions the French have taken, it was announced.

OTHER UNIONS MAY BE INVOLVED IN R.R. STRIKE

DENISON, Aug. 5.—A serious situation was created here by the reported attack last night upon C. R. Eggleston, a M. K. & T. fireman, by H. F. Grizzle, deputy United States marshal.

Action by the "Big Four" brotherhoods at this terminal is threatened as a result of the alleged attack, and it is believed that a meeting of the Big Four Brotherhood executives was held here last night.

It is understood that Eggleston, according to the police, was struck by a pistol when told to move off the union depot platform. Grizzle, a former Dallas policeman and now serving as deputy United States marshal, was charged with striking the fireman. He was arrested and later released on bond.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 5.—Clerks and employes of the store houses and warehouses employed by the Missouri & Pacific railroad, are taking a ballot to determine whether they shall walk out against a wage reduction recently ordered was announced today.

General Chairman Patterson of the Missouri & Pacific board of adjustment declared that about ten per cent of the membership of the railway clerks union of the road had turned in their vote, and that about ninety per cent of those who had turned their vote were in favor of the strike. There are about six thousand five hundred members of the clerk's union employed by the Missouri & Pacific road.

A wage reduction of about three to four cents per hour was recently fixed by the railroad labor board.

POULTRY SHOW ON DURING FAIR

Poultry fanciers throughout this section will welcome the announcement that the Sixth annual show of the Kunnels County Poultry association will be held this year in connection with the Kunnels County fair, Sept. 14, 15 and 16. The poultry shows held here the past two years have drawn large crowds, and the class of fowls exhibited each year has shown marked improvements.

A small entry fee will be made by the association for entries, and liberal prizes will be awarded for the best cock, cockerel, hen, pullet, pen and flock of each particular breed.

The awarding of prizes for flocks will be an innovation of this year's show, as exhibitors will be allowed to enter a flock of fowls to consist of a cock and eight hens of the same variety, or a cockerel and eight pullets of the same variety.

A poultry expert from the A. & M. college will judge the entries at this year's exhibition.

SCHOOL BOARD AFTER BOOTLEGGERS

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 5.—Members for rural school district No. 30, near here, have adopted a resolution authorizing the school board to announce a reward of \$50 for the conviction of any person transporting or selling intoxicating liquors within the district.

HONG KONG, Aug. 5.—Five thousand lives are believed to have been lost in the typhoon last Wednesday which devastated Sawtow, twenty-four miles north of here, according to an estimate of loss of life received here today.

The typhoon is said to be the worst in the history of Sawtow. Dead bodies are floating amid the wreckage everywhere in the harbor, and nearly every house in the city was damaged, and floods following the wind drove the inhabitants from the houses and they perished in the water.

British coastwise steamers which were wrecked by the typhoon, and left in position to render them easy prey of pirates, fear their cargoes will be looted before they can be salvaged.

DOUBTS DEATH OF JOE FURRY

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—A coffin on the way from Fort Worth, Texas, to Oakland, Calif., said to contain the body of Joe Furry, convicted swindler, caused District Attorney Woolwine to wire authorities in both cities asking that the body be positively identified as that of Furry, was reported here today.

Furry died recently in the Huntsville, Texas, prison, but as dying in prison was said to be a common trick among Furry's band, the authorities doubted the report that he was dead.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—A post mortem examination made at Rusk, Texas, prison revealed that Big Joe Furry died from cancer of the stomach, according to information sent to officials here. Furry was nationally known by the detective agencies. He was convicted for swindling in Texas, being captured by the man who he swindled, after a chase extending to California and back to Florida.

OKLAHOMA TROOP TRAIN WRECKED

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 5.—Two cars and the trucks of the engine of a horse troop train, carrying soldiers to Kansas for National guard duty, were derailed at Dawson five miles east of here early today.

None of the troops were injured, and after several hours delay the cars were placed back upon the rails and the train proceeded to its destination.

CONCEDES REED IS NOMINATED

LOUIS, Aug. 5.—The politicians today agreed that United States Senator Reed had won the senatorial nomination over Breckenridge Long, third assistant secretary of state during the Wilson administration. Reed's plurality in Tuesday's primary is only a matter of doubt as to final count. Returns up to date gives Reed a plurality of 5,972.

FERGUSON FACES POLITICAL PIT

"By God, I'm going to Washington as United States Senator from Texas and there is no one who can stop me, nor no organization."

The above extract is from the speech of James E. Ferguson made at Georgetown Thursday, and published in the Dallas News of Friday.

The profanity indulged in only reflects the character of the man and, if for no other reason is sufficient to defeat him for United States Senator, and forever eliminate him from Texas Politics.

Rip the wet plank from Ferguson's platform and most of his crowd would blot him from their political memory over night. He would have nothing left to stand on.

If it was not for the support of the old liquor following, who like a drowning man grabbing at a straw, are following Ferguson because no other will espouse their cause, supplemented by the anti-Ku Klux prejudice, Ferguson would not receive enough votes to elect him constable in his home precinct.

It is the same old fight, in the same old way, and Ferguson is pledged to use his best efforts to do something he cannot do—overthrow the prohibition law, notwithstanding that the law is a part of the constitution of the United States, which he would have to take an oath to uphold should he be elected. However, he will not have to perjure himself.

Aside from what Ferguson stands for, there are other good and sufficient reasons why the citizens of Texas will not send him to Washington to represent the greatest state in the Union. Texas does not want the world to point to its representative in the senate as an impeached governor. Ferguson was honored by Texas and he trampled that honor under foot for greed.

Texas will not again honor a man with the highest office in the state who turned his back on the democratic party in the time of need, during the reconstruction period when the loyal Americans were trying to overcome their losses and sorrow caused by the awful war. Texas is a democratic state.

Texas American men and American women will not send a man to Washington to represent this state to whom the breweries of Texas swore that they charged out \$150,000 as a bad loan, and who is still espousing the cause of the same gang.

Texas will not send a man to the senate who goes into a hysterical rage because he reads the handwriting on the face of his audience, and sees political oblivion awaiting him over the bill on August 26th, and blackguards in the presence of decent men, women and children.

No, Texas will never do that. Ferguson's Georgetown speech cost him fifty thousand votes in the coming run-off primary. Many people who were disappointed because their candidate was defeated in the first primary and who would have either remained away from the polls, or voted for Ferguson, because they were "scared" will be made to realize what the real issues in the

campaign are, and they will rally to the polls and save Texas from political disgrace.

THE GENTLEMAN

From time to time attention has been called to the unfortunate decay of courtesy and the vanishing of chivalry which was once so characteristic. The Old South produced a race of men distinguished for courtliness, chivalry, and honor. The world never saw a better type of men than were those who shaped the destiny and preserved the traditions of the Sunny Southland. But in this partial age of business hurry, dignity seems to have become a secondary consideration, and the sentiment has given way to sordidness.

While no unmerited condition should be passed on the man who soils his hands in honest labor, and toils in the ranks of those who are accomplishing the brilliant achievements of this wonderful age, yet the spirit of commercialism which appears all-absorbing seems to have little time for the cultivation of amenities, and the developing of that elegant art of being a true gentleman.

This should not be true. When

one becomes so engrossed in professional and commercial problems that they have no time for the development of the finer traits, the sacrifice is really to great for personal good or common weal. The sacred traditions of the Southland should be preserved in the lives of the courtly, courageous and chivalrous men who are the successors of the old-time Southern gentleman who lived amid the air of romance and had their work done by slaves.

Aside from chaste language and courtly manners, there are other marks which distinguish the true gentleman. One of these is manliness. The man must be before the gentleman is. Honor and integrity must be fundamental. Manliness is more than physical courage or brute strength—it is moral fibre and mental vigor. Moral courage and mental capacity never fall below par, and he is every inch a man who, regardless of criticism, has the courage to do his duty.

Cleanliness is another mark of the true gentleman. No man, even tho he have access to the highest circles of society, deserves to be called gentleman if he is impure in his life. Good morals are as essential to the development of character as good food is to the development of the body. The unclean man, instead of developing an higher instincts of his fellow creatures, helps to cultivate their baser passions. It cannot be otherwise, for the region in which dwells his inner self is one of vulgarity and obscenity. The life of the true gentleman is so pure that his associations never fails to be inspiring and uplifting.

Still another mark of the true gentleman is nobleness. The ability to live above the sordid elements in which multitudes revel is an indication of royal character. The man who seorns misrepresentation, hates a lie, discourages deception, decries all kinds of evil conniving, is the man who has within him the elements of imperial power. In such a man Conscience is sovereign. There is no sacrifice of truth for expediency, conviction for popularity, nor manhood for material gain. The true gentleman holds to scorn the moral scavenger, and will not countenance the purveyor of moral filth.

So while the South has opened its gates to the strangers from the North and from other lands, who bring with them their spirit

of thrift and modes of doing business, let us not forget the examples of our fore-fathers. Let not the politeness of the past become a matter of poetic sincerity. Rudeness is never permissible in the man who would be a gentleman. Politeness is always in order. While we are so busy making aliving let us not forget the more important matter of making a life.

POLISH CHILDREN HONOR HOOVER

WARSAW, Poland, Aug. 5.—One of the most remarkable books ever made in Europe has just been completed here and will be sent to America. It is "The Book of Signatures" and is addressed to Herbert Hoover in the name of scores of thousands of Polish children, whose actual signatures are included in the several hundred pages of the volume.

Marshal Pilsudski, the Polish chief of state, wrote the first page, and other pages were written by members of the Polish parliament, the Cabinet, Cardinal Kakowski, the Polish Protestant clergy, the Jewish Rabbis, the students and professors of the Universities, and representatives of all the arts, science, trades and crafts of Poland.

The book is made entirely of Polish parchment and is bound in magnificent hand-embossed leather done in the style of the medieval manuscript volumes.

NEW SUBTERRANEAN RIVER IS FOUND

 GENEVA, Aug. 5.—A great subterranean river, with an outflow of 67,000 gallons of water a minute, has been discovered in the Monte Blanc region. Known as Eaux Belles, this river has thrown underground tributaries which have formed small lakes and wells of extremely pure and cold water in the south east districts of France and some of the southern cantons of Switzerland. The origin of the river is the ancient lower glaciers of Monte Blanc which it has been proved flowed from the bottom as well as the top, the latter supplying indirectly the Rhone and the Rhine.

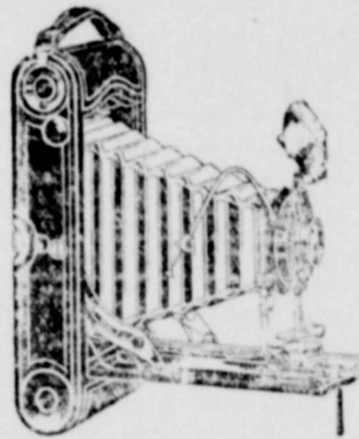
