## Institute Work to Mark Opening Ballinger Schools

Prof. J. M. Skinner, superintendent of the city schools, is perfecting plans for the opening of the Ballinger schools next week. The 1922-23 term will open Monday, September 4th, but the first day will be devoted entirely to institute work, and the pupils are notified not to appear until Tuesday morning, and to observe the program given below for enrolling, etc.

The buildings have undergone repairs during the last few days, and are thoroughly renovated and made ready for the opening of the term, and despite the disadvantages under which the board and faculty are laboring, the term promises to be a successful one.

Superintendent Skinner in announcing the program states that the teachers will assemble Monday morning for institute work. All questions concerning the best interests of the schools will be discussed. The work of the week, he stated, would be as far as possible practical and directly concerned with the idea of making our schools more efficient and profitable, and following is a general outline of the work for the first week. It will be observed by the program that pupils are expected to meet with the teachers from time to time during the week, enroll, be classified and receive their books, and everything will be in order to begin work without delay at the beginning of the second week:

- Monday Morning, Sept. 4**  
General Session:  
1. Talk by Supt. to all teachers.  
2. Explanation of week's program.  
**Monday Afternoon**  
1. High School meets with the Superintendent.  
2. West Ward with Principal.  
3. Central with Principal.

- Tuesday Morning**  
1. Enrollment of pupils in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th grades in South Ballinger.  
2. Pupils West of Pou Street at West Ward. (a.) 1, 2 and 3 in Mrs. Brock's room. (b.) 4 and 5 in Miss Burris' room. (c.) 6th in Mrs. Daniels' room. (e.) All 7's in Mr. Daniels' room.  
3. (a) All 6's on East side of Pou Street with Miss Smith. (b.) 5's with Miss Dark. (c.) 4's with Miss Mills. (d.) 3's with Miss May Bridwell. (e.) 2's with Mrs. Mitchell. (f.) 1's with Mrs. Bridwell.  
Enroll carefully as to street and number, bring all irregulars to Central for classification.

- Tuesday Afternoon**  
1. Teachers three wards meet Superintendent at Central for comparison and adjustment of numbers.  
2. High School teachers meet and adjust noon, ground, and other duties.

- Wednesday Morning**  
Ward teachers draw books from book room in following order: (1) West Ward; (2) South Ward; (3) Central Ward.  
All orders for books should be made out in duplicate.  
High School pupils meet at the High School for classification and enrollment.

- Wednesday Afternoon**  
Examination of irregulars for classification.  
**Thursday Morning**  
High School draw books.  
Ward teachers make out book cards, place books on each child's desk with covers.  
(Be sure each number is recorded on card.)  
**Thursday Afternoon**  
Finish work of morning and prepare daily program in duplicate.  
**Friday Morning**  
Pupils assemble at nine o'clock, lessons assigned, and books covered.  
Dismiss at noon.  
**Friday Afternoon**  
General Session of Teachers:  
Discussion of examinations:

## OKLAHOMA OFFICER CHARGES REPUBLICANS WITH BLACKMAIL

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 30.—Lieut. Governor M. E. Trapp was arrested at his home today by a deputy sheriff on a charge of perjury in connection with the alleged transaction in Seminole county three years ago. He is also charged in the complaint with preparing false testimony.

Mr. Trapp was victorious in the recent primary and was re-nominated for lieutenant governor on the Democratic ticket. He issued a statement shortly after being arrested in which he said, "this is the same matter which was made the basis for an attack upon me by the Republican house of representatives two years ago. It is plainly apparent that the complaint was drawn up as a piece of Republican political blackmail, and comes following a conference of Republican leaders who assembled here for the state Republican convention this week. I was vindicated of this charge nearly two years ago, and I am not worried one bit about the complaint."

## 300 LOST IN JAPAN WATERS

TOKIO, Japan, Aug. 30.—The Japanese cruiser Nitaka went down in a typhoon off the Kamchatka coast on August 26th, according to reports just received here. The reports say that virtually all hands were lost. Confirmed advices received by the Japanese admiralty say that practically none of the crew of three hundred men was saved. The destroyer Maki has been ordered to the scene of the disaster.

## GINS HUMMING AND COTTON COMING FAST

The continued dry weather is popping the cotton and the demand for pickers is here before summer time weather disappears. The gins can be heard humming and new bales of cotton can be seen on the streets at all hours of the day. About twenty bales were marketed here Tuesday, and up to Tuesday night, forty bales had been weighed at the local yards since the first bale came in.

## HARDING OBJECTS NEW BONUS BILL

WASHINGTON, August 30.—White House callers who went to the president's home today to discuss the soldier bonus bill with him came away with the impression that the chief executive regarded the addition to the McNary reclamation and the Simmons foreign debt amendments as adopted by the senate yesterday, as making the measure more objectionable than the original form of the bill.

## JURY GETS NAMES MINE MURDERERS

(By Associated Press)

MARION, Ill., Aug. 30.—The names of several hundred persons, alleged participants in the Herrin massacre, have been furnished to the grand jury which is in session making a thorough investigation of the affair, it was learned today.

Every name furnished to the grand jury is entered on a card and as the evidence is brought out it is attached to the card bearing the name of the persons the evidence concerns.

The grand jury is receiving many anonymous communications furnishing new leads and giving names of persons suggested as witnesses, and the names of men alleged to have been seen in the "death march." Notwithstanding that the testimony of some witnesses is proving disappointing, the officials say that the investigation is making good progress.

## TEXAS NEGRO FOUND HANGING IN LOUISIANA

(By Associated Press)

SHREVEPORT, La., Aug. 30.—The body of Thomas Rivers, a negro, who is alleged to have made a confession to assaulting a white woman in this city, was found today by the Bossier parish authorities hanging from a tree twelve miles from here. He was taken from the officers by a mob last night as he was being transferred to Benton, La., for safe keeping. The negro is alleged to have attempted an assault on a white girl at Marshall, Texas, about one month ago.

## MINERS DISPUTE OVER CONTRACT

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, August 30.—When spokesmen for the anthracite miners and operators left here early today after an all-night conference, it was said the only obstacle remaining to prevent the resumption of hard coal production was the dispute over the length of time the wage contracts should run.

The operators insist that the new contracts should terminate on April 1, 1923, while the spokesman for the miners desired a much longer term through which to maintain the war time wage rates, which were in effect last April when the work was suspended and the miners went out on a strike.

A decision on the question will be put up to responsible groups which will be empowered to speak for all the miners and all the employers concerned.



## HOPE WANES FOR RESCUING 48 MINERS

(By Associated Press)

JACKSON, Calif., Aug. 30.—All hope of rescuing the forty-eight men entombed in the Argonaut gold mine waned today. Rescuers continue in their desperate efforts to extinguish the fire which has the entombed men shut off from the mouth of the mine. The work of the rescue party is being greatly hampered by the intense heat and smoke.

## THREE KILLED WITH IRON BAR AS ENTER HOME

(By Associated Press)

CANTON, Ohio, Aug. 30.—Two women and one man were murdered and another man was wounded today by an unknown man who laid in wait for his victims and struck them down with an iron bar as they entered the house where he was in hiding. The dead are Frank Burns, age 25; and his wife, Mrs. Freda Burns, age 27; and Mrs. Mary Nola, age 20. Luther Armstrong, age 22, suffered scalp wounds.

A pile of rags and paper was found burning in the house, the blaze evidently being started by the murderer to cover up the crime, the police say. Mrs. Nola and her husband are known to have been separated. The police are holding Armstrong, who has not made a statement.

## CANADA'S DAIRY EXPORT TRADE HAS EIG INCREASE

(By Associated Press)

MONTREAL, P. Q., Aug. 30.—Canada's export dairy trade has made important advances this year. The increase to the British Isles has been especially large, more than 100,000 packages of butter having been shipped from Montreal up to August 1, compared with 10,000 for the same period last year.

During the month ending July 15, forty-five carloads of butter from Manitoba were exported. Thirty carloads of Saskatchewan butter will reach British markets before the end of the year.

**MAN WITH GOLDEN RIBS LIVES IN FEAR OF THIEVES**

BERLIN, Aug. 30.—A young man with ribs of gold and platinum is working in a cigarette factory at Breslau.

When he was a locksmith's apprentice several years ago, he fell from the roof of a house and was badly injured. He was taken to a hospital where the doctors found that his skull was fractured and all his ribs but one were broken. The youth was in

the hospital for no less than four and a half years, and finally the surgeons undertook to repair or replace his shattered ribs. A metal plate was inserted in his skull and the fractured bones were replaced by ribs of gold and platinum. Two and a half years

later the man was able to leave the hospital, and since then he has been working in a cigarette factory. In view of the present value of gold and platinum, it is evident that he is carrying about in his body quite a considerable amount of wealth, and it is stated that special measures are being taken to protect him against criminals.

## MANY AFTER GARMENT PLANT

Ballinger has put in a bid for a branch of the Miller Manufacturing Company plant, according to Stuart L. Williams, who returned from Dallas and Fort Worth Wednesday morning.

Mr. Williams stated that he visited the Miller Manufacturing Company while in Fort Worth and placed before them the advantages offered here for such an enterprise, and that the company promised to investigate this place.

The Miller Manufacturing Company has been operating a garment making plant in Ft. Worth, and has been very successful, working about three hundred employees, up until a short time ago when they experienced labor trouble. It will be recalled that the strikers kidnaped one of the women working in the plant and carried her to the country where she was severely beaten, and pickets are still on duty at the plant threatening workers who take the places of the strikers.

As a result of the labor troubles the company has decided to split its \$200,000 plant into about three plants, locate one in North Texas, one in South Texas and one in West Texas. Paris has been selected for the North Texas site. Mr. Williams was informed by the manager that about forty Texas towns had made bids for plants, offering inducements, and that the various places were being investigated. The company pays a wage of from \$4 to \$6 per day and will employ about fifty women for each plant.

## SCIENTISTS FIND STONE WRITINGS IN IRELAND

(By Associated Press) BELFAST, Aug. 30.—The site of one of the earliest Christian monasteries in Ireland has been found at Mahee Island, Straungford Lough, near Belfast. The ruins have been identified as those of Nedrum monastery, mentioned in Maireh's "Life of St. Patrick," written before 699 A. D.

Extensive excavations have been carried out and valuable material, including some stones with writing, the exact meaning of which has not yet been ascertained, have been unearthed. Some of the writings are believed to be of Danish origin.

In Gede's "Ecclesiastical History" it is recorded that in 634 Pope Honorius wrote to certain bishops of the Irish Church about the Paschal controversy and Pelagian heresy, and one of the bishops mentioned in this letter is Cromoous, Bishop of Nedrum. The island of Nedrum was afterwards named Mahee, after a bishop of the monastery.

## GRAND JURY FINDS 2 BILLS
