STRIKING SHOPMEN IN SECRET CAUCUS

Setting Stage for Fair; Regimental Band Coming

Plans were being perfected Monday for music for the Runnels County Fair, and it was announced that the 142nd Regimental Band, of Brownwood, would furnish music for the three days. The band is playing at the American Legion convention at Waco the first part of the week, and will play for the Runnels county celebration here the last three days of this week. This band won first place at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at Plainview last spring and also won first place in the state contest at Amarillo.

An announcement of much interest to the women, especially the women who are interested in home economics, was made Monday morning, Mrs. J. L. Landrum, an expert in home economics, will be here and have charge of the home economics building and will assist Miss Stone from A. & M. College in holding group meetings and instructing the ladies in home economics during the fair. This will be worth much to the women who have the problems of home to contend with and especially the farm women.

All buildings are being put in order, and the doors to the exhibit buildings and the gates to the livestock yards will swing open on scheduled time Thursday. The merchants' exposition will be held in the Ballinger Club building fronting the court house square on Seventh Street, and in the National Guard Armory building next door to Brewer's jewelry store on Hutchings Ave. The agricultural and home economics exhibits will be made in the Rogers-Higdon Co. building, and the poultry exhibit will occupy the Giesecke building on

8th Street. The livestock pens are in the wagon yard South of the court house square.

The Donald McGregor Shows are here setting up for the week, and the fair committee has booked a number of free attractions, including a fireworks display. There will be something doing all the time for the three days and nights, and Ballinger is prepared to take care of the large crowds which are expected to throng the thoroughfares of the city during the fair.

The official program is being perfected and will be issued Tuesday.

CITY GETS FRESH WATER SUPPLY

Coming from the North Sunday morning about ten o'clock a good rain drenched the North half of Runnels county, and carried showers to other parts of the county.

The rainfall at Ballinger amounted to six-tenths of an inch and at Norton and further West the precipitation amounted to about half an inch. Winters, Hatchel and the country East of Winters reported the heaviest rain. The precipitation was sufficient to put out considerable water and put both Elm and Coyote creeks to running and the two city lakes were filled and water sent over the lower dam Monday morning.

Considerable wind accompanied the rain, but no serious damage was reported and the damage to cotton will not amount to much.

An East wind prevailed through a good part of Sunday afternoon, shifting to the North Sunday night, and Monday brought the first fall weather, with a clear sky and conditions favorable for resuming cotton picking.

Her condition this afternoon showed improvement which began last night. An official bulletin said the wife of the president spent a less restless night last night and complications were subsiding generally and her condition improving.

Harding spent a fairly restful night last night, but there was no marked change in her condition, according to Secretary Wallace, who called at the White House shortly after eight o'clock this morning and received an official report of her condition. There is much apprehension that she will not recover, and close friends of the president and family are keeping informed.

DATE SET FOR DIXIE GAMES

FT. WORTH, Sept. 11.—The first game of the annual Dixie baseball championship series between the pennant winners of the Texas League and the Southern Association, will be played in Fort Worth on Saturday or Sunday, it was announced today. The Fort Worth and Mobile teams will play for the Southern states' championship in Class A baseball, with the first two games to be played at Fort Worth and the next two in Mobile.

Fort Worth has won the Texas League pennant two years and has also taken the Dixie flag twice, in 1920 from Little Rock, Arkansas, and in 1921 from Memphis, Tennessee. The Mobile club ended in the "cellar" in the Southern Association last year, but taking "spirits" from that position, has charged thru the Southern this year, going out several games ahead of Memphis.

RATE HEARING MAY SAVE ROAD

DALLAS, Sept. 11.—Financial relief, long needed by the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway system, will soon be received and the 737 miles of railroad composing this system will be saved for the one hundred points now dependent on its operation for their existence, provided the Railroad Commission of Texas grants the application of the K. C. M. & O. Ry. for differential rates at its local points, which application is set for hearing in Austin on Sept. 13, according to the transportation department of the Texas Chamber of Commerce which will have representatives at the hearing to ask that the application be granted.

The fate of the Orient Railway has been hanging in the balance for some time. It appeared at one time that it would have to be junked, as it was impossible to borrow any more capital and its income was not sufficient to meet operating expenses, to say nothing of interest on its forty five million dollars outstanding securities. This condition was due partly to the fact that the Orient is so situated that it cannot command any appreciable amount of through business and the territory it traverses is in process of development and does not originate or consume enough tonnage to keep up the road. Its divisional arrangements with other lines have also been unsatisfactory.

SCHOOL BEGINS ON FULL TIME

After devoting the first week to institute work and to the matter of organizing the classes, the Ballinger schools began on regular schedule Monday morning with a full house.

Reports from the ward schools and from the high school indicate that all rooms are well filled with clean, healthy, ambitious pupils, who are striving under the faithful help of their parents to better equip themselves for places of usefulness in life.

No time was lost in taking up the regular schedule of work Monday morning. Aside from a few who did not enroll last week, all pupils were in their places with their lessons assigned when school convened, and the time generally lost in classifying and organizing was made up last week.

The only changes reported since the grades were assigned last week, is the privilege extended to the Fifth and Sixth Grades of South Ballinger to attend the South Ward, if they so desired. It was at first announced that nothing higher than the fourth grade would be taught in the South Ward, but those in the Fifth and Sixth who live in South Ballinger and who prefer going to the South Ward school may do so.

While working under some disadvantages, due to crowded conditions, and shortage of equipment, the term promises to be a successful one. The board and faculty are doing the best possible under the circumstances, and it is up to the parents and pupils to do the rest by co-operating for the best interests of the schools.

TIGERT MEETS WITH TEXAS EDUCATORS

AUSTIN, Sept. 11.—John J. Tigert, of Washington, National Commissioner of Education, today conferred with Miss Annie Webb Blanton, State Superintendent, on educational activities in Texas. He will address the state officials late today.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—Leaders of the striking railway shopmen were in session today at what was heralded as a peace meeting intended to effect a new policy for the shopmen. The action to be considered is being guarded closely and nothing is being given out to indicate what course the strikers intend to pursue. President Jewell of the shops crafts, said that a decision would probably be announced tomorrow.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—Arguments in the government's action to make permanent the temporary injunction against the rail strikers opened this morning before Federal Judge Wilkinson.

Blackburn Esterline, assistant to the solicitor general, opened the argument for the government, and Donald Riechberg, attorney for B. M. Jewell, president, and John Scott, secretary and treasurer of the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor, represented the strikers.

Attorney Riechberg called the court's attention to the motion he filed Saturday asking for the dismissal of the injunction so far as it relates to his clients. Riechberg declared that the acts involved in calling and conducting the strike were entirely lawful. The restraining order, he said, was one the court had no power to issue because, he maintained, it is unconstitutional and in violation of the Clayton act.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty was attempted in the House today by Representative Keller, Minnesota independent Republican, who rising to a question of highest privilege, declared, "I impeach Harry M. Daugherty."

There was so much confusion that the rest of Keller's opening sentence was not heard. He was forced to stop talking on a point of order raised that there was no quorum.

The abolition of the United States Railroad Labor Board and the setting up in its place of a "disinterested tribunal" for the settlement of railroad disputes was proposed in a bill introduced today by Representative Koeb, of Kansas, Republican member of the committee which framed the transportation act creating the labor board.

After the confusion in the House subsided and Keller got a statement on the press table it became known that he demanded the impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty for "high crimes and misdemeanors."

Keller attempted to get immediate action on a resolution for investigating the action of the attorney general. The question was put to a vote and by an overwhelming majority the question was referred to the judiciary committee, thus disposing of it finally, according to the opinion of House leaders.

NEGRO RECEIVES LIFE SENTENCE

District Judge Woodward and District Attorney Early returned to Ballinger Monday to hear a motion which the attorneys for the defense said they would make in the case of Sam Moore, convicted for murder, for a new hearing.

The negro was tried last week for killing his wife and given a life sentence. The attorneys announced that they would ask for a new hearing and the negro was remanded to jail to await the action of the court. After returning here to pass on the motion Monday afternoon, Judge Woodward was informed that the negro had decided to accept the sentence and he was brought before the court and sentenced to the penitentiary for life. He will be carried to the prison, together with two Mexicans also convicted here last week, as soon as the transfer agent comes this way.

BEAUMONT—A total of 6,669,000 feet of lumber has been shipped out to Mexico, the West Indies and England from Beaumont this year. In all, 29 vessels made the port during the month of August. There were imports of 1,500,000 gallons of Mexican crude, which was brought to the Magnolia Refinery for refining. Oil shipments from the Magnolia Refinery exceeded those for any month this year. A total of 60,317,000 gallons went out.

STATE FAIR READY FOR BOYS AND GIRLS

Annual Encampment of Young Texas Farm Folk To Be Big Fair Feature.

Boys and girls from Texas farms will attend the State Fair of Texas at Dallas this year in number. Dates for the annual encampment and prize-winning contests at the Fair have been announced and officials of the extension department of A. & M. College are active in preparation for the events.

Members of accredited Boys Farm Clubs will encamp at the Fair Oct. 9-11. Members of girls' clubs will be at Dallas Oct. 12-14. Both boys and girls will be guests of the Fair in the big encampment building, and will contest for the three prize scholarships in Texas colleges offered by the Fair Association. In addition they will contest for the handsome prizes offered by the Dallas County Seed Breeders' Association.

The Fair scholarships in A. & M. College, John Tarleton College, or Grubb's Vocational school, will be offered, first, for the best record in corn production; second, for the best peanut production; and third, for the best record in grain sorghum.

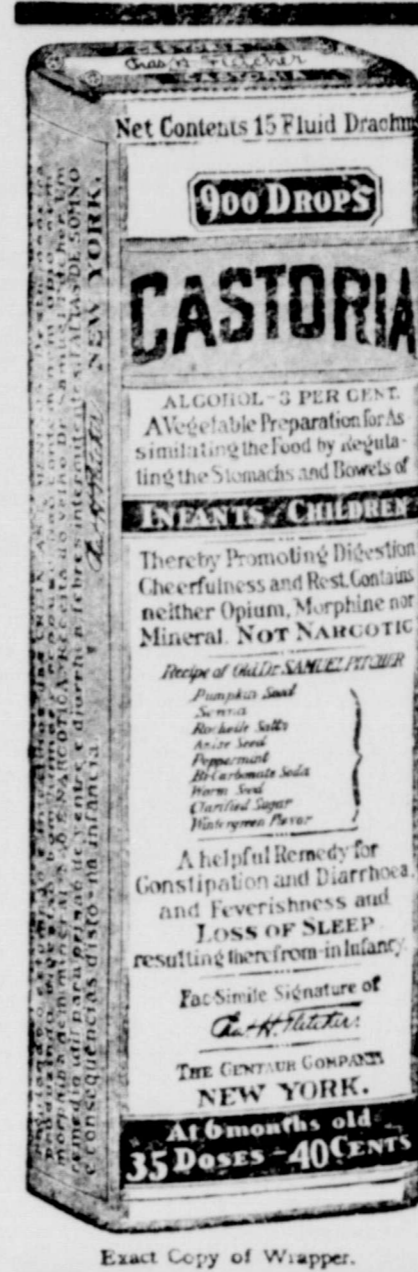

STRIKING SHOPMEN IN SECRET CAUCUS

Setting Stage for Fair; Regimental Band Coming

Plans were being perfected Monday for music for the Runnels County Fair, and it was announced that the 142nd Regimental Band, of Brownwood, would furnish music for the three days. The band is playing at the American Legion convention at Waco the first part of the week, and will play for the Runnels county celebration here the last three days of this week. This band won first place at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at Plainview last spring and also won first place in the state contest at Amarillo.

Landrum, an expert in home economics, will be here and have charge of the home economics building and will assist Miss Stone from A. & M. College in holding group meetings and instructing the ladies in home economics during the fair. This will be worth much to the women who have the problems of home to contend with and especially the farm women.

All buildings are being put in order, and the doors to the exhibit buildings and the gates to the livestock yards will swing open on scheduled time Thursday. The merchants' exposition will be held in the Ballinger Club building fronting the court house square on Seventh Street, and in the National Guard Armory building next door to Brewer's jewelry store on Hutchings Ave. The agricultural and home economics exhibits will be made in the Rogers-Hugdon Co. building, and the poultry exhibit will occupy the Giesecke building on

8th Street. The livestock pens are in the wagon yard South of the court house square.

The Donald McGregor Shows are here setting up for the week, and the fair committee has booked a number of free attractions, including a fireworks display. There will be something doing all the time for the three days and nights, and Ballinger is prepared to take care of the large crowds which are expected to throng the thoroughfares of the city during the fair.

The official program is being perfected and will be issued Tuesday.

CITY GETS FRESH WATER SUPPLY

Coming from the North Sunday morning about ten o'clock a good rain drenched the North half of Runnels county, and carried showers to other parts of the county.

The rainfall at Ballinger amounted to six-tenths of an inch and at Norton and further West the precipitation amounted to about half an inch. The Fort Worth and Mobile teams will play for the Southern states' championship in Class A baseball, with the first two games to be played at Fort Worth and the next two in Mobile.

Fort Worth has won the Texas League pennant two years and has also taken the Dixie flag twice, in 1920 from Little Rock, Arkansas, and in 1921 from Memphis, Tennessee. The Mobile club ended in the "cellar" in the Southern Association last year, but taking "spirits" from that position, has charged thru the Southern this year, going out several games ahead of Memphis.

RATE HEARING MAY SAVE ROAD

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Sept. 11.—Financial relief, long needed by the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway system, will soon be received and the 737 miles of railroad composing this system will be saved for the one hundred points now dependent on its operation for their existence, provided the Railroad Commission of Texas grants the application of the K. C. M. & O. Ry. for differential rates at its local points, which application is set for hearing in Austin on Sept. 13, according to the transportation department of the Texas Chamber of Commerce which will have representatives at the hearing to ask that the application be granted.

The fate of the Orient Railway has been hanging in the balance for some time. It appeared at one time that it would have to be junked, as it was impossible to borrow any more capital and its income was not sufficient to meet operating expenses, to say nothing of interest on its forty five million dollars outstanding securities. This condition was due partly to the fact that the Orient is so situated that it cannot command any appreciable amount of through business and the territory it traverses is in process of development and does not originate or consume enough tonnage to keep up the road. Its divisional arrangements with other lines have also been unsatisfactory.

SCHOOL BEGINS ON FULL TIME

After devoting the first week to institute work and to the matter of organizing the classes, the Ballinger schools began on regular schedule Monday morning with a full house.

Reports from the ward schools and from the high school indicate that all rooms are well filled with clean, healthy, ambitious pupils, who are striving under the faithful help of their parents to better equip themselves for places of usefulness in life.

No time was lost in taking up the regular schedule of work Monday morning. Aside from a few who did not enroll last week, all pupils were in their places with their lessons assigned when school convened, and the time generally lost in classifying and organizing was made up last week.

The only changes reported since the grades were assigned last week, is the privilege extended to the Fifth and Sixth Grades of South Ballinger to attend the South Ward, if they so desired. It was at first announced that nothing higher than the fourth grade would be taught in the South Ward, but those in the Fifth and Sixth who live in South Ballinger and who prefer going to the South Ward school may do so.

While working under some disadvantages, due to crowded conditions, and shortage of equipment, the term promises to be a successful one. The board and faculty are doing the best possible under the circumstances, and it is up to the parents and pupils to do the rest by co-operating for the best interests of the schools.

TIGERT MEETS WITH TEXAS EDUCATORS
AUSTIN, Sept. 11.—John J. Tigert, of Washington, National Commissioner of Education, today conferred with Miss Annie Webb Blanton, State Superintendent, on educational activities in Texas. He will address the state officials late today.

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—Leaders of the striking railway shopmen were in session today at what was heralded as a peace meeting intended to effect a new policy for the shopmen. The action to be considered is being guarded closely and nothing is being given out to indicate what course the strikers intend to pursue. President Jewell of the shops crafts, said that a decision would probably be announced tomorrow.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—Arguments in the government's action to make permanent the temporary injunction against the rail strikers opened this morning before Federal Judge Wilkinson.

Blackburn Esterline, assistant to the solicitor general, opened the argument for the government, and Donald Riechberg, attorney for B. M. Jewell, president, and John Scott, secretary and treasurer of the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor, represented the strikers.

Attorney Riechberg called the court's attention to the motion he filed Saturday asking for the dismissal of the injunction so far as it relates to his clients. Riechberg declared that the acts involved in calling and conducting the strike were entirely lawful. The restraining order, he said, was one the court had no power to issue because, he maintained, it is unconstitutional and in violation of the Clayton act.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty was attempted in the House today by Representative Keller, Minnesota independent Republican, who rising to a question of highest privilege, declared, "I impeach Harry M. Daugherty."

There was so much confusion that the rest of Keller's opening sentence was not heard. He was forced to stop talking on a point of order raised that there was no quorum.

The abolition of the United States Railroad Labor Board and the setting up in its place of a "disinterested tribunal" for the settlement of railroad disputes was proposed in a bill introduced today by Representative Koeh, of Kansas, Republican member of the committee which framed the transportation act creating the labor board.

After the confusion in the House subsided and Keller got a statement on the press table it became known that he demanded the impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty for "high crimes and misdemeanors."

Keller attempted to get immediate action on a resolution for investigating the action of the attorney general. The question was put to a vote and by an overwhelming majority the question was referred to the judiciary committee, thus disposing of it finally, according to the opinion of House leaders.

The Waco conclave promises to develop some interesting work for the Texas Legionnaires. The program calls for a great time for the former service men and the Salvation Army is to take a part in entertaining the boys.

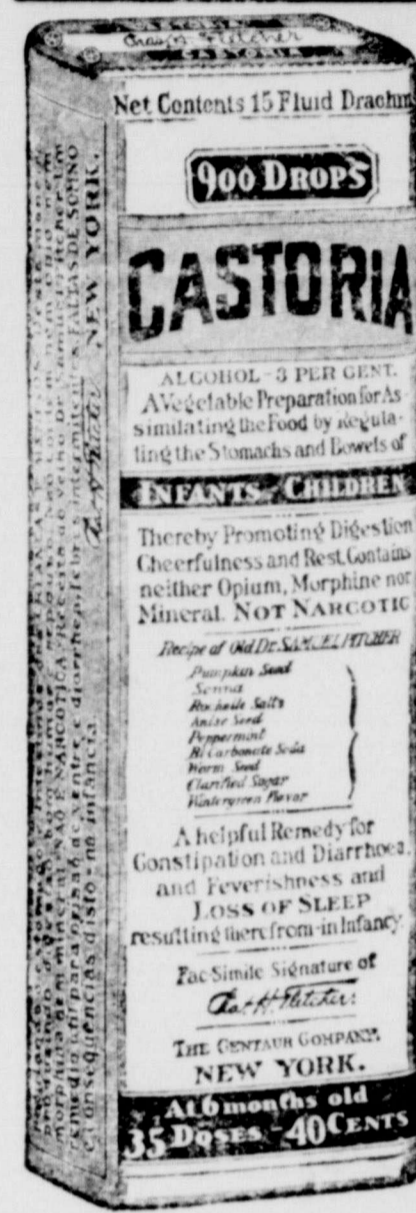
