BIG FALL FAIR IS OFFICIALLY OPENED

MANY RAILROADS ARE READY TO ACCEPT STRIKE AGREEMENT

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—The strike settlement plans provide for return to work of strikers in their former positions at a rate of pay to be prescribed by the United States Railroad Labor Board. Any disputes or controversies incident to the settlement will be referred to a commission of twelve members. Six will be selected by the railroads in an agreement and six by the shops crafts.

B. M. Jewell, head of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, would not announce what roads had agreed to the settlement.

Officials of the Southern Pacific, Texas & Pacific, Gulf Coast Lines, at New Orleans, said today that their systems were not included in the shopmen's strike agreement. Officials of the Cotton Belt, Katy, and Frisco, at St. Louis, also said that their lines were not included in the settlement, indicating that the terms proposed were not satisfactory to them.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Advices to the Department of Labor this afternoon from its representatives in Chicago, said that the railroads approximating 35 per cent of the country's mileage, had signified their intention of ending the shopmen's strike on a basis of agreement accepted yesterday. It was said that roads representing an additional thirty per cent are ready to end the strike.

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—Preparations for additional counter evidence against that being submitted by the government to make

permanent the temporary injunction against officials of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, was started today by the defense.

At the conclusion of peace negotiations between the shopmen and a number of roads, introduction of evidence to refute charges of conspiracy and sabotage was permitted, which the defense attorneys said could not be introduced before because of the nature of the peace negotiations.

90 NEW MEMBERS IN THE LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN, Sept. 14.—Communications were sent out today to the approximately ninety new members of the House of Representatives of the Texas Legislature by O. P. Basford, reading clerk, for complete information on their residence and addresses. Basford expects to have the House roll completed immediately following the general election in November. He is also making preparations for using the new automatic electric voting recorder which has been installed in the House of Representatives.

Approximately sixty of the 150 members of the House were renominated at the Democratic primary elections, reports received here show.

TEXAS MEXICANS IN CELEBRATION

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Sept. 14.—What is said will be the largest gathering of Mexicans held in Central Texas will begin here tonight, with the opening session of a three-day celebration of Mexican Independence Day, Sept. 16th. More than 3,000 citizens of the southern republic are expected to be here. The gathering has been planned by Austin Mexicans for all their brother citizens within a 100-mile radius of the capital city.

Speaking by prominent Mexicans will be the chief feature of the celebration. At tonight's session, the chief activity will be a dance. Mexican music by a Mexican orchestra will be in order at the occasion.

The climax of the celebration will be reached Saturday afternoon when the Independence Day activities proper begin. This day will be the anniversary of the declaration of independence of the Mexican government from Spain. Discussions of the republic, its resources and accomplishments, will be given by Mexican speakers.

Frank Prado and A. G. Nunez, of Austin, are in charge of plans for the celebration. Notices have been sent to Mexicans in all surrounding towns, urging them to attend the gathering.

Local Mexicans are also preparing a big celebration in Ballinger, commencing Friday night, when a grand ball will be the chief feature. Saturday will be observed with appropriate exercises, including a parade. Colorful costumes and decorations will, of course, be a part of the celebration dear to those of Spanish extraction.

FORMER CITIZEN SENDS FAIR EXHIBIT

Mayfield to Fight Attack on Democrats

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Sept. 14.—Earle B. Mayfield, Democratic nominee for United States senator, declared here this afternoon that he would fight most vigorously the attacks now being made upon the Democratic party in Texas.

"I will contest the attacks of those who would destroy the integrity of the Democratic party," said Mr. Mayfield in a statement commenting on the proposed fusion of the anti-Ku Klux Democrats and Republicans to nominate a candidate to oppose him.

"There can be no fusion because Democrats do not fuse with the Republican party or with any other political party that would destroy democratic principles," Mr. Mayfield said in his statement.

Mr. Mayfield referred to a meeting of prominent Texas Democrats and Republicans in New York on August 30th, at which time he said that an opponent to him was agreed upon. He did not say who the opponent agreed upon is, but said that it was "all out and dried at the New York meeting."

With the streets crowded, the exhibit halls jammed with people, and whistle shrieks of the small boy mingling with music of the band, the Second Annual Runnels County Fair was officially opened with a parade about two-thirty Thursday afternoon.

The parade formed near the jail on Sixth Street and Strong Avenue, and wended its way down Hutchings Avenue, through the business district. Art, comics, and commerce were pictured in the decorated cars, and beauty made up the cargo carried by the automobiles down the busy thoroughfares of the city.

The attendance at the first day of the fair was far beyond the expectation of the Fair Association, and a chorus of surprises were expressed on every hand at the displays put on for the second fall exhibit of the wonderful resources of this county.

It was expected that the first day's attendance at the fair would be made up largely of townspeople, but the streets were literally lined with autos from every section of the county, and from Concho, Coke, Tom Green, Taylor and other neighbor counties.

A slight delay was occasioned in the parade to await a delegation from San Angelo which phoned to the committee in charge of that part of the program requesting that they be given a place in the parade. Many San Angolites were here to advertise the San Angelo fair, and boosters for the West Texas Fair at Abilene which will be held the last of this month were also here.

Starting off without a hitch, or bobble to mar the annual festivities, the second and third days of the fair promise to bring record breaking crowds here. Saturday is expected to be the banner day, altho some claim tomorrow will see the greatest crowds. On Saturday cotton picking throughout the county will halt long enough to give the pickers an opportunity to visit the fair.

The Runnels County Fair opened Thursday morning and from the early outlook it promises to be the best fair ever held in this section. People began coming to the city early, most of them

bringing exhibits to be placed in the various departments. Early morning found the Merchants Exposition all set and ready to receive visitors. The process of decoration which has been in progress for the past three days and the appearance of the booths are much better than last year, and both buildings are truly things of beauty. Anyone trying to pick the prettiest and cleverest booth would have a hard time and then would likely be criticised at their choice.

One big improvement over last year is the Agricultural and Domestic Arts Exhibits. The exhibits in these two divisions are on display in the Rogers-Higdon building, and one must make a careful inspection to realize the beauty of the ensemble. All during the day Thursday excellent collections arrived for showing in this building.

A nursery has been provided in the Domestic Arts building, where mothers may leave their small children under the care of competent nurses who will attend them and serve the kiddies eats while the parents are visiting other departments.

The Poultry Show and the Fine Stock Show are in readiness and will attract their share of the

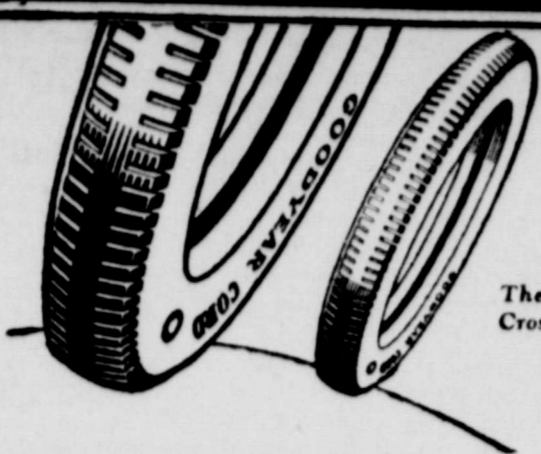

BLOUSES BORROW IDEAS FROM MANY SOURCES



LIKE the mocking bird who "borrows his little music scores" and "makes all minstrelsy his own," blouses look to every source for inspiration. Variety seems to be their dominant feature and they are, therefore, always a new story. Two of them, as shown here, are made of crepe de chine, but this is their only common ground. The long blouse at the left shows the peasant influence and is cut much like a smock, with pockets. It affects the peasant sleeve and makes much of peasant embroidery. The neck is consistently managed with its open throat and flat collar, and silk in two colors is used for the cross-stitch embroidery.

Bugle beads and small steel beads work out the curious and fascinating flower motif, with narrow border of leaves, on the blouse at the right. It is a slipover model, having the lower part narrowed to a hip band, with the fullness under the arms gathered into it. The unfamiliar and fascinating flowers that flourish at the front of the blouse thrive so well in the sleeves that they almost cover them. This

overblouse is so simply made that the average needlewoman can undertake it. The head work goes quickly and white beads are used on grounds in any of the fashionable colors, as Hindoo brown, Sorrento blue, almond green or black.

Besides the dressy blouses there are some interesting new shirtwaists of white wash silk and pongee that should enter into one's calculation. Tucks and plaited frills are favored for their simple decorations and they are made with long sleeves ending in shirt-cuffs or with elbow sleeves with turn-back cuffs. School and college girls and sportswomen have special need for blouses of this kind. Straight overblouses of serge, worn with plaid skirts, are something new. They are trimmed with braid and buttons, and sleeveless coats to match finish an ideal outfit for school wear.

As the rosy beams of morning herald childhood's happy days, And the shielding clouds of noontide guard its youth from folly's ways, So the grander clouds of evening, with their lights and shades combine, Speak a broader, deeper knowledge, and a manhood's nobler prime; Then the twilight of life's seasons calmly come and calmly go; Happy they for whom its storm clouds can a silver lining show.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS

THIS is the time to prepare preserves, jellies and conserves.

White Relish.

Chop four quarts of cabbage, a quart of celery, one quart of stringless beans cut in bits, one quart of silverskinned onions chopped. Sprinkle all the vegetables with salt, except the onions, using a cupful of cold water to cover. Let stand overnight. In the morning drain, add the onions and put over the fire; add one cupful of fresh-grated horseradish, one ounce each of mustard seed and celery seed, three cupfuls of sugar and a piece of white ginger root. Cover with good vinegar and cook until the vegetables are tender, then put into jars.

Green Relish.

Take two quarts each of green tomatos and cabbage chopped, one quart of green cucumbers, one quart of green peppers and a few white radishes, all chopped. Place the vegetables in a stone jar and pour over them enough cold water to cover; add a cupful of salt. Let stand overnight and drain off the water. Put three quarts of vinegar in a kettle, add three cupfuls of sugar, three small bags of spice containing one ounce each of all-spice, pepper, cloves, mace, celery and mustard seed. Cover with vinegar and cook until the vegetables are tender. Add more salt if needed and can in jars.

Pickled Mushrooms.

Gather the small-sized button mushrooms, peel and cook, adding one cupful of vinegar to a quart of mushrooms, salt and spices to taste. Simmer until the mushrooms are tender then can boiling hot.

Sweet Cider.

Any surplus apples may be put through the meat grinder, the juice squeezed out through a bag, then if bottled and bottled hot will never ferment. This is especially good for mince-meat, adding a little to the pie when they are being made.
